CODE-A-PHONE: This service is available to authorized members of the media only. Please contact the Public Relations Department for the phone number. During the season a basic game report will be available after the game on Sunday, John McKay Monday, a Buc player Tuesday, an injury report Wednesday, the opposing coach and a player Thursday, John McKay Friday and a Buc player Saturday. This schedule is subject to some variation.

PRESS BOX: The Bucs maintain two press boxes on the first (auxiliary) and third levels (main press box) of Tampa Stadium. All working news media with the proper credentials should enter the press gate (west side of stadium).

CREDENTIALS: News media representatives on assignment who do not hold press box credentials for the season should request single-game reservations two weeks in advance by writing or calling Bob Best. Reserved credentials may be picked up at the press gate on game day. The press gate is located on the Dale Mabry Highway side (west) of Tampa Stadium.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Field photographers should enter the press gate and obtain an armband for field admission. No one except network television and game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. There is also a photo deck located on the fourth level. Space is available there on a reserved basis. Field photographers are cautioned that the bench area inside the 35-yard lines is off-limits to all nonplaying personnel. Field photographers must also remain at least 12 feet outside of the sideline boundary at all times.

Photographers are asked to take special note of the following conditions for use of press credentials:

"Any secondary noneditorial or commercial use of any picture, film or drawing of the game taken or made by the accredited organization or individual to whom this credential has been issued (including but not limited to use in advertising, sales promotion, or merchandising) is prohibited without prior specific written approval by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers football club of the National Football League. Television stations filming or taping NFL games recognize that any films or tapes can be used only in connection with regularly scheduled television newscasts within a seven-day period following the game and the film clip or tape portion of each such showing will not exceed two (2) minutes in length."

LOCKER ROOMS: Admission to the locker rooms after the games is governed by credentials issued by the Bucs only. There is no admission to the locker rooms before or during the game. Bob Best will be present the entire postgame period to assist in setting up interviews.

HUGH F. CULVERHOUSE

President



To the public Hugh F. Culverhouse is known primarily as the owner of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. But his involvement in the National Football League, substantial as it is, is just a small portion of his business and community activity.

The foundation of Hugh Culverhouse's success is the law. Born in Birmingham, Alabama on February 20, 1919 he graduated from the University of Alabama with a B.S. degree in 1941 and a law degree in 1947. In between, he served as an Air Force officer during World War II.

For seven years following his graduation from law school he was involved in public service as assistant attorney general for the state of Alabama (1947-1949) and as assistant regional counsel for the Internal Revenue Service. He also was recalled to active Air Force duty during the Korean conflict, achieving the rank of colonel.

In May, 1956 he entered private practice, specializing in tax law in Jacksonville, Florida. One of the top tax experts in the country, he is senior partner in the firm of Culverhouse, Tomlinson, Mills, Anderson and Cone.

In the 1960s Culverhouse began to expand his interests with a number of real estate investments. He has enjoyed great success as a partner/owner/developer of projects in Indiana, Ohio and Florida.

He has also made successful investments in banking and other fields, but his most public activity has been as president and majority owner of the Buccaneers. He was awarded the 27th franchise of the National Football League for the Tampa Bay area on December 5, 1974. The Buccaneers began NFL play in 1976 and in three seasons have developed into one of the NFL's most respected teams on the field and in the stands.

Culverhouse's fellow owners have also shown a tremendous acceptance for his legal knowledge, business acumen and common sense. He is a member of the league's most prestigious committees (Finance, Management Council, Retirement, Congressional Relations and Player Relations).

In addition to the above activities he is a member of the board of directors of a number of corporations, including Host International, Inc., Port Everglades Steel Corporation and Tampa Electric Company. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of Jacksonville University (where he has recently endowed a chair), Stetson University College of Law and the Foundation for Eye Research at the University of South Florida.

Culverhouse has been active through the years on many civic and philanthropic projects. He is especially involved in the Boy Scouts and the United Way. He was named Humanitarian of the Year in 1978 by the Pinellas County Chapter of the National Foundation of the March of Dimes. He has also been vested into the Order of St. John, Knights of Malta (one of only 700 in 1,000 years) in 1976 and honored by the American Academy of Achievement and the Sales and Marketing Executives of Jacksonville. In 1976 he was President Gerald Ford's official representative with ambassador rank to the 1976 Winter Olympics in Innsbruck, Austria.

His wife, the former Joy McCann, is an accomplished golfer who has been the woman's amateur champion of Alabama and Florida. They have two children, Gay and Hugh, Jr.

JOHN McKAY

Vice-President and Head Coach



As he enters his 30th season in 1979 John McKay still finds coaching football a challenge. "I enjoyed coaching last season," he says, "and I expect it to be enjoyable this year. Some of the other aspects of this business may wear on you as the years go by, but I've never tired of the battle of wits between the offense and defense."

McKay has won that battle more often than not during his 19 previous seasons as a head coach. In 16 years at the University of Southern California (1960-75) McKay won nine Pac-8 championships, five Rose Bowls and four national championships. His career record at USC was 127-40-8 and only one other coach, his close personal friend Bear Bryant with five, has won more national championships in the history of collegiate football.

McKay knew that when he resigned from his position at Southern California as coach and athletic director in late 1975 to assume command of the new Tampa Bay NFL franchise the constant parade of winning seasons would end for awhile during the development of the fledgling franchise.

"You win with players and quite frankly we just didn't have very good players the first year," says McKay. "I think now through the draft and some other moves we are reaching a position where we have enough quality players to be winners in the NFL. Our goal has been to have a legitimate title contender in the fifth year and everything I see indicates we're on schedule."

John H. McKay was born on July 5, 1924 in Everettville, West Virginia. Following the death of his father, a coal miner, McKay helped support his family through odd jobs while earning all-state honors as a running back at Shinnston High School.

After serving in World War II, McKay enrolled at Purdue and was a starting defensive back in 1946. He then transferred to Oregon and was a two-way starter in 1948 and 1949. Teaming with Norm Van Brocklin, McKay helped the 1948 squad to a 9-1 record and a trip to the Cotton Bowl. He still holds the school record of 6.4 yards per carry during his career.

In 1950 McKay turned down offers from the New York Yankees of the All-American Football Conference and the FBI to become an assistant coach at Oregon. He coached both offense and defense with the Ducks for nine years under Jim Aiken and Len Casanova.

In 1959 McKay moved to USC for one season as an assistant to Don Clark. Upon Clark's retirement he became head coach in 1960. In his third season, 1962, he produced an undefeated national champion.

National championships followed in 1967, 1972 and 1974. Southern California produced nearly 40 All-Americans, including two Heisman Trophy winners (Mike Garrett in 1965 and O. J. Simpson in 1968) during the McKay years. McKay was named Coach of the Year in 1962 and 1972.

Before accepting the position with the Buccaneers on October 31, 1975, McKay had turned down numerous pro coaching offers.

McKay and his wife, the former Nancy Hunter (known as Corky), have four children, Michele, John, Terri and Richard. He is the author of **McKay: A Coach's Story** and enjoys golf and John Wayne movies.

ASSISTANT COACHES

TOM BASS

Defensive Coordinator and Linebacker Coach

A charter member of the Buccaneer organization ... enters third season as the Buccaneers' defensive coordinator and linebacker coach ... born August 2, 1935 at March Air Force Base in Riverside, California ... raised on Army bases in cities across the country ... graduated from San Bernardino (CA) High School ... a linebacker at San Jose State, until polio ended his college career as a junior ... after regaining the use of his legs, he returned to San Jose State to finish his education while coaching ... graduated with honors in biological science ... joined Don Coryell's staff at San Diego State for the 1961-63 seasons ... joined the pros in 1964 as a member of Sid Gillman's staff with the AFL San Diego Chargers ... served as defensive coordinator for the Chargers in 1966 and 1967 ... the first assistant hired by Paul Brown when forming the Cincinnati Bengals in 1968 ... Bengal defensive coordinator for two seasons before becoming a full-time Cincinnati scout ... joined the Bucs as Pro Personnel Director in June, 1975 ... returned to coaching, this time the offense, in midseason of 1976 ... switched back to defense in 1977 ... his gentle nature and interest in the arts belie his 6-1, 250 lb. size ... author of two books of poetry, "Pro Football From the Inside" and "Fly Free My Love" ... a contributing editor to five Super Bowl programs ... a member of the Florida Gulf Coast Symphony Board of Directors ... also interested in jazz ... he and his wife, Michelle, have four children ... son Mike is a placekicker-linebacker for Davidson College.

GEORGE CHAUMP

Running Back Coach

Joins the Buccaneers in 1979 after 11 seasons with another group of Bucks, Ohio State University's Buckeyes ... quarterback coach and top offensive assistant for Coach Woody Hayes ... named offensive coordinator by new Ohio State coach Earle Bruce prior to accepting position with Tampa Bay in February, 1979 ... born April 28, 1936 in Scranton, Pennsylvania ... graduated from nearby West Pittston High School ... graduated with a degree in mathematics from Bloomsburg State in 1958 where he was a four-year letterman in football and wrestling ... assistant coach at William Penn High in Harrisburg for three years and head coach in 1961 at Shamokin High ...

moved to Harrisburg's John Harris High in 1962 and won six Central Pennsylvania championships in six years at the school, compiling a 58-4 record ... his 1967 Harris High team set a Pennsylvania state scoring record of 489 points as quarterback Jimmy Jones threw 35 touchdown passes ... had a 35-game winning streak when he moved to Ohio State in 1968 ... the Buckeyes represented the Big Ten in six Rose Bowls while Chaump was at Ohio State and won or shared nine Big Ten championships ... pupils such as Rex Kern, Cornelius Greene, Rod Gerald, Archie Griffin and Pete Johnson own most of the Buckeye offensive records ... he and his wife, Connie, have three daughters, Lynda (9) and six-year-old twins Melanie and Melissa.

WAYNE FONTES

Defensive Back Coach

Directed the group which ranked second in the league in least passing yardage allowed ... joined the Tampa Bay staff in 1976 from a similar position with John McKay at Southern California ... the Buc defensive backs led the NFC in interceptions in 1978 ... born on February 17, 1940 in New Bedford, Massachusetts ... graduated from McKinley High School in Canton, Ohio ... graduated from Michigan State in 1962 after a two-way career ... an all-Big Ten running back his senior year ... a .300 hitting second baseman for the Spartan baseball team ... played in the Senior Bowl and North-South All Star games following 1962 season ... named Defensive Player of the Game in the North-South game ... played with New York of the AFL in 1963 and 1964 ... a starter in the defensive backfield before a broken leg ended his career prematurely ... still holds Jet team record for longest interception return (83 yards) ... returned to Michigan State and earned a master's degree in administration in 1965 while coaching the freshman football team ... in 1966 and 1967 he coached at Bay City (MI) High School, compiling a 17-3 record ... his 1967 Bay City team won the Michigan Class B championship with a 10-0 record ... served as defensive secondary coach at three different universities, first at the University of Dayton under John McVay in 1968 ... then from 1969-71 at the University of Iowa under Ray Nagel ... finally from 1972-75 at USC ... Trojan defensive backs he coached now in the pros include Oakland's Skip Thomas and Charlie Phillips, Cincinnati's Marvin Cobb and the Bucs' Danny Reece ... last name is pronounced "font's" ... he and his wife, Evelyn, have three children, Michael (18), Scott (16), and Kimberly (13) ... Mike will attend University of Miami on a football scholarship this fall ... has three brothers also in coaching.

ABE GIBRON

Chief Assistant and Defensive Line Coach

One of the most widely recognized figures in pro football ... enters his fourth season with the Bucs and third as John McKay's chief assistant ... continues to work with Tampa Bay's developing defensive line ... born in Michigan City, Indiana on September 22, 1925 and has lived there most of his life ... a three-year letterman guard at Purdue following Marine service during World War II ... a 1946 freshman teammate of John McKay before McKay transferred to Oregon ... graduated with a degree in education ... began professional play with Buffalo of the old All-American Football Conference as a number-one draft pick ... joined the Cleveland Browns in 1950 ... played seven seasons with the Browns as one of pro football's top middle guards ... a three-time All-Pro (1952-53-54) and appeared in five Pro Bowls ... played in six championship games with the Browns and was on three world champions ... traded to Philadelphia late in the 1956 season ... spent 1957 with the Eagles before joining the Bears for the final two seasons of his playing

career ... played in a total of 128 games ... an assistant coach with the Washington Redskins for five years ... joined the Bears' staff in 1965, coaching the offensive line for three years (1965-67) before becoming defensive line coach and defensive coordinator for four years (1968-71) ... succeeded Jim Dooley as head coach of the Bears in 1972 ... his Bear teams always played aggressive defense, leading the NFC in rushing defense in 1971 ... briefly head coach of the Chicago Wind of the World Football League in 1975 ... appeared as himself in the TV movie, "Brian's Song" ... of Lebanese descent, he is listed sixth in the Book of Lists "Top 10 Arab Americans" ... he and his wife, Sue Frances, have three children, Bill (18), Martina (16) and Kal (12).

BILL JOHNSON

Offensive Line Coach

This will be his first year with the Buccaneers but his 20th coaching NFL offensive lines ... since joining the San Francisco 49ers of the All-American Football Conference in 1948, he has been involved with professional football for 32 consecutive seasons ... born July 14, 1926 in Tyler, Texas where he graduated from Tyler High School ... served on an aircraft carrier in the Pacific during World War II prior to attending college ... played at Texas A&M in 1946 and Tyler Junior College in 1947 ... moved into professional football in 1948 with the San Francisco 49ers ... played for the 49ers for nine seasons, two in the AAFC (1948-49) and seven in the NFL (1950-56) ... played in the Pro Bowl twice and was voted to the center position on the Helms Foundation all-time All-Pro team ... retired following 1955 season to coach San Francisco offensive line but returned to playing ranks during season ... coached the 49er offensive line for 11 seasons (1957-67) ... joined the expansion Cincinnati Bengals and tutored the offensive line for eight more seasons (1968-75) ... named to replace Paul Brown as head coach of the Bengals in 1976 and tied Pittsburgh for division championship in first season ... resigned as Cincinnati head coach during 1978 season with head coaching mark of 18-15 (10-4 in 1976, 8-6 in 1977 and 0-5 in 1978) ... briefly a scout for the New York Jets prior to accepting position with Buccaneers in January, 1979 ... offensive linemen he has coached include Monte Clark, Bob St. Clair and Bob Johnson ... finished work on college degree during pro off-seasons and is a graduate of Stephen F. Austin University ... nicknamed "Tiger" from comment to 49er teammates as a rookie that he would return from an injury "like a tiger" ... hobbies include fishing and tennis ... he and his wife, Dot, have three children, Bill, Sherilyn and Tommy.

BILL NELSEN

Quarterback and Receiver Coach

Will coach both quarterbacks and receivers in 1979 ... has the background in that area as a former Pittsburgh and Cleveland quarterback ... born January 29, 1941 in Los Angeles ... graduated from El Rancho High School and attended Cerritos Junior College ... quarterbacked John McKay's first Southern California team in 1960, starting from the third game on ... split time with Pete Beathard in 1961 and 1962, the latter a national championship season ... completed 104 passes during his Trojan career for 1,811 yards ... selected by the Steelers in the 10th round of the 1963 draft ... started, except when injured, for Pittsburgh in 1965-67 ... traded to Cleveland and led the Browns to a pair of Eastern Conference championships in 1968 and 1969 ... Cleveland had a 20-7-1 record during those two years, averaging nearly 27 points per game ... played in the Pro Bowl following the 1969 season ... his 87-yard pass to Milt Morin against Philadelphia in 1969 is still a Cleveland record ... tossed five touchdown passes against Dallas in 1969 ... while with Pittsburgh, he once completed 13 consecutive passes, still a Steeler record ... started for the Browns until 1971 and retired after 1972 season ... 10-year career stats include 963 completions in 1,905 attempts (50.5%) for 14,165 yards and 98 touchdowns ... coached the New England quarterbacks in 1973 and 1974, Jim Plunkett's two best years as a professional ... offensive coordinator at Atlanta in 1975 and 1976 ... pupil Steve Bartkowski named *The Sporting News* Rookie of the Year in 1975 ... Bill and his wife, Susan, have three children, Keith (15), Missy (13), and Tim (11).

ADMINISTRATORS

WARD HOLLAND

Secretary-Treasurer

Owner Hugh Culverhouse's top aide on the Buccaneers in Jacksonville ... a key representative for the Bucs in major contract negotiations and handles the overall budget ... born on January 7, 1917 and raised in Collins, Georgia ... valedictorian at the University of Georgia, graduating with a perfect 4.0 grade point average in accounting ... a fullback on the Georgia football team and a member of the baseball and track squads ... served in the Pacific during World War II, achieving the rank of lieutenant colonel before leaving active duty in 1946 ... employed by the Internal Revenue Service for many years ... chief of the audit division for Florida from 1960 to 1972 ... partner in the St. Petersburg accounting firm of Tornwall, Lang & Lee from 1972 to 1975 ... employed by the Jacksonville law firm of Culverhouse, Tomlinson, Mills, Anderson & Cone since 1975 ... divides his time between duties with the Bucs and various tax cases of the law firm ... he and his wife, Deanie, have two daughters, Gaylen and Beverly, and one granddaughter.

DICK BEAM

Director of Administration

Has held the position of Director of Administration since January, 1977 ... served as John McKay's administrative assistant during the Bucs' first season ... current duties include overseeing the day-to-day operations of the Tampa Bay front office and making travel arrangements ... born in Long Beach, California on May 16, 1936 ... graduated from Whittier (CA) High School in 1954 ... a three-sport letterman (football, basketball and baseball) ... All-America and all-CIF split end as a senior ... played football at Whittier College under George Allen (three years) and Don Coryell ... all-league end

in 1958 ... graduated with a degree in physical education ... coached the Whittier freshman team and assisted Coryell in 1959 ... assistant coach at Santa Fe (CA) High School in 1960 ... spent six years as assistant at Montebello High School ending in 1966 ... head coach at Brea High School in 1967 before moving to Alhambra High in 1968 ... assistant coach at Southern California for four years, beginning in national championship year of 1972 ... assisted with the defense one year and worked with the offense the next three ... came with John McKay to Tampa Bay in early 1976 ... he and his wife, Dorothy, have two children, Donn (20) and Cathy (18).

PHIL KRUEGER

Assistant to the President and Special Teams Coach

Handles key administrative duties, including player contract negotiations plus his continued work in research and development and coordinating the special teams ... the first assistant coach hired by John McKay for Tampa Bay in December, 1975 ... named Assistant to the President in the spring of 1978 ... born October 6, 1929 in La Salle, Illinois ... graduated from University City High School in suburban St. Louis ... a three-year letterman quarterback at Southeast Missouri State College where he was a 1950 honors graduate in English ... taught and coached at Festus (MO) High School before entering the Army ... earned a Bronze Star as a lieutenant in Korea ... taught and coached at various high schools in Missouri and Arizona during the late 1950s ... earned his master's degree in English while serving as a graduate assistant to Don Faurot at Missouri in 1956 ... his 1958 Yuma High School team won the Arizona state championship ... college coaching career began as an assistant at Long Beach City College from 1960 to 1962 ... Long Beach was national junior college champion in 1960 ... assistant at Utah State in 1963 ... head coach at Fresno State for two seasons (1964-65) ... coached linebackers for John McKay at Southern California for five years beginning in 1966 ... five Trojan linebackers were named All-America during that time ... linebacker coach and recruiting coordinator at Illinois in 1971-1972 ... returned to Utah State as head coach for three seasons (1973-75) ... the Aggies were 21-12 during those three years as Louie Giamonna twice led the nation in all-purpose running ... lost only one game to Western Athletic Conference teams ... five-year record as a college head coach is 31-22-0 ... wife, Kathy, and daughter, Kristi (15), are also athletically active.

Taft Broadcasting Co. on radio and WTOG (Channel 44) on television head an expanded broadcast network for 1979. Led by flagship station WDAE in Tampa, Taft has put together a network of over 25 stations that will essentially cover all of Florida.

Mark Champion, 28, the sports director at WDAE, will head the three-man broadcast team. With the exception of a brief period with a Tampa television station, he has been the sports director at WDAE for six years, covering local events and hosting a nightly talk show. 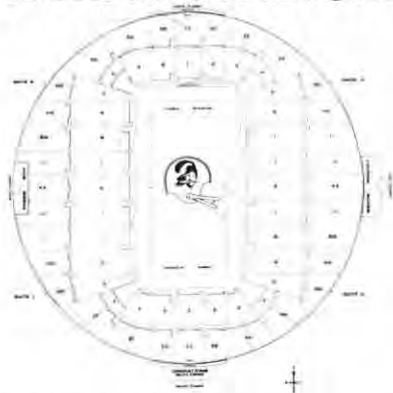

The open concrete bowl seats 72,126 people, the fourth largest figure in the National Football Conference, (behind the Pontiac Silverdome, Giants Stadium and Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum). The stadium attendance record was set on October 22, 1978 against the Chicago Bears with 68,146. The Buccaneers had five sellouts in 1978 — Miami, New York Giants, Minnesota, Chicago and Green Bay.

The original 46,500-seat structure was begun in October, 1966 following the establishment of the 11-member Tampa Sports Authority in 1965 by the Florida legislature. The stadium was dedicated on November 4, 1967 and the first section cost only \$4.6 million.

After the Tampa Bay area was awarded an NFL franchise in 1975, work began on the addition to the stadium, the expansion of the press box and the computerization of the scoreboard. For \$13 million the end zones were enclosed, new scoreboards were added at each end and an extra level was added to the press box. Also 24 private boxes were constructed above the east stand.

Located in northwest Tampa, adjacent to North Dale Mabry Highway within a mile of Interstate 275, the stadium is convenient to fans throughout the Bay area and central Florida.

With a minimum of excess area around the field, many of the seats clustered around midfield and no pillars or posts to obstruct the view, Tampa Stadium is an outstanding site for a football or soccer game.

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers are Tampa Stadium's main tenant but it is also the home for the Tampa Bay Rowdies soccer team, the Can-Am Bowl (all-star football between college seniors from the United States and Canada) the American Invitational Horse Jumping Competition, area college football games and concerts.

BUCCANEER BAND and SWASH-BUC-LERS



With one of only three team bands in the NFL plus the highly acclaimed cheerleading and dance unit, the Swash-buc-lers, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers provide Tampa Stadium fans with one of the league's most complete entertainment packages.

From a quiet beginning in 1977 the Buc Band has grown to over 100 members as it starts its third season. Strictly a volunteer organization, the Band practices twice a week for several hours under the direction of its founder Dean Page.

The Band provides a lively sound during breaks in the Tampa Stadium action and entertains before and after games. The Buc Band has also performed on the field at halftime.

The Band has more than just game day responsibilities. They are often asked to entertain at various functions throughout Buccaneer country and welcome the team home to One Buccaneer Place after road games.

Dancing to the sounds of the Buc Band are the Swash-buc-lers, a skilled dancing and cheerleading group. In addition to dancing and cheering at games the Swash-buc-lers also participate in a large number of off-the-field activities as representatives of the Buccaneers. They have performed on the nationally syndicated "Dinah" show and in the Main Street Parade at Disney World with the Buc Band.

Under the direction of Mary May, the Swash-buc-lers offer Tampa Stadium fans both the enthusiasm of a cheerleading group and the precision of a dance team. They practice twice a week for most of the year and like the Band are volunteers.

Coupled with a top lineup of guest bands and other attractions, the Swash-buc-lers and Buc Band will make Tampa Stadium an exciting place for more than just football this fall.

BUCCANEER COUNTRY

Buccaneer country is an exciting, growing region centered on the Tampa-St. Petersburg metropolitan area but extending far beyond, that has proven itself remarkably receptive to NFL football. In 1978, the third-year Buccaneers had five sellouts of 72,000-seat Tampa Stadium and the third best average attendance in the league.

Buc fans come from as far away as Jacksonville and Tallahassee in the north to Fort Myers in the south, from Orlando, Daytona Beach and Cocoa on the Atlantic to Tampa Bay and the Gulf. It is an area that includes 3.5 million people including 1.6 million in the Tampa-St. Petersburg metropolitan area. Tampa and St. Petersburg have populations of just under 300,000 each.

The area continues to be one of the fastest growing in the nation with a 10% expansion forecast within the next three-to-five years. By 1981 the Tampa-St. Petersburg area alone will be the 21st largest in the country, not counting over one million more residents an easy drive away in the Orlando area.

Buc country is much more than statistics and numbers. Millions of tourists enter the area annually either by a modern highway network, the expansive and space-age \$86 million Tampa International Airport or other expanded airports in the area.

They are drawn by miles of sandy, clean beaches on both coasts and the sunny climate. Temperature ranges from a mean of 60 degrees in January to an August mean of 82 with the sun shining nearly every day.

Two-thirds of Florida's major attractions are located within 100 miles of Tampa including Disney World, Busch Gardens, Cypress Gardens, Sea World and Circus World.

But Buc country is more than just a place to visit. It is the year-round home of a \$50 million citrus industry, the important phosphate industry and a rapidly diversifying industrial base.

Tampa itself is the eighth largest port in the nation, the closest American port to the Panama Canal and the largest port on the coast between New Orleans and Norfolk. It is also the home of the University of Tampa and the growing University of South Florida with over 23,000 students.

The other major cities in Buc country also are vibrant, exciting places to live. St. Petersburg and the rest of Pinellas County are the headquarters for three dozen banking concerns, a modern, growing industrial base and a pleasant home for thousands of retirees. To the south Sarasota and Fort Myers are growing commercial and industrial centers while remaining attractive vacation destinations. Orlando continues to prosper in an expansion almost unprecedented in its size and speed. Jacksonville remains one of the busiest ports on the South Atlantic coast. Lakeland is the hub of the area's citrus and phosphate industries.

Sports fans have a wide variety of activities to choose from in Buc country. In addition to unexcelled opportunities for outdoor sports such as boating, sailing, golf, tennis, hunting and fishing, Buc country is the home of the University of Florida and Florida State University, two of the nation's top intercollegiate sports programs, the professional soccer Tampa Bay Rowdies and the spring training headquarters of nearly half of the major league baseball teams.

A growing economy, a warm climate, sea and inland water and now professional sports. It seems safe that the legendary eighteenth century pirate Jose Gaspar would still make his headquarters in Tampa Bay — where the good life gets better every day.

BUCCANEER EVOLUTION

November 4, 1967: Tampa Stadium is dedicated and the final price tag on the 46,500-seat structure is \$4.1 million. The dedication concluded planning begun in 1965 by the Tampa Sports Authority, an 11-member public agency formed by the Florida Legislature in 1965.

August 10, 1968: The Tampa Jaycees sponsor a NFL preseason game between the Atlanta Falcons and the Washington Redskins. Washington wins as 42,000 fans watch from new Tampa Stadium.

August 7, 1971: The New York Jets-Detroit Lions preseason game is sold out three days before the event. Over 51,200 fans turn out to see Jets lose 28-24 to Lions. In all, 13 professional preseason games would be played in Tampa Stadium with an average of 41,000, setting the stage for the NFL.

February 25, 1974: The NFL Expansion Committee narrows the expansion list to five sites — Tampa, Honolulu, Memphis, Phoenix and Seattle.

April 24, 1974: Tampa Bay is awarded the NFL's 27th franchise. As part of the franchise award for the area, Tampa Stadium will be enlarged to 72,000 seats.

October 30, 1974: Philadelphia construction man Tom McCloskey is awarded the new Tampa franchise, but later backs off accepting the ownership.

December 5, 1974: Hugh F. Culverhouse, Jacksonville attorney and real estate investor, is awarded ownership of the 27th franchise for the Tampa Bay area.

January 30, 1975: At a civic luncheon honoring Hugh Culverhouse in Tampa, the new team's owner announces a 14-man advisory board.

February 15, 1975: The official name of the team is announced. The club will be known as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Some 400 names were reviewed by the Advisory Board.

April 21, 1975: Tampa Sports Authority unanimously approves a 30-year lease agreement with Bucs' officials for Tampa Stadium.

April 24, 1975: Tampa City Council, 6-1, votes for approval of the stadium lease and the expansion of Tampa Stadium to nearly 72,000 seats.

May 14, 1975: The sale of \$13 million in bonds is effected by the Tampa Sports Authority to finance renovation and enlargement of the stadium.

June 15, 1975: The Tampa Bay Buccaneers adopt the official colors of orange, white with red trim and also gain a logo of a swashbuckling buccaneer.

July 9, 1975: Ground is broken for expansion of Tampa Stadium.

October 31, 1975: John McKay, four national championships behind him, is announced as the first head coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. At Southern Cal, he had won 76 per cent of his games.

December 27, 1975: Hugh Culverhouse draws the first pick in the college draft, while Seattle receives the first pick in the veteran allocation in a special drawing held prior to the Pittsburgh and Baltimore playoff game in Pittsburgh.

February 15, 1976: Marvin L. Warner, president of Warner National Corp. and a long-time friend of Hugh Culverhouse, buys a major share of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Mr. Warner, who lives in Cincinnati, is involved in various companies in the development and management of real estate and consumer services.

March 30, 1976: The Tampa Bay Buccaneers choose 20 defensive players and 19 offensive players in the veteran allocation held in New York at the NFL offices. The procedure was to take nearly two days but was completed in less than 10 hours.

April 8, 1976: Lee Roy Selmon, All-American defensive lineman from Oklahoma, is the first pick of the entire college draft by the Bucs.

April 16, 1976: Lee Roy and Dewey Selmon become the first choices to sign as both sign separate contracts with the Buccaneers.

July 5, 1976: The Bucs welcome the first rookies and free agents to training camp at One Buccaneer Place. When the process of roster changes is finished in December, 140 players will have been on the Bucs' first-year roster.

July 31, 1976: Head Coach John McKay returns to the Los Angeles Coliseum and the Bucs play their first game ever as the Rams host Tampa Bay. Los Angeles prevails, 26-3, with Pete Rajecki kicking an 18-yard field goal for the first points of all time.

August 14, 1976: The Atlanta Falcons become the first team to lose to the Buccaneers when Tampa Bay takes a 17-3 decision in Jacksonville's Gator Bowl.

August 21, 1976: 71,718 fans fill expanded Tampa Stadium to view the Bucs first home game ever against the Miami Dolphins. Tampa Bay loses 28-21 but the game is a huge success as the Buccaneers are welcomed home.

September 12, 1976: Tampa Bay opens the regular season on the road against the Houston Oilers. The Bucs lose 20-0 in the Astrodome.

May 3, 1977: Tampa Bay, holding the number-one pick in the NFL draft, selects All-American running back Ricky Bell from Southern California. Bell later in the day inks a five-year contract with Tampa Bay.

December 11, 1977: The Bucs tie an NFL record with three interceptions returned for touchdowns as they defeat New Orleans in the Superdome, 33-14, for their first regular season win. Over 8,000 fans greet the team when it returns to One Buccaneer Place.

December 18, 1977: Tampa Bay runs its winning streak to two with its first home victory ever, 17-7, over the St. Louis Cardinals. A 61-yard touchdown pass from Gary Huff to Morris Owens highlights the win.

April 24, 1978: The Buccaneers trade their number-one selection in the 1978 NFL draft to the Houston Oilers for tight end Jimmie Giles, the Oilers' first and second picks in the 1978 draft and Houston's third and fifth picks in the 1979 draft. The Oilers announce they will use their new selection to draft Earl Campbell of Texas.

May 1, 1978: The Buccaneers use their first-round selection acquired from Houston to draft quarterback Doug Williams from Grambling. Williams, the 17th player taken in the draft, is the first black quarterback ever selected in the first round.

October 15, 1978: Jimmy DuBose becomes the first Buc ever to rush for 100 yards (109 yards in 24 carries) but is injured and lost for the season in the fourth quarter as the Giants pull out a 17-14 decision at Giants Stadium.

January 3, 1979: Hugh Culverhouse purchases Marvin Warner's minority interest in the Buccaneers. He now owns 99% of the team's interest.
