OWNERS

Daniel F. Reeves

Daniel F. Reeves, majority stockholder and active director of the Los Angeles Rams, was born in New York City on June 30, 1912. He attended Newman Prep and graduated from Georgetown University. Mr. Reeves is a member of the Reeves grocery family of New York which sold a chain of 900 stores to Safeway in 1939. In 1941, he purchased the Cleveland Rams. Following the war, during which he served as a captain in the Army Air Forces, Mr. Reeves moved his club to Los Angeles. He also moved his stock brokerage business west. He is married and the father of five daughters and one son.

Fred Levy, Jr.

Fred Levy, Jr., was born in Louisville, Ky., on April 8, 1902. He is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania. He was partner with Reeves at the time of original purchase of Rams in 1941, sold his interest to Reeves in '43 and re-entered the partnership in 1947. He served as a Colonel in the Air Force during the war. Owns varied business interests. He makes his permanent home in Los Angeles and moved here from Kentucky. He is married and has two daughters.

Edwin W. Pauley

Edwin W. Pauley was born in Indianapolis, Ind., on Jan. 7, 1903. His parents moved to Pasadena in 1919 and Mr. Pauley attended Occidental College for two years and then the University of California, graduating in 1923. He was a tackle on the Oxy grid team and a member of the crew of California. Mr. Pauley, along with brother Harold, has long been associated with West Coast oil interests. He is the father of three sons and one daughter and lives in Beverly Hills.

Harold Pauley

Harold R. Pauley was born in Birmingham, Ala., on June 1, 1909. He attended Stanford University, graduating in 1928. He lives in Los Angeles and is the father of three daughters. Both Pauley's were tackles in their football days.

James "Hal" Seley

James H. Seley was born at Conneaut Lake, Penn., April 19, 1906. He attended Manual Arts High School and the University of Southern California, graduating in 1929. Mr. Seley is president of the Pacific Processing Co. He also owns a large stable of race horses.

Hampton Pool, Head Coach

Hampton Pool fashioned one of the National Football League's most remarkable coaching achievements in 1952, his first season as a head professional grid mentor.

He moved up from the backfield post he had held for two years and took the Rams reins after the club's league opener loss to Cleveland and Joe Stydahar's resignation. From there, Los Angeles climbed from the cellar to a Western Division tie with Detroit, winning its final eight league contests.

A painstaking student of the game, Pool dedicates himself completely to his profession. This, and an excellent background, made him well qualified to achieve success in his rookie season as an N.F.L. pilot.

Hamp played every position except tackle in his college and professional career as a player—fullback, quarterback, halfback, guard and center in school and end with the Chicago Bears.

Born March 11, 1915 in San Miguel, California, he attended Paso Robles High School and earned BA and MA degrees in education at Stanford following a freshman year at University of California and two years at West Point. Pool competed in both football and track at Stanford, 1938 and 1939, being named All Coast fullback in his senior year.

He joined the Chicago Bears in 1940 and George Halas, blessed with a bevy of established backs, shifted him to end. During Pool's four year tenure with the Midway Monsters, 1940-41-42-43, he was a part of some of the mightiest teams in the history of football.

In 1944, Hamp entered the Navy and became an underwater demolition man. His initial experience as a football coach came in the Navy when he was assigned to coach the Fort Pierce Naval Amphibious team. Pool's club, paced by Marshall Goldberg and Bill Daley, swept through a 10 game schedule unbeaten and untied in '44. The 1945 squad, decimated by the war's end, won six and lost six with only 18 men.

Released from the Navy as a Lieutenant (jg), Hamp was signed as backfield coach of the Miami Seahawks in 1946. The Miami club folded at the end of the season and Pool became backfield coach for the Chicago Rockets in 1947.

In 1948, he served as backfield coach for Bill Hubbard at San Jose State College, but quit after the season to enter private business, a chemical extracting plant in which he still hold an interest. Hamp helped coach at San Bernardino Valley College during 1949 and joined the Rams as backfield coach the following year.

Pool and his wife, Olive, have three children, Suzanne (11), Johnny (6) and Robert Norman, born just after the 1952 season. The baby was named after Robert (Dink) Templeton, Ex-Stanford track coach, Norman Standlee, one of Hamp's grid mates at Stanford, and the Ram's two quarterbacks of '52, Bob Waterfield and Norman Van Brocklin.

John Sauer, Backfield Coach

The 27-year-old Johnny Sauer became Ram backfield coach last February, following similar positions at West Point and University of Florida.

A native of Dayton, Ohio, Johnny attended West Point and played on the great Army football teams of 1943-44-45 as a halfback and quarterback. He was a teammate of the Rams' Glenn Davis on the Black Knights of the Hudson national championship juggernauts of '44 and '45.

Army mentor Earl (Red) Blaik made Sauer his assistant backfield coach in 1947 and the following year moved him up as number one backfield aide at the age of 22.

In 1950, Johnny became backfield coach at University of Florida under former West Point assistant coach Bob Woodruff. He remained at the Florida institution for two years and then resigned to enter the real estate business in Dayton.

Sauer's father, Eddie (Tubby) Sauer was a 6-foot 4-inch, 330 pound tackle star with the professional Canton Bulldogs in the early 1920's. Johnny stands 5-feet 7-inches and weighs 175 pounds.

William Battles, Line Coach

Bill Battles, 38, was named Ram line coach last February, following a year in that capacity at the University of Indiana.

Born in Boston, Mass., he attended Brown University and earned All-East honors as a tackle on the school's teams of 1936-37-38. He also lettered in wrestling. Battles' college major was psychology.

Bill played tackle for the Newark, N. J. farm club for the Chicago Bears in 1940-41. One of his teammates was Gene Ronzani, present head coach of the Green Bay Packers.

In 1942, Battles served as a construction engineer for the Royal Navy in the British Isles while under employment for Great Britain and the United States. He entered the Marine Corps in 1943 and served two years as an instructor.

Battles was an assistant coach at Dartmouth for four years, 1945-48 and at Georgetown, 1949-50, and spent the 1951 season as a freelance game scout for Eastern and Southern college teams and professional clubs.

Married, and the father of three children, Bill will be doing game scouting as well as line coaching for the Rams in 1953.

Howard (Red) Hickey, End Coach

Himself a standout end with the Rams for five years, "Red" Hickey has helped develop great Los Angeles' wingmen since 1949.

Hickey was a four sport letterman at Clarksville (Ark.) High School before entering the University of Arkansas. He earned All-Southwest Conference honors in both football and basketball with the Razorbacks, captained their 1940 grid team and participated in the Shrine East-West Classic that same season.

He joined the Rams in 1941 at Cleveland after being purchased from the Pittsburgh Steelers, who had drafted him. After finishing sixth among N.F.L. receivers in his rookie year, Hickey became a lieutenant in the Navy. He played with Great Lakes in 1942 and in '43 made the All-Service team while performing with Bainbridge Navy.

"Red" followed this with 13 months as a gunnery officer on a tanker and Liberty ship and rejoined the Rams in time to play with their world championship club of 1945.

During his four years as Ram end coach, Hickey has seen two of his proteges, Tom Fears and Elroy Hirsch, ring up three all-time N.F.L. records and tie for another.

He lives in Los Angeles with his wife and two sons.

Eddie Kotal, Chief Scout & Backfield Asst.

Associated with the Rams since 1946, Eddie Kotal heads up the club's extensive player scouting department. He probably knows more football players and coaches than anyone in the game.

Ed attended the University of Illinois in 1921 and then switched to Lawrence College, from which he graduated in 1925. Joining the Green Bay Packers as a halfback that same year, he played pro ball for five seasons and was a member of the Packers' first world championship team in 1929.

He was head coach at Lawrence in 1930 and then moved to Wisconsin State Teachers where he was head coach and athletic director from 1932 to 1942. Kotal became backfield coach and scout for Green Bay from 1943 until coming to Los Angeles in '46.

Eddie is credited for much of the success Los Angeles has had in unearthing such players as Paul Younger (Grambling), V. T. Smith (Abilene Christian), Ends Larry Brink (Northern Illinois State) and Andy Robustelli (Arnold) and Dick Lane (Scottsbluff, Nebr. J.C.)

He is married and has two boys and a girl. Eddie shoots golf in the 70's.

... New assistants include one of football's all-time greats in Mel Hein, and Hampton Pool, fine backfield coach and strategist . . . Rams move offices from Beverly Hills to 7813 Beverly Blvd., Los Angeles . . . In Stydahar's first year as head coach, Rams set 22 league records as they win National Conference championship in playoff game with Bears, then lose to Cleveland, 30-28, for world title. Ray Richards replaces Mel Hein as line coach for 1951 when Hein quit to accept job with USC . . . Rams go down to the wire to win National Conference title on last day of 1951 season and then beat Cleveland, 24-17, for the team's second world championship. . . Hampton Pool becomes Ram head coach when Joe Stydahar resigns following 1952 league opener loss to Cleveland, preceded by three straight pre-season game setbacks. Rams climb from cellar to divisional playoff with Detroit by winning their last eight regular season games. Lions win, 31-21. Line Coach Ray Richards resigns to join new Baltimore franchise at close of year and two new assistants hired: Bill Battles, line and John Sauer, backfield.

THE RAMS, 1937 to 1953

Homer Marshmann, representing prominent group of Cleveland businessmen, granted franchise by National League on Feb. 13, 1937 . . . Coached by Hugo Bezdek, former Penn State great, team wins one game in first year . . . Assistant Coach Art Lewis takes over ball club after four straight losses in 1938 and team wins four of remaining seven games . . . Earl "Dutch" Clark, one of pro football's immortals, becomes head coach in 1939 and Art Lewis remains as assistant . . . Parker Hall joins team and is voted League's most valuable player . . . Rams win five, lose five to hit .500 for the first time . . . In June of 1941, Daniel F. Reeves and Fred Levy, Jr., purchase Cleveland franchise from Marshmann and immediately hire Billy Evans, former sports columnist, American League umpire and general manager of the Cleveland Indians, as the Rams' General Manager . . . The coaching staff is retained . . . Team wins first two games in '41, then drops nine straight to finish in cellar . . . Evans resigns . . . Team enjoys moderate success in '42, winning five and losing six . . . Charles 'Chile' Walsh has replaced Art Lewis as Assistant Coach and Radio Announcer Bob Kelley is acting as Club Secretary . . . Lieutenant Reeves and Major Levy are with Uncle Sam . . . Chile Walsh becomes Head Coach in 1943 when Clark resigns, but the team is given permission to suspend operations for a season . . . Levy sells his interest in club to Reeves . . . Ram players loaned to other clubs for '43 season . . . Walsh appointed General Manager in 1944 and he in turn names Aldo "Buff" Donelli head coach . . . Pick-up team loses six, wins four . . . Donelli inducted into service prior to '45 season and Walsh brings in brother Adam Walsh as head coach . . . George Trafton signed to handle line. Bob Snyder returns to old team as backfield coach . . . Also joining the club was a rookie from the West Coast, Bob Waterfield.
