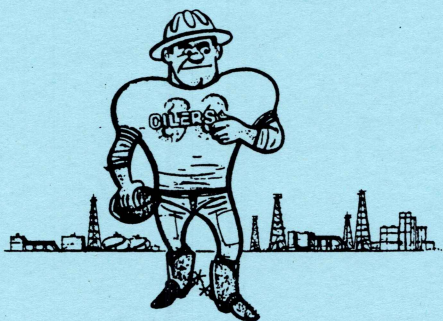
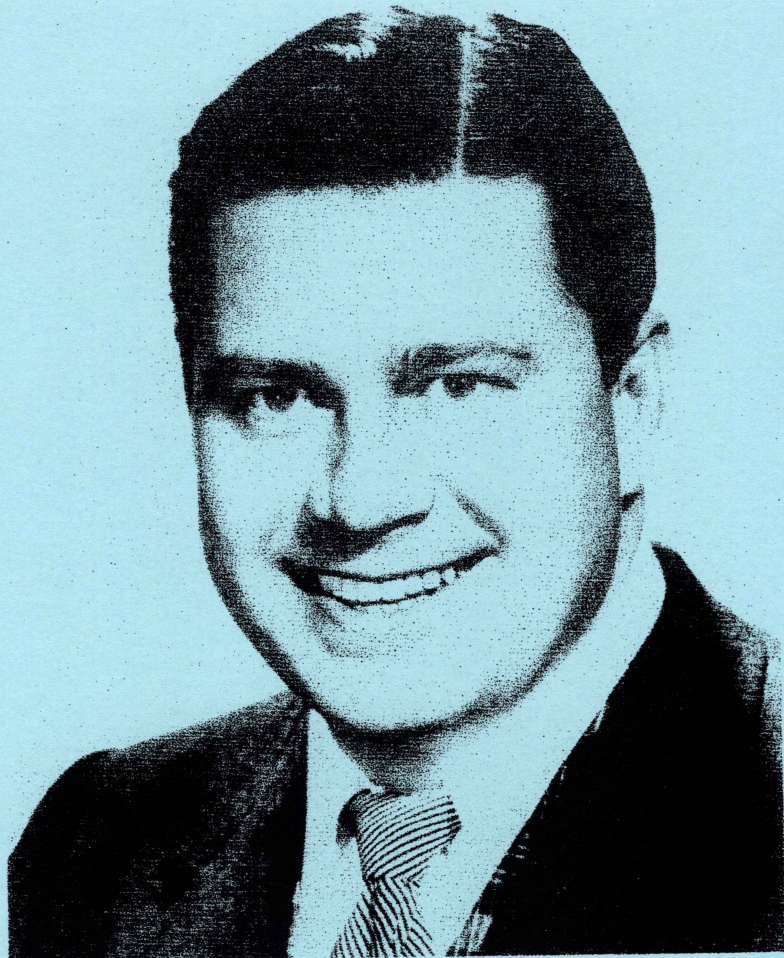

THE PRESIDENT

K. S. (Bud) Adams, Jr.

A few years ago, in a Miami hotel room, Bud Adams met with owners of the Chicago Cardinals and negotiations began for possible purchase of the Cardinals by Adams. The young Houstonian wanted 50 per cent of the football franchise. Cardinal owners offered only 49 per cent and negotiations fell through.

Adams for several years has eyed possible pro franchises for Houston, but was stymied until the American Football League was organized.

Adams, a devoted football fan who uses his private plane to hop from game to game, is a 38-year-old oil executive who was audacious enough to start his own oil company while he was in his twenties and has watched it record an amazing growth. Today, his Ada Oil Co. services some 600 stations. In addition he formed Adams Petroleum Corporation and owns Adams Petroleum Center, a massive building which calls for expansion to 18 stories.

Other interests include ownership of a chain of five-and-ten stores, a restaurant with private club, a ranch, and uncounted real estate holdings.

Adams is the son of K. S. (Boots) Adams, Sr., chairman of the board of Oklahoma's giant Phillips Petroleum Co. Adams' interest in football goes back to his college days at Kansas where he was a fair halfback for two seasons.

He came to Houston in the mid-Forties and established his Ada Oil Co. He is President and sole owner of the Houston Oilers.

Don Suman

Don Suman is a former basketball coach at Rice Institute, where his intense recruiting brought in the finest playing talent the Southwest school has ever had. An excellent organizer and detail man, he carries out many of the duties that a General Manager would for the Oilers. Suman, a Rice football and basketball player in the late 30's, was head basketball coach for ten years.

John W. Breen

John Breen has been in football, as a coach and athletic director, for 21 years, and came to the Oilers from the Chicago Cardinals where he was also director of player personnel. A Milwaukee native, Breen attended Carroll College where he played football and basketball. After graduation in 1935, he stayed at Carroll as an assistant coach and was named head coach and athletic director when he was 30 years old. In 1949 he became head coach and athletic director at Lake Forest, Ill., went to the Cardinals in 1957 and served three years as director of the Cardinals' search for playing talent. A Navy veteran, Breen served as Communications Officer in the Pacific and Mediterranean, was discharged as a Lieut. Commander.

THE HEAD COACH

Lou Rymkus

Oiler head coach Lou Rymkus has been in professional football, as player, assistant and head coach, for 17 years, and the AFL will be his third league.

As a rookie in 1943, he played for the Washington Redskins, Eastern Division champs that year. Navy service interrupted his pro football, but he played in 1944 for the unbeaten Bainbridge team, and while stationed at Notre Dame in 1945 was an assistant under Hugh Devore.



LOU RYMKUS

He returned to pro ball in 1946 with the Cleveland Browns and played six years, making all-pro as an offensive lineman four years and serving as Paul Brown's offensive captain his last years.

He entered coaching at Indiana in 1952, went to Calgary in 1953 as an assistant, then finished with assistant's jobs at Green Bay and Los Angeles before coming to the Oilers.

Rymkus, a native of Royalton, Ill., is 41 years old. He played high school ball at Tilden Tech H. S. in Chicago, making all-city and all-state teams as a tackle for three straight years. He also won the city high school wrestling championship and lettered as a shot putter. Sought by all major midwest college teams, he chose Notre Dame. He was named most valuable player on the 1942 Irish team coached by Frank Leahy.

Rymkus is married (Bette) and has twin boys, Pat and Mike, 16.

THE ASSISTANTS

WALTER H. (WALLY) LEMM—A native Chicagoan, Lemm attended Carroll College where he played halfback under John Breen. Started coaching career as assistant at Carroll College and has coached at every level—high school through professional. Was on Notre Dame staff from 1945 through 1946 and coached defensive backs for the Chicago Cardinals last season. He is in charge of Oiler defense.

WALTER G. (WALT) SCHLINKMAN—A native of Dumas, Texas, and one of the great backs (fullback) in early Texas Tech history during the mid-forties. Was nation's fourth leading rusher in 1945 and was No. 1 choice of Green Bay. In eight seasons, Schlinkman was among top NFL ground gainers four times. He made the All-Pro team in 1947. He was assistant coach at Columbia, the University of Washington and the Chicago Cardinals. He will work with the offensive backfield.

FRED W. WALLNER—Born in Greenfield, Mass., and graduated from Notre Dame in 1951. Played four years with the Cardinals before joining Marquette staff in 1956. At Notre Dame, Wallner was a guard on the undefeated teams of 1948 and 1949. As a pro, he was used mostly as linebacker, making the All-Eastern Division pro team in 1955 for the Cards. Wallner will be Oiler line coach.

MAC SPEEDIE—One of the great receivers in pro history, Speedie was an all-pro choice for six seasons with the Cleveland Browns. He led the All-America Conference in receiving four straight years and the NFL once. Speedie finished his career with three seasons at Regina and Vancouver in the Canadian League, again making all-pro. Speedie was born in Odell, Ill., and graduated from Utah in 1942. He will coach Oiler ends.



GEORGE BLANDA

Quarterback . . . Born Sept. 17, 1929 6'2" . . . 208 lbs. . . . Kentucky

A veteran of ten seasons in the NFL with the Chicago Bears, Blanda holds the distinction of having kicked 156 consecutive points after touchdown, a pro football record . . . His 541 career points are the most by any member of the Bears . . . In 250 attempts he scored with 247 conversions and toed 88 field goals in 201 tries . . . Other Bear records held by Blanda include most PATs one season (45 in 1956) and most field goals one season (14 in '57) . . . Retired last season after having been relegated to third string quarterback in 1958 . . . Born in Youngwood, Pa., now makes his home in Chicago with his wife and two children . . . Completed 29 passes in game of Nov. 1, 1953 against San Francisco 49ers . . . Also played fullback for Bears and handled kickoff assignment . . . Played in North-South game after graduating from Kentucky where he completed 53 percent of his passes in senior year.

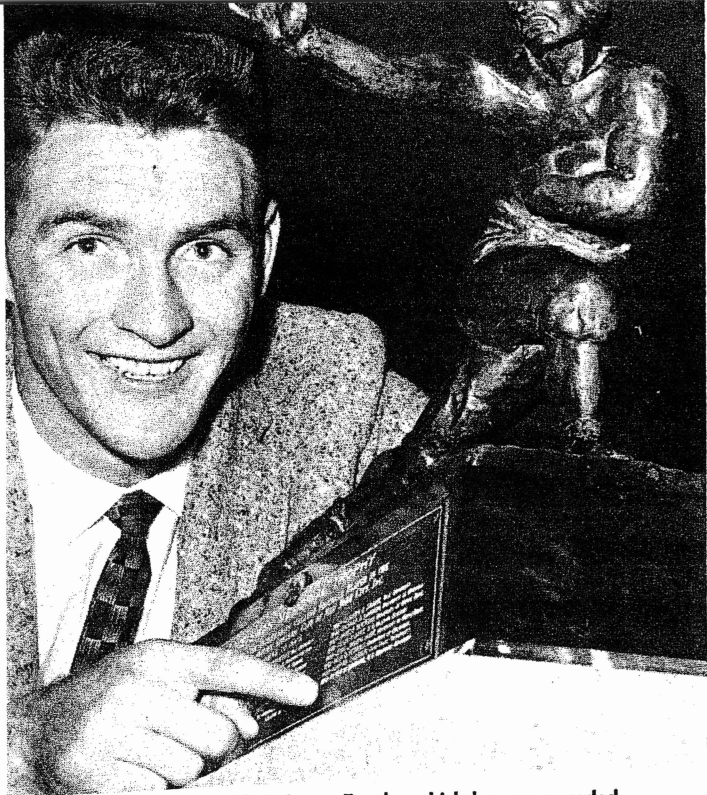
JOHN CARSON

JOHN CARSON

End . . . Born Jan. 31, 1930 . . . 6'2½" . . . 200 lbs. . . . Georgia
A five year veteran of the National Football League . . . Drafted by Cleveland Browns in 1953 as "future pick" . . . Traded to Washington Redskins along with Dale Atkeson in August 1954 for Don Paul . . . Led nation in pass catching at University of Georgia in 1954 with 45 receptions for 633 yards . . . All-America selection in 1953 . . . All-Southeastern Conference in '53-'54 . . . Played in '54 College All-Star game . . . Caught 122 passes in NFL career for 1900 yards and scored 11 touchdowns . . . Was Redskins' leading pass receiver in 1955-56-57 . . . Home town is Atlanta, Ga. . . . Released by Washington after fourth game of 1958 season . . . Outstanding golfer.

BILLY CANNON

Halfback

6'1" . . . 206 lbs. . . . L.S.U.

The most sought after player in pro football after a brilliant career at Louisiana State University, Cannon was first team All-America in 1958 and 1959 and the first player selected in this year's National Football League draft . . . The Oilers finally got the Baton Rouge, La., star after a court battle with the Los Angeles Rams of the NFL . . . Selected as "Back-of-the-Year" in '59 and won Heisman Trophy . . . Gained 1867 yards rushing during three years of varsity ball at LSU and scored 24 touchdowns . . . Named "Player-of-the-Year" by the "Sporting News" in both '58 and '59 . . . In '57 gained 583 yards on the ground and caught 11 passes for another 199 yards while scoring six TDs . . . Punted 43 times in '58 for a 37.1 average . . . Rushed for 686 yards in 116 '58 attempts to lead the Southeastern Conference and intercepted three enemy aeriels . . . Led the SEC in scoring in '58 with 74 points on 11 TDs and eight PATs . . . Threw winning TD pass in '59 Sugar Bowl game . . . Starred in track as well as on the grid doing the 100-yard dash in 9.4 seconds and putting the 16-pound shot 57'4" . . . Cannon is a fearsome blocker as well as triple-threat in the backfield . . . Married and has two daughters.

DON FLOYD

End

6'3" . . . 235 lbs. . . . T.C.U.

Former All-America at Texas Christian University—first team in 1959, second team in 1958—where he won three varsity letters in football as a tackle . . . Switched to defensive end this season, his first in pro ball . . . Was second round draft choice of Baltimore Colts in last Fall's National Football League selections . . . Captain of the Horned Frogs in his senior year . . . Home town is Midlothian, Texas.

DAN LANPHEAR

Defensive End

6'2" . . . 230 lbs. . . . Wisconsin

All-America tackle at University of Wisconsin in 1959, will be used as defensive end by Oilers in this, his first year of pro football . . . Played three years of varsity ball for Badgers and was captain in senior year . . . Played in Rose Bowl . . . From Madison, Wisconsin . . . Was eighth pick of Pittsburgh Steelers in this year's NFL draft . . . Named to second All-Big Ten team in '58, first team in '59.

BOB WHITE

Fullback

6'2" . . . 225 lbs. . . . Ohio State

All-America first team selection in 1958, second team in '59 . . . Played three years varsity ball for Ohio State . . . Finished second in nation in rushing in '58 with 859 yards in 218 carries and scored 12 touchdowns . . . Named to first team All-Big Ten in 1958 and 1959 and All Scholastic team in 1957-58-59 . . . During career at OSU carried total of 430 times for 1494 yards and was thrown for loss only one time . . . Hails from Covington, Kentucky . . . Wears glasses off the field . . . Married.

BILL ROACH

Tackle

6'5" . . . 240 lbs. . . . T.C.U.

Three year veteran of T.C.U.'s powerhouse . . . Will be used on offense by Oilers . . . Shoulder injury hampered him in sophomore year with Horned Frogs . . . Played football and basketball in high school and did amateur boxing . . . Home town is Fort Worth, Texas.

JACK LEE

Quarterback

6' . . . 187 lbs. . . . Cincinnati

The nation's No. 2 passer in 1959 when he tossed the pigskin for 2814 yards . . . Named to All-Missouri Valley Conference first team in 1958 and 1959 . . . Completed 30 of 57 passes for Bearcats' freshman team in '56 after winning high school letters in football, baseball and basketball in Akron, Ohio . . . Completed 25 of 52 tosses in '57 for 328 yards and scored two touchdowns . . . Connected with 71 of 130 '58 pass attempts for 951 yards and five TDs and scored 16 points . . . Nicknamed the "General" . . . Played in Senior Bowl and North-South game . . . Now makes his home in Boise, Idaho.

CLEATUS DRINNON

Center

6'4" . . . 210 lbs. . . . Hardin-Simmons

Played six-man football in high school at Weinert, Texas, and played three years of varsity ball at Hardin-Simmons . . . Rugged two-way player is nicknamed "Chief."

HALL WHITLEY

Center and Linebacker

6'2" . . . 225 lbs. . . . Texas A & M

A veteran of three seasons in the Canadian Western Interprovincial Football Union . . . Played with Winnipeg Blue Bombers in 1957 and part of '58 when he was traded to Vancouver Lions . . . Played for Lions again last season . . . From Kingston, Texas . . . Completed college career in 1956 with Texas A & I.

JERRY HELLUIN

Tackle . . . Born August 8, 1929

6'2" . . . 275 lbs. . . . Tulane

Veteran of eight seasons in the National Football League with the Cleveland Browns and Green Bay Packers . . . Was Cleveland's third draft choice in 1951 after completing varsity career at Tulane . . . Played end, guard and tackle in college . . . Traded by Browns to Packers in 1955 and played in Green Bay through '59 . . . Played defensive tackle for Packers . . . From Donaldsville, La., now lives in Houma, La. . . . First name is Francis . . . Married and is father of twin girls.

CHARLEY MILSTEAD

Quarterback **6'2" . . . 190 lbs. . . . Texas A & M**
Earned three varsity letters at Texas A & M . . . Was cover boy on 1959 NCAA Football Guide . . . An all-around backfield star, passes, rushes and kicks . . . In 1957 completed 14 of 35 aerials for 185 yards and converted all six of his PAT attempts . . . Finished fourth in nation in total offense in 1958 with 1332 yards . . . Ranked fifth among major college passers with 88 completions in 167 attempts for 1135 air yards . . . Twice named to All-Southwest Conference team, 1958-59 . . . Holds nine Aggie records including career total of 2072 yards passing . . . From Tyler, Texas . . . Was 14th choice of Washington Redskins in this year's NFL draft.

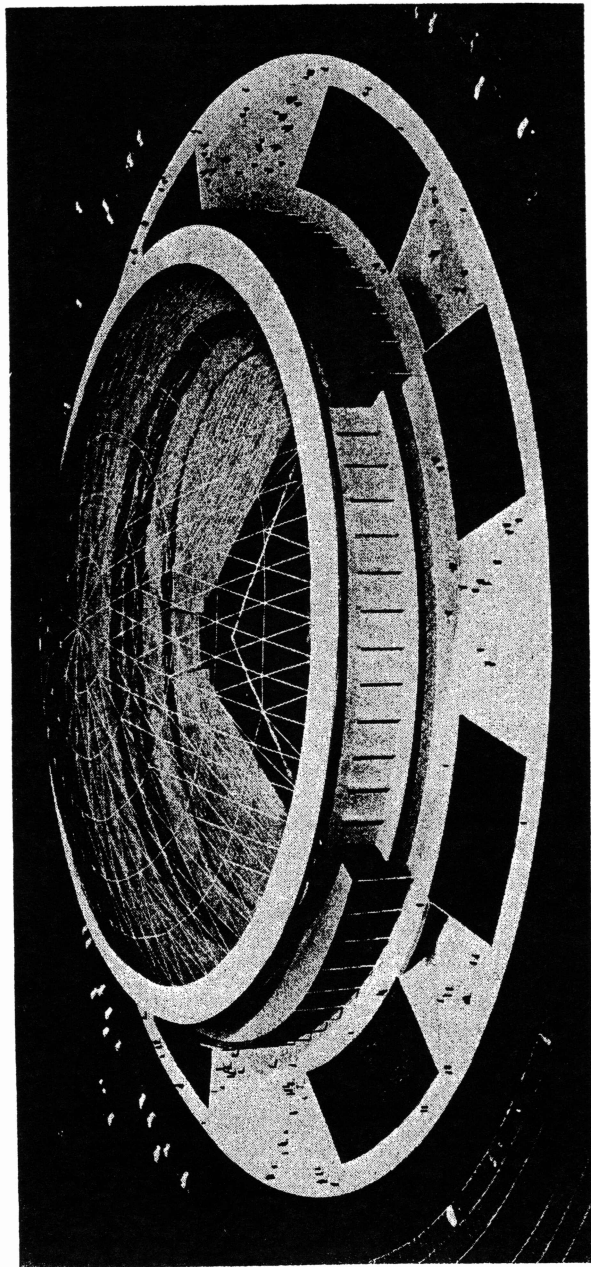
JIM MORSE

End and Halfback **5'11" . . . 190 lbs. . . . Notre Dame**
Selected as a future pick by the Green Bay Packers in the 13th round of the 1956 National Football League draft . . . Was captain of the 1956 Notre Dame eleven . . . In 1955, caught 17 passes for 424 yards and in 92 carries added 400 yards while scoring six touchdowns . . . Scored three TDs in '56; caught 20 passes for 442 yards; carried 20 times for 76 yards and completed five of seven passes for 63 yards . . . Had total of 12 TDs and one PAT for 73 points with Fighting Irish . . . Signed with Calgary Stampeders of Canadian Western Interprovincial Football Union in '57 . . . Also played for Stampeders in '58 and '59 . . . Home town is Muskegon, Michigan . . . In '57 he scored five touchdowns for the Stampeders.

GARY O'STEEN

Fullback and Halfback **5'11" . . . 180 lbs. . . . Alabama**
Played all backfield posts during varsity career at University of Alabama . . . From Anniston, Alabama, where he starred in football and baseball in high school . . . In 1958 he carried for 284 yards in 79 tries and caught seven passes for 159 yards . . . Scored 20 points on three touchdowns and one PAT (pass-play) . . . Intercepted three enemy passes and was Crimson Tide's top punt and kick-off return man . . . Also handled punting chores . . . Led Alabama's ground attack last season and was among team's top receivers . . . Played on 'Bama's baseball team . . . His brother, Henry, is an end on this year's Alabama team.

OILERS' BUSY STADIUM

At Jeppesen Stadium, home of the Houston Oilers, there will be 53 football games played this fall, an average of four for each week of the football season.

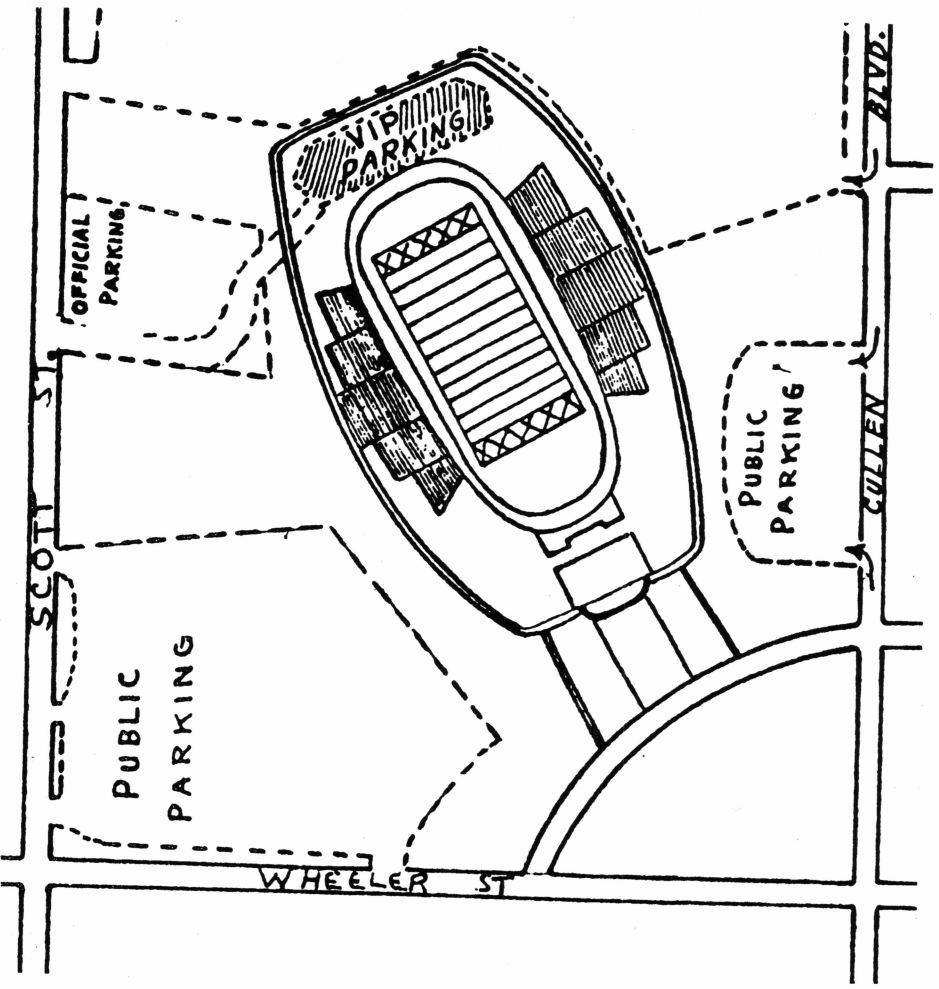
Except on Sundays, when the Oilers play, the concrete seating spaces will more than accommodate the turnouts (mainly for high school games). Bud Adams is the man being thanked for this, for the Oiler owner voluntarily expanded the capacity of the public schools stadium by 64 per cent, increasing it from 22,000 to 36,000, at a cost to his team budget of \$250,000.

It was a high price, but Jeppesen Stadium will allow the Oilers to have a home until Houston has a new all-purpose stadium available for pro football.

Adams came across Jeppesen Stadium when his bid for 70,000-capacity Rice Stadium was firmly turned down. Jeppesen, built in 1942, became Adams' only hope, but its 22,000 capacity wasn't enough for a financial break-even point even if completely sold out.

Adams negotiated, forked up a quarter of a million dollars for a 14,000 seat expansion project, and was given rental rights at \$4,000 per game. Concessions and parking fees go to the Houston school system.

Not the ideal stadium, Jeppesen will serve the Oilers well until others are available.
