President & General Manager

DANIEL F. REEVES



Southern California today boasts major league franchises in baseball, basketball, hockey and soccer. But the pioneer in the East-to-West move, when such a switch was a gamble, not a guarantee, was Daniel F. Reeves, president and general manager of the Los Angeles Rams.

Reeves brought the National Football League franchise from Cleveland to Los Angeles in 1946, exactly one year after the team had won the NFL championship and more than a decade before any other major league sports group dared to move.

A native New Yorker born June 30, 1912, Reeves had been a football fan ever since he'd captained the Newman Prep School team of Lakewood, N.J. His introduction into the professional sports world came in 1939 with the purchase of Jersey City Giants of the defunct American League.

After unsuccessful attempts to secure interests in either the Pittsburgh Steelers or Philadelphia Eagles, Reeves became an NFL member in 1941 when he took over the four-year-old Cleveland franchise.

Along with millions of others, Reeves' personal career stood still when he joined the Army Air Corps as a second lieutenant in 1942 and returned to civilian life as a captain in 1945, just in time to see his charges capture the World Championship.

Reeves' career in sports includes many milestones besides that of being first to establish a major league franchise on the West Coast. For example, the Rams were the first of post-war NFL teams to play a Negro when Kenny Washington, ex-UCLA great, signed in 1946, a year before Jackie Robinson joined baseball's Brooklyn Dodgers.

Reeves instituted the Rams' famed "Free Football for Kids" program in 1946, enabling two generations of youngsters to enjoy the game in their formative years and, hopefully, remain fans when they grew up.

Ram experiments with television in the media's early days provided the groundwork for not only pro football's television policies, but most other sports as well.

Reeves was the first to employ a full-time scouting staff, an organization now regarded as one of a team's most important functions. Those are but a few of Reeves' contributions to pro football in particular and all professional sports in general.

These and other contributions received recognition in 1967 when Reeves was elected to the NFL's Hall of Fame, headquartered at Canton, Ohio.

The popular executive, a low-handicap golfer at Bel-Air Country Club when time is available, was graduated from Georgetown University. He is a partner of Daniel Reeves & Co. and a member of the New York Stock Exchange.

Reeves is married to the former Mary Corroon. They have six children: Moya (Mrs. William Bullis), Sheila (Mrs. John O'Donnell), Anne, Susan, Joan and Daniel, Jr.

Ram Coaching Staff

GEORGE ALLEN, Head Coach



After three seasons with the Rams, George Allen's head coaching record is 29 wins, 10 losses and three ties. This places him fourth in percentage among active pro coaches behind Johnny Rauch of Buffalo, Don Shula of Baltimore and Vince Lombardi of Washington.

His big year with the Rams was 1967 when he led the club to an 11-1-2 record and the Coastal Division Championship. It was the best mark of any Los Angeles team and the first time the Rams had won a title of any kind since 1955.

Assuming the head duties in 1966 after moving from the Chicago Bears where he was an assistant, Allen guided the Rams to an 8-6 record, snapping a seven-year losing slump.

In '67 Allen's Rams kept pace with Baltimore throughout the season, then beat the Colts on the final Sunday, 34-10, to win the title. He was honored as Coach of the Year by UPI, The Sporting News and the Washington Touchdown Club and Co-Coach of the Year (with Schula) by AP.

Last year the team's 10-3-1 record was good enough to win most divisions, but not the Coastal where powerful Baltimore compiled a 13-1 mark, the best regular season record in pro football.

Allen's trademarks with the Rams have been shrewd trading, defensive toughness and a comeback spirit which helped the club win several close games in the closing minutes.

The author of five books on football, George Allen began his pro coaching career with the Rams in 1957 after nine years of highly successful coaching at Morningside (Iowa) and Whittier (California). Following the 1957 season, Allen left the Rams and joined the staff of the Chicago Bears. Quickly, he became one of George Halas' most valued assistants.

The one-man boss of the Bears' defense, Allen molded strong units in his eight Chicago autumns. Perhaps the most famous was the 1963 group that carried the Bears to the NFL title by leading the league in 10 of 19 defensive categories and placing second in eight others. The game ball following the world title victory over the New York Giants was given in full view of a multi-million person TV audience and it went not to a player, but to assistant coach George Allen.

Allen was born April 29, 1922 in Detroit, Michigan and attended nearby Lake Shore High where he earned nine letters: 3 in football, 3 in basketball, 3 in track. He was Captain and All-Conference in Basketball. He then moved on to Alma College in 1943 (where he played right end), Marquette University (where he played football in 1944), and the University of Michigan (where he was on the wrestling and baseball team). He received his B.A. from Michigan in 1947 where he was a member of Sigma Delta Psi, national honorary

athletic and scholarship fraternity. In 1948 he handled some JV coaching duties there while he received his M.A.

Wife Etty and George have four children: George (17), Gregory (15), Gerald (10), and Jennifer (8). They reside in Palos Verdes.

RAY PROCHASKA, Offense

Counting three seasons with the Rams, Ray Prochaska has been coaching football teams for 23 years. Prochaska (pronounced with a silent "c") was offensive line coach of the St. Louis Cardinals for eight years before joining George Allen's staff in the winter of 1966. Earlier he coached nine seasons at his alma mater, Nebraska, until 1954, then was an assistant to Frank Ivy with the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian League before following

Ivy to the Cardinals in 1958. A 1941 graduate of Nebraska, Prochaska, 49, played three years of offensive end for the Cornhuskers, capped by participation in the 1941 Rose Bowl game in which Nebraska lost to Stanford, 21-13. He played in the College All-Star game, then signed with the Cleveland Rams for a season before entering the Army for 4½ years. He and wife JoAnn have four children: Craig, 22; Mark, 17; Judy, 14; and Scott, 5. They reside in Long Beach.



TOM CATLIN, Defense



A former Cleveland Browns star linebacker, 37-year-old Catlin served six seasons on the Kansas City Chiefs' coaching staff before coming to the Rams in 1966 as defensive backfield coach. This year he has been promoted to the new title of defense coach. He was an All-American center and linebacker at the University of Oklahoma under Bud Wilkinson in 1952, the last of his three varsity seasons there. He was drafted by Baltimore on the

fourth round, but traded to Cleveland where he became a regular linebacker midway in his rookie year. Cleveland won the World Championship in 1954 and second-year pro Catlin called defensive signals for that club. In March of 1955 he went into the Air Force, later spent his final months of duty in 1957 as Plebe Coach under Red Blaik at West Point. He returned for three more seasons of pro football with Cleveland and Philadelphia, then joined the coaching ranks. He and wife Betty have two children, a daughter, Kimberly, 10, and a son, Tommy, 9. They live in Orange.

TED MARCHIBRODA, Offensive Backfield

Marchibroda came to the Rams in the winter of 1966 after spending five years on Bill McPeak's staff at Washington. The 37-year-old Marchibroda is a former Detroit University passing great. He quarterbacked St. Bonaventure in 1950 and 1951, then transferred to Detroit when his first school gave up football. At Detroit he was among the nation's top-ranked passers and became the Pittsburgh Steelers' first draft choice prior to the 1953

season. He played with the Steelers in '53, and after a year in the service, returned to Pittsburgh for the '55 and '56 seasons before winding up his playing career in 1957 with the Cardinals. Ted's best NFL season was 1956 when he completed 124 of 275 passes for 1585 yards and 12 TDs to rank second in the league. He and wife Henrietta have four children: Jody, 13; Teddy, 12; Lonni, 10; and Robert, 7. They live in Orange.



HOWARD SCHNELLENBERGER, Offensive Ends



Schnellenberger, 34, was offensive coach of Bear Bryant's National Champion 1965 Alabama team before joining George Allen's staff prior to the 1966 season as offensive ends coach. He began his coaching career in 1959 at his alma mater, Kentucky, as assistant to Blanton Collier, then moved to Alabama in 1961. He went to the University of Kentucky and was an All-American end his senior year, 1955. He played with Hamilton of the

Canadian League in 1956, served in the Army for a year, then toiled for Vancouver in '58 before accepting the coaching post at Kentucky. He and wife Beverlee Ann have three sons, Stephen, 9, Stuart, 8 and Timothy 2. They live in Long Beach.

LA VERN TORGESON, Defensive Line

La Vern (Torgy) Torgeson, with 10 years of NFL coaching experience behind him, took over the defensive line coaching duties of the Rams last March. He replaced Marion Campbell, who went to the Atlanta Falcons. Torgy, 39, has a lengthy and distinguished NFL career, both as a player and a coach. Drafted by Detroit in 1951 out of Washington State, where he was an All-American, Torgeson spent four years as a linebacker with the Lions before they traded him to Washington in 1955. A knee injury cut short his playing career in 1958 after he had been All-Pro in five of his eight years, and he became a Redskin assistant coach in '59. In 1962 he left Washington to become an assistant with the Steelers under Buddy Parker. He remained at Pittsburgh under three regimes: Parker, Mike Nixon and Bill Austin. PRO: When Dick Bass breaks records, he makes sure there is plenty of distance between himself and whoever is in second place. For example, in 1966 "The Scooter" passed Dan Towler's career total of 3493 yards to become the Rams' all-time leading rusher. Two seasons later he became the first Ram over the 5,000-yard mark, and he is still going. His career statistics read like the club's records section. In nine years he has gained 5416

yards in a record 1217 attempts for a remarkable average of 4.5. He is the only Los Angeles player ever to gain more than 1,000 yards in a single season, and he turned the trick twice by traveling 1090 in 1966 and 1033 in '62. Bass ranks second to Don Perkins in the National Football League among active players in lifetime rushing and he is eighth on the all-time rushing list. His 248 carries in 1966 is a Ram record, and it was that year that he was named second team All-Pro by both AP and UPI. He also won AP's Comeback Player of the Year award, made the West Pro Bowl squad for the third time and was named the team's Most Valuable Player by Ye Old Rams. Last year, plagued by a nagging hamstring pull, Dick gained only 494 yards, yet averaged 4.1. His top yardage day last year was against Cleveland when he gained 134 yards on 23 carries. Other best days: 169 yds., 20 atts., vs. Chicago, 1962; 140 yds., 11 atts., vs. Detroit, 1962; and 137 yds., 23 atts., vs. Detroit, 1966.

COLLEGE: His collegiate credentials at UOP were so impressive that he became the first player ever to be drafted No. 1 as a "future" when the Rams tabbed him at the end of his '58 season. The first NCAA triple crown winner since Whizzer White in 1937, Bass rushed for 1361 yards, scored 116 points and had 1440 yards total offense in 1958.

PERSONAL: Dick was born in Georgetown, Miss., but his parents moved to California when he was five and he attended school at Vallejo. In high school his team never lost a game in four years, Bass scoring 109 touchdowns. He has a ten-year-old son, Ricky, from a former marriage.

PRO: In 1968 the Ram defensive team set a new NFL 14-game record for fewest yards allowed when it limited opponents to just 3118. The field general of that team, the man who calls the defensive signals, is the right linebacker, Maxie Baughan. In addition to his value as a thinker, Baughan is also a hitter. He led Ram linebackers in tackles last year with 63, and the coaching staff credited him with 34 assists. He also intercepted four passes,



running his career total to 17. For these achievements he was named first team All-NFL by AP, the wire service that picked him on its second team in each of the two previous seasons. The Sporting News also made him a starter on its All-Western Division team. But winning honors is nothing new to Baughan. In '67 he was named All-Pro first team by UPI and the Football News. And he was an All-Pro several times in his six years with the Philadelphia Eagles, a team that traded him to the Rams in 1966 in exchange for linebacker Fred Brown, defensive tackle Willie Molden and a draft choice. The Rams have not been sorry. Baughan has been a Pro Bowl performer in all three of his Ram years, making it eight appearances in nine seasons for him in that classic. Baughan, who underwent surgery on his right knee, was originally drafted by the Eagles on the second round in 1960.

COLLEGE: In 1959, the year he set a Georgia Tech record of 124 tackles in a single season, Baughan was named All-American, All-Southeast Conference and All-SEC Lineman of the Year. He played in the Hula Bowl and College All-Star Game.

PERSONAL: Baughan was born in Forkland, Ala., and went to high school in Bessemer, Ala. He participated in both track and football, before entering Georgia Tech where he majored in industrial management. He and his wife, Dianne have two boys, Maxie III, 6; and Christopher, 4. Although he was used little as a running back (he carried only twice for two yards) he was considered a valued member of the club's special teams. He was drafted eighth by the Rams for 1966.

COLLEGE: An All-American small college player and most valuable on the Whitewater State team, Ezerins carried 171 times in 1965 for 1073 yards and drew praise from area coaches for his outstanding blocking abilities.

PERSONAL: Ezerins was born in Latvia and is a "displaced person," thus becoming the first non-U.S. citizen ever drafted by the Rams. He graduated from Union Grove (Wisc.) High, where he participated in football, basketball and track. He and wife Geraldine reside in Long Beach, California.

**Gabriel, Roman****Quarterback****North Carolina State****Height: 6-4****Weight: 220****Born: 8-5-40 Eighth Year**

PRO: In 1965, after Bill Munson suffered a knee injury in the 10th game, Roman Gabriel took over as starting Ram quarterback and led the team to three wins in the last four games. He has been the No. 1 signal caller ever since. In '66 the Rams won eight and lost six. In '67 the club was 11-1-2 and last season 10-3-1. In short, Gabriel is a proven winner. His overall record since that day in '65 is 32-11-3, a winning percentage of .744. At age 29,

he looks forward to many more successful seasons of NFL football. He would like them to be as successful as 1967 when he led the Rams to the Coastal Division Championship. That season he threw 25 touchdown passes for a new club record. Six of them came in the last two games as Los Angeles won crucials from Green Bay and Baltimore. For this he was named Most Valuable Player by Ye Old Rams, an honor he had also won in 1963. Last year he won the Ye Old Rams award as the Outstanding Offensive Back. He also was voted the Most Valuable Player in the 1969 Pro Bowl Game as he led the West to a 10-7 win. It marked his second consecutive appearance in the post-season classic. With a lifetime mark of 932 completions in 1832 attempts for 12,857 yards, he ranks ahead of Bob Waterfield and second to Norm Van Brocklin in the Ram career record book. As the NFL's biggest quarterback, Gabriel is also an effective runner. In his career he has gained 822 yards on 220 carries for a 3.7 average and 19 touchdowns. In addition to the 25 TD passes, he also holds the following single season club records: most passes attempted, 397, 1966; most passes completed, 217, 1966; and fewest passes intercepted, 2, 1962.

PRO: For Bruce Gossett, 1968 was the year of the clutch kick. In the final seconds of play, his field goals won two games for the Rams and tied another. In an early season crucial at Milwaukee he beat the Packers, 16-14, with a 27-yard boot with 55 seconds remaining. Later, his 20-yard three-pointer with 17 seconds left tied San Francisco, 20-20, and a 36-yard field goal in the final four seconds was the margin of a 24-21 victory over the Giants.

Altogether, he kicked 17 of 31 field goal attempts, 37 conversions without a miss and made the West Pro Bowl squad. In five years he has kicked 98 field goals, a Ram record, and has scored 469 points, second in club history to Bob Waterfield's 573. He has led the club in scoring each year. In 1966 Gossett kicked 28 field goals in 49 attempts to set National Football League records in both departments. His 49-yard field goal in 1965 remains his distance record as well as the fourth best in Ram history. Gossett's best days kicking field goals: vs. Philadelphia, 1967, 4 of 4 (21, 12, 27 and 31 yds.); vs. Green Bay, 1965, 4 of 5 (26, 49, 43 and 41 yds.); and vs.



Minnesota, 1966, 4 of 6 (48, 42, 10 and 21 yds.).

COLLEGE: A free agent with the Rams in 1965, Gossett played for three different colleges in Virginia and Pennsylvania. He was a field goal kicker and punter at Richmond.

PERSONAL: Gossett was born in Canonsburg, Pa., and attended prep school at Cecil Township High. His father was a pro soccer player in the late 30s and early 40s. He and wife, Jeannette, live in nearby Fountain Valley, and Bruce works for Moody Funds in the off-season. They have one daughter, Kim, 9; and a son, Daniel Bruce, Jr., 2.

In '66, however, the Rams acquired three veteran linebackers with Pro Bowl credentials and Guillory, who sat out the entire year with a knee injury, continued his education by observing from the bench. He has yet to crack the starting defensive lineup, but that's only because outside backers Maxie Baughan and Jack Pardee are playing as well

as they ever have. In the meantime, Guillory has performed like a demon on Ram special teams, so well that last year George Allen named him co-captain of those units. It was as a special teams member that Guillory made his biggest play. In fact, it was one of the biggest plays in Ram history. It was his block of a Green Bay punt in 1967 that led to a last-minute 27-24 win which kept the Rams' hopes alive in the race for the Coastal Division title. They won that title a week later against Baltimore but the victory would have been meaningless if it hadn't been for Guillory's blocked punt. Last year Tony suffered a knee injury in the 13th game which required off-season surgery, but Ram physicians report the knee as sound as ever.

COLLEGE: Guillory played three years at guard, tackle and middle guard at Lamar Tech in Beaumont, Tex., after a freshman year at Nebraska. The Rams drafted him seventh for 1965.

PERSONAL: Anthony R. Guillory was born in Opelousa, La., one of eight children. His family moved to Beaumont where he attended Herbert High, starring in football and track. He and his wife, the former Katherine Houston, have three sons, Charles Martin, 6; Paul Anthony, 4; and Michael Sean, 1. They live in Gardena, Calif. He works for the California State Chamber of Commerce's "athletes for jobs for youth" program.

Iman joined the Rams in a 1964 off-season trade with Green Bay for Zeke Bratkowski. He missed all of that year, however,

with a broken ankle, then returned in 1965 to launch a Ram career in which he has started every game for four seasons. His strong point is the cutoff block, one of the most difficult in football for a center. **COLLEGE:** Iman was signed as a free agent by the Packers in 1960 after playing center and linebacker at S.E. Missouri State and earning honorable mention on the Little All-American team.

COLLEGE: Jackson was an All-Southwest Athletic Conference end while setting a Jackson State pass catching record his senior year. Speed is his trade-mark. He ran a 9.4 in college.

PERSONAL: Jackson was born in Hattiesburg, Miss., and attended Ronon High in that city. Still a bachelor, he spent last off-season completing his six months active duty with the U.S. Army Reserves.

**Jones, David****Defensive End****South Carolina State****Height: 6-5****Weight: 250****Born: 12-9-38****Ninth Year**

PRO: No other defensive football player in the NFL worries opposing offensive coaches as much as Deacon Jones. In 1968 they double teamed and triple teamed him, yet he still sacked the quarterback a startling 24 times (of the Rams' league leading 51). And when he didn't make the tackle on the QB, he was keeping so many offensive players busy that a teammate was usually able to get through. At times, coach George Allen even used

Jones as a middle guard of a five man line in an effort to create one-on-one situations. Despite receiving the attention of a marked man, The Deacon in 1968 continued to perform in his customary violent, yet efficient manner. He was credited with 87 unassisted tackles and 23 assists. He forced six fumbles. For the fourth consecutive year he was a unanimous first team All-Pro, winning that distinction from UPI, AP and NEA. And for the second straight year his fellow players in an NEA poll named Jones the top defensive player in the NFL. Last January he participated in his fifth straight Pro Bowl Game. He was also named the Southern California Athlete of the Year by the Helms Athletic Foundation and the West Coast Pro Athlete of the Year by the Peninsula All Sports Club. Ye Old Rams honored him as the club's Most Valuable Player after previous years in which they had named him Rookie of the Year (1961) and the Outstanding Defensive Lineman (1962, '64, '65 and '66). Jones and teammate Merlin Olsen, a fellow All-Pro, combine to make the left side of the Ram defensive line the best in pro football.

COLLEGE: Jones was an All-Conference tackle at South Carolina State, then shifted to Mississippi Vocational in 1960. He was drafted on the 14th round for 1961 when Ram scouts discovered him while watching films of two backs in the same conference. They noticed Jones outrunning the backs, and recommended drafting him instead.

PERSONAL: Jones was born in Eatonville, Fla., and attended Hungerford High in that city. He and his wife, Iretha, live permanently in Los Angeles, where he began a singing and acting career last off season. He has made several records, the first of which, "Lovin A Pro," was released May 1 on Sundown Records.

PRO: The biggest single blow to the Ram title hopes in 1968 was the injury to Les Josephson. Now the concern is his ability to come back in '69. The injury was a serious one—a torn Achilles tendon, and the rehabilitation program is long and arduous. It all came after a 1967 season in which Josie suddenly became a star and the Rams became Coastal Division Champs. That year he gained 800 yards rushing, tops in the division, fourth best in the Western Conference, and seventh in the NFL. He also caught 37 passes to tie for second on the club. For these achievements, he made the West Pro Bowl squad for the first time, was named second team All-Pro by the Football News and honorable mention by UPI. In addition, Ye Old Rams named him their Outstanding Offensive Back. A Ram co-captain, Josie ranks 10th among all-time Ram rushers. He came to the Rams in a 1964 off-season trade with Dallas for tackle, Jim Boeke.



COLLEGE: Josephson was signed as a free agent by Dallas for 1964 after he gained 850 yards in his senior year at Augustana College in South Dakota.

In the opener against St. Louis, Lundy knocked down three Cardinal passes in one of the finest games of his splendid career. Two games later, however, he suffered a knee injury against the Browns, and on November 1, he underwent surgery on his right knee for removal of torn cartilage. Lundy also had off-season surgery prior to the '68 season. A Ram co-captain, Lundy is an NFL record holder. He is the only defensive lineman ever to re-

COLLEGE: Marchlewski played both center and linebacker at Minnesota, making honorable mention All-American and second team All-Big Ten his senior year.

PERSONAL: Born in New Kensington, Pa., Marchlewski attended Plum High in Unity, Pa., and currently lives in New Kensington in the off-season where he works for Metropolitan Insurance Co. He and wife, Lettia, have one child.

PRO: The sixth leading rusher in the NFL among active players, Mason is in his third year with the Rams after six highly successful seasons with the Minnesota Vikings. The story behind Mason's career, however, is injury. Without injury, there's no telling what kinds of records he would hold. He has had operations on both knees several times, the latest coming last December. Last year he gained 395 yards on 108 carries, running his career total to 3860 yards on 932 tries. He also caught 15 passes for 144 yards. Used both at halfback and fullback, Mason missed two games with knee problems. His best day was in the season opener against St. Louis when he picked up 82 yards on 16 carries for a 5.1 average. Mason began his pro career as Minnesota's first draft choice in its first ever draft, 1961. He became the Vikings' workhorse, gaining 3252 rushing, catching 151 passes for 1689 yards and returning 78 kickoffs for 1478 yards. He was an All-Pro in 1963, and a member of the West Pro Bowl squad in '63, '64, and '65. He came to the Rams in an off-season 1967 trade along with Hal Bedsole and a second draft choice (Willie Ellison) in return for Marlin McKeever and a first choice.



COLLEGE: Mason was All-American and All-Southwest Conference at Tulane in 1960 when he was the league's top scorer and rusher. He was also a sprinter in track, running the 100 in 9.8 and 220 in 21.4.

PERSONAL: An accomplished guitarist, Tommy once played in the Grand Ol' Opry. He was born in Lake Charles, La., and went to high school in that city. PRO: After ten years of labor in the Ram defensive backfield, Ed Meador is as frisky as ever, or so it would seem from his recent statistics. His club career pass interception record is now 39, making him by far the Rams' all-time greatest thief. The next closest is Will Sherman with 28. And just to prove he is not slowing down, Meador has swiped nearly half of his 39 during the last three years, getting six in 1968, eight in 1967 and five in '66.



This has not gone unnoticed by the nation's pollsters, who have given the Ram free safety considerable All-NFL recognition the past two seasons. Last year, for example, he made AP's first team plus the second teams of both UPI and NEA. And the Football Writers named him to their second unit of a combined AFL-NFL all-star team. In 1967 he was selected first team All-NFL by UPI, NEA and the Football News, and second team by AP. His stardom is not just a recent development, however. He has been named to the Pro Bowl West squad five times and has won various Ye Old Ram awards eight times, including the Most Valuable Player twice (1964 and '65). A team leader, Meador is the club's player representative. Pass interceptions may be his specialty, but he contributes in other ways too. For instance, he is a vicious open-field tackler. He also holds for extra points and field goals, and last year returned 17 punts for 136 yards, an 8.0 average. He was recently inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame, and in 1967 was named the outstanding professional athlete from the State of Arkansas.

COLLEGE: Coming out of little Arkansas Tech where he was an offensive back, Meador was drafted seventh by the Rams for 1959. As a senior he won Player of the Game honors in the Optimist Bowl and was named Arkansas' top amateur athlete.

PERSONAL: Meador, born in Dallas, had never seen an NFL game

until he took part in the Rams' pre-season opener against Detroit in 1959. He attended high school in Russellville, Ark., where he was a four-sport athlete. He and his wife, Paulette, live in Downey, Calif., with their three sons, Michael, 10; Mark, 7; and William, 6. In the off-season Meador operates a real estate investment and development company, Eddie D. Meador, Enterprises, Inc.

Teaming with fellow All-Pro Deacon Jones on the left side of the Ram defensive line, Olsen made the follow-



ing first team All-NFL squads: AP, UPI, NEA, Pro Football Weekly, and The Football News. In addition, the Football Writers named him to a first team berth on a combined NFL-AFL all star club. It was virtually the same story for the mammoth, but agile Olsen in 1967. Last year, as the Rams set a new NFL 14-game record for fewest yards allowed, Olsen was the leading tackler on the team, nosing out Jones, 91-87. He also was credited with 16 sacks on the quarterback, three fumble recoveries and two forced fumbles. Ye Old Rams named him their Outstanding Defensive Lineman, the same honor they gave him in '67. Olsen was a first round draft choice in 1962.

COLLEGE: Olsen was named to every All-American team for his line play at Utah State. He was "Lineman of the Game" in the Hula Bowl and also took part in the East-West, Buffalo and Chicago All-Star games.

PERSONAL: Merlin was born in Logan, Utah, one of a family of nine children, and was an all-around athlete at Logan High. He is married to the former Susan Wakley, and they have two daughters, Kelly Lynn, 4; and Jill, 2. He lives in South Pasadena and last off-season he and Roman Gabriel played major parts in a new motion picture, "The Undefeated," by 20th Century Fox.

That total included two 80-yard receptions against the Colts and eight touchdowns altogether. As a reward for his fine '67 season, he was named to the West Pro Bowl squad, but was unable to play due to an ankle injury. Last year he caught 29 passes for 500 yards (17.24 avg.) and three scores. At 190 pounds, Snow's speed is deceiving. It is most noticeable on his



catches in the open, for he has never been caught from behind. Ye Old Rams has recognized Snow's talent by naming him rookie of the year in 1965 and offensive lineman of the year in '67. Drafted by Minnesota on the first round in 1965, Snow came directly to the Rams when the Vikings traded his negotiation rights in exchange for Jim Phillips and Gary Larsen. Snow's best days: six catches for 106 yds., one TD, vs. Baltimore, 1968; five catches for 87 yds., vs. Green Bay, 1965; and three catches for 151 yds, two TDs, vs. Baltimore, 1967.

COLLEGE: Snow was named to every All-American team after breaking most of the pass receiving records at Notre Dame. His career marks have been broken by Jim Seymour (now a Ram rookie), but his single season records still stand. In 1964 he caught 60 for 1114 yards and nine touchdowns.

PERSONAL: Snow was born in Rocky Springs, Wyo., but went to high school at St. Anthony in Long Beach, Calif., where he was named All-City Lineman of the Year in 1960. He and wife, Merry Carole, live in Seal Beach with their two children, Michelle, 3; and Jack, Jr., 1. During the 1969 off-season Snow worked for Mike Frankovich Productions and played a part in the movie, "Marooned."

He responded by completing 157 of 309 passes (50.8%) for 1809 yards and four touchdowns. One of his TDs was a 99-yarder to Pat Studstill, tying an NFL record for distance. Against the Rams that year he completed 23 of 46 for 216 yards in a 23-3 loss, prompting George Allen to vote for Sweetan as Rookie of the Year. After sharing the QB chores with Plum in '67, Sweetan was traded to New Orleans in the pre-season in 1968 for Walter Roberts and a draft choice. He was a reserve for Bill Kilmer last year.

COLLEGE: Sweetan attended Navarro Junior College in Texas in 1961-62 before transferring to Wake Forest in '63. He did not play his senior year.

tion most remembered was a leaping fourth-down grab in the fourth quarter against Green Bay that kept a rally alive and helped the Rams win, 16-14. Truax was drafted second by Cleveland in 1964, but was traded to the Rams for a draft choice just prior to the '64 season. Truax's best days: seven catches for 111 yards, one TD (all in first half), vs. Atlanta, 1968; seven catches for 62 yards, vs. Green Bay, 1966; and six catches for 74 yards, vs. Baltimore, 1967.

Originally drafted as a future on the 15th round in 1960, Watkins spent one year with the Browns, then was traded to the Lions. Used as a return specialist and running back, Watkins had five productive years with Detroit. He led the league in punt returning in 1963 with 32 returns for 399 yards. In 1964 his 14.9 punt return average was the best in the NFL and in '65 his 34.3 kickoff return average topped the league. He sat out all of 1966 with a knee injury.

COLLEGE: Watkins was an all-conference halfback at Iowa State in 1959 and '60 and also made some All-American teams the latter year. He was a transfer from East Los Angeles JC.



PERSONAL: Born in West Memphis, Ark., attended high school in that city before going west to junior college. He and wife Camilla and their three children Grace, 6; Sonya, 4; Mark, 3; reside in Detroit.

PRO: The most astonishing statistic about Clancy Williams during the 1968 season was that he was beaten only once for a touchdown. This, for a cornerback in the NFL, is near perfection. He also led the team in interceptions with seven, running his career total to 19 in four seasons. In 1966 he intercepted eight, running them back 97 yards for one touchdown and also returned 15 kickoffs for a 28.0-yard average. Last year, with the Rams

The Ram Story 1937-1969

- 1937 On February 13th, the National Football League grants a Cleveland franchise to Homer Marshman and associates, a prominent group of local businessmen. Hugo Bezdek is named head coach. As the league's rookie franchise, Rams finish with a 1-10-0 record. Bob Kelley is named radio play-by-play announcer at start of season.
- 1938 Assistant coach Art Lewis takes over team after three losses and Rams win three of remaining seven games.
- 1939 Earl "Dutch" Clark becomes head coach and Lewis remains as assistant. Rams hit .500 mark for first time with 5-5-1 record. Parker Hall joins team as rookie tailback. Hall is not named on official NFL all-league first team, but wins Joe Carr trophy as NFL's official Most Valuable Player.
- 1940 Team drops back to 4-6-1 record. Johnny Drake, powerful Ram fullback, is named to first team all-NFL.
- 1941 Daniel F. Reeves and Fred Levy, Jr. purchase Rams in June and hire, as general manager, Billy Evans, former sports columnist, American League umpire and Cleveland Indians general manager. Team wins first two games but drops next nine to finish in cellar.
- 1942 Evans resigns before 1942 season. Charles "Chile" Walsh replaces Art Lewis as assistant coach. Lt. Reeves and Major Levy depart to enter armed forces. Bob Kelley is named club secretary. Team finishes 5-6-0.
- 1943 Clark resigns. Chile Walsh is named head coach, but NFL grants Rams permission to suspend operations for one season because of war-time difficulties. Reeves buys out Levy.
- 1944 Chile Walsh becomes general manager and appoints "Buff" Donelli as head coach. Pick-up team finishes 4-6-0. Bill John joins team as business manager.
- 1945 Donelli joins military service. Walsh names his brother, Adam Walsh, as head coach, with George Trafton and Bob Snyder as assistants. Third round draft choice (a future) Bob Waterfield from UCLA joins team as T-formation quarterback and leads Rams to 9-1-0 season for first divisional title in team's history. On icy field, Rams defeat Washington Redskins, 15-14, at Cleveland for world title. Waterfield becomes first player to receive unanimous vote for official NFL Most Valuable Player award. Walsh is named coach of the year. Eddie Kotal joins team as chief scout.
- 1946 Reeves moves franchise to Los Angeles early in the year. After disappointing 6-4-1 season, both Walshes resign.
- 1947 Reeves assumes duties of general manager. Bob Snyder is named head coach with Joe Stydahar as new assistant. Team is talent-heavy but injury-ridden in 6-6-0 season. Reeves sells part interests to former partner Levy and to Edwin and Harold Pauley and Hal Seley.

- 1948 Clark Shaughnessy joins staff as advisory coach. On September 3rd Snyder resigns and Shaughnessy becomes head coach. Team wins four of last five to post 6-5-1 mark.
- 1949 Team wins first six games, then hangs on to win first divisional title since moving west. Heavy rain holds down L.A. crowd as Philadelphia Eagles skid to 14-0 win over Rams in NFL title game. Rookie Norm Van Brocklin joins team and gives Rams top-notch one-two quarterback punch. Elroy Hirsch has fine rookie year.
- 1950 NFL absorbs AAC, leaving Rams as lone pro team in Los Angeles after four years of two-league existence. In February, Stydahr becomes head coach, replacing Shaughnessy, and appoints Hamp Pool, Mel Hein and Red Hickey as assistants. Club opens new offices on Beverly Boulevard. Bill Granholm begins 18-year tenure as equipment manager. Team sets 22 league records in rolling to divisional title tie. Waterfield and end Tom Fears lead play-off win over Bears, 24-14, but following week in Cleveland, Lou Groza's late field goal stops Rams' title hopes, 30-28.
- 1951 Hein resigns to take USC post. He is replaced by Ray Richards. Rams win third straight divisional title on final day of season, then defeat Cleveland at the Coliseum, 24-17, on 73-yard pass, Van Brocklin to Fears, for first world title since moving to L.A.
- 1952 After team loses three straight pre-season games and drops league opener by big score, Stydahr resigns. He is replaced as head coach by Hamp Pool. Team loses two of next three, but wins last eight to tie for divisional title. Rams lose playoff in Detroit. Rams trade 11 players to Dallas for rookie Les Richter, who then enters army for two years. Waterfield retires.
- 1953 Richards resigns to accept Baltimore coaching assignment. Pool names John Sauer and Bill Battles as new assistants. Club co-owner Harold Pauley passes away. Team compiles 8-3-1 record, losing three games by total of eight points, to finish third in division. Rams defeat world champ Lions in both games.
- 1954 Pool adds Dick Voris and Ralph Weaver to staff. Bonus choice Bill Wade and tradee Les Richter both join Rams as rookies two years after going from college into military services. Team has disappointing 6-5-1 mark. All assistant coaches resign. Pool soon follows suit.
- 1955 On January 26th, Rams hire Sid Gillman, head coach at University of Cincinnati, to replace Pool. Gillman names Joe Madro, Jack Faulkner, Lowell Storm and Joe Thomas as assistants. Fine defensive year and clutch field goal kicking by Richter give team hard-fought 8-3-1 record for divisional title. Cleveland wins title game at Coliseum by one-sided score.

- 1956 In form reversal, team loses five consecutive early-season games and finishes in cellar tie with 4-8 record.
- 1957 Ram owners sign five year operational pact and name former Ram publicist Pete Rozelle as general manager. George Allen is added to coaching staff. Team loses squeakers on road to 49ers and Lions, finishing 6-6-0, but only two games behind divisional leaders.
- 1958 Gillman's revamped coaching staff includes Madro and Faulkner, and addition of Bob Waterfield, Bill Swiacki and Lou Rymkus. In pre-season trade, Van Brocklin goes to Eagles. Bill Wade sets many Ram passing marks en route to 8-4-0 year.
- 1959 Team has general letdown and many injuries for worst season since 1937, finishing 2-10-0. Ollie Matson, acquired in big trade, is workhorse at fullback. On last day of season, Gillman and staff resign.
- 1960 Following death of Bert Bell, Pete Rozelle is named NFL commissioner. Elroy Hirsch replaces Rozelle as Ram general manager. Bob Waterfield is named Ram head coach, and hires Hamp Pool, Don Paul, Jim David, Tom Fears and Vic Linskog as assistants. Team shows slight improvement over previous year with 4-7-1 record.
- 1961 Rams trade Bill Wade, Del Shofner, John Guzik for Zeke Bratkowski, Lindon Crow and 1962 first draft choice, which makes it possible to draft both Roman Gabriel and Merlin Olsen. Revamped Rams finish strongly after slow start, but still show 4-10-0 deficit.
- 1962 Harland Sware replaces Don Paul as defensive line coach. Rams lose four of first five games by narrow margins, then show only occasional surges of success en route to 1-12-1 year. Waterfield resigns after eighth game. Sware named interim head coach, with Pool, Linskog, and player-coach Richter and Crow as his staff. On December 27, in closed auction, Reeves reacquires control of Rams, purchasing full interests of co-owners Pauley, Levy, Seley and Bob Hope.
- 1963 Reeves sells 49% interest in Rams to Gene Autry, Bob Reynolds, Leonard Firestone, Paul A. O'Bryan, Robert Lehman, J.D. Stetson Coleman and Joseph A. Thomas. Sware is retained, and he names to his staff Don Heinrich, Ray Wietecha, Bob Schnelker, Jack Patera and player-coach Crow. Les Richter retires before season. After 0-5 record, Gabriel is re-installed as starting QB and plays last nine games without relief, guiding team to 5-4 mark and season record of 5-9-0.
- 1964 Rams sign ten-year pact to play in "new look" Coliseum's "stadium-within-a-stadium." Fourteen rookies make the season squad. Club finishes fifth with 5-7-2 record.

- 1965 Harland Svare's new lineup of staff coaches includes Vic Schwenk, Bill Austin, Bob Schnelker, Jack Patera and Don Doll. After winning only one of first ten, Rams take three of last four against top two teams in each division, but Svare is dismissed.
- 1966 After a court hassle, George Allen is released by George Halas from his assistant coaching duties with the Chicago Bears to become head coach of the Rams. Allen selects staff which includes Jack Patera, Ted Marchibroda, Ray Prochaska, Howard Schnellenberger, Tom Catlin and Joe Sullivan. NFL and AFL merge in spring. Bob Kelley, "Voice of the Rams" since the club's beginning in 1937, dies in September. Rams, practicing at new facilities in Long Beach, have a chance to finish second in West until final game, which they lose to World Champion Packers. Thus, the team finishes 8-6, the best record since 1958.
- 1967 Jack Patera accepts job with New York Giants and Marion Campbell moves from Minnesota Vikings to assume defensive line coaching duties. After 17 years on Beverly Boulevard, club moves front offices to new building on Pico. Training camp is also moved to California State College at Fullerton after five years at Chapman College in Orange. Equipment manager Bill Granholm leaves club after 18 years to take position in league office. Rams record first unbeaten pre-season in history with six wins, including victories over first-ever AFL opponents, San Diego and Kansas City. Team completes finest win-loss season ever with 11-1-2 league record to win Coastal Division Championship, the first title of any kind since 1955, then loses to Green Bay in Western Conference Championship Game. Club sets new team record in attendance by playing before 1,230,059 fans and also establishes new club mark for 14 games in attendance: 848,090.
- 1968 After Playoff Bowl win over Cleveland in January, team finishes regular 1968 season with 10-3-1 record, second in Coastal Division to Baltimore's 13-1 mark. Attendance is over one million for second straight year and Ram defense sets new 14-game NFL record for fewest yards allowed. On Dec. 26, Allen is dismissed as head coach, but is re-hired two weeks later.
- 1969 Marion Campbell leaves to become defensive coach at Atlanta. He is replaced by LaVern Torgeson, from the Pittsburgh staff, as defensive line coach. Dick Vermeil is also added to coaching staff. After 20 years with the Rams as a player, general manager and assistant to the president, Elroy Hirsch leaves club to become athletic director at the University of Wisconsin. He is replaced by Public Relations Director Jack Teele, and John Sanders becomes Assistant General Manager. With three No. 1 draft choices, club picks Larry Smith, Jim Seymour and Bob Klein.
