

Mrs. Victor P. Morabito

The San Francisco 49ers, oldest original major league professional football franchise west of the Mississippi, begin their 30th year representing San Francisco and The Bay Area with the 1975 season, and their 30th year under the basic original ownership with which they began.

Over the previous 29 years, the 49ers have established themselves among the most exciting and colorful teams in professional football. There have

been great players, great games and highly-successful seasons.

And there has been established a lasting tradition for operating as an always "first class" organization.

That reputation did not come easily and is the result of a strong pioneer-

ing effort-and enduring faith.

When Anthony J. "Tony" Morabito, the club's founder, watched the first 49er team take the field in 1946, he had set in motion the first major league professional sports operation ever to originate in the State of California.

Tony, later joined by his younger brother, Victor, survived those early days, many of them tough, struggling days, to achieve a level of success with the 49ers which enabled sports fans in Northern California, in fact, the entire state, to enjoy what has become one of the national hotbeds of professional sport.

In the beginning, the 49ers were members of the All-America Football Conference. They joined the National Football League prior to the 1950 season.

Tony Morabito passed away during the 1957 season, to be succeeded by Vic Morabito as the club's chief executive officer. Upon Vic's death, in 1964, Louis G. Spadia, then general manager, became the club's top working executive. He was named president prior to the 1967 season.

The San Francisco 49ers are a limited partnership with the major interest

being held by Mrs. Anthony J. Morabito and Mrs. Victor P. Morabito.

ROSTER NOTES

The eventual roster for each NFL team in 1975 will be 43 players. There will be no so-called "taxi" squad. All 43 will be carried on the active roster. Cutdown dates to reach the eventual 43-man limit are as follows:

Tuesday, Aug. 12 — 60 Tuesday, Aug. 19 — 55 Tuesday, Sept. 2 — 49 Tuesday, Sept. 9 — 46 Monday, Sept. 15 — 43

After the cut has been made to 49, there will be no recall allowed, nor will there be withdrawal of claims allowed.

On the 1975 49er roster there are six veterans in double figures as far as NFL experience is concerned. Tackle Len Rohde begins his 16th year, Quarterback Norm Snead and Cornerback Jimmy Johnson both go into year No. 15, Kicker Bruce Gossett begins his 12th season, and both Safety Mel Phillips and Offensive Lineman Randy Beisler are entering their 10th year.

FORTY NINER PROSPECTUS - 1975

A variety of available weaponry, a solid cadre of good veterans and a significant addition of young talent to the roster all make it apparent that the San Francisco 49ers could become, rather rapidly as a matter of fact, one of the more interesting teams in the NFL's 1975 title chase.

Not the least of a number of causes for a positive 49er view of 1975 is last year's strong finish in which the club pulled itself free of a seven-game losing streak to win four of its final five games and climb to second place in the NFC's Western Division final standings.

During that turn-around, San Francisco scored 14 touchdowns, with rookie quarterback Tom Owen at the controls, while a resurrected defense allowed only four TDs and accomplished back-to-back shutouts over Chicago and Atlanta along the way.

At season's end the 49ers ranked sixth in the NFC in total offense, fourth in rushing offense (highest since their 5th-place finish in 1971 when they won their second Western Division title), and 10th in pass offense.

Defensively, San Francisco ranked eighth totally, 11th against the rush and third against the pass.



TOM OWEN

The rise to fourth in rushing offense (1,981 yards) accomplished a jump from 13th in that category in 1973 and Wilbur Jackson (eighth-ranked among individual runners in the NFC) became the first rookie to lead 49er ground gainers since 1965.

Both Owen (88 completions in 184 attempts, 1,327 yards and 10 TDs) and Jackson (705 yards on 174 carries) were named to the NFL All-Rookie team and Jackson was NFC "Rookie of the Year" on the majority of selections.

Owen, a strong-armed, tough and determined youngster from Wichita who surfaced from being a 13th-round draft choice, is currently the leading candidate to establish stability at quarterback, stability that was disrupted when Steve Spurrier was injured (shoulder separation followed by surgery) in the final pre-season game of 1974.

San Francisco used live quarterbacks, including veteran Norm Snead, acquired in trade from the New York Giants, last year before Owen claimed the job in the final stages of the season.

Spurrier, who threw only three passes all year, and Snead, who performed well in spot situations (he played in only six quarters, completed 30 of 48 passes for 368 yards and two TDs while limited by a sore knee) are the only other quarterbacks on the veteran roster.



WILBUR JACKSON

Jackson, San Francisco's No. 1 draft choice from Alabama, heads up a potentially brilliant set of young running backs with last year's co-starter Larry Schreiber, the greybeard of the lot going into his fifth year, and Del Williams, Sammy Johnson and Manfred Moore, all of whom were rookies last year.

In addition, San Francisco dra'ted powerback Wayne Bullock (5th), from Notre Dame, and has signed high-rated Kermit Johnson, UCLA's all-time ground gaining All-American, whose rights they obtained in the 1974 draft.

Williams, who backed up Jackson last year, averaged 5.6 yards a carry and had the club's longest run from scrimmage, a 71-yard TD romp against Oakland. Sammy Johnson was Schreiber's relief

and averaged 5.4 yards per try in the role.

Each of the returning backs is also considered a good receiver and the 49ers like to throw in their direction.

Traditionally, San Francisco quarterbacks have always had good receivers to throw to and

with brilliant Gene Washington and emerging star Terry Beasley, both at wide receiver, and Tom Mitchell at tight end, the situation still exists.

Obviously, the unsettled quarterback situation in 1974 kept their totals down, but as a group they caught 9 of the team's 15 TD passes and averaged 16.8 yards per reception.

Washington, going into his seventh year, caught 17 of his final season total of 29 in the second half of the season, wound up with a 21.2-yds, per catch average and six touchdowns.

A potentially brilliant addition comes in the swift form of former Air Force Academy All-American Ernie Jennings. The 49ers drafted Jennings in 1971 taking a chance that he might want to play after his military commitment. He did and will bring, somewhat matured, the talent that enabled him to catch 74 passes for 1,289 yards and 17 TDs as an Air Force senior.

Backing up Mitchell at tight end will be 3rd-year man Al Chandler, acquired from Cincinnati in the off-season, and 9th-round choice Dan Natale, of Penn State.

For the past three seasons San Francisco's offensive line has had to survive a siege of injury, but that hasn't been all bad because survive it has and, in many ways, like Pollyanna, has become "better and better."



GENE WASHINGTON

In 1974, for example, the coaching staff was forced to do an almost weekly patch up job across the offensive front. At one time both starting guards, Woody Peoples and John Watson, were out of action, center Forrest Blue missed two games (but still made the Pro Bowl) and tackle Cas Banaszek played hurt most of the year. Big Randy Beisler filled in everywhere, though he, too, was hurt some.

Only veteran tackle Len Rohde, in his 15th year, remained fairly well intact, but he had to shrug off infirmity in order to establish his team record of 208 consecutive games played in his career.

What good has come from all this adversity is that now, because they have had to play under pressure, young men such as Watson, going into only his fifth year, Jean Barrett, into his third season, Bob Penchion, into his fourth, and last year's rookie standout, second-round choice Keith Fahnhorst, can be counted upon to perform reliably as their learning process continues.

The 49ers hope to furnish further depth to this unit with the addition of giant Jeff Hart, 6-5, 266, a third-round choice from Oregon State.



JOHN WATSON

In the 1975 draft San Francisco selected with a concentration on defense, particularly in the line, by making Mississippi State's big Jimmy Webb, 6-5, 248, their No. 1 choice, Wayne Baker, 6-6, 260, of Brigham Young, a third-round selection and Cleve!and Elam, Grambling's 6-3, 260-pound defensive end, a fourth-round pick.

Both Webb and Baker are tackles which means there will be a trio of large young men challenging incumbents Bob Hoskins and Bill Belk, the third candidate being UCLA's Bill Sandifer, 6-6, 278, himself a first-round choice from the 1974 draft.

Sandifer was hurt in a college all-star game before ever reporting to the 49ers last year, had knee surgery and did not play at all until late in the year. When he did begin work, however, he made a strong impression.

At the defensive end positions the high-quality tandem of Cedrick Hardman and Tommy Hart still prevail, healthy and moving into what should be the prime years of their careers. Hardman is entering year six and Hart year eight. Belk and Rolf Krueger are veteran backups and the aforementioned Elam could mount a strong challenge.

Skip Vanderbundt, former right side starter, shoulders the burden of replacing the retired Dave Wilcox on the left side of the 49er linebacking setup. Vanderbundt, entering his 7th season, played the position in relief of the ailing Wilcox last year and did what his coaches felt to be an outstanding job.

Wilcox's retirement and Vanderbundt's subsequent ascension to the job focuses attention on the backup positions to be battled for by veterans Billy McKoy and Ceaser Belser and rookie draftees Preston Kendrick (8th) and Dale Mitchell (13th).

McKoy saw action in all 14 games last year.

Young Willie Harper, whose first two campaigns have been outstanding, may make a move toward All-Pro status this year. He will return as the right side starter.

In the middle, nine-year veteran Frank Nunley reclaimed his starting job in 1974, performed well in directing a defensive climb from 10th-ranked in 1973 to eighth last year in the NFC.

Behind Nunley will be Penn State's Tom Hull, back for his second year, and there will probably be a challenge from Greg Collins, 6-3, 228-pound second-round choice from Notre Dame.

There was further good news for the 49er defense with the expected return of Jimmy Johnson, an institution as the club's starting left cornerback.



SKIP VANDERBUND

Despite the fact that he had one of his best seasons in the past three years and was selected to the post-season Pro Bowl, the 37-year-old Johnson had considered retirement, but indications now are that he will return for year No. 15 as one of the best cornerbacks ever to play in the NFL.

On the right side, Bruce Taylor, as is the way with quality athletes, has improved steadily and 1974 was generally conceded by his coaches to have been his best year. The challenges don't come his way as often as they used to and his strong performance was a key factor in San Francisco's third-place finish on pass defense last year.

Nobody has suffered more misfortune in recent seasons than San Francisco's well-regarded strong safety Mel Phillips. Mel broke an arm in 1972, the same arm again in 1973 and, last year, broke both arms and played in only six games.

But he'll be back, cast-free, for his 10th season. Last year young Windlan Hall, originally scheduled to be the starting free safety, moved in for Phillips and did a fine job, while thirdyear man Ralph McGill and rookle Mike Holmes handled the free safety chores. Holmes made some All-Rookie team selections on the basis of his work. McGill was the club's interception

leader with five for the year. He also played some corner.

And, this year, San Francisco reclaimed former No. 1 draft choice Tim Anderson, a hard-hitter from Ohio State who was the club's first choice in 1971. Anderson has had four good years in Canadian football and is expected to offer some immediate help to the 49ers. At the moment, he is projected at strong safety, but will probably also get a look at corner.

Kentucky State, was the first defensive back selected by San

In the area of specialty teams the 49ers have veteran Bruce

From this year's draft, fourth-round choice Frank Oliver, from Francisco.

JIMMY JOHNSON

Gossett as their incumbent field goal man. Gossett, like virtually every other kicker in the league, had a little problem adjusting to the new kicking rules last year, but still led the team in scoring (58 points), now ranks as one of the few men ever to score more than 1,000 points in a career. Bruce has 1,021 in 11 seasons.

Punter Tom Wittum enhanced his position in his second season after leading the NFC as a rookie. Wittum, also a place kicker who handled kickoff chores last year, averaged 41.2-yds per punt, finished second in the NFC and was the conference punter in the Pro Bowl for the second time.

The 49ers drafted for kicking depth when they selected the nation's top kick scorer from the colleges last year, Maryland's Steve Mike-Mayer, in the third round, Mike-Mayer, a soccer-style kicker who had 79 points and was the kickoff man for the Terrapins as well, is the brother of Atlanta kicker Nick Mike-Mayer.

Kick return men abound with Holmes, Manired Moore and Jackson all having done kickoff return duty last year and having averaged 24.5, 22.1 and 20.6 yards a try, respectively.

Moore, Ralph McGill, Holmes and Bruce Taylor are all better than adequate punt returners, with McGill and Taylor each having led the NFC in the department at one time or another in their careers.

Moore impressed last year when he returned one 88 yards for a touchdown against Atlanta to record the second-longest punt return in the club's history.



TOM WITTUM

BY POSITIONS . . .

OFFENSE

Receivers: Fine veteran Gene Washington, speed burner Terry Beasley and tough tight end Tom Mitchell are all high-quality performers. With a stabilized QB situation they could become a highly-productive unit with good depth coming from veterans Mike Bettiga and Robert West and well-regarded rookie Ernie Jennings, at wide receiver, and 3rd-year man Al Chandler, acquired in an off-season trade from Cincinnati, at tight end. Strong unit with speed and top talent.



TOM MITCHELL

Running Backs: Again, another unit with good depth—and youthful talent. Wilbur Jackson, despite a slow start last year because of injury, proved to be everything the 49ers thought he was when they made him their No. 1 draft choice, and the other rookies, Del Williams, Sammy Johnson and Manfred Moore, all proved excellent choices. Williams, a fast, nifty runner, could make a wide receiver and all of the rookies impressed as pass catchers. Reliable Larry Schreiber, last year's starter with Jackson, returns for just his fifth season. The 49ers drafted powerback Wayne Bullock, of Notre Dame, in the fifth round and signed UCLA's all-time leading ground gainer, Kermit Johnson, whom they drafted seventh in 1974.

Donnie Layton, from South Carolina State, was a 10th-round draftee this year. Young group with great promise, both as a group and individually.

Quarterback: Tom Owen's emergence in the second half of the 1974 season marked him as the top prospect for 1975. In all, he started seven games, proved an accurate, strong thrower with the ability to take punishment and survive. The physical punishment (he was sacked 25 times for 202 yds.) should lessen after his year's experience with both his own

receivers and the NFL pass rush. Owen, who completed 88 of 184 pass attempts (47.8%) for 1.327 yards, 10 TDs, was named to the NFL All-Rookie team. Steve Spurrier was scheduled to be last year's starter but was injured in the final pre-season game (shoulder separation followed by surgery) and played hardly at all. Norm Snead came to the 49ers via trade from the New York Giants prior to the seventh game of the regular season, played in only

three games (six quarters, in all) for San Francisco, but played well despite knee problems. After Spurrier's injury, the 49ers used five quarterbacks in all last year, but the situation seems to be settling down heading into 1975. There are no drafted OBs in San Francisco's roster, but five free agents will report to training camp -Craig Kimball, San Jose; Bill August, Brigham Young; Eric Scott, Illinois State; Mike Terrizzi, Purdue; and Joe Wagner, Wisc .- La-Crosse. Owen has the edge because of more playing time in '74, but Spurrier and Spead are both highly capable-and both will report healthy. Stability is the key.



NORM SNEAD

Line: With everybody healthy this is an outstanding unit. The long-time veterans-tackles Len Rohde and Cas Banaszek, guards

John Watson, Woody Peoples and Randy Beisler, center Forrest Blue-are all superior players, and the younger performers such as Jean Barrett, 6-6, 254, who started four games (two at guard, two at center) last year, Keith Fahnhorst, 6-6, 255, and Bob Penchion, 6-6. 252, played quite a bit, and well, last season. They offer good depth, could challenge for starting jobs. Third-round choice Jeif Hart, 6-5, 266, from Oregon State, and ninth-round selection Ceaser Douglas, 6-5, 272, from Illinois Wesleyan, are the top rookie prospects. Good personnel with the right combination of veteran experience and young talent.

DEFENSE

Line: At end, veterans Cedrick Hardman and Tommy Hart are a superb tandem in the prime of their playing careers. Veteran backups are reliable Bill Belk, who actually started at tackle most of the '74 season, and Rolf Krueger. Top rookie candidates are fourth-round choice Cleveland Elam, 6-3, 225, from Tennessee State, and eighth-round choice Preston Kendrick, 6-2, 217, from Florida, Kendrick, however, may play linebacker. At tackle, incumbents Bob Hoskins, who had a good year in '74, and Bill Belk, converted end who shared starting time with Stan Hindman last year, will face a challenge from last year's first-round choice Bill Sandifer, 6-6, 278, and this year's first-round choice Jimmy Webb, 6-5, 248, from Mississippi



BOB HOSKINS

State, along with third-round choice Wayne Baker, 6-6, 266, from Brigham Young, Sandifer, from UCLA, played some in the latter stages of the 1974 season after recovering from pre-season knee surgery. Infusion of top-grade new talent should make this a strong, durable and effective unit.

Linebackers: Former right-side starter Skip Vanderbundt takes over on the left at the spot vacated by Dave Wilcox's retirement. A strong performance from him is important. Willie Harper, going into his third season, may make a move toward All-Pro consideration on the right side. Frank Nunley reclaimed his starting job in the middle and played well in '74, with Penn State rookie Tom Hull seeing quite a bit of time in a backup role. Billy McKov and Ceaser

Belser were the other backup men. The 49ers took Notre Dame's Greg Collins, 6-3, 228, in the second round with the idea of working him as a middle backer. Chief aim here will be to toughen up defense against the run.

Secondary: Jimmy Johnson, returning for year number 15, had an outstanding '74 season at left cornerback, the first fully-healthy year he has had in awhile. He was selected to the

Pro Bowl. Bruce Taylor, who returns for his sixth season, had what coaches considered his best year. 49ers brought in Hugo Hollas and John Saunders as backup men, and rookie Mike Holmes and Ralph McGill also saw some reserve duty as corner men. At strong safety, outstanding Mel Phillips, who goes into his 10th season this year, broke both arms and played in only six games. Tough Windlan Hall, originally scheduled as starting free safety moved

into the strong position and did a good job, while McGill and Holmes shared the free position with McGill at the starter most of the time. McGill led the club in intercepts with five. Holmes was named to a number of All-Rookie teams. Biggest change here may come from San Francisco's reclamation of Tim Anderson, former Ohio State All-American, whom the 49ers had drafted No. 1 in 1971. Anderson has since played four years in Canada, but is now a 49er rookie and a probable strong safety candidate. The 49ers drafted three defensive backs—Frank Oliver, Kentucky State, 4th; James Johnson, Tennessee State, 9th; and Gene Hernandez, TCU, 11th. Despite some patchwork last year because of injury, this unit was chiefly responsible for 49ers' 3rd-place ranking in NFC pass defense.



CEDRICK HARDMAN

SPECIAL TEAMS

Good kick returners among the veterans with Bruce Taylor and Ralph McGill each having led the NFL in punt returns at least once in their careers, and Manfred Moore, Mike Holmes and Wilbur Jackson all having done good duty in the kickoff return assignment last year. Holmes averaged 24.5 yds, to lead 49er kickoff return men, while Moore, who had an 88-yd. TD return, topped punt returners with a 29.8 average. Among the rookies only defensive back Frank Oliver has had much kick return experience.

Tom Wittum, in his second season, was the NFC Pro Bowl punter for the second time. He was the conference's top punter as a rookie, second last year with a 41.2 average. Wittum is also a place kicker and handled 49er kickoffs last year. Field goal specialist Bruce Gossett, who led the club with 58 points last year to become one of the few men to have scored more than 1,000 points (1,021) in their career, returns for his 12th year, and San Francisco drafted (3rd round) Maryland's Steve Mike-Mayer, a strong-legged soccer styler, who led the nation's collegiate kick scorers in '74 with 79 points.



They yielded only 170 yards to the Bears, 99 rushing and only 71 through the air, and held them to eight first downs.

THE FORTY NINER STORY - 1946-1973

From a modest beginning in 1946, the San Francisco 49ers have grown into one of the most flourishing franchises in professional sports.

A major league football franchise in the City by the Golden Gate had long been the cherished dream of Anthony J. (Tony) Morabito, a native son and 1931 graduate of the University of Santa Clara. Failing to win recognition from the National League, Tony turned to the All-America Conference, which began operations in 1946 with the late Arch Ward, sports editor of the Chicago Tribune, as the guiding genius.

Although the AAC went under after four years of intense competition with the NFL, it proved Morabito's point that San Francisco was a major league city. Sports fans of the entire Bay Area took the 49ers to their hearts and attendance grew by the proverbial leaps and bounds.

The club's success was predicated on Tony's oft-repeated slogan of "Go first class or not at all," and his early organization was built around such honored names as Lawrence T. (Buck) Shaw, head coach; and Frankie Albert, Norm Standlee, Alyn Beals, Johnny Strzykalski and Len Eshmont—all of whom were already top drawing cards in collegiate and pro football.

The 49ers were the perennial runners-up to the mighty Cleveland Browns throughout the history of the AAC and, masterminded by Shaw on the bench and Albert on the field, became noted nationally for daring, colorful football. The AAC ended its short but exciting life when the Browns defeated the 49ers, 21-7, in the championship game of 1949, San Francisco, Cleveland and Baltimore became members of the NFL.

In recent years the 49ers have crowned the realization of Tony Morabito's dream by winning three division titles and, with the move to Candlestick Park, becoming one of the most successful franchises in the NFL.

In the years of their greatest accomplishments, the 49ers have remained what they have always been, an exciting, colorful football team manned by many of the game's greatest players. Here are the highlights, beginning with the first year in the NFL.

1950—The 49ers fell flat on their faces in their NFL debut, winning only three games. A rival coach described them as "not big enough or tough enough."

49ER STORY (Con't)

1951—In an amazing reversal of form sparked by a great rookic group, the 49ers were in the race to the final day and finished only a half game off the top. Led by Hardy Brown and his famed "shoulder tackle," the club had one of the toughest defensive units in the league. Y. A. Tittle and Billy Wilson began their great careers.

1952—After a blazing start, the 49ers slumped in midseason. It can't be written off as unscoccessful for Hugh (The King) McElhenny came off the University of Washington campus to become "Player of the Year" and the most feared runner in football.

1953—The 49ers had their best NFL showing, 9-3, normally good enough for a champion-ship. But Detroit was 10-2. Two of the San Francisco losses came with Tittle benched because of a severe facial injury. The three defeats were by a total of nine points. Joe (Jet) Perry became one of the few players in pro history to gain more than 1,000 yards in a single season. Gordy Soltau was the league's top scorer for the second straight year.

1954—Early momentum was broken by injuries to key players such as Tittle, McElhenny, and Joe Perry. Perry gained more than 1,000 yards again, the first man ever to achieve this distinction.

1955-With McElhenny hobbled by a foot injury, the 49ers had their second worst season in history under Norman P. Strader who succeeded Shaw as head coach.

1956—In Albert's first year at the helm, the 49ers were bogged in last place at midseason with a 1-6 record. They won four and tied one of their last five games for a brilliant stretch drive.

1957—This undoubtedly was the most emotional and dramatic season in 49er history. Every game was a "Cliffhanger" and the "Alley-Oop" pass from Tittle to rookie R. C Owens became a household byword. Emotions reached a peak when the beloved Tony Morahito collapsed and died of a heart attack at the Chicago Bears game on Oct. 27. Trailing, 17-7, the 49ers fought back for their greatest victory of all time, 21-17. The magnificent Wilson caught a pass from Tittle for the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter. Tied with Detroit at 8-4 when the season ended, the 49ers lost the playoff game, 31-27, although they held a 27-7 lead in the third quarter.

1958—An up-and-down season which finished on a high note when Green Bay and Baltimore were defeated in the last two games. The 6-6 record, however, was blackened by the 33-3 and 56-7 lacings at the hands of Los Augeles and Albert resigned at the end of the year.

1959—With Hickey in charge, the 49ers were in contention all the way and John Brodic came into his own at quarterback when he led the team to a 21-20 upset of Cleveland, J. D. Smith, converted from a defensive back, became the second 49er to accumulate more than 1,000 yards rushing.

1960—Hickey saved a seemingly hopeless season when he installed his Shotgun attack and the club captured four of the last five games to finish in a tie for second place. Third-string quarterback Bobby Waters threw the passes that upset Baltimore, 30-22, in the final two minutes.

1961—The success of Hickey's Shotgun amazed the football world, especially the 49-0 victory over Detroit. Quarterback Bill Kilmer, a passing-running rookie from UCLA, was made to order for the new offense. When the Shotgun was stopped, Brodie took over again in the T and had the finest season in 49er q.b. annals. Indicating the evenness of NFL competition, the 49ers were playing for a second-place tie, plus a trip to the Runner-up Bowl at Miami, or a fifth-place position on the last day of the season. The Colts again won by three points, but 1961 must remain as one of the most exciting and interesting years in 49er history.

1962—For the first time since 1956, the 49ers finished the frustrating season with more defeats than victories. In so doing, the honored adage of "it's easier to win at home than on the road," proved false—the 49ers won only one of seven at home, but captured five of seven road contests.

1963—Injuries in multitude to key personnel started the 49ers off to a disappointing 2-12 league season. One of the victories, however, was a smashing 20-14 upset of ultimate World Champion Chicago, the only league defeat suffered by the Bears all season.

1964—Club chief executive Victor P. Morabito died of a heart attack in May. Injury to key personnel prevented the 49ers from gaining enough offensive momentum to forge a winning senson, although they proved to be one of the toughest defensive clubs in the league. Outstanding rookie performances by end Dave Parks, quarterback George Mira and linebacker Dave Wilcox also took some of the sting from the 4-10 overall record.

1965—Outstanding offensive performances enabled the 49ers to jump from the bottom to fourth place in the Western Division as the team led the NFL in both scoring and total

offense. John Brodie was the most productive passer in the NFL, Dave Parks led the league in receiving and rookie Ken Willard and veteran John David Crow, acquired in an off-season trade, led a strong ground game. The over-all record was 7-6-1 and the season-opening 52-24 beating of the Chicago Bears marked the largest number of points ever scored by the 49ers in NFL play.

1966—After a somewhat slow start, the 49ers got in gear just before midway in the season and became one of only two teams to beat the eventual World Champion Green Bay Packers. After that, they rolled to a respectable 6-6-2 record and were in the battle for second place in the Western Division until the final league game. Guard John Thomas and end Dave Parks were All Pro, and they joined guard Howard Mudd, center Bruce Bosley, fullback Ken Willard and linebacker Dave Wilcox in the Pro Bowl.

1967—An auspicious start (they were 5-1) disintegrated into disappointment for the 49ers as injuries took a heavy toll and a six-game losing streak took them out of the running. Quarterback George Mira came off the bench to lead the squad to two season-ending victories and salvage a 7-7 record. There were bright spots, however, as, with John Brodie in fine form, the 49ers were the only team to beat the power-laden Rams in a league game, guard Howard Mudd and linebacker Dave Wilcox were named to All-Pro teams, and Mudd and center Bruce Bosley played in the Pro Bowl for the second straight time.

1968—Under new coach Dick Nolan the 49ers posted a 7.6.1 record as the season turned on key wins over New York, 26.10, and Green Bay, 27.20. Brilliant performances by QB John Brudie, receiver Clif McNeil and running back Ken Willard led a prolific offense, while tackle Charlie Krucger, linebacker Dave Wilcox and defensive back Kermit Alexander, sparked a revitalized defense. McNeil and guard Howard Mudd were chosen All-NFL, and joined by Wilcox, Willard and Alexander in the Pro Bowl.

1969—Beset by injuries that nearly decimated the defensive unit, the 49ers struggled through the early part of the season, went five games before beating Baltimore, the first time they had done that in 13 previous games. It got a little better after that (final record was 4-8-2) and five players—Jim Johnson, Dave Wilcox, Elmer Collett, Ken Willard and rookie Gene Washington—were selected for the Pro Bowl. Johnson was also All-Pro and winner of the Eshmont Award.

1970—This was the greatest year since the club became a member of the NFL in 1950. The 10-3-1 record was the best as an NFL club, the Western Division (NFC) championship was the first in the NFL. In a season of superlatives, John Brodie was the NFL's "Player of the Year," Bruce Taylor was NFC "Rookie of the Year," Coach Dick Nolan was a near-unanimous choice as NFC "Coach of the Year." Brodie, receiver Gene Washington, linebacker Dave Wilcox and cornerback Jimmy Johnson were All-Pro and joined by tackle Len Rohde in being selected for the Pro Bowl.

1971—The 49ers forged a 9-5-0 record and won their second consecutive NFC Western Division title, cinching the crown on the final day by beating Detroit, 31-27, the identical score by which the Lions had knocked the 49ers out of championship play in the bitterly-remembered 1957 game. The season was also the club's first in its plush new home, Candlestick Park. Center Forrest Blue, Incbacker Dave Wilcox and cornerback Jimmy Johnson were All-Pro and joined in the Pro Howl by Ted Kwalick, Gene Washington, Vic Washington, Cedrick Hardman and Bruce Taylor.

1972—Early-season inconsistency compounded by an injury to John Brodie in the fifth game of the season cast a pall on 49er prospects for a third-straight NFC West title, but Steve Spurrier stepped in for Brodie and turned things around with a brilliant, poised performance. In the final quarter of the final game the recovered Brodie relieved Steve, threw two TD passes for 20-17 win over Minnesota that clinched NFC West title No. 3, but Spurrier's nine-game contribution was the key. Center Forrest Blue, defensive back Jimmy Johnson, tight end Ted Kwalick, wide receiver Gene Washington and linebacker Dave Wilcox were All-Pro selections.

1973.—In what was both a disappointing and significant year, the 49ers were 5-9 after tackling the NFL's toughest schedule and falling victim to a rash of key injuries and an unsettled quarterback situation. It also marked the end of the brilliant careers of quarterback John Brodie and defensive tackle Charlie Krueger, both of whom retired at year's end. Center Forrest Blue and Daye Wilcox were All-Pro and joined in the Pro Bowl by Ted Kwalick, Woody Peoples and Tom Wittum.

1974—The 49ers used five different quarterbacks after an injury to starter Steve Spurrier a week before the scason opened sidelined him for most of the year. After winning the first two games, the club lost a team record seven straight and then closed with a rush, winning four of the last five games to finish the season at 6-8. Running back Wilbur Jackson was named SPORTING NEWS "Rookie of the Year" and was named to the NFL All-Rookie team along with quarterback Tom Owen and defensive back Mike Holmes. Center Forrest Blue and punter Tom Wittum were All-NFC and selected for the Pro Bowl along with Jimmy Johnson. A knee injury forced perennial All-Pro linebacker Dave Wilcox to retire after a brilliant 11-year career with the 49ers.

NINER NOTES

Morabito Fund

The San Francisco 49ers are one of the few organizations in professional sport to fund annual scholarship grants for high school and junior college students. The Morabito Fund, named in memory of the club's founder, provides \$25,000 annually to San Francisco Bay Area students hopeful of attending Bay Area colleges and universities. They are not athletic grants, but are awarded to a student upon recommendation and application based upon the applicant's academic promise. Since its inception in 1968, the fund has averaged 90 grants a year.

Mayor's Youth Bowl

The San Francisco 49ers and The City of San Francisco annually work together in funding many of The City's youth-oriented programs. Each year one of the 49ers' home pre-season games is designated "The Mayor's Youth Bowl," and one-third of the net proceeds from that game are directed toward operating young people's programs in The City. In the two years of its existence, "The Mayor's Youth Bowl" has contributed more than \$200,000 to the youth programs.

"Name" Backfields

The San Francisco 49ers have been known for their "name" backfields. From 1954 through 1956 it was "The Million Dollar Backfield" of Y. A. Tittle. Joe Perry, Hugh McElhenny and John Henry Johnson. Then, in 1960, came "The Alphabet Backfield" of Y. A. Tittle, J. D. Smith, R. C. Owens and C. R. Roberts.

Hall of Fame

Three members of San Francisco's "Million Dollar Backfield" of the mid-1950's are enshrined in Pro Football's Hall of Fame. They are Y. A. Tittle, Joe Perry and Hugh McElhenny. Another member of that same team, tackle Leo Nomellini, is also a member of the Hall of Fame.

Nomellini

Former San Francisco 49er tackle Leo "The Lion" Nomellini is a member of Pro Football's Hall of Fame, but he also has another distinction. He is the only player ever to make All-Pro both on offense and defense since two-platoon all-stars have been selected. Nomellini was an All-Pro choice on offense in 1951 and 1952, then switched to defense and was an All-Pro selection in 1953, 1954, 1957 and 1959 as a defender. Leo also played in 10 Pro Bowl games, two on offense, eight on defense.

Retired Jerseys

The San Francisco 49ers have retired five jerseys—Joe Perry's No. 34. Hugh McElhenny's No. 39, Leo Nomellini's No. 73, and, after the 1973 season, John Brodie's No. 12 and Charlie Krueger's No. 70. Krueger's jersey will be officially retired at the 49ers' first regular-season home game in 1974 against Cincinnati. Nomellini will make the presentation at "Charlie Krueger Day" in Candlestick Park.



During the regular season, all 49er road games will be seen "live" in the Bay Area over KP1X, Channel 5, and the CBS Television Network.



MEDIA INFORMATION

The football press box at Candlestick Park will open three hours prior to game time, as will the Curley Grieve Room (press room) on the promenade level. Lunch and other refreshments will be available in the press room, and there will be a snack bar in operation in the press box.

Western Union and Sportscom services will both be available in the press box and each will provide runners for copy.

All credential requests should be made to George McFadden in the 49er office no later than Wednesday prior to the game to be covered, if possible. No individual game credentials will be mailed. There is a special press "will call" booth at Gate A at Candlestick Park.


There is a limited amount of photo deck space available, so all requests for camera positions should be made as early as possible. When the space is all allocated, additional requests must be refused. Photo positions are on the second level of the press box and on the balcony areas on either end of the first level outside.

The press box is accessible only from the elevator from ground level. The elevator makes only one stop—at the press box.

With two minutes remaining in each game a member of the 49er public relations staff will guide writers to the team dressing rooms. From the elevator the group will walk the main concourse to the dressing room elevator. There will be no need to go onto the field.

Photographers working on the field are asked to check in at the dugout at the south end (first base line) of the stadium. They will be issued arm bands upon presentation of their credential. Food and drink will be available in the dugout at halftime.

STADIUM INFORMATION



The San Francisco 49ers begin their third year in Candlestick Park, now recognized as one of the finest combination stadiums in the United States.

Last season was the first that saw Candlestick in its completed form. completely encircled, carpeted with Astroturf, furnished throughout with comfortable chairs (no bleachers) and surrounded by adequate, and adjacent parking space. It was an immediate hit.

The completed stadium seats 61.-252. There are three major ticket plazas and entry areas, each served by escalators which move spectators to and from the various seating levels. Every seat in the stadium is a chairtype plastic unit for comfort and durability.

Completely double-decked, the park features a 6,000-seat movable section. Astroturf facilitates rapid conversion from baseball to football configuration.

Other facts:

Original ground-breaking for Candlestick Park was in 1958. The expansion program began November 19, 1969.

The stadium covers 141/2-acres on an 82-acre site.

Stadium diameter is 680 feet at its shortest, 840 feet at its longest.

The highest point from field to roof is 120 feet.

There are 29 concession stands, 54 rest rooms.

There are parking spaces for 14,400 automobiles in the stadium and auxiliary lots, as well as space for 175 buses.

Stadium construction required 1,034 tons of structural steel, 8,000 tons of reinforcing steel and 50,000 cubic yards of concrete.

First Aid is located on the main level concourse opposite Section 7.

Police Station is located on main level concourse opposite Section 5.

Lost and Found is in the Burns Security Office on the mezzanine level opposite Section 7.

Telephones are located throughout the stadium. Specifically, at each ticket plaza, along the main concourse and along the upper mezzanine level.

"WILL CALL" window is at Gate A, south end of the stadium.

Gates, A, E and F provide escalator service to the upper seating levels and are reversible for exiting after the game.
