- The Start**
July 9, 1932
George P. Marshall heads syndicate (Vincent Bendix, Jay O'Brien, M. Dorland Doyle) that buys National Football League franchise for Boston, Mass. They contract to play in Braves Field, home of National Baseball League team—and are called "The Braves."
- The Name**
July 8, 1933
The Boston gridders move to Fenway Park, home of American League Red Sox, and "The Braves" become "The Redskins."
- The Franchise**
Feb. 13, 1937
National Football League approves transfer of Boston Redskins franchise to Washington, D. C.
- The Band**
Aug. 9, 1937
The famed Redskins Band founded. First of its kind.
- Westward Ho!**
Aug. 2, 1939
Redskins set forth on first coast-to-coast football training trip. Training site: Eastern State Normal School in Cheney, Washington.
- California**
Aug. 18, 1941
Redskins bring pro football on large scale for first time to California. Establish training quarters in San Diego at Brown Military Academy.
- To a T**
July 30, 1944
Redskins abandon their double-wing formation and adopt the T-formation.
- Times Game**
Sept. 6, 1946
First Annual Redskins-Rams game for benefit of Los Angeles Times Charities, Inc. Draws 68,188 to Memorial Coliseum. NETS Times Boys Club \$96,711.23.
- High Note**
June 13, 1947
Redskins Band performs at Philadelphia Inquirer's Famed Festival of Music alongside Whiteman, Waring and the Philharmonic.
- First on TV**
June 14, 1950
American Oil announces plans to televise all Redskins games—no other pro team on TV.
- Baugh-to-Bach**
Oct. 10, 1954
Dr. Howard Mitchell leads his National Symphony Orchestra at mid-field in a half-time show.
- The Alumni**
Oct. 15, 1958
Redskins Alumni Association organized. Twenty-three former players residing here adopt formal constitution and by-laws and invite all non-resident ex-Redskins to join for the welfare of all.
- Here to Stay**
Dec. 24, 1959
Redskins sign 30-year lease to play in proposed D.C. Stadium and Congress gives go-ahead to build.

- New Home**
Oct. 1, 1961 First game in new D. C. Stadium draws 36,767. Redskins fail to hold 21-0 lead, Giants win 24-21.
- Business Blitz**
Fall 1964 Redskins sell out all games in new D. C. Stadium.
- Graham Era**
Jan. 25, 1966 Redskins appoint former Cleveland star, Otto Graham, as head coach and general manager.
- Lombardi Hired**
Feb. 7, 1969 The unbelievable happened — Vince Lombardi left Green Bay to become head coach of the Redskins.
- Death claims Lombardi**
Sept. 3, 1970 The sports world was grieved by the death of Vincent T. Lombardi, Head Coach and Executive Vice President of the Redskins.
- Allen Hired**
Jan. 6, 1971 George Allen, winningest coach in the National Football Conference, accepts head coaching job of Redskins and is also named General Manager.
- A New Home**
June 2, 1971 Groundbreaking ceremonies for Redskins new home, Redskin Park near Dulles Airport.
- Most Wins Ever**
1972 In only his second year, George Allen led Redskins to most wins in history of team — eleven.
- Jurgensen retires**
May 1, 1975 Redskin quarterback Sonny Jurgensen retires after playing for 18 seasons in the NFL, 11 in a Redskin uniform.
- Death claims Milton King**
Jan. 23, 1976 Milton King, vice president and treasurer of the Redskins, dies at the age of 85.

THE GLORY ROAD . . .

- First Victory**
Sept. 16, 1937 The First Game! Thursday night opener draws 19,941 fans to flood-lighted Griffith Stadium. Riley Smith scores on 60-yard run with interception, two field goals and extra point. Redskins 13, Giants 3.
- First Title**
Dec. 5, 1937 First big invasion of New York. Ten thousand feather-wearing fans stomp up Broadway behind brass band. Sam Baugh completes 11 of 15, Cliff Battles runs 75 and 76 yards for TDs, Giants routed, 49-14, for Eastern Championship.

- World Champs!**
Dec. 12, 1937
Freezing weather, frozen field, icy-nerved Bears can't stop Baugh. Completes 17 of 33 for 335 yds and 3 TDs. Wayne Millner, the all-time Notre Dame great, escapes with nine for 160 yds . . . including 77 and 55-yd TD sprints.
- Zero Hour**
Oct. 1, 1939
Only scoreless tie in Redskin history as Giants are battled in mud and rain.
- Record Pass**
Oct. 15, 1939
From kick formation, standing deep in end zone, Frank Filchock flips pass to Andy Farkas who goes all the way for touchdown. Longest pass play in National League history . . . 99 yards.
- Eastern Champs**
Dec. 1, 1940
Miniature-sized Davy O'Brien of Eagles completes 33 passes in 60 attempts, but Redskins win 13 - 6 to clinch Eastern Championship.
- 73-to-Ohhh!**
Dec. 8, 1940
Redskins get more first downs than Bears in World Championship Game at Griffith Stadium.
- Title Escapes**
Nov. 23, 1941
Fifty seconds to go in this Eastern Championship Game, Redskins hold 13 - 10 lead. But Giants get field goal and touchdown to win, 20 - 13.
- Only Loss**
Sept. 27, 1942
Giants don't make first down, gain only ONE yard rushing, complete just ONE pass . . . but it's good for TD; then they capture another TD on interception . . . and we suffer our only 1942 defeat, 14 - 7.
- World Champs!**
Dec. 13, 1942
Bears take early lead on errant pass from center. But Sam Baugh's 85-yd quick kick sets them back on their heels. Wilbur Moore then makes vital interception and follows with sensational catch for 38-yd TD. Andy Farkas caps victory by carrying ball 10 of 12 times on 80-yd TD tour. Score: 14 - 6.
- Champs Again!**
Dec. 19, 1943
After two straight losses, Redskins bounce back in Eastern Title playoff game to thrash Giants 28 - 0.
- Untitled**
Dec. 26, 1943
Sam Baugh suffers concussion early tackling Sid Luckman on punt return and Bears go on to win, 41 - 21.
- Eastern Champs**
Dec. 9, 1945
Second straight shutout (Steelers 0 - 24 Dec 2) vs Giants today, 17 - 0, wins Eastern title.
- Post Mortems**
Dec. 16, 1945
In subzero weather, Redskins lose world title to Rams, 15 - 14, on incredibly freakish plays. Baugh's pass from end zone hits goal-post for safety (no longer allowed); and Waterfield's try-for-point hits crossbar and bounces over.
- Champs Trumped**
Nov. 23, 1947
Fans give auto to Sam Baugh who thanks them with 6 TD tosses, routing champion Cards, 45 - 21.

- TD Torrent**
Oct. 1, 1955
- Twenty-one points in 137 seconds! Eagles lead 16 - 0 in 3rd quarter. Brito recovers fumble on their 32 and LeBaron passes to Janowicz for TD. Thomas recovers kick-off in end zone for TD. Torgeson recovers fumble on Eagles 13. Janowicz goes over. Redskins win, 31 - 30.
- Colts Corraled**
Nov. 8, 1959
- World Champion Colts nipped in final 11 seconds by Sam Baker's 46-yd field goal.
- 4 of a Kind**
Dec. 17, 1961
- Dick James scores 4 TDs to set Redskins single game scoring record in 34 - 24 win over Dallas.
- Spring Time**
1964
- Redskins stun public by trading QB Norman Snead to Eagles for veteran QB Sonny Jurgensen. Then repeat the performance, shipping favorite Dick James to N.Y. for Sam Huff.
- A Sunny Day**
Oct. 11, 1964
- Sonny Jurgensen out-duels Norm Snead by pitching four TD's against the Eagles in the first meeting of the TRADED quarterbacks.
- Indians Scalp 'em**
Nov. 28, 1965
- Sonny Jurgensen sparks greatest comeback win in Redskin history. Down 21-0, Redskins record 34-31 victory over the Cowboys as Sonny passes for over 400 yds and 3 TDs.
- TD Jamboree**
Nov. 27, 1966
- The Redskins score the most points in NFL history as they tie or set many team and league records in routing New York, 72-41.
- Pass-Catch Records, 1967**
- Sonny Jurgensen sets new Redskin and NFL passing records for most attempts, completions, and yards. Receivers Charley Taylor, Jerry Smith and Bobby Mitchell finish 1, 2, and 4 in the league; highest ever by receivers on same team.
- A Winning Season**
Dec. 14, 1969
- Redskins defeat New Orleans by score of 17-14 to insure their first winning season since 1955. Victory also kept Coach Lombardi's record of never having coached a losing NFL team intact.
- A New Hero**
Dec. 13, 1970
- Larry Brown, on second offensive play of game with Eagles and needing 4 yards to break the 1000 yard barrier, takes handoff from Sonny Jurgensen and gains 12 yards to become the first Redskin in history to become a member of the 1000 yard club.
- NFL Rushing Leader**
Dec. 20, 1970
- Larry Brown, gaining 44 yards against the Cardinals, ends the season as the top rusher in the NFL with a total of 1125 yards in 237 attempts for a 4.7 avg. He is the first Redskin to win an NFL rushing title.
- Future Is Now**
1971
- Allen guided Redskins to most wins, 9, in 29 years with 9-4-1 record. First time in 26 years Redskins gained championship playoff game.

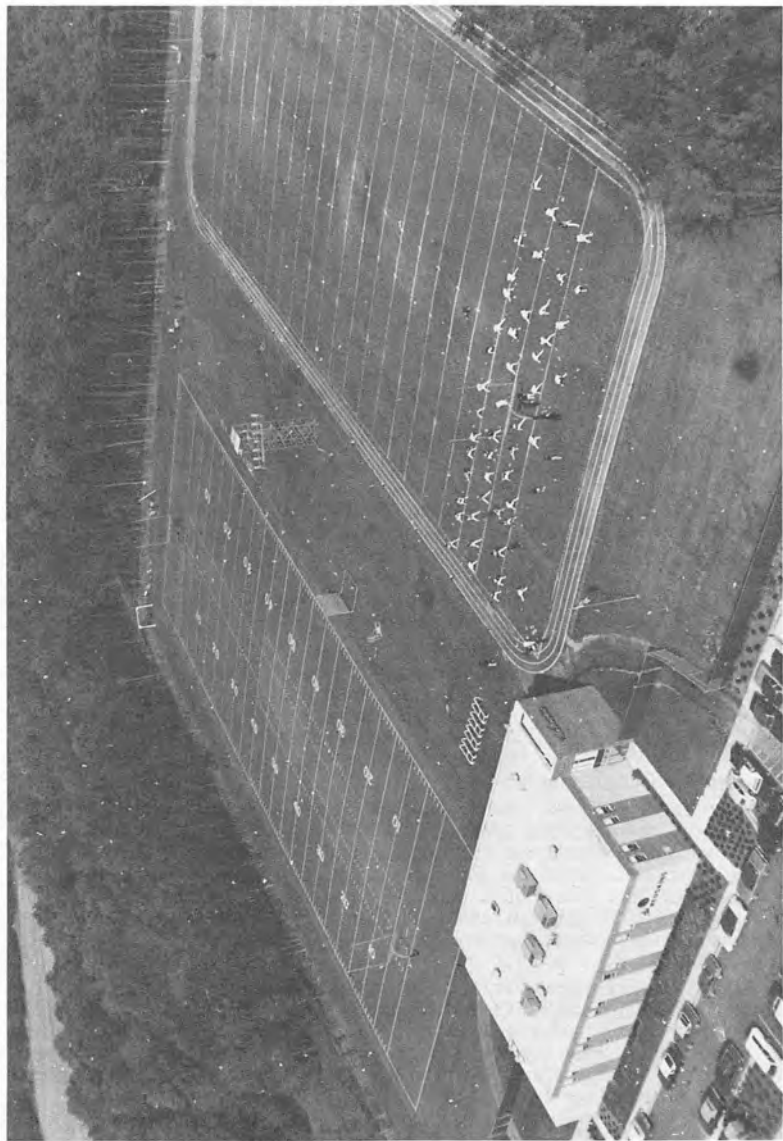

The Coaching Staff

GEORGE ALLEN

VICE PRESIDENT, GENERAL MANAGER and HEAD COACH

Sixth Year with Redskins. Became Head Coach of the Redskins January '71.

George Allen begins his sixth season as head coach of the Redskins hoping to bring a playoff berth back to the Nation's Capital after it eluded him in 1975. Allen's five year record of 48-21-1 makes Allen the winningest coach in Redskin history. He needs only three more victories to reach the '100 win mark' as he enters his eleventh year as a head coach in the N.F.L.

In 1971, Allen led the team to a 9-4-1 record. This was Washington's best record in 29 years. It earned the Redskins the "Wild Card" berth and their first playoff championship game in 26 years, 1945.

In 1972, enroute to their first appearance in the Super Bowl, Allen bettered his first year record with a regular season mark of 11 wins and 3 losses. This was the most wins in the 36-year history of the Redskins. The previous high was 31 years ago, 1942, when they had a 10-1-0 mark.

In 1973, the Redskins finished the season as NFC Eastern Division "Co-champions" with Dallas. Both had 10-4-0 records. The Cowboys earned the NFC title because of the 34-21 point advantage in the two-game competition. The Redskins earned the "Wild Card" spot in the NFC and played Minnesota, the Central Division Champion.

In 1974 Redskins finished the regular season as NFC Eastern Division "Co-champions" with St. Louis. Both had 10-4 records; however, the Cardinals defeated the Redskins twice during the regular season, giving the Cardinals the Eastern Division Championship. The Redskins gained the "Wild Card" spot in the NFC and played Los Angeles, the Western Division Champion.

Never in the 38-year history of the Redskins have they played in four consecutive championship games. The 10-4-0 record in 1974 also represents the fourth consecutive year the Redskins have had a winning season. It has been since 1945 the Redskins came off with a string of winning years. They had consecutive winning seasons from their first year in Washington, 1937 through 1945. They had not even put two winning seasons together since that era until Allen's arrival and four winning ledgers in a row.

Allen, whose ten-year record of 97 wins, 38 losses and 5 ties (.719) is among the best in the NFC, had his tenth consecutive winning mark with his fifth straight winning year as head coach of the Redskins and the five at Los Angeles. With the Redskins, he has won 48, lost 21 and had one tie. With the Rams, his five-year total was 49-17-4, making him the winningest coach in Ram history.

As NFC East "Co-champions," Allen kept intact his high division finishes each of his ten years. His first year, 1966, he finished third; 1967,

first; 1968, second; 1969, first; 1970, second; 1971, second; 1972, first; 1973, tied for first; 1974, tied for first and 1975, third.

The Eastern Division "Co-championship" is the third for the Redskins in 29 years. Prior to that, the last division title was in 1945, when they finished with an 8-2-0 record and lost to the Rams for the title, 15-14. Their last world title was in 1942 when they finished the regular season with a 10-1-0 mark and won the world title with a 14-6 win over the Bears.

The Super Bowl World Championship game was preceded in 1971 during his first year by winning a spot in the National Football League playoffs with the second best record in the NFC, 9-4-1. This was the first time in the era of modern professional football that a Redskin team was involved in a championship playoff since 1945. The nine wins in 1971 were the most for a Redskin team in 29 years. The 11-3-0 record in 1972 represents the most wins in Redskin history. The nine wins in 1971 were the most since 1942. Since that winning season, before Allen came, the Redskins had only six winning seasons and two break-even years.

Also, it was 30 years ago that the Redskins won a title game at home, before the 16-3 playoff victory over the Central Division Champion Green Bay Packers and the 26-3 victory for the NFC Championship over the defending World Champion Dallas Cowboys.

The playoff game with the Vikings in 1973 was the fifth appearance of an Allen team in championship playoff games in his eight years as a head coach. The Rams were in playoff games twice; 1967, losing to Green Bay, 27-7; and 1969, losing to the Vikings, 23-20. In 1971, his first season in Washington, they took the "Wild Card" playoff game to San Francisco and lost, 24-20. In 1972, he won the NFC championship by winning over Green Bay, 16-3 and Dallas, 26-3. In the Super Bowl, Miami took a 14-7 decision. In 1973, the Redskins lost a 27-20 decision to the Vikings. In 1974, in his fourth consecutive playoff year, the Rams came from behind to beat the Redskins, 19-10.

The phenomenal turnabout with a team that had only one winning season during the previous 15 years before he took over, won for him, "Coach of the Year" honors both years. Again in 1972, for his taking the Redskins to the Super Bowl, he was voted both "NFL" and "NFC" Coach of the Year honors by various organizations. This marked the third time in his nine-year head coaching career that he had been so honored. He was Coach of the Year in 1967, his second year as head coach of the Rams.

In his five years at Los Angeles, Allen led the Rams to a third place division finish in 1966; first in 1967; second in 1968; first in 1969; and second in 1970. His eleven wins, one loss and two ties in 1967 was the best season record in the history of the Rams. They played Conference title games against Green Bay and Minnesota. In two playoff bowls, they defeated Cleveland, 1968, and Dallas in 1970. Following the 31-0 win over the Cowboys, the Orange Bowl Committee gave Allen and the team a plaque congratulating them for their overall excellence and performance.

Allen went to Los Angeles in 1966 after the Rams had recorded seven consecutive losing seasons. The 1965 team had a 4-10 record. Allen quickly turned it all around as he won 8 and lost 6 in his first year as a professional head coach.

In 1967 Allen brought the Rams the best record in the history of the team with 11 wins, 1 loss and 2 ties. He was named "Coach of the Year" by UPI, The Sporting News and the Washington Touchdown Club, as well as "Co-coach of the Year" by the Associated Press for leading the team to its all-time winning mark. The overall record in '67, including pre-season, season, and playoff games was a fantastic 18-2-2 mark. The 1973 Rams set a new winning record with their 12-2-0 finish.

In 1968, Allen led the Rams to a second place finish to NFL Champion Baltimore. In 1969, they won the crown again, but lost the Western title to Minnesota. Then came a second place finish in 1970. Allen's overall (5-year) Ram record was 49 wins, 17 losses and 4 ties, for percentage of .700.

Allen, author of 7 books, began his pro coaching career with the Rams in 1957, after nine years at Morningside (Iowa) and Whittier (California). In 1958, he was beckoned by the Bears' George Halas to join his staff, and did, as the Bears' number one defensive coordinator. He proceeded to mold the Chicago defense into one of the best throughout the eight years he headed the Bears' defensive unit.

The height of his defensive coaching came following the Bears' NFL championship victory over New York in 1963. Assistant coach George Allen was presented the game ball by the Chicago players. The title win was attributed to the stout Bear defense that stopped the potent Giant offense.

Allen was born April 29, 1922, in Detroit, Michigan and attended Lake Shore High, where he earned nine letters; three in football, three in basketball and three in track. He was captain and all-conference in basketball.

In 1943 and 1944, under V-12 Naval Programs, he attended Alma College and played end. He moved on to Marquette University in 1944 and again played as a receiver. He completed his undergraduate work at the University of Michigan and was a member of the wrestling and baseball teams. He received his B.A. and M.A. from Michigan in 1947 and 1948, where he was a member of Sigma Delta Psi, national honorary athletic and scholarship fraternity. He also did graduate work on his doctorate at the University of Southern California.

On May 13, 1973, he was invited back to Morningside College, Sioux City, Iowa (site of first head coaching job), to accept an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

Allen has also initiated three scholarships, at Morningside College, Gallaudet, the nation's leading school for the deaf, in Washington; and a scholarship for an Indian youth. He started issuance of the Gallaudet scholarship in 1973 and has continued the award in 1974 and 1975. Those for Morningside and the Indian youth were started in 1974. The Indian youth scholarship is co-sponsored with the Washington Touchdown Club. He also is active in many community affairs and contributes much of his time to special projects. For the fifth straight year, this spring, he was chairman of the Metropolitan Summer Jobs for Needy Youth Campaign. At its end, over 32,000 summer jobs were obtained for area youths, the most in the country. Under his chairmanship, the Washington campaign led the nation during the last five years.

Pro Career: In only his second year of pro football, led the NFL in rushing and became the first Redskin in history to rush for over 1000 yards. His totals were 1,125 yards in 237 attempts, a 4.75 average, with 5 TDs. Also caught 37 passes for 341 yards, a 9.2 average with 2 TDs. Despite injuries resulting in missing one complete game, Brown rushed for 100 yards or more in six games for the season total of 1,125 yards. The old Redskin rushing record of 951 yards was set by Rob Goode in 1951.

In his rookie year, Brown finished as the league's fourth leading rusher gaining 888 yards and catching 34 passes for 302 yards. He just missed "Rookie of the Year" honors which were won by the Cowboys' Calvin Hill. He had three over 100 yard games in 1969.

Brown was selected to, started and starred in, the Pro Bowl his first 4 years. 888, 1125, 948, 1216, 860, 430 — total: 5467. These are Brown's rushing figures for his 6 years. He is now 3rd among active NFC rushers. The one over-100 yard game in 1973 gives a total of 19. The 253 carries in 1971 were the most by a NFC ball carrier.

Brown won the 1972 NFC rushing crown with his 1216 yards. He lost the NFL rushing title to O. J. Simpson by 35 yards. Brown did not play in the final two games against Dallas and Buffalo. His 1216 yards was a new Redskin record. The previous record was his 1125 yards in 1970 when he won the NFL rushing title and became the first Redskin in history to make the elite 1,000 Yard Club. His 285 carries is also a new Redskin record for most rushes in a season.

Brown, NFL "Player of the Year" in 1972, closed out the 1973 season with four touchdowns against Philadelphia, 3 receiving and one rushing. This gave him a season total of 14, 8 rushing and 6 receiving. This ranked him number one in most touchdowns scored in the National Football League for the year. The 4 touchdowns also tied a single game record of most touchdowns a game. Dickie James had four in 1961. Brown's former high was seven in 1970, 5 rushing and 2 receiving.

In the 1973 season final against the Eagles, Brown rushed for 150 yards and had 105 yards on 3 TD pass receptions for 255 total yards. This was his all-time best total yard game.

Brown became only the third man in NFL history to gain more than 5000 yards rushing in his first five seasons. He had 5037 yards to rank 3rd among active rushers. Jimmy Brown had 6463 yards in his first five seasons while O. J. Simpson made his five-year total of 5181 last year.

His six-year 5467 rushing yards ranks him 3rd among the NFC active rushers. Ken Willard and Bill Brown are first and second.

He rushed over 100 yards once in 1973 to give him 19 for his career. He also rushed for 101 yards in the playoff game against the Packers in 1972 and 115 against the Vikings in 1973.

In 1974 Brown suffered a knee injury and started only ten regular season games. He did lead the team in rushing with 430 yards and total yardage with 818 yards. However, this marked the first time in his career that he didn't exceed 1000 total yards in a season. Last year Brown was switched to fullback for the first time in his career. He still ranks second among active rushers in the NFC with 5819 yards, behind Larry Csonka of the Giants.

Did not play in 1963 due to serious injuries suffered in automobile accident, nor did he play in 1965. Selected by Saints in 1967 expansion draft and earned starting job at opening of season. Known for determination and fortitude. Named NFL offensive player of week by AP in 1969.

For the Redskins in 1971, Kilmer led the team to its finest season in 29 years. He took over for the injured Jurgensen in the final pre-season game against the Bengals. For his outstanding performances, Kilmer was voted "Most Valuable Redskin, 1971," by his teammates. He also was honored by the Philadelphia sportswriters when they gave him the highly coveted "Most Courageous Athlete of the Year" award. He was fourth in the balloting for NFL Player of the Year award.

His best day was against the Rams as he led the 38-24 win hitting on 14 of 19 passes for 240 yards and 3 touchdowns, clinching a playoff berth. He won the "Offensive Player of the Week" award by Associated Press.

BILLY KILMER — continued

For the season, he finished third in the NFC and sixth in the NFL combined rating. His 13 interceptions was 4th fewest in the NFC.

After taking the Redskins in 1971 to their best season in 29 years and into the NFC Playoffs, Kilmer directed the Redskins to the Super Bowl in 1972 and most wins, 11, in the club's history.

He opened the '72 campaign and quarterbacked the first 3 games. Jurgensen then returned and led the Redskins to wins over Philadelphia, St. Louis and Dallas. In the opening offensive series of the seventh game against the Giants in Yankee Stadium, Jurgensen suffered a ruptured achilles tendon and was lost for the season.

Kilmer returned to lead the Redskins to six straight wins and the NFC Playoff win over Green Bay and the NFC championship over Dallas. He finished the season as the fourth ranked passer in the NFC, and fifth among NFL passers. He ranks sixth among the NFC's active passers.

His 19 TD passes were the most in the NFC and tied with the Jets' Joe Namath as the most in the NFL.

In the four years with the Redskins, Kilmer has won 31 regular season games as quarterback. He was the QB in 9 losses. In playoff and title games, he has won two and lost three. His two wins were in 1972 to get the Redskins into Super Bowl VII over Green Bay and Dallas. His losses were in the playoff game in 1971 at San Francisco, 1973 at Minnesota and 1974 at Los Angeles.

He had one of his finest games in the championship win over the Cowboys as he hit on 14 of 18 for 194 yards and two touchdowns, both to Charley Taylor. Against Green Bay, he was 7 of 14 for 100 yards and one scoring pass to Roy Jefferson.

Kilmer was intercepted but 11 times in 1972, fewest among ranked passers in the NFC. The 7.43 yards gained per pass was the best in the NFC.

In 1973, he ranked 5th in the NFC and 8th in the NFL. Kilmer did not play in the third, fourth and fifth games in 1973. He returned to the lineup in the sixth game and led the Redskins to their third consecutive playoff championship game. He did, however, miss the second Dallas game because of an ankle injury. He returned to lead the team to a big season final game against the Eagles although he had spent three days in the hospital due to a stomach blockage. Following the Eagle game, he returned to the hospital and remained until Friday as the team prepared for the Viking playoff game. He rejoined the team and started the championship game and played exceptionally well. He underwent surgery for correction of the blockage.

In 1974, he ranked third among passers in the NFC, starting ten regular season games. He completed 58.5 percent of his passes, which was his top mark in his thirteen year career. The only games he missed were the fifth game against Miami, seventh game against St. Louis and the last game against Chicago.

BILLY KILMER — continued

Last year Kilmer threw 23 touchdown passes, a career high, despite missing the Cardinal game at St. Louis and the Eagle game at RFK. For the second consecutive year Kilmer ranked third among NFC passers.

Kilmer's 13-year totals rank him 5th among active passers in the NFC.

Selected No. 9 in the 1964 draft.**Notable:** He has caught more touchdowns (58) than any other tight end in NFL history.**Pro Career:** Took over for Pres Carpenter at tight end after Carpenter's injury in Eagle game 1965. Started last five games. Fifth top receiver with 18 catches for 257 yards and 2 touchdowns. Recovered 2 opponents' fumbles. no return.

In 1966, Smith finished as the top receiver in the league among the tight ends with 54 catches, 686 yards and 6 touchdowns. He started the season as the number one split end, then was involved in the "big switch" that sent him to tight end and brought Charley Taylor from the backfield to split end. As split end, during the first six games, Smith caught 16 for 162 yards, 1 TD.

In 1967 Smith's 67 receptions were the most ever in the NFL by a tight end, and his 12 touchdown catches tied him for leadership in most TD receptions by a Tight End with Mike Ditka, who caught 12 for the Bears in 1961. It also tied him with teammate Charley Taylor for the Redskin mark, 12. Smith's second place finish to Taylor was the closest a tight end has ever come to winning the pass receiving title.

In 1968, Smith played all season as flanker when he caught 45 passes, 9th best in the league.

For 1969's unanimous All-Pro tight end Smith, his 54 receptions and 9 touchdown catches represented the best by the League's tight ends. It was also the 4th consecutive year he finished in the top ten pass leaders of the NFL. His three TD receptions against Dallas marked the second time in his career that he has caught three. He caught three against the Rams in 1967.

In 1970, Smith finished as the Redskins leading receiver with 43 catches for 575 yards and 9 TDs, most in NFC by a tight end.

In 1971, an aggravating groin injury kept him out 5 games and he finished with only 16 receptions, 1 TD, his lowest career output.

In 1972, he had 21 for 353 yards and seven touchdowns. The seven scores were the most caught by a tight end in the NFC and second highest in the NFL.

In 1973, he suffered four fractured back vertebrae in the second pre-season game against Denver. He returned the fifth league game against the Giants. Was scoreless for the first year in his nine years in the NFL.

In 1974, Smith managed to stay injury-free and responded with 44 receptions which was his best total since he was the NFL's top tight end receiver in 1969 with 54 catches. His 44 receptions also ranked second in the NFC among tight ends.

Last year Smith caught 3 more TD passes giving him 348 points which ranks second among active receivers in the NFC behind teammate Charley Taylor (540).

Became Redskin: Dec. 2, 1963, Redskins No. 1 draft choice for 1964.

Notable: His 53 receptions on way to 1964 Rookie of Year honors set new NFL record for most receptions by a running back in the NFL at that time. The new record set by ex-teammate Charley Harraway, 55 catches in 1969, leaves him currently in second place.

Pro Career: 1964 Rookie of the Year, first Redskin to win this honor. First rookie since 1943 to be in top ten, rushing and receiving—6th rushing; 8th receiving. All-Pro and Pro Bowl selection first four years in the league, Taylor won the pass receiving title for 1966, catching 72 passes for 1119 yards and 12 touchdowns. He repeated in 1967 as top NFL receiver with 70 for 990 yards and 9 TDs. The 72 receptions tied the Redskin season record held by Bobby Mitchell. Taylor was part of the "big switch" midway through the 1966 season. The Redskins' finest running back was moved to split-end. The switch came in the seventh game against St. Louis. It was late in the first quarter that

CHARLEY TAYLOR — continued

Taylor surprised and left his halfback post and went outside. Before the switch, from his halfback spot, Taylor caught 18 passes for 348 yards and 4 scores. Seven games later, he finished as the league leader. His 12 TDs by receptions tied him with Hugh "Bones" Taylor for most touchdowns by receptions for a Redskin and his total of 15 set a new Redskin touchdown mark for a season. Against Dallas in the first game, Taylor caught 11 passes to tie Mitchell's mark for most receptions in a game. He caught passes for more than 100 yards in five games. He had 4 in 1967.

The 1-2-4 finish by Taylor, Smith and Mitchell in 1967 marked the first time in the history of the NFL that three receivers on the same team finished that high, and the combined 197 receptions was the most by a threesome in the top-finisners, ever. The finish in 1967 was even more phenomenal since Taylor missed three games because of an injury and Mitchell was running back for five games, from the second through the sixth game. Taylor led the team in receptions again in 1968 with 48, 7th in the NFL.

In 1969, after Mitchell retired at the beginning of the season, Taylor placed second in the league with 71 receptions for 883 yards and 8 touchdowns. Going into the final game of 1969 he was tied with the winner, the Saints' Danny Abramowicz, who finished with 73.

Taylor ranked in the top ten receivers each of his first six years in the league and was well up among the leads in 1970 until an injury suffered in the third quarter of the 10th game of the season against Dallas on Nov. 22nd sidelined him for the remainder of the season. His season total was still 42 catches for 593 yards and eight touchdowns.

Taylor broke two Redskin records in 1970. He supplanted Hugh Taylor for most touchdowns, lifetime, with 61. The old record was 58 (all on passes). Charley scored 50 TDs on passes, 11 by rushing. He also replaced Bobby Mitchell in the category of Most Pass Catches, lifetime. Taylor totaled 396 catches for 5,615 yards and 50 TDs. Mitchell's old record was 392 receptions for 6,480 yards and 49 TDs.

In 1971, he added to this record although sidelined for the second season in a row. He suffered a fractured ankle in Kansas City as he was scoring his second touchdown of the game near half-time. He was out the rest of the season. The TD catch was his 7th in the half to give the Redskins a 17-6 half-time lead. In 5½ games, he caught 24 for 370 yards and 4 scores. Had 2 over 100-yard games.

He was the Redskins' leading receiver in 1972 with 49 receptions, 673 yards and seven touchdowns. In 1973 he again led the Redskin receivers with his 59 catches. This was second in both the NFL and the NFC. In 1974 he had another fine year with 54 receptions which ranked him 4th in the NFC.

Taylor is the No. 1 Pass Receiver in the National Football League. His 635 career catches moved him into first place among all-time (career) reception leaders.

He has scored 90 touchdowns in his 11-year career and is the 10th player in NFL history to score at least 500 points on touchdowns. He has scored 74 receiving and 11 rushing. He ranks 6th among the top ten active scorers in the NFC with 540 points.

CHARLEY TAYLOR — continued

Taylor's 90 career touchdowns place him 10th on the NFL's all-time TD list. He needs 10 more to join the elite trio of Jim Brown (126), Lenny Moore (113), and Don Hutson (105) as the only players in the NFL to score more than 100 TDs in their careers.

He has gained 8,952 yards and scored 79 touchdowns on his 635 catches. In addition, while a running back for 2½ years, he has 1,489 yards and 11 TDs rushing, plus 133 yards on five kickoff returns, 63 yards on five punt returns and nine yards on fumble returns. His combined total offense is 10,441 yards and 90 touchdowns.

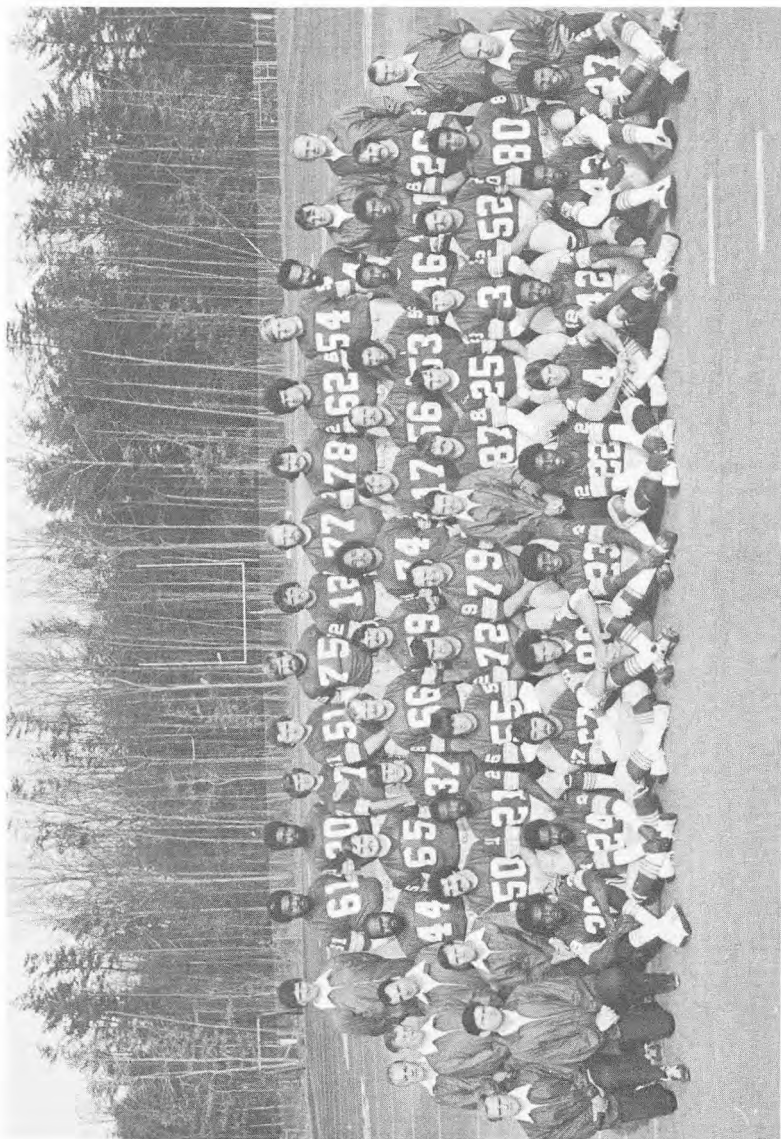

Undefeated Miami cooled off the Redskins attack and the Dolphins became Super Bowl champions with the first undefeated season by any NFL team since the 1941 Chicago Bears.

Both Dallas and the Redskins finished the regular season with identical 10-4 records, but because of the point differential, in head-to-head play, the Redskins were assigned the NFC "wild card" berth.

The Redskins played the Minnesota Vikings in Bloomington, Minnesota and were led by quarterback Billy Kilmer who had spent all of that week in a Washington, D.C. hospital with a stomach ailment that required surgery after the season. Redskins lost to the Vikings 27-20.

The Redskins played the NFC Western Champion Los Angeles Rams in LA. Despite holding a 10-7 lead at half-time, the Redskins were unable to score in the second half and faltered 19-10.

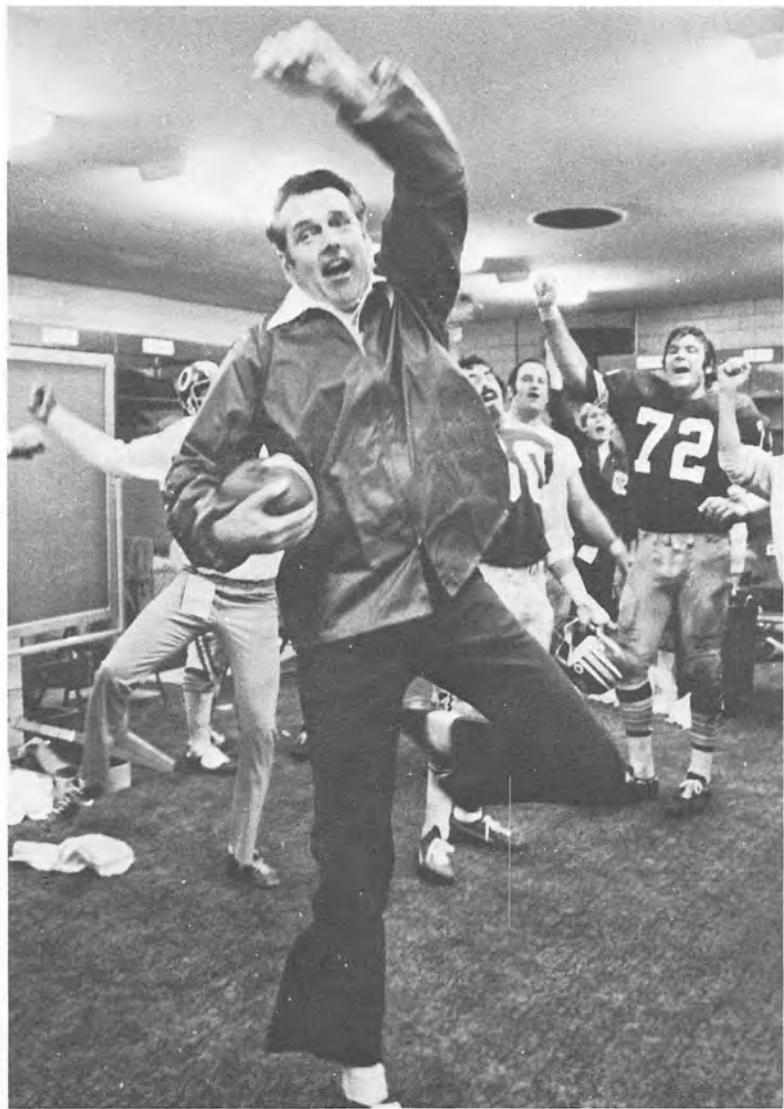

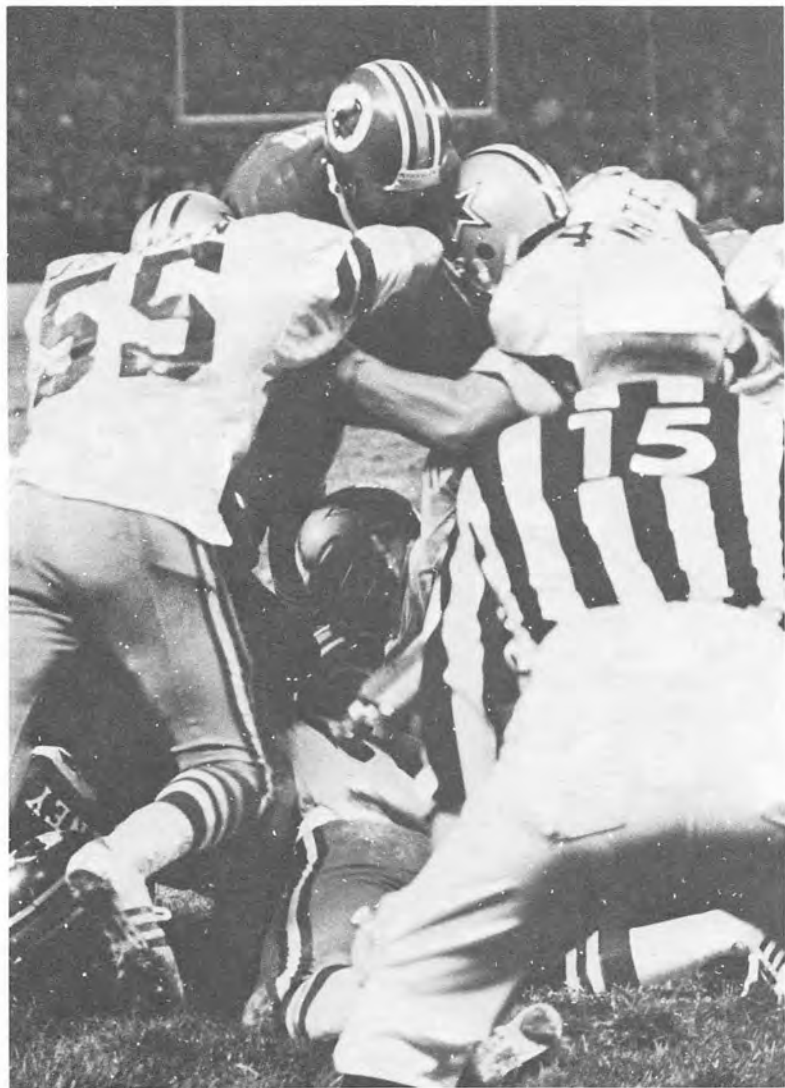

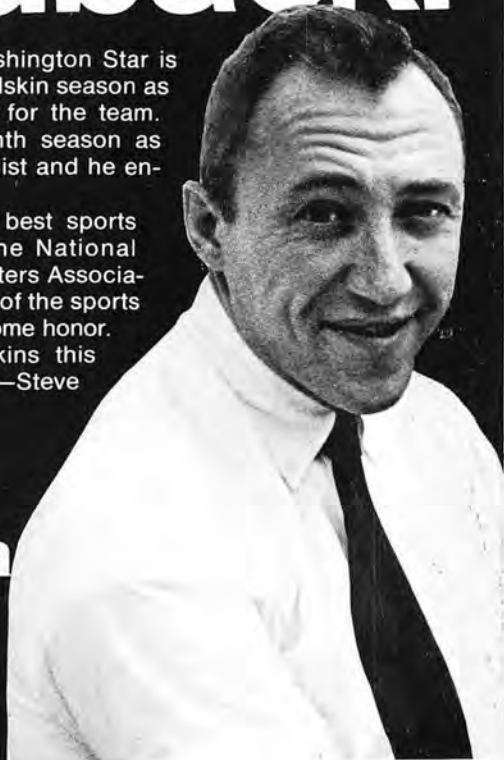
