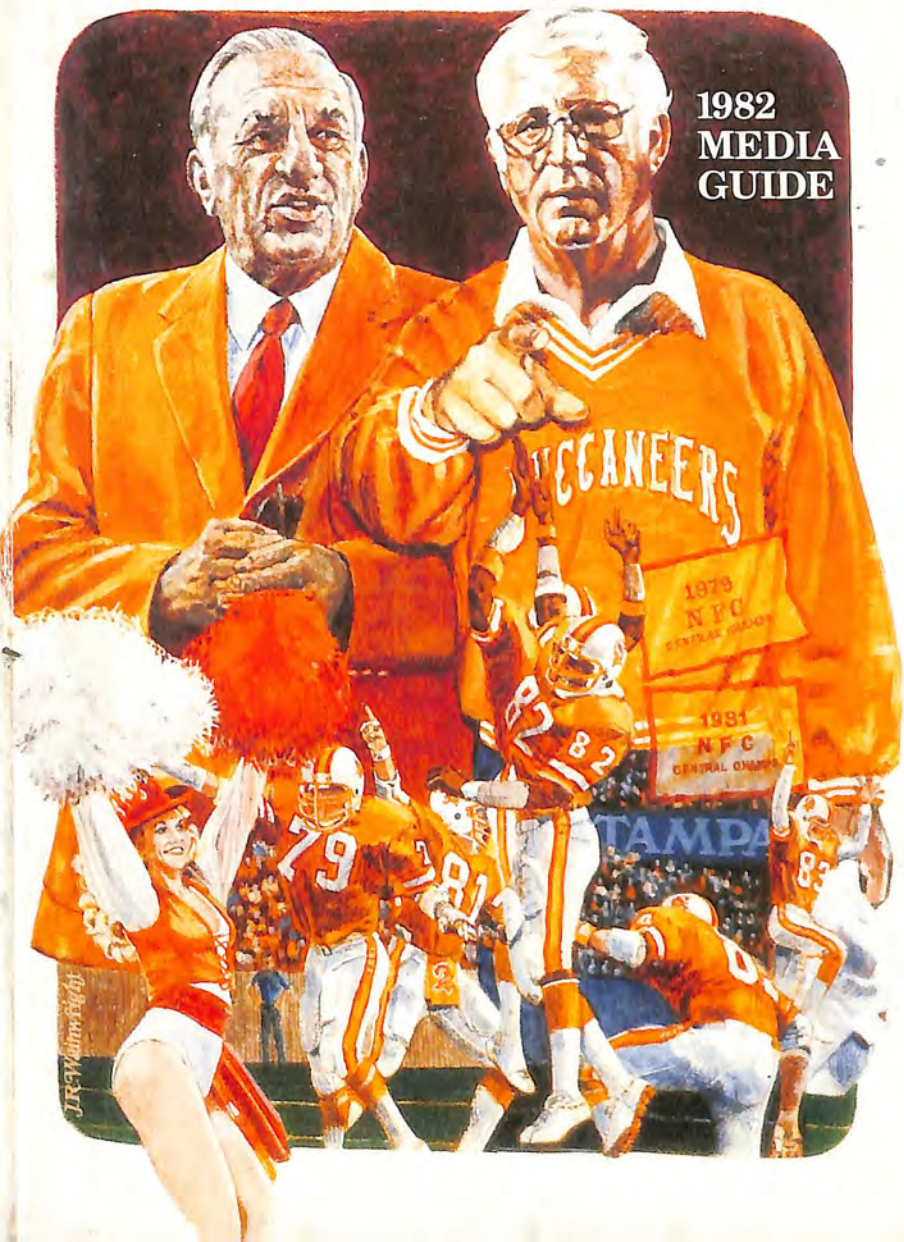

MEDIA INFORMATION

MEDIA LINE: This service is available to authorized members of the media only. The phone number for 1982 is (813) 879-0930. Please keep this number confidential. During the season a basic game report will be available after the game Sunday, John McKay Monday, a Buc player Tuesday, an injury report Wednesday, the opposing coach and a player Thursday, John McKay Friday and a Buc player Saturday. This schedule is subject to some variation.

PRESS BOX: The Bucs maintain two press boxes on the first (auxiliary) and third levels (main press box) of Tampa Stadium. All working news media with the proper credentials should enter the press gate (west side of stadium).

CREDENTIALS: News media representatives on assignment who do not hold press box credentials for the season should request single-game reservations two weeks in advance by writing or calling Bob Best. Reserved credentials may be picked up at the press gate on game day. The press gate is located on the Dale Mabry Highway side (west) of Tampa Stadium.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Field photographers should enter the press gate and proceed to the media room to obtain a sideline credential for field admission. No one except network television and game personnel will be admitted to the field without a camera. There is also a photo deck located on the fourth level. Space is available there on a first-come, first-served basis. Field photographers are cautioned that the bench area inside the 35-yard lines is off-limits to all non-playing personnel. Field photographers must also remain at least 12 feet outside of the sideline boundary.

Photographers are asked to take special note of the following conditions for use of press credentials:

Any secondary non-editorial use of any picture, film/tape or drawing of the game taken or made by the accredited organization or individual to whom this credential has been issued (including but not limited to use in advertising, sales promotion or merchandising) is prohibited without prior specific written approval of the National Football League. Additionally, television stations are prohibited from making available game film or tape to any other organization even though the planned use may be editorial in nature without advance written permission from the NFL or one of its member clubs. Such film or tape may be aired **only by the specific station or entity to whom this credential is issued.**

Television stations filming or taping NFL games recognize that any films or tapes may only be used in connection with a regularly scheduled television newscast **within a seven-day period** following the game and the film clip or taped portion of each such showing will not exceed **two (2) minutes** in length.

Additionally, television stations agree not to use more than **six (6) minutes** of filmed or taped "same-day" highlights from NFL games on any regularly scheduled news programs (i.e. no more than six minutes of highlights on Sunday night). This is the only exception to the two-minute limitation.

TELEPHONE: There are three outside lines and four pay telephones located in the main press box, and an additional outside line in the auxiliary box. Requests for individual telephone circuits should be directed to Steve Markiewicz, Service Representative, Tampa Stadium, General Telephone Company, (813) 224-6436.

HUGH F. CULVERHOUSE

Owner and President



The already substantial list of Hugh F. Culverhouse's accomplishments and challenges grew even longer in 1981. The owner and president of the Buccaneers saw his team win their second NFC Central Division championship while he became even more active in league affairs as a member of the NFL's Management Council (league management's collective bargaining group). He also played an important role in steering the 1984 Super Bowl to Tampa Stadium and relocated his personal principal place of residence to Tampa and expanded his legal and business operations in Tampa. All this in addition to continuing the successful tax law practice and real estate investment that preceded his entry into NFL owner-

ship seven years ago.

"The Buccaneers and the NFL have become an extremely important part of our lives," says Culverhouse. "We realize that we have a tremendous obligation to our fans and the entire area to see that the team is operated in a successful manner. Our family enjoyed living in Jacksonville for over 20 years and we will continue to spend time there. But Tampa is our home now."

Culverhouse has already played an important role in the athletic ascendency of his new home city. He was awarded the league's 27th franchise for the Tampa Bay area on December 5, 1974 and in only six seasons of operation the team has already won two division championships while earning an off-the-field reputation for efficiency. Culverhouse's fellow owners have readily accepted his legal knowledge, calm demeanor and business acumen. He is a member of three of the NFL's most prestigious committees (Executive Committee of the Management Council, Finance and Congressional Relations).

Culverhouse's NFL prestige was an important contributing factor to another Tampa civic achievement - selection of Tampa Stadium as the site of Super Bowl XVIII on January 22, 1984. Florida Trend magazine echoes others in calling the upcoming Super Bowl "the clearest sign yet that Tampa Bay has become a significant metropolitan area."

With Tampa's Super Bowl Task Force marshalling information and public enthusiasm, Culverhouse lobbied quietly but effectively behind the scenes with his fellow owners. Their efforts carried the day on June 3, 1981 when the game was awarded to Tampa Bay by an overwhelming 24-2 vote.

It was the first time that an area had secured the coveted game on its first formal presentation to the league owners and came in the face of competition from stadiums with larger seating capacity and prior Super Bowl experience. "The presentation was excellent and Tampa Bay is a great area," said Philadelphia owner Leonard

Tose, "But the single most important factor was Hugh Culverhouse. We have come to find out that anything he is associated with is going to be first-class."

"It (Culverhouse's work and support) was very, very important," concurred Dan Rooney of the Pittsburgh Steelers. "Had Hugh Culverhouse been against the project or even lukewarm, there's a good chance it would not have happened."

Culverhouse has been making things happen for many years in diverse fields, but the foundation of his success remains his 35-year practice of law. Born in Birmingham, Alabama on February 20, 1919 he graduated from the University of Alabama with a BS degree in 1941 and a law degree in 1947. In between he served as an Air Force officer during World War II.

For seven years following his graduation from law school he was involved in public service as assistant attorney general for the state of Alabama (1947-49) and as assistant regional counsel for the Internal Revenue Service. He also was recalled to active Air Force duty during the Korean conflict as a colonel.

In May, 1956 he entered private practice, specializing in tax law in Jacksonville, Florida. One of the top tax experts in the country, he is today senior partner in the firm of Culverhouse, Botts, Mills and Cone with offices in Jacksonville, Tampa and Miami.

In the 1960s Culverhouse expanded his interest with a number of real estate investments. He has enjoyed great success as a partner/owner/developer of projects in Indiana, Ohio and Florida. One of his largest investments is the 12,500-acre Palmer Ranch in Sarasota.

"I think it's important that you don't get discouraged by early failure but learn from it. My first real estate investment back in 1959 was a failure. From that I was able to cope with the early lack of success the Buccaneers experienced. I have complete confidence in John McKay and saw then that he was laying a good foundation for the team," says Culverhouse.

Culverhouse has been active through the years on many civic and philanthropic projects. He is especially involved in the Boy Scouts, higher education, the United Way and the arts. A recent donation of porcelain sculptures to the Tampa Museum and the Plant Museum in Tampa has been valued at \$250,000.

Among many awards he has received are Humanitarian of the Year in 1978 by the Pinellas County Chapter of the National Foundation of the March of Dimes and Man of the Year in 1982 by the Florida Broadcasters Association. He was one of the organizers and the first president of the Family Consultation Service of Jacksonville. In 1976 he was appointed to the rank of ambassador as President Gerald Ford's official representative to the Winter Olympics in Innsbruck, Austria.

He has actively participated as a member of the boards of directors of many major companies throughout the United States. He is a member of the United States Senatorial Business Advisory Board, the Board of Trustees of Jacksonville University (where he endowed a chair) and Stetson College of Law.

A business associate once said, "The best way I know to become tired is to follow Hugh Culverhouse around for a day." In his limited spare he time enjoys aviation, golf and electronics. He and his wife, Joy, have two children and four grandchildren.

JOY CULVERHOUSE

Vice President



In 40 years of marriage, Joy Culverhouse has always taken an active role in the pursuits and accomplishments of her husband, Hugh Culverhouse. In 1981 her interest in the Tampa Bay Buccaneers was formalized with her appointment as vice president.

An outstanding athlete in her own right as a state amateur golf champion in both Alabama and Florida, Joy Culverhouse is a frequent and attentive observer at Buc practices. She travels with the team to away games as well as attending the league meetings. She was a member of the presentation committee of the Tampa Bay Super Bowl Task Force which successfully secured the 1984 Super Bowl.

Having had her golf career limited by injuries, she especially appreciates the problems of injured players and often visits them during their recovery.

Born Joy McCann in Chicago on March 6, 1920, she moved to Wyoming at an early age where her father was a homesteader. Health reasons forced her father to move the family to Montgomery, Alabama and it was there that she was introduced to golf at the age of 14.

She quickly developed into one of the area's outstanding players and in 1938 secured a partial scholarship to LSU where she was actually the ninth player on the men's team. She transferred home to the University of Alabama where 1941 proved noteworthy for two reasons; she met future husband, Hugh Culverhouse, and won her first state golf title, the Alabama women's amateur.

The couple married in 1942 and while Hugh was serving in the Air Force, Joy worked with a finance company in Montgomery. Women's golf competition was suspended during the war and in 1946 the couple's first child, Gay, was born. Joy returned to win the Alabama state amateur championship again in 1947 but was unable to defend the title as the couple moved to Ohio and had their second child, Hugh, Jr.

The Culverhouses moved to Jacksonville in 1953 and Joy was able to resume her golf competition. She won many local tournaments and captured the Florida state amateur title on her first try in 1961.

Mrs. Culverhouse's golfing has been slowed by operations in 1978 to her wrist and hip. But she has remained athletic, swimming a mile every day. She enjoys sewing and is a member of the Tampa Junior League. She served five years on the Jacksonville Junior League Board of Directors and three on the Board of Directors of the Jacksonville Multiple Sclerosis Association. In addition, she was active in many other Jacksonville charitable organizations. She is currently a member of the Board of Directors of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Tampa and the Board of Directors of the Foundation for Eye Research at the University of South Florida. She is a member of Delta Delta Delta sorority.

Son, Hugh, Jr., is a University of Florida law graduate and is associated with the Culverhouse law firm in Miami. Daughter, Gay, is in the final stages of a doctorate in special education from Columbia University. The Culverhouses have four grandchildren.

JOHN H. MCKAY

Vice President and Head Coach



John McKay continued to add to his illustrious coaching record in 1981 as he guided the six-year-old Tampa Bay Buccaneers to their second division championship in the last three seasons. Following on the heels of 16 successful seasons of collegiate football coaching at the University of Southern California, it marked the 11th time in 22 years as a head coach that McKay's teams have finished first in their college conference or professional division.

"Comparing championships is like comparing chocolate cakes," says McKay. "There are differences to all of them, but they all taste good. I'll always remember our first NFC Central title in 1979 because no one but the team believed we could win it and few

teams have ever been as successful as the Bucs were in their first playoff game. This year's team also accomplished a lot because it righted itself when it looked like it was going down. Not every team can do that and it showed a lot of character."

Character and the courage of his convictions are two personal characteristics that have helped John McKay in his development of the Buccaneers into a team capable of winning two division titles in their first six seasons (a feat equaled only by Cincinnati among expansion teams).

McKay's early Buccaneer teams were castigated in some quarters for their reliance on the I-formation offense and 3-4 defensive concepts that had served him so well at Southern California. But McKay felt these formations were sound and particularly well suited to a young, professional team and he continued to use them. Today the Buccaneers have experienced success with both. The 3-4 defense is now used as the basic defensive alignment by a growing majority of NFL teams and the I-formation has become an integral part of nearly every professional attack.

"I'm pleased to see the acceptance of the 3-4 and I-formation in professional football because it shows that those of us who have believed in them weren't crazy," McKay says. "But no formation is a panacea. Nothing will work without sound blocking and tackling which come with better players and more experience. And, of course, you have to adjust parts of your plan to the personnel you have available."

Tampa Bay's performance has rewarded the confidence in McKay shown by Buc owner Hugh Culverhouse who persuaded McKay to leave his Southern California position for the fledgling Buccaneers on October 31, 1975. That original five-year contract was extended by Culverhouse for five more years at the conclusion of the 1979 season. After McKay retires from coaching he will assume the position of chief executive officer for the Buccaneers. Only five current NFL head coaches have a longer tenure with their teams.

"I am grateful the Bucs have an owner like Hugh Culverhouse who has the wisdom and patience to understand the importance of continuity in professional football," says McKay. "If you look at the teams that have been repeatedly successful, you will see they have all had a consistent operation of their program."

During his 16-year tenure at Southern California, John McKay compiled a record of 127-40-8 (.760) while winning nine Pac-8 championships, five Rose Bowls and four national championships (1962, 1967, 1972 and 1974). Only one other coach, his close personal friend Bear Bryant, has won more national titles (six) in the history of college football. Between them they have won 10 of the last 21 national championships.

McKay's professional head coaching record is 31-60-1 in regular season after a 2-26 start with the young Buccaneers.

John H. McKay was born in Everettsville, West Virginia where his father was a coal miner. Following his father's death, McKay helped support his family through odd jobs while earning all-state honors as a football running back and starring at guard in basketball at Shinnston High School.

After serving in World War II in the Army Air Corps, McKay enrolled at Purdue and was a starting defensive back in 1946. He then transferred to Oregon and was a two-way starter in 1948 and 1949. Teaming with Norm Van Brocklin, McKay helped the 1948 squad to a 9-1 record and a trip to the Cotton Bowl. He still holds the school record of 6.4 yards per carry during his career.

In 1950 McKay decided against offers from the New York Yankees of the All-American Football Conference and the FBI to become a low paid assistant coach at Oregon. To supplement his income for a growing family he moonlighted as a night watchman in a lumberyard.

McKay coached both offense and defense at Oregon for nine years under Jim Aiken and Len Casanova. McKay's plans resulted in three consecutive Webfoot wins over Southern California and convinced Don Clark to add him to the Trojan staff in 1959. In 1960 he was named head coach following Clark's retirement.

During the McKay years, Southern California dominated the Pac-8 conference, finishing first or second 13 times and losing only 17 conference games in 16 years. After posting an 8-11-1 record in McKay's first two seasons, the Trojans won the national title in 1962, his third year at the helm, the first of 14 consecutive winning seasons. McKay's final nine USC teams were 80-17-6 (.825) overall, winning four Rose Bowls and three national championships. McKay's teams were known for winning the big games and in his final nine Southern California seasons (1967-75) posted a 21-9-3 (.700) record in the Rose Bowl and regular season games against UCLA, Notre Dame, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Nebraska, Alabama and Texas.

The McKay years at Southern California produced 40 All-Americans, most notably a string of outstanding tailbacks. Two of those runners won the Heisman Trophy, Mike Garrett in 1965 and O.J. Simpson in 1968. An indication of McKay's ability to recognize and develop talent is that four of the top five tailbacks he coached at USC were not running backs in high school (Simpson - receiver, Clarence Davis - guard, Anthony Davis - quarterback and Ricky Bell - linebacker).

The McKay years at USC produced outstanding players at nearly every position, including Pat Haden, Charle Young, Lynn Swann, Marvin Powell and Richard Wood among others. McKay was elected Coach of the Year in 1962 and 1972. Had he remained at Southern California he would in all likelihood now rank second in wins to Bear Bryant among active major college coaches.

McKay and his wife, the former Nancy Hunter (known as Corky) have two daughters, Michele and Terri, and two sons, John and Richard, and four grandchildren. He is the author of **McKay: A Coach's Story** (with Jim Perry) published in 1974.

THE ASSISTANT COACHES

BOYD DOWLER

Receiver Coach

Development of Kevin House in 1981 and Jimmie Giles' second trip to the Pro Bowl were highlights of his second season as Tampa Bay's receiver coach . . . Giles is the sixth player coached by Dowler to reach the Pro Bowl in 12 seasons . . . can teach from experience gathered in 12 pro seasons as a player . . . enters 1981 ranked 16th on the all-time pro career pass receiving list with 474 receptions for 7,270 yards (15.4 avg.) and 40 touchdowns . . . born October 18, 1937 in Rock Springs, Wyoming where his father coached football, basketball and track . . . graduated from Cheyenne (WY) High School where he was all-state in three sports . . . versatile college player at the University of Colorado where he was a three-year starter and all-Big Eight quarterback as a senior (1958) . . . operating in single wing formation, he achieved the rare double of leading his team in both passing and pass receiving in 1958 . . . topped the Colorado team in punting and interceptions . . . also a varsity hurdler at Colorado . . . received a bachelor of science degree . . . a third-round draft choice of the Green Bay Packers in 1959, he played with the Pack for 11 seasons until 1969 . . . returned from retirement to play with Washington in 1971 . . . a member of five champion Green Bay teams (three NFL champions prior to the first Super Bowl and two Super Bowl champions) . . . inducted into the Packer Hall of Fame in 1978 . . . second to Hall of Famer Don Hutson in most Green Bay career receiving categories . . . NFL Rookie of the Year in 1959 . . . played in two Pro-Bowls and selected first team wide receiver on the 1960s All-Decade, All-NFL team . . . greatest game may have been 1967 NFL Championship Game (21-17 win in frigid cold over Dallas) with receptions for first two Packer touchdowns and two more receptions, setting up final Bart Starr score . . . punted four seasons for the Packers, including 44.1-yard average in 1961 which is second best in Green Bay history . . . began coaching career with Los Angeles in 1970 . . . player-coach with Washington in 1971 and full-time coach with Redskins in 1972 . . . pass coordinator for the Philadelphia Eagles from 1973 to 1975 . . . receiver coach with the Cincinnati Bengals from 1976 to 1979 . . . receivers Charley Taylor and Roy Jefferson with Washington, Charles Young and Harold Carmichael with Philadelphia, Isaac Curtis with Cincinnati and Giles have made Pro Bowl while coached by Dowler . . . instrumental in developing Carmichael who passed Dowler on NFL career receiving list last season . . . top racquetball and tennis player . . . he and his wife, Patricia, have two children, Kristen (19) and Brian (13).

FRANK EMANUEL

Special Teams Coach

A new member of the Tampa Bay coaching staff, he will organize the Buc-

career special teams ... comes to the Bucs from his alma mater, the University of Tennessee, where he coached the defensive line ... a consensus first-team All-America linebacker for the Volunteers in 1965 ... brings 10 years of college coaching experience and five seasons of professional playing experience to his new position with Tampa Bay ... born December 4, 1942 at Clio, South Carolina ... graduated from Warwick High School in Newport News, Virginia where he was an all-state linebacker and twice a state wrestling champion ... a three-year linebacker starter at Tennessee, he was first-team All-America and all-SEC as a senior in 1965 ... the second player ever drafted by the Miami Dolphins in the second round in 1966 ... played four seasons for the Dolphins (special teams captain in 1969) and finished his career with New Orleans in 1970 ... after serving as a part-time coach with Tennessee in 1971, his first full-time coaching position was at Memphis State for two seasons, beginning in 1972 ... defensive coordinator at Wichita State (1974); Vanderbilt (1975-76) and Louisville (1977-78) ... returned to Tennessee in 1979 where he coached the defensive line and was defensive coordinator (1979) and kicking coordinator (1980-81) ... enjoys golf and racquetball ... he and his wife, Carolyn, have two children, Brian (7) and Brooke (5).

WAYNE FONTES

Defensive Coordinator and Secondary

Energetic coach who assumes defensive coordinator's role in 1982 while retaining responsibilities for defensive backs he has held from team's first season in 1976 ... Bucs led NFC by allowing only 10 touchdown passes in 1981 ... Tampa Bay's total of 64 touchdown passes allowed in the last five years is tied with Denver for best in the NFL in that period ... joined Bucs in 1976 from similar position on John McKay's staff at Southern California ... born February 17, 1940 in New Bedford, Massachusetts ... graduated from McKinley High School in Canton, Ohio ... graduated from Michigan State in 1962 after playing football and baseball ... an all-Big Ten running back his senior year, playing in the Senior Bowl and North-South All Star games ... named Defensive Player of the Game in the North-South game ... a .300 hitting second baseman for the Spartan baseball team ... played with New York

of the AFL in 1963 and 1964 ... a starter in the defensive backfield before a broken leg ended his career prematurely ... still holds Jet team record for longest interception return (83 yards) ... returned to Michigan State and earned a master's degree in administration in 1965 while coaching the freshman football team ... in 1966 and 1967 he coached at Visitation High School in Bay City, Michigan, compiling a 17-3 record and winning the 1967 Class B state championship with a 10-0 record ... served as defensive backfield coach at three different universities, first at Dayton in 1968, then at the University of Iowa (1969-71) and Southern California (1972-1975) ... last name is pronounced "fontz" ... brother Len is defensive backfield coach of the Cleveland Browns and three other brothers played major college football ... he and his wife, Evelyn, have three children, Mike (21), Scott (19) and Kimberly (16).

Defensive Line Coach

If you finish third in a five-team division, your schedule is:

- home-and-home games with the other four teams in division — 8
- one game each with teams one through four in a division of other conference — 4
- one game each with the two other third place teams and the two other second place teams in your conference — 4

If you finish fourth in a five-team division, your schedule is: home-and-home games with the other four teams in your division — 8

- one game each with the two other first place teams and the two other fourth place teams in your conference — 4
- one game each with teams one through four in a division of the other conference — 4

If you finish fifth in a five-team division, your schedule is: home-and-home games with the other four teams in your division — 8

- one game with teams one through four of the four-team division in your conference — 4
- home-and-home games with other fifth place team in your conference — 2
- one game with each fifth place team in other conference — 2

APPLYING THE SCHEDULE FORMULA

The opponents and sites for the Buccaneers' 1983 schedule will be known as soon as the 1982 season is completed. The NFL schedule formula matches teams in a predetermined manner based on their final positions.

If in 1982 the Bucs finish **FIRST** or **FOURTH** in the NFC Central, their 1983 opponents will be: two games (home-and-home) with the other four NFC Central teams (eight games), one game each with the first-place teams in the NFC West and the NFC East (two games), one game each with the fourth-place teams in the NFC West and the NFC East (two games) and one game each with the four teams in the AFC Central.

If in 1982 the Bucs finish **SECOND** or **THIRD** in the NFC Central, their 1983 opponents will be: two games (home-and-home) with the other four NFC Central teams (eight games), one game each with the second-place team in the NFC West and the NFC East (two games), one game each with the third-place teams in the NFC West and NFC East (two games) and one game each with the four teams in the AFC Central.

If in 1982 the Bucs finish **FIFTH**, their 1983 opponents will be: two games (home-and-home) with the other four NFC Central teams (eight games), one game each with the four teams of the NFC West (four games), home-and-home games with the fifth place team in the NFC East (two games) and one game each with the fifth-place team in the AFC West and the AFC East (two games).

1983 INTERCONFERENCE GAME SITE PRIORITIES

For interconference games between teams one through four in a division, 1983 sites will now be assigned so that those teams do not play a second consecutive game at the same site with their interconference opponents that they did in 1980 when the divisions were last paired.

If a team that played a fifth-place schedule in 1980 finishes first through fourth in 1982, it will inherit the site priorities from the team in the division that finishes fifth.

Below are the site priorities between the NFC Central and the AFC Central for 1982. (If Detroit finishes first through fourth in 1982 it will inherit the site priorities from the team in the division that finishes fifth):

- CHICAGO — home vs. Cleveland and Pittsburgh, at Cincinnati and Houston
- GREEN BAY — home vs. Cleveland and Pittsburgh, at Cincinnati and Houston
- MINNESOTA — home vs. Cincinnati and Houston, at Cleveland and Pittsburgh
- TAMPA BAY — home vs. Cincinnati and Houston, at Cleveland and Pittsburgh

PLAYOFF INFORMATION

Selection of Clubs

1. Three division champions from each conference.
2. Two "Wild Card" clubs (non-champions with two best records) from each conference. Both wild cards may come from the same division. Clubs eliminated in Division Championship tie-breakers are eligible if their records qualify them.

Pairings and Priority

1. **First Round** — Wild cards play each other. Home clubs will be the clubs with the best won-lost-tied percentage in the regular season. If tied in record, apply all applicable division tie-breakers.
2. **Second Round** — Same as in previous years.

Division Ties

If, at the end of the regular season, two or more clubs in the same division finish with the best won-lost-tied percentage, the following steps will be taken until a CHAMPION is determined:

TWO CLUBS

1. Head-to-Head (best won-lost-tied percentage in games between the clubs).
2. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the division.
3. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the conference.
4. Best won-lost-tied percentage in common games, if applicable.
5. Best net points in division games.
6. Best net points in all games.
7. Strength of schedule.
8. Best net touchdowns in all games.
9. Coin toss.

THREE-OR-MORE-CLUBS

(Note: If two clubs remain tied after a third club is eliminated during any step, tie-breaker reverts to Step One of two-club format.)

1. Head-to-Head (best won-lost-tied percentage in games among the clubs)
2. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the division.
3. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the conference.
4. Best won-lost-tied percentage in common games.
5. Best net points in division games.
6. Best net touchdowns in all games.
7. Strength of schedule.
8. Best net touchdowns in all games.
9. Coin toss.

Draft Priority

1. If two or more clubs are tied for selection order, the conventional strength-of-schedule tie-breaker will be applied, subject to the following exceptions for playoff teams:
 - A. The Super Bowl winner will be last and the Super Bowl loser will be the next-to-last.
 - B. Any non-Super Bowl playoff team involved in a tie moves down in priority as follows:
 1. Participation by a club in the playoffs without a victory adds one-half victory to the club's regular season won-lost-tied record.
 2. For each victory in the playoffs, one full victory will be added to the club's regular season won-lost-tied record.
 - C. Clubs with the best won-lost-tied record after these steps are applied will drop to their appropriate spots at the bottom of the tied segment. In no case, will the above process move a club lower than the segment in which it was initially tied.

Wild Card Ties

If necessary to break ties to determine the two Wild Card clubs from each confer-

ence, the following steps will be taken:

1. If all the tied clubs are from the same division, apply division tiebreaker.
2. If the tied clubs are from different divisions, apply the following steps.

TWO CLUBS

1. Head-to-Head, if applicable.
2. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the conference.
3. **Best won-lost-tied percentage in common games, minimum of four.**
4. **Best net points in conference games.**
5. Best net points in all games.
6. **Strength of schedule.**
7. Best net touchdowns in all games.
8. Coin toss.

THREE-OR-MORE-CLUBS

(Note: If two clubs remain tied after third or other clubs eliminated, tie breaker reverts to Step One of applicable two-club format).

1. Head-to-Head sweep (applicable only if one club has defeated each of the others or one club has lost to each of the others).
2. Best won-lost-tied percentage in games played within the conference.
3. **Best won-lost-tied percentage in common games, minimum of four.**
4. **Best net points in conference games.**
5. Best net points in all games.

Tampa Stadium, the home of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, will become the eighth stadium to host professional sports' most prestigious event, the Super Bowl (XVIII), on January 22, 1984.

Tampa Stadium has been in its current 72,128-seat configuration since an expansion prior to the Buccaneers' inaugural season in 1976. The fourth largest stadium in the National Football Conference (behind the Pontiac Silverdome, Giants Stadium and Veterans Stadium), it has hosted sellout crowds for all but one Buccaneer home game the last three seasons. The stadium record of an actual attendance of 72,033 (just 93 no shows) was set for the NFC Championship Game between the

Bucs and Los Angeles on January 6, 1980.

The stadium originally seated 46,500 fans in concrete stands along either sideline. Construction started in October, 1966, and Tampa Stadium was dedicated on November 4, 1967. The initial structure cost only \$4.6 million. In this configuration it served as the home of the University of Tampa Spartans and other college football games along with preseason professional contests.

After the Tampa Bay area was awarded an NFL franchise in 1975, work began on an expansion program. This included the addition of end zone seating to raise the stadium to its current capacity, new computerized scoreboards at either end and an extra level to the press box for a cost of \$13 million. In addition the Buccaneers constructed 24 private boxes above the east stands.

Located in northwest Tampa adjacent to North Dale Mabry Highway within one mile of Interstate 275, Tampa Stadium is the home of both the Bucs and Tampa Bay Rowdies of the North American Soccer League in addition to other special events. Al Lopez Field, the spring home of the Cincinnati Reds and the summer base of the Tampa Tarpons of the Florida State League, is also a part of the complex administered by the Tampa Sports Authority. The TSA is a public board composed of 11 members from both the City of Tampa and Hillsborough County which was established by the Florida Legislature in 1965.

With a minimum of excess area around the field, seats clustered around midfield and no pillars or posts to obstruct the view, Tampa Stadium has outstanding sight lines for fans. The high-grade Bermuda-turfed field with an 18-inch crown is considered one of the best playing surfaces in the NFL.

BUC RADIO NETWORK

The popular broadcast team of Mark Champion, Dave Kocourek and Dick Crippen will team up for the fourth consecutive year in 1982 to bring Buccaneer football to listeners throughout the state of Florida. The Buccaneer Radio Network numbers over 30 affiliates this year with Tampa's WDAE (1250 AM) the flagship station. WDAE is a Taft Broadcasting station.

Champion provides top-notch play-by-play descriptions of the action with former pro tight end Kocourek adding analysis between plays. Crippen provides the game introduction, halftime and locker room interviews after the game.

Champion, 31, has been the sports director at WDAE for most of nine years with the exception of a brief period with a Tampa television station. This is his fourth season as the Voice of the Buccaneers, in addition to his continued daily sports reports and evening talk show. Originally from Muncie, Indiana, he broadcast Ball State University football, basketball and baseball play-by-play while earning his degree in broadcasting.

Kocourek is a former all-star player in the American Football League with the San Diego Chargers and Oakland Raiders. His broadcast credentials include analysis for NBC's national football telecast and he has also done preseason television commentary for the Detroit Lions and Miami Dolphins. Now

involved in real estate sales in Marco Island, Florida he is the former Director of Ticket Sales for the Buccaneers. This is his fifth season of Buccaneer radio broadcasts.

Crippen has played a part in the broadcast of every game the Bucs have ever played as he enters his seventh year on the Tampa Bay radio team. He has lived in the Tampa area for 20 years. He became the sports director at WFLA-TV (Channel 8) in 1981 after 15 years in a similar position with another area television station, WTSP. In addition, he is considered the voice of hydroplane racing and has covered auto racing and other football games for national broadcast. He is a past president of the Florida Sportcasters Association.

BUCCANEER BAND and SWASH-BUC-LERS

Assisting the great fan enthusiasm of Tampa Stadium crowds are the Buccaneer Band and Swash-buc-lers. The Buccaneer Band is one of only three NFL team bands while the Swash-buc-lers are an acclaimed group of 32 cheerleaders.

From a quiet beginning in 1977 the Buc Band has grown to over 100 members with a rapidly diversifying skilled musical sound as it starts its sixth season. A volunteer organization, the Band practices twice a week most of the year under the direction of its founder Dean Page.

The Band provides a lively sound during breaks in the Tampa Stadium action and also entertains before and after games. Drilled to perform on short notice, the Band performs renditions of popular tunes and marches and accompanies the Swash-buc-lers and message board.

But the Buc Band has more than just game day functions. Sponsored by Sandpiper Resorts of St. Petersburg Beach and Treasure Island and Eastern Airlines, the bandmen are often asked to entertain at various functions throughout Buccaneer country. The Band's outstanding performances are a major part of the success of the Tyrone Square Mall Pep Rallies on Fridays before home games since 1979.

In 1982 the Buccaneer Band has moved to further expand and diversify its musical capabilities. In addition to the game day group of over 100, the Band has a 45-member symphonic band and a 20-piece concert stage band. Elements of the symphonic band's performance include a woodwind choir, a trombone choir, a brass choir, a 16-voice mixed chorus and a barbershop quartet.

Leading cheers and dancing to the sound of the Buccaneer Band are the Swash-buc-lers. The group was founded with the team in 1976 and has cheered at every Tampa Bay home game. The squad's director and choreographer is Pattie Bean, in her third year with the squad. She is assisted by former Swash-buc-ler Jeanne Albrecht.

In addition to dancing and cheering at the game, the Swash-buc-lers also participate in a large number of off-the-field activities as representatives of the Buccaneers. They have performed on television shows and in commercials and in the Main Street Parade at Walt Disney World's Magic Kingdom with the Buc Band.

Neal Colzie clinched the game for Tampa Bay in the final minute by intercepting a Steve Dils pass and returning it a club-record 82 yards for a touchdown. Minnesota, trailing 14-13, had a third-and-four at the Tampa Bay 26 with 35 seconds left when the play began. Dils threw to his left for Terry LeCount but Colzie stepped in front of the ball and raced down the sideline, reaching the end zone with 21 seconds left in the game.

It took only 9:28 of the season for Doug

Williams and Kevin House to unveil what would be the most prolific passing combination in Buccaneer history. They delighted a capacity Saturday night crowd with a 55-yard scoring strike in the first quarter, the first of five 50-yard or longer touchdowns they would team up for in 1981.

After Minnesota closed to 7-6 with a pair of third quarter field goals, Williams rushed up the middle 10 yards for Tampa Bay's second touchdown. Minnesota's Dils completed 37 passes (only two quarterbacks in league history have completed more in a game) of 62 attempts for 361 yards. But 20 of the completions were to the running backs and the Vikings' only touchdown came on a deflected fourth down pass with 2:29 remaining.

Colzie's interception was his second of the game as he earlier intercepted a pass thrown by halfback Ted Brown. (Tampa Bay record 1-0.)

Tampa Bay snapped out of its two-game tailspin in a big way with a 37-3 win over Green Bay. The victory set Buccaneer records for most points in a game and largest margin of victory and was the only defeat Green Bay suffered in a seven-week span.

With the Bucs leading 3-0 Cedric Brown ignited a 24-point second quarter by intercepting a Rich Campbell pass on the first play and returning it 81 yards for a touchdown. Four minutes later James Owens dashed 35 yards for a touchdown and the Bucs added another touchdown and a field goal before the half was over.

Owens saw his most extensive action of the season and responded with the first 100-yard rushing day of his career (112 yards in 16 carries). Bill Capece, despite straining a leg muscle in pregame practice, set a team record with 13 kick-scoring points, including a club-record 51-yard field goal. Capece's 51-yarder also held a Tampa Stadium record for all of three and a half minutes until Green Bay scored its only points on a 53-yard Jan Stenerud field goal early in the fourth quarter.

Brown had another interception which he returned 50 yards to set up a touchdown while John Holt and Neal Colzie also had interceptions. Chuck Fusina threw the first touchdown pass of his NFL career, a two-yarder late in the game to Jimmie Giles. (Tampa Bay record 6-6.)

His other touchdown throw was a 38-yarder to Jimmie Giles which helped Tampa Bay to a 14-9 halftime lead.

Atlanta's William Andrews played an outstanding game, bowling over Tampa Bay defenders for 80 yards on 17 carries and catching 13 passes for 98 more yards. Jerry Eckwood played what John McKay termed "his best all-around game," averaging 4.9 yards per carry (11-54) and blocking well.

With Detroit losing to Green Bay and Minnesota falling to Chicago, Tampa Bay's 8-6 record was one game better than the Lions, Vikings and Packers. The Bucs needed one win in their last two games for the championship.

Dan Fouts pulled the game out for San Diego by directing an excruciating 16-play drive to Benirschke's winning field goal, twice converting on third down and once on fourth down with passes to Kellen Winslow and Charlie Joiner.

Both quarterbacks passed for over 300 yards in the contest. Fouts' total of 351 yards passing (33-49) was the fourth highest ever against the Bucs. Doug Williams had his fourth 300-yard game of the season and ninth of his career, passing for 321 yards. Williams completed over 60% of his passes for the third consecutive game, hitting 22 of 35, including a 58-yard touchdown to Theo Bell in the first quarter.

Detroit's 45-7 Saturday victory over Minnesota and Green Bay's win over New Orleans left Tampa Bay, Detroit and Green Bay all tied at 8-7. Due to tiebreaking procedures the winner of the season's final game between Tampa Bay and Detroit would become the division champion.

On the next play Doug Williams lofted a club record 84-yard scoring bomb to Kevin House and suddenly Tampa Bay led 10-7 at the half.

The teams traded field goals in the second half before what proved to be the decisive play with 13 and a half minutes remaining. Lee Roy Selmon sacked Hipple from behind, forcing a fumble which David Logan scooped up and returned 21 yards to the end zone for a 20-10 Tampa Bay lead. It was Logan's second fumble return for a touchdown in the Silverdome after a similar

play in 1980.

The Lions battled back, scoring in the final minute, but Theo Bell's onside kick recovery preserved the victory. (Tampa Bay record 9-7.)

BUCCANEER HISTORY

FOUNDATION

November 4, 1967: Tampa Stadium is dedicated as Tennessee defeats the University of Tampa, 38-0. The dedication concludes planning begun in 1965 by the Tampa Sports Authority, an 11-member public agency formed by the Florida Legislature. The price tag of the 46,700-seat stadium is \$4.1 million.

August 10, 1968: The first NFL preseason game is played in Tampa Stadium as Washington defeats Atlanta before a crowd of 42,000.

November, 1968: First group attempting to secure an NFL franchise for Tampa Bay area is formed. This group, known as the Suncoast Pro Football Committee, functions until 1972 when the Tampa Chamber of Commerce appoints the formal West Coast NFL Task force headed by J. Leonard Levy.

Summer, 1972: The Baltimore Colts train in Tampa and play three preseason games at Tampa Stadium. Some 33,000 ticket packages for the three games are sold.

August 11, 1973: The New York Jets defeat the San Francisco 49ers, 34-14, in the 13th preseason game staged since 1968 at Tampa Stadium. Average attendance for the games was 41,000.

April 24, 1974: Tampa Bay is awarded the NFL's 27th franchise. As part of the franchise award for the area, Tampa Stadium will be enlarged to 72,000 seats.

October 30, 1974: Philadelphia construction man Tom McCloskey is awarded the new Tampa Bay franchise, but soon backs off accepting ownership.

December 5, 1974: Hugh F. Culverhouse, Jacksonville attorney and real estate investor who had earlier declined ownership of the Seattle franchise for geographic reasons, is awarded ownership of the Tampa Bay franchise.

February 15, 1975: It is announced that the club will be known as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, which was also the choice of a local contest to name the new team. On June 15th, the team announces its official colors of orange, white and red trim and gains the logo of a swashbuckling buccaneer.

April 21, 1975: Tampa Sports Authority unanimously approves a 30-year lease agreement with Buc officials for Tampa Stadium. Three days later the Tampa City Council votes 6-1 for approval of the stadium lease and the expansion of Tampa Stadium to 72,000 seats.

July 9, 1975: Ground is broken for the Tampa Stadium expansion financed by the sale of \$13 million in bonds by the Tampa Sports Authority.

October 31, 1975: John McKay, four national championships behind him at the University of Southern California, is announced as the head coach of the Buccaneers.

December 27, 1975: Hugh Culverhouse draws first pick in the college draft, while Seattle receives the first pick in the veteran allocation in a special drawing held prior to the Pittsburgh-Baltimore playoff game in Pittsburgh.

1976 (0-14, 5th AFC West)

March 30, 1976: The Buccaneers choose 39 players (20 offensive and 19 defensive) from other NFL rosters in the veteran allocation draft at the NFL offices in New York.

April 8, 1976: Lee Roy Selmon, All-America defensive end from Oklahoma, is the first pick of the entire college draft by the Bucs. He will become the Buccaneers' first consensus All-Pro and NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1979.

April 16, 1976: Lee Roy Selmon and his brother Dewey, who was chosen in the second round of the draft, sign contracts with the Buccaneers, the first draft choices to sign.

July 5, 1976: The Bucs welcome the first rookies and free agents to training camp at their recently completed office complex known as One Buccaneer Place. By December, 140 players will have been at least briefly on the Bucs' first-year roster.

July 31, 1976: Tampa Bay's first ever action is a preseason game at the Los Angeles Coliseum with the Rams. Los Angeles wins 26-3 although Pete Rajecki's 18-yard field goal provides Tampa Bay's first points.

August 14, 1976: The Buccaneers are winners for the first time, defeating Atlanta 17-3 in a preseason game at Jacksonville's Gator Bowl.

August 21, 1976: After three road preseason games, the Buccaneers open at home in expanded Tampa Stadium in a preseason match with the Miami Dolphins. As 67,466 fans watch, the Bucs give the veteran Dolphins all they can handle before succumbing, 28-21.

September 12, 1976: Tampa Bay's first regular season game is a 20-0 defeat at Houston. One week later, San Diego spoils the home opener, 23-0.

1977 (2-12, 5th NFL Central)

December 11, 1977: The Bucs tie an NFL record with three interceptions returned for touchdowns and end 26 games of frustration with a 33-14 win at New Orleans. Over 8,000 fans greet the team when it returns to One Buccaneer Place.

December 18, 1977: Tampa Bay makes it two in a row with its first home win ever, a 17-7 triumph over the St. Louis Cardinals.

1978 (5-11, 5th NFC Central)

April 24, 1978: The Buccaneers trade their number-one selection in the first round of the 1978 NFL draft to the Houston Oilers for tight end Jimmie Giles plus the Oilers' first and second picks in 1978 and Houston's third and fifth picks in 1979. The Oilers use their new selection to draft Earl Campbell of Texas and the Bucs draft Grambling's Doug Williams.

October 15, 1978: Jimmy DuBose rushes for 109 yards in 24 carries (first Buc over 100) but is injured late in the game as Tampa Bay loses to the New York Giants, 17-14. The next week Tampa Bay defeats Chicago to up its record to 4-4, but injuries such as DuBose's cripple the team during the second half of the season.

1979 (10-6, 1st NFC Central)

September 30, 1979: The Bucs become the only undefeated team in the NFL (5-0) with a 17-13 win at Chicago. The game proves decisive in the NFL Central race when Tampa Bay and Chicago end the season tied at 10-6.

December 16, 1979: The Bucs wait until the final game of the season to clinch their first NFC Central crown. Tampa Bay edges Kansas City 3-0 in pouring rain at Tampa Stadium with Neil O'Donoghue's 19-yard fourth quarter field goal decisive.

December 29, 1979: Tampa Bay is successful in its first-ever NFL playoff appearance, defeating the Philadelphia Eagles, 24-17, as Ricky Bell rushes for 142 yards and two touchdowns.

1980 (5-10-1, 4th NFC Central)

January 6, 1980: The Bucs finish just one game short of the Super Bowl as Los Angeles wins the NFC Championship Game at Tampa Stadium, 9-0.

January 7, 1980: Head coach John McKay receives a five-year contract extension. He will become the organization's president when he retires from coaching.

September 11, 1980: Tampa Bay avenges January's NFC Championship Game defeat with a 10-9 victory over Los Angeles in the Buccaneers' first appearance on ABC's national television series. The game is played on a Thursday night.

November 16, 1980: Doug Williams passes for 486 yards, the fourth highest total in NFL history, and four touchdowns but Minnesota defeats Tampa Bay, 38-30.

1981 (9-7, 1st NFC Central)

June 3, 1981: A Tampa Bay Super Bowl Task Force, headed by Leonard Levy and assisted by Hugh Culverhouse, makes a successful presentation at the NFL Owners' Meeting in Detroit and by a vote of 24-2 Tampa Stadium is selected as the site for Super Bowl XVIII on January 22, 1984.

December 20, 1981: Tampa Bay wins an exciting winner-take-all showdown with the Detroit Lions (20-17) for the NFC Central Division title. The Bucs are the only team to defeat the Lions in the Pontiac Silverdome in 1981. Two weeks later (January 2, 1982), Dallas eliminates Tampa Bay from the playoffs.
