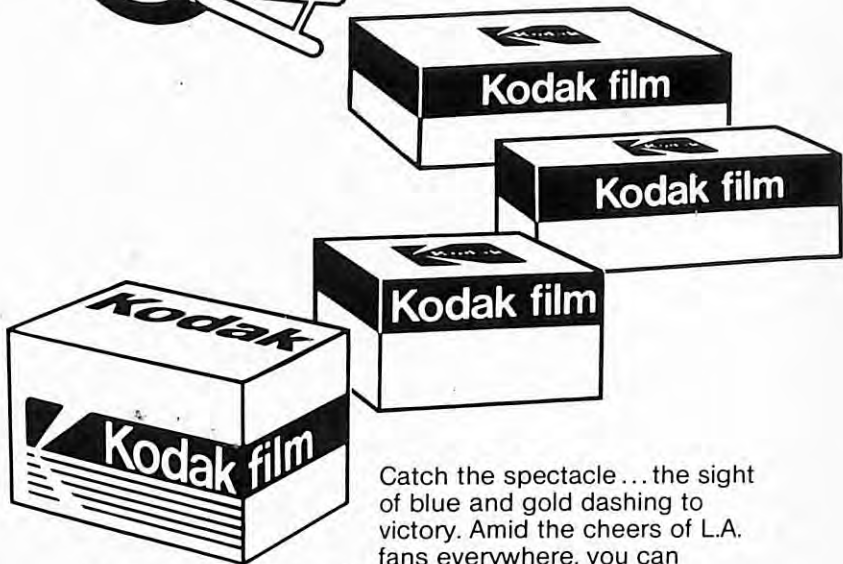

# GEORGIA FRONTIERE

---

## President

The Los Angeles Rams can, indeed, be called the Class of '83, and President Georgia Frontiere is certainly at the Head of the Class. The offseason was anything but an off-time for the Rams' energetic owner, as she succeeded in hiring a new head coach, John Robinson, and a new Executive Vice President, Ray Nagel.

Clearly, it was a time for action as the Rams' record had declined the past two years. So Mrs. Frontiere went after — and landed — John Robinson, the popular and highly-successful former USC football coach.

The Robinson move astounded pro football observers inasmuch as he had left football for an administrative position at USC. Robinson's hiring followed the appointment of Ray Nagel, a former All-Coast halfback at UCLA. Nagel comes to the Rams from the University of Hawaii, where he was Athletic Director and a dynamic force in the emergence of that school's athletic program.

It has, therefore, become clear that Mrs. Frontiere's commitment is to return the Rams to a position of prominence. Certainly, the former Greater Los Angeles Press Club Headliner of the Year would like nothing better than to take the Rams all the way to the Super Bowl again.

Mrs. Frontiere also manages to find time to participate in numerous charitable endeavors, civic and community activities. She serves on the board of directors of the Los Angeles Boys and Girls Club, the Los Angeles Orphanage Guild and the Los Angeles Blind Youth Foundation. She is also honorary co-chairman of the Boy Scout Sports Dinner in Los Angeles and is a benefactor of the St. Jude Children's Research Center.





## RAMS EXECUTIVES

---

### **RAY NAGEL**

#### **Executive Vice President**



When Ray Nagel was named to join the Rams' front office team in January it marked a homecoming for the former All-Coast halfback from UCLA.

Nagel, 56, a Los Angeles native, graduated from L.A. High School and went on to secure a degree in marketing from UCLA, where he later received a law degree.

Nagel supervises the day-to-day operations of the Rams' front office and is uniquely qualified to do so inasmuch as he's spent most of his adult life in coaching and

sports administration.

He played pro football with the old Chicago Cardinals (1952-53) and got his first head coaching job at Utah at age 29. The highlight of Nagel's coaching career came in 1964 when his Utes tied for the Western Athletic Conference title and won the Liberty Bowl. Nagel was named the conference's coach of the year.

Nagel moved to Iowa where he was head coach for five years, then turned to administration as athletic director at Washington State (1971).

He stayed with the Cougars until 1976 when he was named athletic director at the University of Hawaii, where he remained until joining the Rams. At Hawaii, Nagel was instrumental in bringing a post-season game (the Aloha Football Classic) to the area and helping the Rainbows gain admittance into the Western Athletic Conference.

Nagel and his wife, Shirley, live in Los Angeles. They have five children, Nancy, Bruce, Tom, Ray Jr. and Scott.

### **JOHN SHAW**

#### **Vice President-Finance**



John Shaw begins his second year as the Rams' Vice President-Finance. Shaw, a 31-year-old native of Brooklyn, is a practicing tax attorney and certified public accountant.

Before joining the Rams, Shaw spent three years with the accounting firm of Arthur Andersen & Co. Prior to that, he practiced law in California.

Shaw is an avid sports fan who is a key member of the Rams organization. He advises President Georgia

Frontiere on financial matters, including club investments, player contracts and legal affairs.

Shaw attended Kearney High School in San Diego and went to the University of San Diego where he earned a degree in accounting in 1973.

Shaw continued his education at New York University and secured a law degree from that institution in 1976.

John and his wife, Suzanne, a student majoring in fashion design at UCLA, live in Brentwood.

## **DON KLOSTERMAN** **Assistant to the President/Consultant**

Don Klosterman enters his 12th year with the Rams after coming to the club from Baltimore with the late Carroll Rosenbloom in 1972.

Born in Lemars, Iowa, Don grew up in Compton, Ca., and attended Loyola University. "The Duke of Del Rey" led the Lions through their most successful athletic era as he set seven NCAA passing records.

He played pro ball with Cleveland, the Dallas Texans, the Rams and the Calgary Stampeders before a skiing accident ended his career in 1957.

Don began his front office pro football career in 1960 as a scout with the Los Angeles Chargers. He moved on to the Dallas Texans (now the Kansas City Chiefs) where he helped turn the Chiefs into a Super Bowl winner. Klosterman then became general manager of the Houston Oilers in 1966. He moved on to Baltimore as general manager in 1970, then to Los Angeles when Rosenbloom traded his Colts for the Rams.

Klosterman and wife Luciana reside in Beverly Hills, Ca. He has two children, Kurt and Katie.



## **JACK FAULKNER** **Administrator of Football Operations**

Jack Faulkner begins his 20th season as a member of the Rams staff and brings a record of success matched by few.

Faulkner, 57, has devoted 30 years to coaching and scouting and remained active as an assistant coach through 1980. At that point, he was named to the Rams' front office. His duties consist of the evaluation and signing of players, scouting reports on opposing teams and providing input on trades.

Faulkner, a native of Youngstown, Ohio, was a line-backer at Miami, Ohio, from 1946-48 after a tour of the Marine Corps. He coached for six years at the University of Cincinnati (1949-54) under Sid Gillman, then accompanied Gillman as defensive backfield coach when both joined the Rams in 1955.

When Gillman left the Rams for the Chargers, Faulkner accompanied his coach. He remained with Gillman until 1962 when he moved on to Denver. Faulkner was named AFL coach of the year in 1962 while leading the Broncos to a 7-7 record in his first season as head coach and general manager.

In 1965 Faulkner was named defensive backfield coach of the Minnesota Vikings, then returned to the Rams in 1966 as a scout. He left to join the New Orleans Saints where he stayed through 1970, serving as chief defensive coach the first three years and director of player personnel the final year.



Faulkner rejoined the Rams as director of Pro Scouting in 1971, then joined the coaching staff where he remained until being named Administrator of Football Operations.

Faulkner and wife Betty live in Rolling Hills Estates. They have two children, Jon and Cathy.

## **LES MARSHALL** **Director of Marketing**



The title Director of Marketing does not adequately describe Les Marshall's value to the Rams' front office.

Marshall, 38, is involved with many other areas of the Rams' operation as he functions as a liaison between President Georgia Frontiere and other staff members.

Marshall joined the Rams in November, 1981, after an 11-year career with Playboy Enterprises. Throughout his career at Playboy, he served as Executive Assistant to the Chairman, President of Playboy Models, President of

Playboy Limousine Co. and Director of Home Video Playboy.

Marshall is a former professional baseball player in the Milwaukee farm system. He served in Vietnam as an infantry platoon leader and company commander from 1968 through 1970.

He was born at Schofield Barracks in Hawaii and moved with his family to California where he graduated from Apple Valley High School. He attended Stanford University, graduating in 1966 with a degree in business. In 1976 he earned his Master's in business administration from Pepperdine.

He lives in Chatsworth with his wife, Janice, and daughter, Dallas.

## **DICK BEAM** **Director of Operations**



Dick Beam begins his third year as Director of Operations for the Rams and is responsible for a myriad of duties. Beam oversees the club budget, supervises the daily operation of Rams Park, arranges for team travel and serves as liaison with the team and its Anaheim Stadium home as well as other administrative functions.

The 47-year-old former star athlete from Whittier was formerly director of administration for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He moved to Tampa to join head coach John McKay in 1976. Beam was an assistant to McKay at USC in 1971. Beam served as a Trojan assistant for four years before moving to Tampa where he was an administrative aide to McKay before becoming the team's director of administration.

Beam is a devoted long distance runner, who's participated in numerous races, including the Orange Bowl Marathon in 1981. He occasionally runs from his Fullerton home to Rams Park in Anaheim, a distance of eight miles.

He is a graduate of Whittier High, where he won varsity letters in football, baseball and basketball. He moved on to Whittier College where he played under George Allen and Don Coryell and was an all-league performer in 1958.

Beam and his wife Dorothy have a son, Donn, and a daughter, Cathy.

**JOHN MATH**  
**Director of Player Personnel**

John Math's primary duties as Director of Player Personnel are overseeing the Rams' involvement in the annual college draft and player evaluation. Math begins his fourth year in that capacity.

Math joined the Rams as a scout in March, 1977. He has earned acclaim for his ability to foresee development in young athletes with pro football potential.

The 52-year-old native of San Gabriel attended Alhambra High School before moving on to the University of California, Berkeley. At California (1950-54), Math was a defensive back under the legendary Pappy Waldorf.

Math coached at Glendale College from 1960 to 1963, then coached at Utah State for two seasons. He joined the Houston Oilers the following season as a scout. Math remained in that position until he joined the Rams.

John is deeply committed to youth sports and is currently involved with the establishment of a physical testing program for young athletes in South Orange County.

Math and his wife Maxine live in San Juan Capistrano. They have five children, John Jr., Gayle, Wanda, Nancy and Cathy.



**JAY ZYGMUNT**  
**Legal Counsel**

Zygmunt begins his second year with the Rams after joining the club as legal counsel in 1982. His current duties include negotiating and advising on player contracts and club legal matters as well as consulting on financial matters. Born July 1, 1952, in Chicago, Ill., Zygmunt attended Brother Rice High School in that city. He graduated from the University of Notre Dame in 1973 with a degree in business administration. Zygmunt attended Northwestern University Law School and was awarded a law degree from the institution in 1978. He is also a certified public accountant.

Zygmunt is single and lives in Marina del Rey, Ca.



**MARSHALL KLEIN**  
**Director of Community Relations**

After spending his entire adult life with the Los Angeles Times, Marshall Klein changed careers and became the new man in a new position this year as the Rams' first Director of Community Relations.

Klein, 41, had been with The Times for 21 years, the last 15 as Sports Editor of The Times' Orange County Edition. With the Rams, he will spearhead the club's community outreach program and assist in other public relations and administrative areas.



A versatile person, Klein has been a part-time lecturer in the communica-

tions and journalism departments at Cal State University, Fullerton and Cal State University, Long Beach. He has also taught at Cal State University, Dominguez Hills, Golden West College and Orange Coast College.

He has also done sports commentary and feature work on KOCE (Channel 50) and KDOC (Channel 56) in Orange County. Klein is an accomplished speaker who has performed at many luncheons and banquets throughout the Southern California area.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Klein graduated from John H. Francis Polytechnic High School in Sun Valley (Ca.) and attended Los Angeles City College and Los Angeles Valley College.

He is a director of the Orange County Sports Hall of Fame and was Chairman of the Board of the Orange County Sportswriters Assn. for eight years.

Klein lives in Tustin with his wife Katie and children, Phillip, Michael, Benjamin and Molly.

## **PETE DONOVAN** **Director of Public Relations**



Pete Donovan became Director of Public Relations for the Los Angeles Rams on April 6, 1983.

Donovan, 40, came to the Rams after six years as a sportswriter for the Los Angeles Times. While at the paper, he covered the California Angels, collegiate sports and wrote feature articles on a wide variety of subjects.

A graduate of Cal State Fullerton, Donovan was a sportswriter for the Fullerton News-Tribune; the sports publicist for Cypress College; the publicist for the Los Angeles Times Special Events Department; and the Director of Public Relations for the Los Angeles Strings of World Team Tennis before joining the Times in 1977.

For the past two years, he taught a Sports Marketing class at Cal State Fullerton. He has also served as the Chief Operating Officer of the Orange County Sports Hall of Fame and the Program Chairman of the Orange County Sportswriters Assn.

Born April 18, 1943, in Brooklyn, New York, Donovan played basketball and baseball at Liberty (N.Y.) High School. After four years in the United States Air Force, he enrolled at Cypress (Ca.) Junior College where he was named that school's Man of the Year in 1968.

Donovan and his wife, Janet, live in Fullerton, Ca. They have seven children: Kym, Rena, Robbie, Shelly, Stacey, Debbie and Andrea.



## RAMS COACHING STAFF

---

### **JOHN ROBINSON** **Head Coach**

Few figures in Southern California sports history have attained the popularity and success of John Robinson, who begins his first season as head coach of the Los Angeles Rams.

Robinson's stature has been built on a warm, easy-going personality; a refreshing sense of perspective; and a strong, competitive drive. He has been described as magnetic, positive, self-confident, gregarious and often expansive.

Considered a master motivator, Robinson had a brilliant seven-year career as the head coach at the University of Southern California. During that time, the Trojans won 81.9% of their games; captured a national championship (1978); had an undefeated season (1979); took three Pac-10 Conference titles; and won four bowl games in five appearances.

Robinson became the 17th head coach in the 37-year history of the Rams on Valentine's Day. The 47-year-old Robinson (July 25, 1935) is the third intercollegiate coach recruited by the Rams. The others were Sid Gillman (1955 from the University of Cincinnati) and Tommy Prothro (1971 from UCLA).

Robinson succeeds Ray Malavasi, whose five-year reign ended after back-to-back losing seasons in 1981 and 1982.

The new Ram coach was raised in San Mateo, Ca., where he played football and baseball at Serra High, earning Catholic All-American and All-Northern California honors as end on the football team.

Robinson graduated from the University of Oregon in 1958 with a bachelor's degree in education. He was a letterman end when the Ducks won the Pacific Coast Conference title in 1957 and he played briefly in Oregon's 10-7 loss to Ohio State in the Rose Bowl.

His coaching experience spans 23 years. He was an assistant at Oregon (1960-71), on John McKay's USC staff (1972-74) and one season as an aide to his boyhood friend, John Madden, at the Oakland Raiders (1975) before succeeding McKay at USC in 1976.

Robinson was acclaimed by the Washington, D.C., Touchdown Club as the 1979 Coach of the Year, and also Pac-10 and West Coast Coach of the Year in both 1976 and 1978. In 1976, he also was the first rookie head coach to take a team to the Rose Bowl in 25 years.

On the field, Robinson produced seven consecutive powerful offensive units, meanwhile perpetuating USC's heritage of defensive excellence.

In 1976, 1977 and in 1979, the Trojans finished third, fourth and fourth in the country in total offense and the 1979 team gained more yards than any team in the school's history.



Defensively, the Trojans finished first in the Pac-10 four times and once in team defense under Robinson, while the 1980 team led the conference in every single team defensive category.

Along the way, Robinson coached two Heisman Trophy winners: Charlie White, now with the Cleveland Browns and Marcus Allen, now with the Raiders in the National Football League.

Allen, the 1982 NFL Rookie of the Year and All-NFL in many selections, was the first 2,000-yard rusher in collegiate annals, shattering the NCAA single season mark with 2,342 yards and a 212.9 yards-a-game average.

Robinson resigned as the Trojans' coach on Nov. 23, 1982. He accepted a position as Senior Vice President of University Relations for USC before taking the Rams' job.

Robinson and his wife, Barbara, now live in Pasadena. They have four children. They are daughters, Teresa 23, and Lynn 21, and sons, David 18, and Christopher 16, a sophomore at Blair High School where he will be a candidate for the starting quarterback role this fall.

## **BOB BAKER** **Quarterback Coach**



Bob Baker comes to the Rams after serving the past three seasons as the offensive coordinator for the high-powered Arizona State Sun Devils.

In 1981, the Sun Devils led the nation in total yardage (5,486) and broke all Pac-10 offensive records.

A 1951 graduate of Ball State (Ind.), Baker coached on the high school level at four different places — Muncie, Royerton, Ft. Wayne Southside and Anderson Madison Heights.

Born in Bluffton, Ind., Nov. 28, 1927, he coached at Illinois, Indiana and Michigan State. He also served as head coach for the Calgary Stampeders in the Canadian Football League.

While at Indiana, Baker served on Coach John Pont's staff in 1968 when the Hoosiers reached the Rose Bowl.

Baker and his wife, Alyce, have four daughters — Lisa, Rebecca, Sue and Debbie. They make their home in Anaheim.

## **MARV GOUX** **Defensive Line Coach**



A distinctive 30-year association between Marv Goux and the University of Southern California ended this past February when Goux chose to join his former Trojan boss, John Robinson, on the staff of the Rams.

One of seven new assistants with the Rams, Goux will coach the defensive line, which is the same role he had at USC.

As both a player and a coach, Goux has been an extraordinarily fierce competitor, who while tough on the field has exhibited unusual sportsmanship after the game. At USC, Goux made it a tradition to personally congratulate each player on every opposing team to

beat the Trojans.

At USC, Goux coached 12 first-team All-Americans, including Gary Jeter, who has been reunited with his college coach this season as a Ram. Goux's other All-Americans were John Grant, Charles Weaver, George Achica, Ron Mix, Marlin and Mike McKeever, Dan Ficca, Damon Bame, Tim Rossovich, Jimmy Gunn and Al Cowlings.

The 51-year-old Goux (Sept. 8, 1932) first came to USC in 1952 when he started at linebacker for the Rose Bowl team that beat Wisconsin, 7-0. He was a junior college All-American at Ventura JC in 1951. Although only 5-10 and 185 pounds, Goux started for three years as a Trojan (1952, 1954 and 1955 — he was injured in 1953).

In his final two seasons, he went both ways, playing center and linebacker. Goux is just one of two Trojans to twice win the Davis-Teschke Award, given annually to the most inspirational player on the team. He was also co-captain of the 1955 team.

After graduating from USC, Goux coached Carpinteria High School in Carpinteria, Ca., to the small school CIF finals with a 9-1 record in 1956.

The following year, he was hired by new head coach Don Clark as head freshman coach and varsity assistant, thus beginning a 26-year run as a Trojan coach.

USC won five national championships during Goux's stay on the coaching staff.

Born in Santa Barbara, Goux now resides in Long Beach.

## **GIL HASKELL** **Special Teams Coach**

Gil Haskell takes over the Rams' special teams, an assignment he handled the last five seasons at USC under John Robinson.

In his last two years with the Trojans, he also coached the wide receivers.

Haskell came to USC after nine years at St. Ignatius High School in San Francisco where he turned in a 34-15 record as head coach the last five seasons after spending four as an assistant. He was also the track coach four years, winning three Catholic Athletic League titles.

Haskell began his coaching career at Riordan High (San Francisco), serving as line coach for three years. At Riordan, he also coached the track team.

A standout defensive back at San Francisco State, he was all-conference as a senior and a second-team All-Coast pick. San Francisco State won three Far West Conference championships while Haskell was there.

Born September 24, 1943, Haskell played football and baseball at St. Ignatius. He was a halfback and defensive back on three St. Ignatius championship teams and a catcher on two title-winning baseball squads.

Haskell's uncle, the late Dr. William O'Grady, was a part owner of the San Francisco 49ers and before coming to USC in 1978, he had not missed a 49er home game in 22 years.

Born in San Francisco, Haskell makes his home in Huntington Beach, Ca.



## **HUDSON HOUCK** **Offensive Line Coach**



Recognized as one of the premier offensive line coaches in college football over the last decade, Hudson Houck makes his professional debut this season with the Rams.

Houck was the first man hired by John Robinson when Robinson took over at USC in 1975. After being named the new Rams' head coach in February, Robinson immediately hired Houck and Marv Goux from his USC staff.

With the Trojans, Houck developed seven first-team All-Americans — Marvin Powell, Keith Van Horne, Brad Budde, Pat Howell, Roy Foster, Bruce Matthews and Don Mosebar. Budde also was the 1979 winner of the Lombardi Award as the outstanding lineman in the country.

Born January 7, 1943, Houck played and coached under John McKay at USC. He was a reserve center on the 1962 Trojan national championship team.

He graduated from USC in 1965 with a degree in physical education. Houck then became a teacher and assistant football coach at Crescenta Valley (Ca.) High School in 1967 and 1969. Twice his coaching career was interrupted by service in the United States Army.

Houck returned to USC in 1970 and spent two years as head freshman coach and varsity graduate assistant. From 1973 through 1975, he was the offensive line coach at Stanford before being hired by Robinson late that year.

A native of Los Angeles, Houck, his wife Patti, and their son Troy live in Long Beach.

## **JIMMY RAYE** **Receivers Coach**



The Rams lured Jimmy Raye, Jr. away from the Atlanta Falcons this year, where he coached Pro Bowl performers Alfred Jenkins and Junior Miller. He will work with the wide receivers and be the passing coordinator this season. This will be Raye's fourth NFL team, as he has been an assistant with the San Francisco 49ers, the Detroit Lions and Atlanta. Prior to that he spent five seasons as a college assistant, first at his alma mater Michigan State and later at the University of Wyoming (1976).

As a player, Raye quarterbacked Michigan State to a pair of Big 10 titles and one national championship, while appearing in one Rose Bowl. He played defensive back for the Rams and the Philadelphia Eagles before turning to coaching.

Raye's first pro assignment was coaching the receivers with San Francisco (1977). He then spent two seasons (1978-79) working with Detroit's running backs and three more years as the receiver coach in Atlanta.

The 38-year old Raye was born in Fayetteville, N.C. (7/3/45) and now lives in Anaheim, Ca. Raye and his wife, Edwena, are the parents of two children, Robin, 15, and Jimmy III, 13.

## **STEVE SHAFER** **Defensive Back Coach**

After coaching each of the defensive positions — line, linebackers and secondary — in eight seasons at San Diego State, Steve Shafer joins the Rams this season.

While at San Diego State, Shafer coached numerous future NFL players, including Herman Edwards and Terry Jackson. He handled the defensive line for one season, coached the secondary the next five and the linebackers in his final two.

Born Dec. 8, 1940, in Glendale, Ca., Shafer played quarterback at Burbank High School where he graduated in 1959. After two years at College of the Sequoias, he moved on to Utah State where he played both quarterback and defensive back in 1961 and 1962.

Drafted by the San Francisco 49ers, Shafer chose to play for the British Columbia Lions in the Canadian Football League. He played five years in Canada where he also was the Athletic Director and head of the Physical Education Department at Westminster High School in British Columbia.

He began his coaching career at the College of San Mateo in 1968 and became the head coach there in 1973. During two seasons, he compiled a 15-6-1 record before moving to San Diego State in 1975.

Shafer and his wife, Jane, live in Anaheim with their children, Don, 19, and Shawn, 16.

## **FRITZ SHURMUR** **Inside Linebacker Coach**

After coaching the defensive line in 1982, Fritz Shurmur takes over the inside linebackers in the Rams' 3-4 defense this season.

Shurmur came to the Rams after four seasons with the New England Patriots as their defensive line coach. He was also the Patriots' defensive coordinator his last two seasons there. In 1979, Shurmur's defensive line totaled 57 quarterback sacks, tops in the NFL.

Shurmur began his NFL coaching career with the Detroit Lions. He coached the Lions' defensive line in 1975 and 1976 and became defensive coordinator in 1977.

Born July 15, 1932, in Riverview, Mich., Shurmur attended Wyandotte (Mich.) High and Albion College. Shurmur was named All-Michigan Inter-collegiate Athletic Association as a center as well as the conference's MVP award. An all-conference baseball player, too, Shurmur graduated in 1954 with a degree in physical education and political science, and earned his master's degree in educational administration.

He served as an assistant football coach and head swimming coach in 1956 at Albion College until 1962 when he became an assistant football coach at the University of Wyoming. He coached the defensive line through 1970 and then entered the NFL ranks with Detroit.

Shurmur and wife Peggy Jane live in Diamond Bar, Ca: They have three children: Sally Ann, Scott and Susan Jane.



## **BRUCE SNYDER**

### **Running Back Coach**

Bruce Snyder joins the staff of the Los Angeles Rams this season after serving seven years as head coach at Utah State.

During that time, Snyder posted a 39-38-1 record. Twice the Aggies won the championship of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association. Utah State was annually among the nation's leaders in total offense and in 1979 when Utah State was 9-2, the Aggies averaged 31.5 points per game.

Prior to taking the job in Logan, Utah, Snyder was the offensive backfield coach at USC for two seasons (1974-75) where he worked with such notable runners as Anthony Davis and Ricky Bell.

A one-time fullback at the University of Oregon and a 1963 graduate of that school, Snyder began his coaching career at his alma mater and worked six seasons under Jerry Frei. At Oregon, he coached San Diego Charger Quarterback Dan Fouts and Bobby Moore (Ahman Rashad), recently retired from the Minnesota Vikings.

In 1972, he went to New Mexico State where he was the offensive coordinator. The following year he moved to Utah State, again serving as offensive coordinator.

Born in Santa Monica, Ca., (March 14, 1940), Snyder attended El Monte High School.

## **FRED WHITTINGHAM**

### **Outside Linebacker Coach**

With Fritz Shurmur, the only holdover from last season's staff. Whittingham was responsible for the tight ends and special teams in 1982, but has moved over to defense with the outside linebackers for 1983.

The switch seems a natural for Whittingham, a pro linebacker for eight seasons with four different clubs.

Whittingham began his professional playing career with the Rams in 1964. He then played for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1965 and 1966; the New Orleans Saints in 1967 and 1968; the Dallas Cowboys in 1969 and 1970 and the Eagles once again in 1971.

Following his playing career, Whittingham spent nine seasons as a coach at Brigham Young University, the last as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator.

Born on Feb. 4, 1942, in Boston, Mass., Whittingham attended Warwick (R.I.) High School before enrolling at BYU in 1957. He sat out a year and transferred to Cal Poly San Luis Obispo where he played three seasons as a linebacker (1960-62). He was signed by the Rams as a free agent in 1963, but missed the season because of an injury.

Va., saw most of his action on the special teams. He returned eight kickoffs for 139 yards (17.4 avg.), with a long of 32 yards. He carried the ball just once from scrimmage, gaining three yards, and caught one pass. A 10th round draft pick in 1981, Alexander impressed Ram coaches before suffering a knee injury during a preseason game. His first professional season ended with surgery on his knee and a year on the injured reserve list.



**COLLEGE:** West Virginia has a long standing tradition in basketball, but with Robert Alexander in the Mountaineers' backfield, the school found success in football. During his four-year career, he gained 2,456 yards, averaged 5.0 yards per carry and scored nine touchdowns. He showed his durability during his senior year by carrying the ball 204 times for 1,064 yards (5.2 avg.) and five TDs.

**PERSONAL:** Robert Alan Alexander was born in Charleston, W. Va. He was a four-sport star at South Charleston High School, lettering in football, basketball, baseball and track. A bachelor, he currently lives in Anaheim, Ca.

Andrews tied for both the second most solo tackles (47) and for most assists (20) among Rams during the 1982 season. He missed only one game due to a bruised kidney in 1981, as well as the first three games of 1980 with a thigh injury, after which he became a regular



starter in Week No. 10. Adding to his defensive contributions in 1982 were five deflected passes and a fumble recovery, leading to an improving all-around performance. A Rams' No. 1 draft choice in 1979 (he was the 19th player chosen overall), Andrews appeared in all 16 regular season games as a rookie, mostly on special teams.

**COLLEGE:** Andrews was named All-America at Nebraska by NEA, Football News, AP (second team) and UPI (second team) after his senior year. He also was All-Big 8 and Academic All-America, graduating in his third year with a business degree.

**COLLEGE:** Bain played one year at Colorado, sat out a season and played two more years at USC, where he was named All-America and appeared in two Rose Bowl games. Bain graduated with a degree in public administration.

That projection is based on both Coach John Robinson's appraisal of his quarterback ("He is blessed with all the tools," Robinson says.) and Ferragamo's performance in the final home game of 1982. Against the Chicago Bears, Ferragamo had one of the greatest days in the history of the NFL, completing 30 of 46 passes for 509 yards, the second most in league and Ram history (Norm Van Brocklin, 554, 1951) and three touchdowns. Among Ferragamo's most notable football attributes are an exceptionally strong arm, coolness under pressure and leadership ability. Ferragamo appeared on the brink of stardom once before with the Rams in 1980. That season, he set club records for pass completions (240), passing yards (3,199), touchdown passes (30) and completion percentage (59.4). He tied a Ram record with five touchdown passes against New Orleans and was named the recipient of the



Daniel F. Reeves Memorial Award, emblematic of the team's MVP. Ferragamo then spent 1981 with Montreal in the Canadian Football League before returning to the Rams prior to the start of last season. A fourth-round pick of the Rams in 1977, Ferragamo saw limited action that year but did throw 2 touchdown passes in the season finale against Washington. He was a backup in 1978 and became the starter in Week No. 12 of 1979 after Pat Haden suffered a hand injury. Ferragamo contributed substantially to the Rams winning the NFC West title for the seventh straight year, an NFL record. In the '79 playoffs, Ferragamo threw TD passes of 32, 43 and 50 yards against Dallas, the last with just 2:06 left in the game, then completed 12 of 23 passes for 163 yards in the NFC title game against Tampa Bay. In Super Bowl XIV, he completed 15 of 25 passes for 212 yards with an interception.

**PRO:** The Rams have several "big play" artists, but none may be more exciting than LeRoy Irvin. In just three years the former Kansas University star has established himself as the NFL's premier punt returner. Last season Irvin returned 22 punts for 243 yards (11.0 average) and one touchdown (63 yards), setting team career records in yardage (1,154) and touchdowns (4), while tying Alvin Haymond for total returns (110). Few punt returners have ever had a season that compares to Irvin's 1981 per-

formance. It had been 20 years since Dick Bass returned a punt for a Ram touchdown, when Irvin burst 55 yards against the Chicago Bears for a score. However that was just a warm-up for his performance against the Atlanta Falcons two weeks later. In that game Irvin set an NFL record for return yardage (207) and tied a league mark with two touchdowns (84 and 75 yards). His efforts sparked the Rams to a 37-35 come-from-behind victory. The only unfortunate note on Irvin's kick returning accomplishments is that they have overshadowed his play as a defensive back. In 1981 he intercepted three passes and was credited with 21 passes defensed, while starting in seven games. His career total of five interceptions is the highest of any Ram reserve during the last three years.

**COLLEGE:** Irvin lettered four years at Kansas University and had 10 career interceptions. As a punt returner, he had a 10.8 career average with two touchdowns. He was named All-Big 8 (second team) by AP and UPI his senior season.

**PERSONAL:** LeRoy Irvin, Jr., was born in Fort Dix, N.J., and attended Glenn Hills High in Augusta, Ga. **PRO:** Pat Thomas certainly ranks among the best defensive backs in Ram history. Besides being a punishing tackler, he is fifth on the team's all-time interception list with 26. He tied for the Rams' lead in interceptions last season with three. Although Thomas stands just 5-9, he has a tremendous leaping ability that allows him to cover much-taller receivers. Drafted in the second round in 1976, he spent his rookie season on the special teams. In 1977 he

gave Ram fans a taste of things to come when he filled in at cornerback for the injured Rod Perry during a Monday night game against the Minnesota Vikings. That night he intercepted two passes, both of which set up touchdowns, in a 35-3 Ram victory. He finished with five interceptions on the 1977 season. He enjoyed his best season in 1978, intercepting eight passes, returning one 33 yards for a touchdown against the New York Giants. His efforts earned him his first selection to the Pro Bowl and he was voted All-NFC by Pro Football Weekly, UPI and NEA (second team). A calf injury slowed Thomas down in 1979, but he still managed to tie a team single-game record with three interceptions against New Orleans. A healthy Thomas is a danger to opposing quarterbacks, so they began throwing away from him in 1980. He had just three interceptions, but still made the Pro Bowl and was named All-NFL by AP and All-NFC by UPI and Pro Football Weekly. Thomas played in just 12 games, starting nine, in 1981 due to a hamstring injury.

**COLLEGE:** His senior year at Texas A&M was indeed a bright one for Thomas. He was selected All-American by AP, UPI, NEA and the American Football Coaches. During his career he broke Dave Elmendorf's school record with 13 interceptions. A four-year letterman, Thomas appeared in the Hula Bowl and the Japan Bowl.

Almost everyone is awaiting Eric Dickerson's entrance into the NFL. With size, speed and ability, he could be the league's next great running back. No one is higher on the Rams' No. 1 draft choice, though, than John Robinson. "Eric Dickerson has a chance to be a great player," says the Rams' first-year coach. "He can make people miss him and he can run over people. He's as fast as O.J. (Simpson) and 15 pounds bigger. Dickerson has the potential to start right away. He has the chance to be a dominate player in the NFL."

**COLLEGE:** A consensus All-American his senior year, third in the Heisman Trophy voting last year, twice the Southwest Conference's Offensive Player of the Year, Eric Dickerson was the greatest player Southern Methodist has had since Don Meredith. In his four-year career he gained 4,450 yards on 790 carries (5.6 avg.) breaking Earl Campbell's conference record for yardage and attempts. His 48 touchdowns also tied Doak Walker's SMU career scoring record of 288 points. The Rams wanted to add some speed to the wide receiver corps and Henry Ellard was at the top of their shopping list during the 1983 draft. John Robinson was concerned that he might not be available by the time the Rams' made their second round choice and was relieved that Ellard was still unclaimed. "We thought he might go as high as the middle of the first round. He's an outstanding athlete," said Robinson. "Henry Ellard is the man we wanted. He can catch medium passes. He's just not built for speed." But speed is the most apparent of all of his skills. Ellard runs a 4.5 40-yard dash and is exceptionally quick off the line. He combines his great speed with sure hands and steady concentration. Once he catches a football he knows what to do with it, as he excels in open field running.

**COLLEGE:** Very few wide receivers have ever been honored as a conference's Offensive Player of the Year. That award is usually reserved for quarterbacks and running backs. However, Ellard's senior season was so outstanding, he

earned co-player of the year honors with Cal State Long Beach's quarterback Todd Dillon in the Pacific Coast Athletic Assn. As a senior Ellard caught 62 passes for 1,510 yards, an astonishing 24.4 yards per reception, and scored 15 touchdowns. He topped 100 yards in receiving nine times and 200 yards three times. His performance against Montana State earned him Sports Illustrated's Player of the Week. Of his 15 touchdowns during his senior season, six were from 60 yards or more. He had 138 career receptions for 2,947 yards (sixth best in NCAA history), averaging 21.4 yards per catch. As a triple jumper he was seventh in the NCAA in 1981 (54-3½) and once had a wind-aided leap of 56-5½.

## THE RAMS STORY: 1937-1982

---

**1937** On Feb. 13, the National Football League grants a Cleveland franchise to Homer Marshman and associates, a prominent group of local businessmen. Hugo Bezdek is named head coach. As the league's rookie franchise, Rams finish with a 1-10-0 record. Bob Kelley is named radio play-by-play announcer at start of season.

**1938** Assistant coach Art Lewis takes over team after three losses and Rams win three of remaining seven games.

**1939** Earl "Dutch" Clark becomes head coach and Lewis remains as assistant. Rams hit .500 mark for first time with 5-5-1 record. Parker Hall joins team as rookie tailback. Hall is not named on official NFL all-league first team, but wins Joe Carr Trophy as NFL's official Most Valuable Player.

**1940** Team drops back to 4-6-1 record. Johnny Drake, powerful Ram fullback, is named to first team All-NFL.

**1941** Daniel F. Reeves and Fred Levy, Jr. purchase Rams in June and hire, as general manager, Billy Evans, former sports columnist, American League umpire and Cleveland Indians general manager. Team wins first two games but drops next nine to finish in cellar.

**1942** Evans resigns before 1942 season. Charles "Chile" Walsh replaces Art Lewis as assistant coach. Lt. Reeves and Major Levy depart to enter armed forces. Bob Kelley is

named club secretary. Team finishes 5-6-0.

**1943** Clark resigns. Chile Walsh is named head coach, but NFL grants Rams permission to suspend operations for one season because of wartime difficulties. Reeves buys out Levy.

**1944** Chile Walsh becomes general manager and appoints Buff Donelli as head coach. Pickup team finishes 4-6-0.

**1945** Donelli joins military service. Walsh names his brother, Adam Walsh, as head coach, with George Trafton and Bob Snyder as assistants. Third round draft choice (a future) Bob Waterfield from UCLA joins team as T-formation quarterback and leads Rams to 9-1-0 season for first divisional title in team's history. On icy field, Rams defeat Washington Redskins, 15-14, at Cleveland for world title. Waterfield becomes first player to receive unanimous vote for official NFL Most Valuable Player award. Walsh is named coach of the year. Eddie Kotal joins team as chief scout and Bill John begins 29-year tenure as business manager.

**1946** Reeves moves franchise to Los Angeles early in the year. After disappointing 6-4-1 season, both Walshes resign.

**1947** Reeves assumes duties of general manager. Bob Snyder is named head coach with Joe Stydhar as new assistant. Team is talent-heavy but injury-ridden in 6-6-0 season.

Reeves sells part interests to former partner Levy and to Edwin and Harold Pauley and Hal Seley.

**1948** Clark Shaughnessy joins staff as advisory coach. On Sept. 3, Snyder resigns and Clark Shaughnessy becomes head coach. Team wins four of last five to post 6-5-1 mark.

**1949** Team wins first six games, then hangs on to win first divisional title since moving west. Heavy rain holds down L.A. crowd as Philadelphia Eagles skid to 14-0 win over Rams in NFL title game. Rookie Norm Van Brocklin joins team and gives Rams top-notch one-two quarterback punch. Elroy Hirsch has fine rookie year.

**1950** NFL absorbs AAC, leaving Rams as lone pro team in Los Angeles after four years of two-league existence. In February, Stydahr becomes head coach, replacing Shaughnessy. Club opens new offices on Beverly Boulevard. Bill Granholm begins 18-year tenure as equipment manager. Team sets 22 league records in rolling to conference title tie. Waterfield and end Tom Fears lead playoff win over Bears, 24-14, but following week in Cleveland, Lou Groza's late field goal stops Rams' title hopes, 30-28.

**1951** Rams win third straight conference title on final day of season, then defeat Cleveland at the Coliseum, 24-17, on 73-yard pass, Van Brocklin to Fears, for first world title since moving to L.A.

**1952** After team loses three straight preseason games and drops league opener by big score, Stydahr re-

signs. He is replaced as head coach by Hamp Pool. Team loses two of next three, but wins last eight to tie for conference title. Rams lose playoff in Detroit. Rams trade 11 players to Dallas for rookie Les Richter, who then enters Army for two years. Waterfield retires.

**1953** Club co-owner Harold Pauley passes away. Team compiles 8-3-1 record, losing three games by total of eight points to finish third in conference. Rams defeat world champ Lions in both games.

**1954** Bonus choice Bill Wade and tradee Les Richter both join Rams as rookies two years after going from college into military service. Team has disappointing 6-5-1 mark. All assistant coaches resign. Pool soon follows suit.

**1955** On Jan. 26, Rams hire Sid Gillman, head coach at University of Cincinnati, to replace Pool. Fine defensive year and clutch field goal kicking by Richter give team hard-fought 8-3-1 record for conference title. Cleveland wins title game at Coliseum by one-sided score.

**1956** In form reversal, team loses five consecutive early-season games and finishes in cellar tie with 4-8 record.

**1957** Ram owners sign five-year operational pact and name former Ram publicist Pete Rozelle as general manager. Team loses squeakers on road to 49ers and Lions, finishing 6-6-0, but only two games behind conference leaders.

**1958** In preseason trade, Van Brocklin goes to Eagles. Bill Wade

sets many Ram passing marks en route to 8-4-0 year.

**1959** Team has general letdown and many injuries for worst season since 1937, finishing 2-10-0. Ollie Matson, acquired in big trade, is workhorse at fullback. On last day of season, Gillman and staff resign.

**1960** Following death of Bert Bell, Pete Rozelle is named NFL commissioner. Elroy Hirsch replaces Rozelle as Rams general manager. Bob Waterfield is named Ram head coach. Team finishes 4-7-1.

**1961** Rams trade Bill Wade, Del Shofner, John Guzik for Zeke Bratkowski, Lindon Crow and 1962 first draft choice, which makes it possible to draft both Roman Gabriel and Merlin Olsen. Revamped Rams finish strongly after slow start, but still show 4-10-0 deficit.

**1962** Harland Svare replaces Don Paul as defensive line coach. Rams lose four of first five games by narrow margins, then show only occasional surges of success en route to 1-12-1 year. Waterfield resigns after eighth game. Svare named interim head coach. On Dec. 27, in closed auction, Reeves reacquires control of Rams, purchasing full interests of co-owners Pauley, Levy, Seley and Bob Hope.

**1963** Reeves sells 49% interest in Rams to Gene Autry, Bob Reynolds, Leonard Firestone, Paul A. O'Bryan, Robert Lehman, J.D. Stetson Coleman and Joseph A. Thomas. Svare is retained. Les Richter retires before season. After 0-5 record, Gabriel is reinstated as starting QB and plays last nine games without relief, guiding team to 5-4 mark and season record of 5-9-0.

**1964** Rams sign 10-year pact to play in "new look" Coliseum's "stadium-within-a-stadium." Fourteen rookies make the season squad. Club finishes fifth with 5-7-2 record.

**1965** After winning only one of first 10, Rams take three of last four against top two teams in each conference, but Svare is dismissed.

**1966** After a court fight, George Allen is released by George Halas from his assistant coaching duties with the Chicago Bears to become head coach of the Rams. NFL and AFL merge in spring. Bob Kelley, "Voice of the Rams" since the club's beginning in 1937 dies in September. Rams practice in new facilities in Long Beach. Team finishes 8-6.

**1967** After 17 years on Beverly Boulevard, club moves to new building on Pico. Training camp is also moved to California State College at Fullerton after five years at Chapman College in Orange. Equipment manager Bill Granholm leaves club after 18 years to take position in league office. Rams record first unbeaten preseason in history with six wins, including victories over first-ever AFL opponents, San Diego and Kansas City. Team completes finest win-loss season ever with 11-1-2 league record to win Coastal Division Championship, the first title of any kind since 1955, then loses to Green Bay in Western Conference Championship Game.

**1968** After playoff win over Cleveland in January, team finishes regular season with 10-3-1 record, second in Coastal Division to Baltimore's 13-1 mark. Attendance is over one million for second straight year and Ram defense sets new 14-game NFL record

for fewest yards allowed. On Dec. 26, Allen is dismissed as head coach, but is re-hired two weeks later.

**1969** After 20 years with the Rams as a player, general manager and assistant to the president, Elroy Hirsch leaves club to become athletic director at the University of Wisconsin. He is replaced by Public Relations Director Jack Teele, and John Sanders becomes Assistant General Manager. Team wins its first 11 games to win Coastal Division with 11-3 record before losing to Minnesota in Western Conference title game, 23-20. Quarterback Roman Gabriel is unanimous choice as the NFL's Most Valuable Player.

**1970** Playoff Bowl victory over Dallas in January heads Rams toward their 25th year in Southern California. With the completion of the merger of the NFL and AFL, the Rams join San Francisco, Atlanta and New Orleans in the Western Division of the National Conference of the new 26-team National Football League. Rams finish second to 49ers with 9-4-1 record. George Allen's contract is not renewed.

**1971** On April 15, owner Daniel F. Reeves dies of cancer in New York. His longtime friend and business associate, William A. Barnes, becomes President and General Manager. Tommy Prothro, successful head coach at UCLA, replaces Allen. Playing the toughest schedule in the NFL, the Rams finish with an 8-5-1 record, second to 49ers in the NFC West.

**1972** In a history-making move, Baltimore Colts owner Carroll Rosenbloom trades the Baltimore franchise to Robert Irsay in exchange for the Rams. Irsay had purchased the Rams from the estate of the late Dan Reeves. The transaction was completed and

announced on July 14. Rosenbloom, the most successful owner in the NFL over the last two decades, brings with him to Los Angeles Don Klosterman, Rosenbloom's general manager in Baltimore. Klosterman assumes title of Executive Vice President and General Manager. After five years at Cal State Fullerton, Rams move training camp site to Cal State Long Beach. After 6-7-1 season, all coaches are dismissed.

**1973** An observer in '72, Rosenbloom begins to make changes early in 1973, and they pay off quickly. His choice for head coach, former Detroit assistant Chuck Knox, leads team to 12-2 season, winningest in Rams history, and Knox becomes "Coach of the Year." Roman Gabriel is traded to Philadelphia and the new quarterback, former San Diego Charger John Hadl, is NFC "Player of the Year." Rams win NFC West title, but lose in first round of playoffs to Dallas. Other changes introduced by Rosenbloom include return to blue and gold uniforms. Club returns to Cal State Fullerton for summer training.

**1974** Carroll Rosenbloom's son, Steve, takes over as Assistant to the President. After 3-2 start, Rams trade John Hadl to Green Bay for five draft choices in bold move that stuns the football world. Hadl's backup, James Harris, becomes starter and leads team to 10-4 record, its second straight NFC Western title and its first playoff victory since 1951 (a 19-10 win over Washington) before the Rams bow to Minnesota, 14-10, in NFC title game.

**1975** With defense allowing second fewest points in NFL history over a 14-game season (135), Rams win third straight NFC Western title by completing 12-2 season. After playoff victory over St. Louis, however, they

bow to Dallas in the NFC Championship Game. The 34-8 record over the last three years is best in the NFL.

**1976** Rams win NFC West title for fourth straight year with 10-3-1 record, then beat Dallas, 14-12, for their first playoff victory on the road before 24-13 NFC title game loss at Minnesota. Quarterback injuries mar season and rookie Pat Haden becomes fourth different playoff QB in four years under Knox. Rams' 351 points is highest in NFC.

**1977** Rams spearhead new Coliseum configuration which reduces capacity from 91,038 to 71,039. With Lawrence McCutcheon setting new club career rushing record of 5,523 yards, the Rams (10-4) roll to their fifth straight division title before 14-7 playoff loss to Minnesota in Coliseum. Following the campaign Knox resigns to take Buffalo Bills head coaching post.

**1978** On Feb. 1, Rosenbloom hires George Allen but releases Allen after second preseason game. Ray Malavasi becomes head coach and leads club to 12-4 mark for the sixth straight division title (tying NFL record). Rams beat Minnesota, 34-10, in playoff but lose NFC title to Dallas. Rams also announce move to Anaheim Stadium beginning in 1980.

**1979** Carroll Rosenbloom dies April 2 and his widow, Georgia, becomes majority owner. Klosterman is named to replace Steve Rosenbloom in charge of day-to-day operations. Club moves to Rams Park in Anaheim, where offices and practice facilities are together. Despite multitude of injuries, team wins 7th straight division title to set NFL record, then beats

Dallas (21-19) and Tampa Bay (9-0) in NFC Playoffs. Rams lose to Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XIV, 31-19.

**1980** With Anaheim Stadium's capacity set at 69,045, Rams sell out last six home games and finish with 11-5 record. Rams lead NFL in rushing for first time since 1957, gaining 2,799 yards. Rams set 15 club records and tie three others. Nolan Cromwell named consensus All-NFL and receives award as NFC Defensive Player of the Year. Rams enter playoffs as wild card and lose to Dallas, 34-13.

**1981** Rams finish 6-10, missing playoffs for the first time since 1972. Nolan Cromwell and LeRoy Irvin named All-NFL. Irvin sets NFL record with 207 punt return yards in 37-35 win over Atlanta. Wendell Tyler rushes for 1,074 yards and ties Elroy Hirsch's club record of 17 touchdowns in a season. Rams sell out first seven regular season games at Anaheim Stadium.

**1982** NFL players' strike wipes out 7 games of the regular season schedule and the Rams finish last in the NFC with a 2-7 record. QB Bert Jones, acquired in draft day trade from Baltimore, misses last 5 games with a neck injury. In his place, Vince Ferragamo throws for 509 yards vs. Chicago, second highest in league history. Following the season Malavasi is dismissed.

**1983** Georgia Frontiere makes two major moves to put her team back on the winning track. First she hires U. of Hawaii Athletic Director Ray Nagel as Executive Vice President. Then she selects ex-USC coach John Robinson to be her head coach.
