A combination of a pouring rain, ankle deep mud and an inspired Eagle team denied the Rams in their bid for the NFL championship. Steve Van Buren, running wild for the first time against the Rams, gained 196 yards in 31 attempts to dominate the game, but scored neither touchdown. Skladany blocked a Waterfield punt in the third quarter and slithered over the Ram goal with it for one score while a Thompson to Pihos pass for 31 yards in the second quarter accounted for the other. The Rams never threatened seriously. Patton kicked two extra points, and 22,245 fans cheered desperately for the Rams despite the downpour.

Daniel F. Reeves

Daniel F. Reeves, majority stockholder and active director of the Los Angeles Rams, was born in New York City on June 30, 1912. He attended Newman Prep and graduated from Georgetown University. Mr. Reeves is a member of the Reeves grocery family of New York which sold a chain of 900 stores to Safeway in 1939. In 1941, he purchased the Cleveland Rams. Following the war, during which he served as a captain in the Army Air Forces, Mr. Reeves moved his club to Los Angeles. He also moved his stock brokerage business west. He is married and the father of five daughters and one son.

Fred Levy, Jr.

Fred Levy, Jr., was born in Louisville, Ky., on April 8, 1902. He is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania. He was partner with Reeves at time of original purchase of Rams in 1941, sold his interest to Reeves in '43 and re-entered the partnership in 1947. He served as a Colonel in the Air-Force during the war. Owns varied business interests. He makes his permanent home in Los Angeles and moved here from Kentucky. Is married and has two daughters.

Edwin W. Pauley

Edwin W. Pauley was born in Indianapolis, Ind., on Jan. 7, 1903. His parents moved to Pasadena in 1919 and Mr. Pauley attended Occidental College for two years and then the University of California, graduating in 1923. He was a tackle on the Oxy grid team and a member of the crew of California. Mr. Pauley, along with brother Harold, has long been associated with West Coast oil interests. He is the father of three sons and one daughter and lives in Beverly Hills.

Harold Pauley

Harold R. Pauley was born in Birmingham, Ala., on June 1, 1909. He attended Stanford University, graduating in 1928. He lives in Los Angeles and is the father of three daughters. Both Pauley's were tackles in their football days.

James "Hal" Seley

James H. Seley was born at Conneaut Lake, Penn., April 19, 1906. He attended Manual Arts High School and the University of Southern California, graduating in 1929. Mr. Seley is president of the Pacific Processing Co. He is the owner of the crack three-year-old, Duplicator, that ran in the Kentucky Derby.

Joe Stydahar, Head Coach

When Football's Hall of Fame is picked for all time, a big, good-natured guy from West Virginia will be a cinch for a tackle spot. That would be Joe Stydahar, who is in his first year as head coach of the Rams, his fourth as a Ram coach.

One of football's all-time greats, Joe was born in Kaylor, Pa., March 3, 1912 and moved to Shinnston, West Virginia with his family when he was four. He became one of the state's greatest athletes. He was twice an all-state selection as a gridder, once making the squad as a tackle and once as a fullback, and three times was chosen the state's finest center in basketball. He played third base on the baseball team, as well.

A spell of homesickness saved him for West Virginia as a college star. He entered the University of Pittsburgh in 1932, but after a month in training camp, he came home and entered the University of West Virginia. As a senior he was named to the All-Eastern, Little All-America and All-America squads. He played in the East-West game and the Chicago All-Star classic before joining the Chicago Bears in the fall of 1936.

Big Joe immediately became one of the contenders for the National League all-pro honors in his first year up. And in 1937-38-39-40, he was selected to the mythical team and was regarded as the best tackle in football. He left the Bears for service in the United States Navy in 1943, and was out until near the end of the 1945 season.

Joe played part of the 1945 season and all of 1946 before hanging up his cleats. In all, he played on five Western Division Championship clubs and three World Championship teams in his 8½ years of professional football.

He joined the Rams in 1947, and has produced a tackle who bids fair to give his mentor a run for all-time honors. Dick Huffman, bulwark of the Ram line, has made all-pro each year since he joined the Rams, at the same time Joe did, in 1947.

A thorough and painstaking student of the game, Stydahar has always been regarded as one of the best line coaches in the business. However, he is an astute strategist and a fine play-maker as well. A student under George Halas for over eight years, he has been thoroughly imbued with the teaching of the Master of the Midway. He commands the respect of his players, and gave the Ram line a spirit which, at one time during the 1949 season, earned them accolades as the greatest pro line since the Bears of Joe's hey-day.

Stydahar took over as Ram head coach between seasons and has piled up hours of work preparing for the 1950 campaign. With capable assistants, he has attended meticulously to each detail of the vast chore which comprises the organization of a professional football team.

Joe is married, the father of a son, David. He lives in Southern California.

Hampton Pool, Backfield Coach

J. Hampton Pool, in his first year as backfield coach for the Rams, is probably the most earnest student of football in the game. His background includes playing at every position on the team except tackle—he played fullback, quarterback, halfback and guard during his college career and was shifted to end when he joined the Chicago Bears in 1940. He has both BA and MA degrees from Stanford University and most of his studies were in football. His brief case—which is always with him—has become a by-word with Ram coaches since from it Pool can dredge almost any kind of football statistic to prove a point. He takes nothing on hearsay—he has facts and figures to prove that a back can start faster with a jab step or that five minutes rest improves the efficiency of a tackle. Hamp played college football at Stanford, after a frosh year at California. He earned All-Coast honors as a fullback before joining the Bears in 1940. George Halas, blessed with fullbacks who had finished one-two-three as ball-carriers the previous year, changed Pool to an end, and he stuck at that position for four years. During those four years—1940-41-42-43—the Bears fielded some of the greatest teams in the history of the game. Pool was a teammate of head coach Joe Stydahar and played against line coach Mel Hein. In 1944, he joined the Navy and was head coach of the Fort Pierce Navy Amphibs, winning 10 games and losing none. The next year, with a team decimated by the end of the war, he won 6 and lost 6 with an 18-man squad. In 1946, he joined the Miami Seahawks as backfield coach under Jack Meagher, took over as head coach in mid-season after the Seahawks had lost six straight. He managed to win two of the last eight games. The Miami club disbanded after that season, and Pool went to the Chicago Rockets as backfield coach under Jim Crowley. He took over the reins there after the club had floundered badly, and in his first and only game as head coach, held the Cleveland Browns to a 28-31 victory. In 1949, Pool served as backfield coach at San Jose State College under Bill Hubbard, and quit to enter private business. He still has an interest in a Chemical Extracting Plant, but devotes his time to the Rams. In 1949, he helped out at San Bernardino Valley College before answering Stydahar's call to the Rams. Pool is married and the father of a boy and a girl. He lives in Los Angeles—across the street from Stydahar.

Mel Hein, Line Coach

Mel Hein, new line coach for the Rams, is one of the few men who has become a legend during his lifetime. Probably no football player who ever lived is so thoroughly identified with one team and one position as is Hein. He played 15 years with the New York Giants as a center, and during that career—the longest ever played by a lineman—he earned all-pro honors no less than eight times. He is an automatic selection in any football Hall of Fame. His career extended from 1931 through 1945 and spanned a revolution in football—the shift from the single and double wing to the T. Mel played college football at Washington State, earning All-Coast honors in 1929 and 1930 and All-America in 1930. He played in the 1931 Rose Bowl, which Alabama won, 24-0. He was named most valuable player in the National Football League in 1938, and was honored with a Mel Hein Day at the Polo Grounds in 1940. After hanging up his cleats, he coached at Union College in 1946—he had coached at that school since 1943, dividing his time between playing with the Giants and coaching. In 1947, he joined the Los Angeles Dons as line coach, and remained through the 1948 season. In 1949, he took over the same position with the New York Yanks, and produced the finest line in the All-America Conference last year. When Joe Stydahar became Ram head coach, Mel was one of the two "musts" on his list of assistant coaches. Mel is married and has a son and daughter. He lives in Pasadena, Calif.

Howard "Red" Hickey, End Coach

Red Hickey, Ram end coach and a member of the team for five years, was born in Clarksville, Ark., Feb. 4., 1917. He earned letters in four sports at Clarksville High School—football, basketball, baseball and track. Upon graduating in 1937, he entered Arkansas where he played four years of football, basketball and track. He earned All-Southwest Conference honors in both football and basketball, captained the football team in 1940 and played in the East-West Shrine game in San Francisco the same year. He joined the Rams in 1941 after being purchased from the Pittsburgh Steelers who selected him in the annual draft. His first year in the big time he finished in sixth place among the National League's pass receivers. Following the '41 season, however, Red became a Lieutenant in the Navy and played with Great Lakes in 1942 and Bainbridge Navy in 1943, making the All-Service team in '43. Thirteen months as a gunnery officer on a tanker and Liberty ship followed, Red finally rejoining the Rams in 1945. A smart and elusive pass receiver, Hickey was the Rams' top touchdown producer in 1948, with seven TDs. In Red's first year as Ram end coach, one of his pupils, Tom Fears, set a new National Football League receiving record by catching 77 passes to eclipse Don Hutson's old mark of 74. Hickey lives in West Los Angeles with his wife and two sons.

Eddie Kotal, Chief Scout and Backfield Assistant

Eddie Kotal, chief bush beater on the Ram's annual safari for grid talent, probably knows more football players and college coaches than any one in football.

Ed attended the University of Illinois in 1921, then changed over to Lawrence College, from whence he received a degree in 1925. He has done post graduate work at Columbia and Stanford. He played pro ball with the Green Bay Packers from 1925 through 1929, and was a member of the first Packer championship team in 1929. He played with, for, and later coached with Curly Lambeau during this time.

Kotal quit the Packers in 1929 to return to his alma mater as head coach. In 1931, he took over as Head Coach and Athletic Director at State Teachers College in Stevens Point, Wis., and remained there until 1942. During this time he developed Ted Fritsch, present Packer fullback. Ed scouted for Green Bay during the time he was at Stevens Point and in 1943, quit there to go to work as backfield coach for the Packers. He handled that chore for the next two seasons, took over scouting duties for the same club in 1945, and joined the Rams as Chief Scout in 1946. This year he has added backfield coaching to his scouting duties, assisting Hamp Pool.

Ed is regarded as one of the most astute judges of pro football material in the business. Since joining the Rams he has turned up stars such as Larry Brink, brilliant end from little Northern Illinois State; Tank Younger, from Grambling College; V. T. Smith of Abilene Christian; Bill Smyth of Cincinnati and many others.

Ed is married, has two potential halfbacks and a daughter. He lives in Los Angeles and golfs as a hobby. He shoots in the low 70s.

Frank Leahy called him "one of greatest fullbacks of the season" . . . Earned two track letters at Iowa, heaving 16-pound shot over 52 feet for school record . . . Spent three years in Army, as a Corporal in Field Artillery in Europe . . . Joined Rams in '47, fractured wrist in training camp, but recuperated in time to shine in league opener against Pittsburgh . . . Fractured ankle three games later and was out for season . . . Top ground-gaining fullback in league last year with 582 yards in 155 attempts . . . strong candidate for all-league honors in 1950.

Ralph Pasquariello

Villanova Hgt: 6 ft. 2 in Wgt: 235 Age: 23 With Rams: Rookie

Born in Boston, Mass., May 30, 1926 . . . Earned letters in football and baseball at Everett High for three years . . . Entered Villanova after year in service, and lettered for 4 years there at fullback . . . All-East and Catholic All-America honors during career . . . Named most valuable player in North-South game in 1949 after brilliant exhibition of power running . . . Gained 1815 yards in 4 years carrying ball 380 times . . . strong with speed of halfback . . . Called best pro prospect in East . . . Single, lives in Everett, Mass

Dan Lee Towler

Wash. & Jefferson Hgt: 6 ft. 2 in. Wgt: 225 Age: 22 With Rams: Rookie

Born in Donora, Pa., March 6, 1928 . . . One of greatest athletes ever to attend Donora High, lettering in football, basketball, track and baseball . . . Set Western Pennsylvania Class AA scoring record with 166 points . . . Lettered for three years at W & J . . . Made All-Penn team in 1946, '47 and '48 . . . Little All-America in '48 . . . Slowed by leg injury last year, but this has been corrected by operation . . . Has amazing speed for size, running hundred in 9.8 . . . Was third in country in scoring with 133 points . . . Single, lives in Donora.

Paul Younger

Grambling College Hgt. 6 ft. 3 in. Wgt: 220 Age: 22 With Rams: 1949

"Tank" Younger was born in Grambling, La., June 25, 1928 . . . A football and basketball player at Grambling High School . . . Entered Grambling College in 1945 where he had a fabulous career on the gridiron . . . In four years of play, scored 60 touchdowns—25 in 1945, 10 in '46, 18 in '47, and 7 in '48—completed 43 of 73 passes for 11 touchdowns; led nation in rushing in 1947 with 1207 yards and a 9.8 average; picked up 2313 yards for the four years; named to the Negro All-America team in both 1947 and '48; played in three bowl games, Vulcan, Flower and Lions; led Grambling to runner-up spot in national Negro championship race in 1948 . . . Was a green rookie when he came to Ram camp, but became most improved player on team by end of season . . . Expected to star as linebacker, ball-carrier . . . Single, lives in Los Angeles.

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THE RAMS, 1937 to 1950

Homer Marshman representing prominent group of Cleveland businessmen, granted franchise by National League on Feb. 13, 1937 . . . Coached by Hugo Bezdek, former Penn State great, team wins one game in first year . . . Johnny Drake, Stan Pincura and Bob Snyder stars of team . . . Assistant Coach Art Lewis takes over ball club after four straight losses in 1938 and team wins four of remaining seven games . . . At close of season, Chicago Bears obtain Snyder in trade . . . Earl "Dutch" Clark, one of pro football's immortals, becomes head coach in 1939 and Art Lewis remains as assistant . . . Parker Hall joins team and is voted League's most valuable player . . . Rams win five, lose five to hit .500 for first time . . . In June of 1941, Daniel F. Reeves and Fred Levy, Jr., purchase Cleveland franchise from Marshman and immediately hire Billy Evans, former sports columnist, American League umpire and general manager of the Cleveland Indians, as the Rams' General Manager . . . The coaching staff is retained . . . Team wins first two games in '41, then drops nine straight to finish in cellar . . . Evans resigns . . . Team enjoys moderate success in '42, winning five and losing six . . . Charles "Chile" Walsh has replaced Art Lewis as Assistant Coach and Radio Announcer Bob Kelley is acting as Club Secretary . . . Lieutenant Reeves and Major Levy are with Uncle Sam . . . Chile Walsh becomes Head Coach in 1943 when Clark resigns, but the team is given permission to suspend operations for a season . . . Levy sells his interest in club to Reeves . . . Ram players loaned to other clubs for '43 season . . . Walsh appointed General Manager in 1944 and he in turn names Aldo "Buff" Donelli head coach . . . Pick-up team loses six, wins four . . . Donelli inducted into service prior to '45 season and Walsh brings in brother Adam Walsh as head coach. George Traf-ton signed to handle line. Bob Snyder returns to old team as back-field coach . . . Also joining the club was a rookie from the West Coast, Bob Waterfield. Rams strike bonanza, win nine games, lose one and defeat Washington Redskins on frozen field, 15 to 14, for championship . . . Waterfield named League's most valuable player . . . Adam Walsh named Coach of year . . . Reeves moves franchise to Los Angeles in 1946 and 101,296 seat Memorial Coliseum becomes new home of Rams . . . Success doesn't follow, however, and Rams drop four, tie one and win six . . . Adam and Chile Walsh both resign . . . Bob Snyder named head coach, Joe Stydahar of Bear fame becomes assistant coach . . . Reeves assumes duties of general manager . . . Injuries topple big hopes for 1947 and team wins six, loses six . . . Edwin and Harold Pauley, along with Fred Levy, purchase interests in the club . . . Early in 1948, Clark Shaughnessy joins staff as Advisory Coach and appointed head coach Sept 3 when Bob Snyder resigns . . . Team wins four of last five games for season record of six wins, five losses and one tie . . . An early season splurge, which saw the Rams win six straight, gives the club its first Western Division Championship in 1949, although the Philadelphia Eagles won the NFL title with a 14-0 victory in the rain at the Coliseum in December . . . Leagues merge, with Rams only remaining pro club in Los Angeles . . . Joe Stydahar takes over as Ram head coach in February, succeeding Shaughnessy . . . New assistants include one of football's all-time greats in Mel Hein, and Hampton Pool, fine backfield coach and strategist . . . Rams move offices from Beverly Drive to 7813 Beverly Blvd.
