President

The offseason of 1982 was an active and positive time for Rams owner Georgia Frontiere. Not only did she support her coach, Ray Malavasi, but she also helped him by trading for a star quarterback in the person of Bert Jones, formerly of the Baltimore Colts.

This was just one move of a busy offseason in which she worked diligently to restore the winning tradition to her Rams, who had been to the playoffs eight straight seasons until last year.

Selected as a "Headliner of the Year" last spring by the Greater Los Angeles Press Club, Georgia Frontiere's activities the last four years have included all that goes into the running of a professional football franchise.

Beginning with her first season, 1979, the Rams continued to prosper and win football games. That year the team went all the way to the Super Bowl and the following season it won 11 and lost five to win a spot in the NFC playoffs for the eighth straight time.

In addition to running her football team, Mrs. Frontiere has found time to involve herself in numerous civic, community and charitable activities. She has been active in local youth programs, serving on the board of directors of the Los Angeles Boys and Girls Club, the Los Angeles Orphanage Guild, the Los Angeles Blind Youth Foundation, honorary vice-chairman of the Good Scout Luncheon in Orange County and co-chairman of the Boy Scout Sports Dinner in Los Angeles.



DON KLOSTERMAN

Assistant to the President/Consultant

A key advisor to owner Georgia Frontiere, Don Klosterman enters his 11th year with the Rams after coming to the club from Baltimore with the late Carroll Rosenbloom in 1972.

Born in Lemars, Iowa, Don grew up in Compton, Ca., and attended Loyola University. "The Duke of Del Rey" led the Lions through their most successful athletic era as he set seven NCAA passing records.

He played pro ball with Cleveland, the Dallas Texans, the Rams and the Calgary Stampeders before a skiing accident ended his career in 1957.

Don began his front office pro football career in 1960 as a scout with the Los Angeles Chargers. He moved on to the Dallas Texans (now the Kansas City Chiefs) where he helped turn the Chiefs into a Super Bowl winner. Klosterman then became general manager of the Houston Oilers in 1966. He moved on to Baltimore as general manager in 1970, then to Los Angeles when Rosenbloom traded his Colts for the Rams.

Klosterman and wife Luciana reside in Beverly Hills, Ca. He has two children, Kurt and Katie.

JOHN SHAW

Vice President-Finance



John Shaw assumed the duty of vice president-finance this spring after serving the past year as the club's secretary/treasurer. Shaw joined the club in 1980 as controller/treasurer.

Before joining the Rams, Shaw spent three years with the accounting firm of Arthur Andersen & Co.

A key member of the Rams organization, Shaw advises owner Georgia Frontiere on financial matters, including club investments, player contracts and legal affairs.

Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., on Sept. 10, 1951, Shaw attended Kearney High School in San Diego, Ca. He went to the University of San Diego where he earned a degree in accounting in 1973.

Shaw continued his education at New York University, and earned a law degree from that institution in 1976. He practiced law in Bakersfield, Ca., before joining Arthur Andersen & Co.

JACK FAULKNER

Administrator of Football Operations



Jack Faulkner joined the Rams' front office in 1980 after 30 years of coaching and scouting football, the previous nine years with the Rams. His duties include assisting in evaluation and signing of players, along with providing input for trades.

Faulkner, born April 4, 1926, in Youngstown, Ohio, was a linebacker at Miami, Ohio, from 1946-48 after a tour in the Marine Corps (1944-45).

He coached six years at the University of Cincinnati (1949-54) under Sid Gillman, then accompanied Gillman as defensive backfield coach when they joined the Rams in 1955.

When Gillman left the head coaching position of the Rams for a similar spot with the Los Angeles Chargers of the AFL, Faulkner went along. He also coached for Gillman with the San Diego Chargers in 1961 before going to Denver where he remained until midway in the 1964 season.

Faulkner was named AFL Coach of the Year in 1962 when he led the Denver Broncos to a 7-7 record in his first season as head coach and general manager after the team had gone 4-9-1 the previous year.

In 1965 he became defensive backfield coach of the Minnesota Vikings, returning to Los Angeles in 1966 as a scout. He left to join the expansion New Orleans Saints from 1967 through 1970, serving as chief defensive coach for three years and director of player personnel the final year.

Faulkner rejoined the Rams as a scout (1971-72), then joined the coaching staff where he remained through the 1979 season.

Jack and wife Betty have a daughter, Cathy, and a son, Jonn. They live in Palos Verdes, Ca.

LES MARSHALL **Director of Marketing**

Although his title is director of marketing, Les Marshall is also involved in many other areas of the Rams operation as he acts as a liaison between Georgia Frontiere and other staff members.

Marshall joined the Rams in November, 1981, after a lengthy career with Playboy Enterprises, Inc. Marshall was employed by Playboy beginning in 1971 as Executive Assistant to the Chairman. From 1976 through 1978 he also served as President of Playboy Models and President of Playboy Limousine Co. From 1979 through 1981 he was Director of Home Video Playboy.



Born on Oct. 15, 1944, at Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, Marshall attended Apple Valley (Ca.) High and Stanford University, graduating in 1966 with a degree in business. In 1976 he earned his master's degree in business administration from Pepperdine.

A former professional baseball pitcher in the Milwaukee farm system, Marshall served in Vietnam as infantry platoon leader and company commander from 1968 through 1970.

He and wife Janice live in Chatsworth, Ca.

DICK BEAM **Director of Operations**

When Dick Beam agreed to accept the position of director of operations from President Georgia Frontiere, it marked a homecoming for the 44-year-old former star athlete from nearby Whittier.

Beam assumed his current duties in April, 1981, and most recently held a similar position — director of administration — with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

Beam was born May 16, 1936, in Long Beach, Ca., and graduated in 1954 from Whittier (Ca.) High, where he was a varsity letter winner in football, basketball and baseball. As a senior split end, he made prep All-America and All-CIF. He then moved on to Whittier College where he played under George Allen and Don Coryell and was an all-league performer in 1958.



After graduating in 1959, Beam began a coaching career as an assistant to Coryell at Whittier before moving on as an assistant coach at Santa Fe High in 1960. He spent six seasons as an assistant at Montebello High (1961-66) before becoming head coach at Brea High in 1967 and Alhambra in 1968-71.

From there he was hired by John McKay as an assistant at USC in 1972, the year the Trojans won the national championship. He worked with the defense

that season, then moved over to offense the next three years before joining McKay in Tampa Bay in 1976. At Tampa, Beam spent a year as administrative assistant to McKay, then became director of administration in 1977.

Several years ago Beam took up long distance running, and has since competed in several marathon races.

He and wife Dorothy have a son, Donn, and a daughter, Cathy. They live in Dana Point, Ca.

JOHN MATH

Director of Player Personnel



John Math was named Director of Player Personnel in June, 1980, and his duties include overseeing the annual college draft and player evaluation.

Math joined the Rams as a scout in March, 1977, and is known for his ability to foresee development in young athletes with a lot of potential.

Born Sept. 27, 1930, in San Gabriel, Ca., Math attended Alhambra High School before going on to the University of California at Berkeley. While at California from 1950-54,

Math was a defensive back under "Pappy" Waldorf.

Math coached at Glendale (Ca.) College from 1960 to 1963, then coached at Utah State from 1964 to 1966. He broke into the National Football League the following season with the Houston Oilers, scouting college talent from 1967 to 1976. He then joined the Rams in 1977.

John and wife Maxine live in San Juan Capistrano, Ca., with son John, Jr. They also have four married daughters.

RAMS COACHING STAFF

RAY MALAVASI Head Coach

It was a disappointing year, 1981, but Rams Head Coach Ray Malavasi feels there is reason for optimism in 1982.

For one thing, it will be the first time in his four-year career as head man in Los Angeles that he has been able to hand pick his own coaching staff. Five assistants from last year's 6-10 team have departed and Malavasi has replaced them with football men who share his philosophies.

Also, Malavasi is hoping to field a healthier team in '82, particularly in the offensive line where injuries stymied his usually explosive attack last year.

Losing was a new experience for Malavasi. In his three previous years as Rams head coach his teams had averaged nearly 11 wins a season, going 12-4 his first year, 9-7 in 1979 and 11-5 in 1980. The 1979 Rams beat Dallas and Tampa Bay in the playoffs to win the first NFC title in the club's history and advance to the Super Bowl, where they gave Pittsburgh all it could handle before losing, 31-19.

Whether his team is having a good season or a bad season, Malavasi is known around the league as an innovative coach. While he spent most of his time the last three years working with the team's offense, he plans to work equally with the defense in 1982.

The is good news to those who like defensive football, for it was on defense that this man earned his reputation. As defensive coordinator under Chuck Knox for five years from 1973 through 1977, Malavasi guided the Rams to the defensive league leadership in several categories, including total defense, rushing defense (twice) and in scoring defense (twice).

However, Malavasi has spent nearly half of his 27 years designing offenses, so it was not surprising when he was named offensive coordinator at the beginning of the 1978 season.

Born Nov. 8, 1930, in Passaic, N.J., Malavasi attended Clifton High, then went on to West Point, where he studied engineering and was a lineman under Earl (Red) Blaik and Vince Lombardi.

Later he was drafted on the sixth round by the Philadelphia Eagles, but elected instead to finish his schooling at Mississippi State where he obtained a degree in civil and structural engineering and coached the freshman football team.

He was commissioned in the U.S. Army as a second lieutenant and went on active duty at Fort Belvoir, Va., where, as a player-coach, one of his football teams won a service championship.

Then he began an extensive collegiate coaching career, serving as an assistant at Minnesota (1956-57), Memphis State (1958-60) and Wake Forest (1961). He became personnel director of the Denver Broncos in 1962 and in 1963 became that club's defensive line coach.



In 1966, Malavasi was named the Broncos' interim head coach, replacing Mac Speedie, who had resigned two games into the season. Malavasi compiled a 4-8 record that year before moving on to the Canadian Football League where in 1967-68 he was defensive coach of the Hamilton Tiger-Cats. He handled the same job with the Buffalo Bills in 1969-70, then served as the Oakland Raiders' linebacker coach in 1971-72.

He became L.A.'s defensive coordinator in 1973.

Ray (Raymondo Guiseppi Giovanni Baptiste Malavasi) is married to the former Mary Fleming. They have five children: Maureen, Sheila, Dennis, Bill and Bryce.

Ray belongs to the St. Simon Judes Mens Club in Huntington Beach. He also served as chairman of the American Diabetes Association Celebrity Golf Classic and was active in fund raising for La Casa to benefit abused children. This summer he was named recipient of the coveted National Eagle Scout award.

JOHN HADL Offensive Coordinator



John Hadl, a veteran of 16 seasons in pro football as a quarterback, returns to the NFL in 1982 as the Rams' offensive coordinator.

For the past four years, Hadl has served as offensive coordinator at the University of Kansas. In the 16 seasons before that, Hadl amassed some incredible passing statistics.

His career totals include being ranked No. 4 in pro history in pass attempts (4,687), No. 8 in pass completions (2,363), No. 4 in passing yards (33,513) and No. 4 in touchdown passes (244).

After 11 seasons (1962-72) with the San Diego Chargers and one AFL Championship, Hadl was traded to the Rams where he led the team to its first of seven consecutive NFC Western Division titles. He was named NFC Player of the Year.

In 1974, Hadl was traded to Green Bay and stayed with the Packers through the 1975 season. He was traded to Houston in 1976 and retired following the 1977 season.

Born Feb. 15, 1940, in Lawrence, Kan., Hadl attended Lawrence High and the University of Kansas. An All-America halfback in 1960 and an All-America quarterback in 1961, Hadl led the Jayhawks to their only bowl win ever, a 33-7 victory over Rice in the 1961 Bluebonnet Bowl.

He still holds Kansas records for longest punt (94 yards), longest interception return (98 yards) and most kickoff return yards in a game (153).

John and his wife Barbara live in Villa Park, Ca. They have two children: John, Jr. and Jackie.

CLYDE EVANS **Conditioning Coach**

As the Rams' first full-time conditioning coach, Clyde Evans is in charge of developing individual programs for each player according to his body weight, structure and position he plays.

Evans develops the year-round programs for the players that include diet control, developing upper and lower body strength, plus speed, quickness and agility.

Born April 10, 1943, in Watsonville, Ca., Evans came to the Rams in 1978 from San Diego. He was in charge of weight lifting and stretching for the Chargers for four seasons — their first full-time employee for such a position.

A defensive back at Cabrillo Junior College in Aptos, Ca., in 1961-62, Evans played two years of semi-pro football. He was in the U.S. Army serving in Vietnam, and later attended San Diego State. He worked with the San Diego State football team with its conditioning in 1972-73, then joined the Chargers.

Single, Clyde lives in Fountain Valley, Ca.



PAUL LANHAM **Offensive Backfield Coach**

Paul Lanham begins his fifth season with the Rams in his third different capacity. He joined the club in 1978 as special teams coach and became quarterbacks coach in 1980. This season Lanham will coach the running backs.

Before coming to the Rams, Lanham was the Washington special teams coach from 1973-77, and before that he spent one season with the St. Louis Cardinals as the special teams and offensive backfield coach.

Born July 31, 1930, in Ripley, W. Va., Lanham attended Morris Harvey College and transferred to Glenville (W. Va.) State. At Glenville, he lettered three years as a linebacker.

His college coaching career began in 1960 at the University of Delaware. While earning a master's in educational administration, Lanham coached the freshmen team's offensive line. He became the head freshmen coach at Dayton in 1961, then moved to Colorado State (1962-69) where he spent most of those years as offensive coordinator.

Lanham guided the special teams and tight ends at Arkansas in 1970-71, then came to the NFL the following season with St. Louis.

Paul and wife Helen have three children: Tammy, Steve and Randy. They live in Mission Viejo, Ca.



HERB PATERRA **Linebackers Coach**



Herb Paterra begins his second season as the Rams' linebackers coach after spending his rookie season as an NFL coach with the Rams' special teams.

Prior to joining the Rams in 1980, Paterra spent two years as the defensive line and linebackers coach of the CFL's Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

With 13 years of coaching experience, Paterra joins Ray Malavasi a second time, but this time as a coach. In 1967-68, Paterra was a player with Hamilton while Malavasi coached Hamilton's defense.

Born Nov. 8, 1940, in Grassport, Pa., Paterra was an offensive guard and linebacker at Michigan State in 1960-62. Drafted by the Buffalo Bills, Paterra played outside linebacker (1963-64) before moving to Hamilton.

He played at Hamilton for four years (1965-68), then returned to Michigan State to coach the linebackers and defensive line (1969-71). Paterra then coached at Wyoming (1972-74), Charlotte of the WFL (1975) and at a high school in Charlotte (1976-77).

He signed on briefly with Northern Michigan in 1978, but left almost immediately to take a job with Hamilton.

Herb and wife Lou Ann live in Diamond Bar, Ca., with sons Jeffrey and Craig.

JIM RINGO **Offensive Line Coach**



Jim Ringo, one of the most honored offensive linemen in NFL history, joins the Rams' coaching staff in 1982 as offensive line coach.

Ringo joins the Rams after a four-year stint with the New England Patriots, the last three as offensive coordinator.

As a player, Ringo enjoyed 15 seasons and two NFL Championships. Ringo played center for Green Bay from 1953-63 as the Packers won the NFL title in 1961 and 1962. He finished his career with four seasons in Philadelphia. Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1981, Ringo played in 182 consecutive games and appeared in 10 Pro Bowls during his career.

Born Nov. 21, 1932, Orange, N.J., Ringo played his college ball at Syracuse and was a seventh-round draft pick of Green Bay in 1953. Upon retiring after the 1967 season, Ringo entered the coaching profession in 1969 with the Chicago Bears.

After three seasons in Chicago, Ringo was named offensive line coach of the Buffalo Bills. He served in that position until the middle of the 1976 season when he was named head coach, a position he held through the 1977 season.

Ringo joined the Patriots' staff the following season.

Jim and wife Betty live in Santa Ana, Ca. They have four children: Michelle, James, Anthony and Kurt.

FRITZ SHURMUR **Defensive Line Coach**

Fritz Shurmur will coach the Rams' defensive line in 1982 after spending the past four seasons with the New England Patriots.

Shurmur coached the Patriots' defensive line in 1978 and 1979, then served as defensive coordinator his last two seasons there. In 1979, Shurmur's defensive line totaled 57 quarterback sacks, tops in the NFL.

Shurmur began his NFL coaching career with the Detroit Lions. He coached the Lions' defensive line in 1975 and 1976 and became defensive coordinator in 1977.

Born July 15, 1932, in Riverview, Mich., Shurmur attended Wyandotte (Mich.) High and Albion College. Shurmur was named All-Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association as a center as well as the conference's MVP award. An all-conference baseball player, too, Shurmur graduated in 1954 with a degree in physical education and political science, and earned his master's degree in educational administration.

He served as an assistant football coach and head swimming coach in 1956 at Albion College until 1962 when he became an assistant football coach at the University of Wyoming. He coached the defensive line through 1970 and became the head coach in 1971. He served as head coach through 1974 and then entered the NFL ranks with Detroit.

Shurmur and wife Peggy Jane live in Diamond Bar, Ca. They have three children: Sally Ann, Scott and Susan Jane.



JACK SNOW **Receivers Coach**

Jack Snow, one of the most prolific receivers in the history of the Los Angeles Rams, returns to the organization in 1982 as the club's receivers coach.

This will be Snow's first full-time coaching assignment after serving as a part-time assistant at Notre Dame the last two springs.

Snow played 11 seasons (1965-75) with the Rams and ranks as the club's No. 3 all-time receiver with 340 receptions. His 6,012 receiving yards is second behind Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch's 6,289 yards and his 45 touchdown catches is second behind Hirsch's 53.

Born Jan. 25, 1943, in Rocky Springs, Wyo., Snow attended St. Anthony High in Long Beach, Ca. He played three years at Notre Dame where he was an All-America wide receiver and was a first-round draft choice of the Minnesota Vikings in 1965. He was soon traded to the Rams and played his entire career in Los Angeles.

Snow has been in private business since his playing days ended.

Jack and wife Merry Carole live in Seal Beach, Ca., with their three children: Michelle, Jack, Jr. and Stephanie.



JIM VECHIARELLA **Defensive Backfield Coach**



After making his NFL coaching debut as the Rams' special teams coach in 1981, Jim Vechiarella will coach the defensive backfield in 1982.

His success as a special teams coach was evidenced by the Rams having the NFL's top punt returner in LeRoy Irvin. After going 20 years without a touchdown by punt return, the Rams scored three in 1981.

Vechiarella spent three seasons at Tulane University (1978-80) and was the Green Wave's defensive coordinator in 1980. Prior to his stint at Tulane, Vechiarella spent two seasons as the defensive coordinator at Southern Illinois University.

Born Feb. 20, 1937, in Youngstown, Ohio, Vechiarella graduated from Youngstown College in 1958. He spent the next three years as an assistant coach at Poland (O.) High, then returned to his alma mater, Rayen High in Youngstown, where he coached from 1961-63.

Vechiarella spent the next 11 seasons as an assistant at Youngstown College. He joined the World Football League in 1975, coaching Charlotte's defensive line.

When the WFL folded, Vechiarella went to Southern Illinois.

Jim and wife Lucille live in Diamond Bar, Ca., with children Jim, Bill and Lisa.

FRED WHITTINGHAM **Special Teams and Tight Ends Coach**



Fred Whittingham begins his NFL coaching career this season as the special teams and tight ends coach.

Prior to joining the Rams, Whittingham spent nine years as an assistant coach at Brigham Young University, the last as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator.

While this is Whittingham's first NFL coaching assignment, he's no stranger to the NFL. In fact, Whittingham began his NFL career as a linebacker for the Los Angeles Rams in 1964. He played for the Philadelphia Eagles (1965-66), the New Orleans Saints (1967-68), the Dallas Cowboys (1969-70) and again with the Eagles (1971).

He gained 106 yards in the NFC title game against Tampa Bay and scored a touchdown in Super Bowl XIV.

Corral (pronounced Kore-al') converted 17 of 26 field goal attempts and 36 of 36 PAT attempts in '81, as well as punting 89 times without a block. His 87 points brings his career total to 379 points, No. 4 on the Rams' all-time scoring list and he has converted 87 straight PATs after missing his first attempt of 1980. His 42.0 punting average was the highest by a Ram

since 1972, and it's even more remarkable since he had just 3 touchbacks and 19 punts downed inside the opponent's 20-yard line. After kicking a career-long 67-yard punt against Chicago, Corral turned around two weeks later to kick a 25-yard FG with 24 seconds left to beat Atlanta, 37-35. A third-round draft choice of the Rams in 1978, Corral had a spectacular rookie season by leading the NFL in field goals (29), field goal attempts (43) and scoring (118). His placekicking talent proved the difference in three last-minute wins. He kicked a 46-yard FG with 7 seconds left to beat the Eagles, a 27-yard FG with 3 seconds left to beat the Buccaneers and a 24-yard FG with 2 seconds left to beat the 49ers. He was All-NFL according to PFWA, NEA, Pro Football Weekly, AP (second team) and Football Digest. He was named All-NFC by The Sporting News, UPI and Pro Football Weekly. In addition, Corral was selected to the Pro Bowl, was voted Rookie of the Year by Ye Old Rams and was recipient of Pro Football Weekly's Golden Toe Award, emblematic of the NFL's best placekicker. In 1979, he accounted for all of L.A.'s points in a 9-0 win in the NFC title game against Tampa by kicking three field goals. Also that season, Corral made 13 of 25 FGAs and 36 of 39 PATs, along with 5 of 7 field goals in the playoffs. In 1980, Corral assumed the duties of punter, but showed he still could kick the pressure field goal: his 23-yard FG in overtime beat Atlanta, 20-17.

PRO: LeRoy Irvin's 1981 season was so remarkable that in 1982 — just his third NFL season — he will probably become the most prolific punt returner in Rams history. He needs 23 punt returns and 24 yards to become the Rams' all-time leading punt returner. From setting NFL and club records to being the NFL's No. 1 punt returner, Irvin provided punt return fireworks nearly every week in '81. His first noteworthy accomplishment came against Chicago when he returned a punt 55 yards for a touchdown, the first by a Ram since Dick Bass did it in 1961. Two weeks later in Atlanta, Irvin was flawless as he had an NFL-record 207 punt return yards, plus had 2 touchdown returns (84 and 75 yards) to tie another NFL record. At San Francisco, his 127 punt return yards was the second highest single-game total in club history, trailing only his 207-yard performance. He led the NFL with 615 punt return yards and a 13.4 average. Almost ignored in '81 were his 3 interceptions and 21 passes defended as he started seven games at left cornerback. He was named All-NFL punt returner by AP, PFWA, The Sporting News and Pro Football Weekly. Pro Football Weekly also named him All-NFC. A third-round draft pick of the Rams in 1980, Irvin returned punts and played backup cornerback that year. He started the final two regular season games and the playoff game at Dallas in '80, and made his first NFL interception in the Rams' 17-14 win over New England.

COLLEGE: A four-year letterman at Kansas, Irvin had 10 career interceptions and had a career punt return average of 10.8 yards with 2 touchdowns. He was named All-Big 8 (second team) by AP and UPI his senior season.

PRO: Bert Jones, one of the most prolific passers in the history of pro football, was acquired by the Rams on April 27 from the Baltimore Colts in exchange for a first- and second-round draft pick. Jones' career passer rating of 79.1 ranks him No. 8 on the all-time list and No. 2 on the active list behind Cincinnati's Ken Anderson (80.5). In his career, he's thrown 122 touchdowns compared to just 97 interceptions. In 1981, despite the Colts' 2-14 record, Jones passed for 3,094 yards, the third time in his career

that he surpassed the 3,000-yard mark. At the same time, he completed 57.3 percent of his passes (244 of 426). The Colts' No. 1 pick in 1973 (second player selected overall), Jones suffered a shoulder separation in 1974, but returned in the season's final game to put on a passing exhibition in the Colts' 45-38 loss to the Jets. In that game, Jones set Colt records for pass attempts (53) and pass completions (36), plus set an NFL record of 17 consecutive pass completions. He led the Colts to the AFC Eastern Division title the next three seasons, passing for 3,104 yards in 1976. Along with being voted to the Pro Bowl in '76, Jones was named All-NFL by AP, NEA and PFWA, All-AFC by AP and UPI, AFC Offensive Player of the Year by Kansas City's Committee of 101 and MVP by the NFLPA. In 1977, he led the NFL with 224 pass completions, then was bothered by shoulder injuries in 1978 and 1979, playing just seven games in those two years. He returned in 1980 to complete 248 of 446 passes for 3,134 yards (all personal highs).

COLLEGE: A three-year letterman at LSU, Jones is the Tigers' all-time leading passer, completing 220 of 410 passes for 3,225 yards and 28 touchdowns. He holds 10 passing and scoring records as well as sharing another. In his senior season, Jones was a consensus All-America, All-SEC and College Player of the Year as selected by The Sporting News and Cleveland Touchdown Club. He played in the Orange Bowl, Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl and College All-Star Game.

PERSONAL: Bertram Hays Jones was born in Ruston, La., and attended Ruston High. His high school football coach, Hoss Garrett, also coached Bert's father, Dub, who played for the Cleveland Browns. Bert and wife Danni live in Ruston with children Molly (5/31/78), Tram (5/31/78) and Stephanie (4/21/80).

PRO: Running behind an offensive line plagued by injuries in 1981, halfback Wendell Tyler still sparked as he became the Rams' ninth 1,000-yard rusher. His 1,074 yards and two 100-yard rushing games may have been overshadowed only by the fact that he scored 17 touchdowns, tying the club record set in 1951 by Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch. Tyler rushed for 12 TDs and caught 5 TD passes as he led the NFC in scoring (non-kickers) with 102 points. Also, Tyler now ranks No. 9 on the Rams' all-time rushing list with 2,702 yards. After suffering a dislocated hip in an auto accident on July 4, 1980, Tyler came back in Week No. 8 and saw his first action the next week against New Orleans. The man with stop-and-go moves gained 88 yards in a first-half performance against the Saints a few weeks later, but against the Jets the next week, Tyler suffered a hyper-extended left elbow and missed the rest of the season. In 1979, Tyler had his best year ever, gaining 1,109 yards rushing and leading the NFL with a 5.1 average per attempt. He had four 100-yard games in '79 even though he did not become a starter until Week No. 5. In the '79 playoffs, Tyler contributed to the Rams' 21-19 win over Dallas with a 32-yard TD catch and a 35-yard run. He gained 86 yards on the ground in the NFC title game, and in Super Bowl XIV, he carried 17 times for 60 yards including a 39-yard run that set up an L.A. touchdown. In addition, he was named the club's Outstanding Offensive Back by Ye Old Rams. A third-round pick out of UCLA in 1977, Tyler saw only backup duty. His season was highlighted by a



102-yard performance on 8 carries in a 35-3 Monday night win over Minnesota. In 1978, Tyler suffered a knee injury in the second game and missed the rest of the season, so the '79 campaign was officially his second.

COLLEGE: Tyler's four-year Bruin career saw him gain 3,181 yards and be named an AP All-America and All-Pac 8. He gained 172 yards in UCLA's 23-10 win over Ohio State in the 1976 Rose Bowl, including a 57-yard TD run. He also played in the East-West Shrine Game and Senior Bowl.

PERSONAL: Wendell Avery Tyler was born in Shreveport, La., and attended Crenshaw High in Los Angeles. He and wife Carmen live in West Covina, Ca., with daughter Candace (12/24/78) and Wendell Avery, Jr. (12/14/81).

He caught 23 passes that season and had a 7.1 punt return average. He started the first two games of 1978 before suffering a rib injury that put him out for five weeks. While he didn't start the rest of '78, Waddy caught a 68-yard TD pass against Tampa Bay that was the club's longest of the year.

COLLEGE: Waddy lettered four years at Colorado: two at running back, one at wing back and one at wide receiver. He broke Cliff Branch's record by returning 22 kickoffs for 566 yards his senior year.

PERSONAL: Billy Dean Waddy was born in Wharton, Tex., and attended Boling (Tex.) High where he competed in football, track and baseball. Billy is single and lives in San Diego, Ca.

PRO: Jack Youngblood possesses the rare qualities that make up a great football player: respected leadership, durability and outstanding performance. After undergoing surgery prior to the 1981 season to remove a blood clot in his left arm, Youngblood turned in a very solid season at left end that saw him lead the Rams with 11 quarterback sacks. In addition, he extended his consecutive game streak to 162, No. 4 on the club's all time list. Youngblood had 11 quarterback sacks in 1980 (club high) as the Rams led the NFC with 56. The team co-captain was named All-NFC by UPI in '80 and was voted Outstanding Defensive Lineman by Ye Old Rams for the sixth time. In 1979, Youngblood had his highest quarterback sack total with 16. However,



his greatest influence on the Rams in '79 came after he fractured his left fibula in the second quarter of L.A.'s 21-19 playoff win over Dallas. Since the injury was to a non-weight bearing bone and could not be injured further, Youngblood was fitted with a plastic brace and went all the way in the NFC title game and Super Bowl XIV. His courage and performance did not go unnoticed as he was named All-NFL by AP, NEA and PFWA, and All-NFC by UPI, Pro Football Weekly and The Sporting News. He played in his seventh straight Pro Bowl after the '79 season and received — for an unprecedented third time — the Daniel F. Reeves Memorial Award, emblematic of the club's MVP as voted by the Southern California Sports Broadcasters Assn. Ye Old Rams named him the club's MVP for the third time. The Rams' second of two first-round picks in 1971, Youngblood played mostly on special teams before splitting playing time in 1972 with Fred Dryer. When Dryer moved to the right side in 1973, Youngblood became a full-time starter and was voted to his first of seven straight Pro Bowls. In 1975 and 1976, Youngblood was named NFC Defensive Player of the Year by Kansas City's Committee of 101. Having won numerous All-NFL and All-NFC honors in his career, Youngblood had one of his finest days in the '75 playoff win over St. Louis. He sacked the Cardinal quarterback once, forced a fumble, blocked a PAT attempt and returned a pass interception 47 yards for a touchdown.

COLLEGE: A three-year letterman at Florida, Youngblood was named All-America his senior year by The Sporting News, Football Writers Association and AP (second team). He was the Most Valuable Defensive Lineman in the SEC that year and played in the College All-Star Game and Senior Bowl.

PERSONAL: Herbert Jackson Youngblood III was born in Jacksonville, Fla., and attended Jefferson County High in Monticello, Fla. Jack and wife Diane live in Orange, Ca., where Jack and Larry Brooks own and operate a western clothing store called Wild Bunch. PRO: Look for Jim Youngblood to be roaming the playing field again in 1982. The Rams' Man of the Year started all 16 games at left linebacker in 1981 and was credited with an interception and 3 quarterback sacks. Youngblood's 1980 season was highlighted by his fourth career touchdown by interception return. It happened in the Rams' 48-26 win over the 49ers as Youngblood returned it 33 yards. He missed one game in '80 because of an elbow injury and ended the season with 3 QB sacks. In 1979, Youngblood showed he could be more than a ferocious tackler as he intercepted 5 passes

(tied for the club lead). Two of those went for touchdowns: a 31-yarder against Tampa Bay and a 34-yarder against Atlanta. Also, he had an interception in the NFC title game. - 1972** Rams trade Jack Pardee (LB), Myron Pottios (LB), Maxie Baughan (LB), John Wilbur (G), Jeff Jordan (RB), Diron Talbert (DT) and D4-71 to Washington for Marlin McKeever (LB), D1-72 (Isiah Robertson), D3-71 (Dave Elmendorf), D3-72 (Traded), D4-72 (Traded), D5-72 (Bob Christiansen), D6-72 (Ed Hebert) and D7-72 (Traded).
- 1973** Rams trade Roman Gabriel to Philadelphia for Harold Jackson (WR), Tony Baker (RB), D1-74 (John Cappelletti), D1-75 (Dennis Harrah) and D3-75 (Dan Nugent).
- 1974** Rams trade John Hadl to Green Bay for D1-75 (Mike Fanning), D2-75 (Monte Jackson), D3-75 (Geoff Reece), D1-76 (compensation to Detroit for Ron Jessie) and D2-76 (Pat Thomas).



THE RAMS STORY: 1937-1981

1937 On Feb. 13, the National Football League grants a Cleveland franchise to Homer Marshman and associates, a prominent group of local businessmen. Hugo Bezdek is named head coach. As the league's rookie franchise, Rams finish with a 1-10-0 record. Bob Kelley is named radio play-by-play announcer at start of season.

1938 Assistant coach Art Lewis takes over team after three losses and Rams win three of remaining seven games.

1939 Earl "Dutch" Clark becomes head coach and Lewis remains as assistant. Rams hit .500 mark for first time with 5-5-1 record. Parker Hall joins team as rookie tailback. Hall is not named on official NFL all-league first team, but wins Joe Carr Trophy as NFL's official Most Valuable Player.

1940 Team drops back to 4-6-1 record. Johnny Drake, powerful Ram fullback, is named to first team All-NFL.

1941 Daniel F. Reeves and Fred Levy, Jr. purchase Rams in June and hire, as general manager, Billy Evans, former sports columnist, American League umpire and Cleveland Indians general manager. Team wins first two games but drops next nine to finish in cellar.

1942 Evans resigns before 1942 season. Charles "Chile" Walsh replaces Art Lewis as assistant coach. Lt. Reeves and Major Levy depart to enter armed forces. Bob Kelley is

named club secretary. Team finishes 5-6-0.

1943 Clark resigns. Chile Walsh is named head coach, but NFL grants Rams permission to suspend operations for one season because of wartime difficulties. Reeves buys out Levy.

1944 Chile Walsh becomes general manager and appoints Buff Donelli as head coach. Pickup team finishes 4-6-0.

1945 Donelli joins military service. Walsh names his brother, Adam Walsh, as head coach, with George Trafton and Bob Snyder as assistants. Third round draft choice (a future) Bob Waterfield from UCLA joins team as T-formation quarterback and leads Rams to 9-1-0 season for first divisional title in team's history. On icy field, Rams defeat Washington Redskins, 15-14, at Cleveland for world title. Waterfield becomes first player to receive unanimous vote for official NFL Most Valuable Player award. Walsh is named coach of the year. Eddie Kotal joins team as chief scout and Bill John begins 29-year tenure as business manager.

1946 Reeves moves franchise to Los Angeles early in the year. After disappointing 6-4-1 season, both Walshes resign.

1947 Reeves assumes duties of general manager. Bob Snyder is named head coach with Joe Stydahar as new assistant. Team is talent-heavy but injury-ridden in 6-6-0 season.

Reeves sells part interests to former partner Levy and to Edwin and Harold Pauley and Hal Seley.

1948 Clark Shaughnessy joins staff as advisory coach. On Sept. 3, Snyder resigns and Clark Shaughnessy becomes head coach. Team wins four of last five to post 6-5-1 mark.

1949 Team wins first six games, then hangs on to win first divisional title since moving west. Heavy rain holds down L.A. crowd as Philadelphia Eagles skid to 14-0 win over Rams in NFL title game. Rookie Norm Van Brocklin joins team and gives Rams top-notch one-two quarterback punch. Elroy Hirsch has fine rookie year.

1950 NFL absorbs AAC, leaving Rams as lone pro team in Los Angeles after four years of two-league existence. In February, Stydahar becomes head coach, replacing Shaughnessy. Club opens new offices on Beverly Boulevard. Bill Granholm begins 18-year tenure as equipment manager. Team sets 22 league records in rolling to conference title tie. Waterfield and end Tom Fears lead playoff win over Bears, 24-14, but following week in Cleveland, Lou Groza's late field goal stops Rams' title hopes, 30-28.

1951 Rams win third straight conference title on final day of season, then defeat Cleveland at the Coliseum, 24-17, on 73-yard pass, Van Brocklin to Fears, for first world title since moving to L.A.

1952 After team loses three straight preseason games and drops league opener by big score, Stydahar re-

signs. He is replaced as head coach by Hamp Pool. Team loses two of next three, but wins last eight to tie for conference title. Rams lose playoff in Detroit. Rams trade 11 players to Dallas for rookie Les Richter, who then enters Army for two years. Waterfield retires.

1953 Club co-owner Harold Pauley passes away. Team compiles 8-3-1 record, losing three games by total of eight points to finish third in conference. Rams defeat world champ Lions in both games.

1954 Bonus choice Bill Wade and tradee Les Richter both join Rams as rookies two years after going from college into military service. Team has disappointing 6-5-1 mark. All assistant coaches resign. Pool soon follows suit.

1955 On Jan. 26, Rams hire Sid Gillman, head coach at University of Cincinnati, to replace Pool. Fine defensive year and clutch field goal kicking by Richter give team hard-fought 8-3-1 record for conference title. Cleveland wins title game at Coliseum by one-sided score.

1956 In form reversal, team loses five consecutive early-season games and finishes in cellar tie with 4-8 record.

1957 Ram owners sign five-year operational pact and name former Ram publicist Pete Rozelle as general manager. Team loses squeakers on road to 49ers and Lions, finishing 6-6-0, but only two games behind conference leaders.

1958 In preseason trade, Van Brocklin goes to Eagles. Bill Wade

sets many Ram passing marks en route to 8-4-0 year.

1959 Team has general letdown and many injuries for worst season since 1937, finishing 2-10-0. Ollie Matson, acquired in big trade, is work-horse at fullback. On last day of season, Gillman and staff resign.

1960 Following death of Bert Bell, Pete Rozelle is named NFL commissioner. Elroy Hirsch replaces Rozelle as Rams general manager. Bob Waterfield is named Ram head coach. Team finishes 4-7-1.

1961 Rams trade Bill Wade, Del Shofner, John Guzik for Zeke Bratkowski, Lindon Crow and 1962 first draft choice, which makes it possible to draft both Roman Gabriel and Merlin Olsen. Revamped Rams finish strongly after slow start, but still show 4-10-0 deficit.

1962 Harland Svare replaces Don Paul as defensive line coach. Rams lose four of first five games by narrow margins, then show only occasional surges of success en route to 1-12-1 year. Waterfield resigns after eighth game. Svare named interim head coach. On Dec. 27, in closed auction, Reeves reacquires control of Rams, purchasing full interests of co-owners Pauley, Levy, Seley and Bob Hope.

1963 Reeves sells 49% interest in Rams to Gene Autry, Bob Reynolds, Leonard Firestone, Paul A. O'Bryan, Robert Lehman, J.D. Stetson Coleman and Joseph A. Thomas. Svare is retained. Les Richter retires before season. After 0-5 record, Gabriel is reinstated as starting QB and plays last nine games without relief, guiding team to 5-4 mark and season record of 5-9-0.

1964 Rams sign 10-year pact to play in "new look" Coliseum's "stadium-within-a-stadium." Fourteen rookies make the season squad. Club finishes fifth with 5-7-2 record.

1965 After winning only one of first 10, Rams take three of last four against top two teams in each conference, but Svare is dismissed.

1966 After a court fight, George Allen is released by George Halas from his assistant coaching duties with the Chicago Bears to become head coach of the Rams. NFL and AFL merge in spring. Bob Kelley, "Voice of the Rams" since the club's beginning in 1937 dies in September. Rams practice in new facilities in Long Beach. Team finishes 8-6.

1967 After 17 years on Beverly Boulevard, club moves to new building on Pico. Training camp is also moved to California State College at Fullerton after five years at Chapman College in Orange. Equipment manager Bill Granholm leaves club after 18 years to take position in league office. Rams record first unbeaten pre-season in history with six wins, including victories over first-ever AFL opponents, San Diego and Kansas City. Team completes finest win-loss season ever with 11-1-2 league record to win Coastal Division Championship, the first title of any kind since 1955, then loses to Green Bay in Western Conference Championship Game.

1968 After playoff win over Cleveland in January, team finishes regular season with 10-3-1 record, second in Coastal Division to Baltimore's 13-1 mark. Attendance is over one million for second straight year and Ram defense sets new 14-game NFL record

for fewest yards allowed. On Dec. 26, Allen is dismissed as head coach, but is re-hired two weeks later.

1969 After 20 years with the Rams as a player, general manager and assistant to the president, Elroy Hirsch leaves club to become athletic director at the University of Wisconsin. He is replaced by Public Relations Director Jack Teele, and John Sanders becomes Assistant General Manager. Team wins its first 11 games to win Coastal Division with 11-3 record before losing to Minnesota in Western Conference title game, 23-20. Quarterback Roman Gabriel is unanimous choice as the NFL's Most Valuable Player.

1970 Playoff Bowl victory over Dallas in January heads Rams toward their 25th year in Southern California. With the completion of the merger of the NFL and AFL, the Rams join San Francisco, Atlanta and New Orleans in the Western Division of the National Conference of the new 26-team National Football League. Rams finish second to 49ers with 9-4-1 record. George Allen's contract is not renewed.

1971 On April 15, owner Daniel F. Reeves dies of cancer in New York. His longtime friend and business associate, William A. Barnes, becomes President and General Manager. Tommy Prothro, successful head coach at UCLA, replaces Allen. Playing the toughest schedule in the NFL, the Rams finish with an 8-5-1 record, second to 49ers in the NFC West.

1972 In a history-making move, Baltimore Colts owner Carroll Rosenbloom trades the Baltimore franchise to Robert Irsay in exchange for the Rams. Irsay had purchased the Rams

from the estate of the late Dan Reeves. The transaction was completed and announced on July 14. Rosenbloom, the most successful owner in the NFL over the last two decades, brings with him to Los Angeles Don Klosterman, Rosenbloom's general manager in Baltimore. Klosterman assumes title of Executive Vice President and General Manager. After five years at Cal State Fullerton, Rams move training camp site to Cal State Long Beach. After 6-7-1 season, all coaches are dismissed.

1973 An observer in '72, Rosenbloom begins to make changes early in 1973, and they pay off quickly. His choice for head coach, former Detroit assistant Chuck Knox, leads team to 12-2 season, winningest in Rams history, and Knox becomes "Coach of the Year." Roman Gabriel is traded to Philadelphia and the new quarterback, former San Diego Charger John Hadl, is NFC "Player of the Year." Rams win NFC West title, but lose in first round of playoffs to Dallas. Other changes introduced by Rosenbloom include return to blue and gold uniforms. Club returns to Cal State Fullerton for summer training.

1974 Carroll Rosenbloom's son, Steve, takes over as Assistant to the President. After 3-2 start, Rams trade John Hadl to Green Bay for five draft choices in bold move that stuns the football world. Hadl's backup, James Harris, becomes starter and leads team to 10-4 record, its second straight NFC Western title and its first playoff victory since 1951 (a 19-10 win over Washington) before the Rams bow to Minnesota, 14-10, in NFC title game.

1975 With defense allowing second fewest points in NFL history over a

14-game season (135), Rams win third straight NFC Western title by completing 12-2 season. After playoff victory over St. Louis, however, they bow to Dallas in the NFC Championship Game. The 34-8 record over the last three years is best in the NFL.

1976 Rams win NFC West title for fourth straight year with 10-3-1 record, then beat Dallas, 14-12, for their first playoff victory on the road before 24-13 NFC title game loss at Minnesota. Quarterback injuries mar season and rookie Pat Haden becomes fourth different playoff QB in four years under Knox. Rams' 351 points is highest in NFC.

1977 Rams spearhead new Coliseum configuration which reduces capacity from 91,038 to 71,039. With Lawrence McCutcheon setting new club career rushing record of 5,523 yards, the Rams (10-4) roll to their fifth straight division title before 14-7 playoff loss to Minnesota in Coliseum. Following the campaign Knox resigns to take Buffalo Bills head coaching post.

1978 On Feb. 1, Rosenbloom hires George Allen but releases Allen after second preseason game. Ray Malavasi becomes head coach and leads club to 12-4 mark for the sixth straight division title (tying NFL record). Rams beat Minnesota, 34-10, in playoff but lose NFC title to Dallas. Rams also announce move to Anaheim Stadium beginning in 1980.

1979 Carroll Rosenbloom dies April 2 and his widow, Georgia, becomes majority owner. Klosterman is named to replace Steve Rosenbloom in charge of day-to-day operations. Club moves to Rams Park in Anaheim, where offices and practice facilities

are together. Despite multitude of injuries, team wins 7th straight division title to set NFL record, then beats Dallas (21-19) and Tampa Bay (9-0) in NFC Playoffs. Rams lose to Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XIV, 31-19.

1980 With Anaheim Stadium's capacity set at 69,045, Rams sell out last six home games and finish with 11-5 record. Rams lead NFL in rushing for first time since 1957, gaining 2,799 yards. Rams set 15 club records and tie three others. Nolan Cromwell named consensus All-NFL and receives award as NFC Defensive Player of the Year. Rams enter playoffs as wild card and lose to Dallas, 34-13.

1981 Rams finish 6-10, missing playoffs for the first time since 1972. Nolan Cromwell and LeRoy Irvin named All-NFL. Irvin sets NFL record with 207 punt return yards in 37-35 win over Atlanta. Wendell Tyler rushes for 1,074 yards and ties Elroy Hirsch's club record of 17 touchdowns in a season. Rams sell out first seven regular season games at Anaheim Stadium.
