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


The Redskin defense allowed opponents to complete only 41.1% of its passes, lowest in the NFL since 1955.

The Washington Redskins organization boasts a proud tradition. Founder George Preston Marshall headed football's fifth oldest organization in 1932 and helped guide the NFL through rough times. Marshall was responsible for the two-division system with a championship game, a Pro Bowl featuring all-stars, elaborate halftime shows, the first team marching band and first rally song. The Redskins were the first pro team to have all their games televised and home games have been sell-outs since the 1960's.

President Edward Bennett Williams persuaded Vince Lombardi to Washington to revive the winning tradition, but cancer claimed Lombardi after one successful season. In 1971, a new, exciting tradition was born with the arrival of George Allen. Since 1971, the Redskins have a 58-25-1 record, including a 35-8-1 (.807) mark at home. Washington has the finest football training facility under one roof, Redskin Park, and have been in the NFL play-offs in five of their six consecutive winning seasons. No team has appeared before Monday Night TV's national audience more than the Redskins since Allen came to Washington, and the Burgundy and Gold have won 9 of those 10 games. One of football's biggest attractions nationwide, the Redskins have millions of fans, young and old, who are proud to proclaim "Hail to the Redskins, Hail Victory!"

# The Coaching Staff

## GEORGE ALLEN

### GENERAL MANAGER and HEAD COACH

The Redskins winningest coach, George Allen, begins his seventh season in the Nation's Capital with a 58-25-1 (.699) record. In 1976, Allen climbed into 10th place on the all-time coaching list with a career total of 107-42-5 (.711).

Coach Allen holds the distinction of being the only coach with 100 wins to never have had a losing season. He has also won his season opener in all 11 seasons and has sold out every home game since coming to Washington in 1971.

Allen took over a Washington club that had had only one winning season in the last 15 years and turned them into perennial league title contenders. He has guided the Redskins to the playoffs in five of his six seasons, and his six consecutive winning seasons is a mark unequalled by the Redskins since pre-World War II years.

It is Allen who has been responsible for the "Redskinmania" which has swept the Washington, D.C. area, making this a football capital. At RFK Stadium, the Redskins under Allen have a 35-8-1 record (.807) and the fans are greatly responsible with their roaring approval.

On Monday Night television, Coach Allen has appeared with his Redskins 10 times in six seasons and won 9 of the nationwide games, including the last five in a row. It was on Monday Night TV against the Eagles in 1976 that Allen notched his 100th career win.

With his constant motto "The Future is Now," Coach Allen has made more trades than any coach in the history of football. In his 11 years, Allen has made 131 trades, with 81 of those coming in his Washington stint as head coach.

Allen's first coaching job was as an assistant coach at Ann Arbor, Mich., high school in 1947. In 1948, he became head coach at Morning-side, Iowa, College and in 1951, Allen took over as head coach at Whittier, College in California. He became offensive end coach for the Rams in 1957 and the following year he joined George Halas and the Bears. In 1963, when he became head defensive coach of the Bears, he fielded the best defense in pro football en route to the NFL Championship. Following the World Championship game after the defense picked off 5 passes, Allen was awarded the game ball, an unheard-of honor for an assistant coach.

In 1966, Allen was named head coach of the Los Angeles Rams, and he proceeded by giving them their first winning season in 8 years, building around his "Fearsome Foursome". He won his first game as a head coach, beating Atlanta 19-14. In 1967, Allen brought the Rams the best record in the history of the franchise, producing 11 wins, 1 loss and 2 ties and was named Coach of the Year by UPI, Sporting News and the Wash-

ton TD Club, as well as Co-Coach of the Year by AP. The overall mark in 1967 was 18-2-2. He won 10 games in 1968 and followed with an 11-3 mark in 1969 and a Western Title. He finished his LA tenure with a 9-4-1 mark and an overall record of 49-17-4 (.729) and the distinction of winningest coach in Ram history. His road record of 27-7-2 was the NFL's best.

Allen came to Washington in 1971 and immediately turned losers into winners. He guided the team to a 9-4-1 record, which was Washington's best record in 29 years and only the second winning season in 15 years. He won Coach of the Year honors for his achievements. The trip to the playoffs was the first time in 26 years for the Redskins in post-season play.

In 1972, the Redskins Super Bowl year, Allen compiled a 11-3 mark, which was the most wins in the 36-year history of the Redskins. The previous high was a 10-1 mark in 1942. The defense shined in the playoffs, with a 16-3 win over Green Bay and a 26-3 pasting of Dallas for the NFC Championship. Allen again earned Coach of Year honors.

In 1973, Allen guided the team to a co-championship of the NFC East division with a 10-4 mark. Again in 1974, the Redskins won 10, lost 4 and shared the co-championship, this time with St. Louis. This made four straight trips to the playoffs for the Redskins, a feat never equalled before in the 38-year history of the franchise. In 1975, two overtime losses meant the difference between 10-4 and 8-6 and the Redskins missed the playoffs.

Last year, the Redskins won their final four contests and 5 of the final 6 to finish 10-4 and earn another trip to the playoffs. The Redskins swept St. Louis and won their first game ever in Texas Stadium against the Cowboys.

The trip to the playoffs was the fifth in six years for Allen and seventh playoff visit in his career. He was honored as Coach of the Year in the NFC by the Kansas City 101 Club for the 2nd time.

George Herbert Allen was born April 29, 1922 in Detroit, Mich., and attended Lake Shore High, earning nine letters; three each in football, basketball and track. He was captain and all-conference in basketball.

In 1943 and 1944, under V-12 Naval Programs, he attended Alma College and played end. He transferred to Marquette, again playing football as a receiver. He completed his undergraduate work at the University of Michigan, playing baseball and wrestling. He received his B.A. in 1947 and his M.A. in 1948 from Michigan, where he was a member of Sigma Delta Psi, national honorary athletic and scholarship fraternity. He also did graduate work on his doctorate at the University of Southern California. Allen accepted an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree from his first head coaching job at Morningside, Iowa (Sioux City.)

Allen, author of 7 books, has initiated three scholarships; at Morningside, at Gallaudet, the nation's leading school for the deaf; and a scholarship for an Indian youth. He started the scholarship at Gallaudet in 1973 and the other two in 1974.

Allen is also active in many community affairs and contributes much time to special projects. For the sixth straight year, he was chairman of

the Metropolitan Summer Jobs for Needy Youth campaign, leading the nation every year.

In May 1951, Allen married the former Etty Lumbroso. They have four children: George, Jr. (25), law clerk for the Hon. Judge Glen M. Williams, U. S. District Court, Western District of Virginia; Gregory (23), a graduate student at George Mason University, Bruce (20), a senior at the University of Richmond, and Jennifer (16), a junior in high school.

Probably the best-conditioned Coach in the NFL, Allen is 6-1 and weighs 175 pounds. He believes "The first step to victory is conditioning. You can never waste time by conditioning." Allen himself exercises daily and jogs several miles as well.

**Pro Playing Career:** Originally drafted by the Redskins in the second round of the 1957 NFL draft. Played tight end for the Redskins, 1957-60, and for the Giants, 1961-63. Was called "The best third down receiver in football," by Giant quarterback Y. A. Tittle. His career totals: 178 receptions, 2,623 yards and 28 touchdowns.

**Pro Coaching Career:** Served as special scout for the Giants for two years, 1967-68, before joining the Giants coaching staff where he was in charge of the offensive receivers and the overall passing game for five years.

**Notable:** Walton and his father, Frank, are the only father-son combination to ever play for the Redskins. His father was a guard, 1934-35 and 1943-45. They were also the first father-son combination to play in NFL.

His 1,463 career completions is the 20th best total in NFL history. Should go over the 20,000 yard mark in passing yardage this year. Has passed for 140 TD's and scored 22 himself, one as a receiver.







## **The Name** July 8, 1933

The Boston gridders move to Fenway Park, home of American League Red Sox, and "The Braves" become "The Redskins."

## **The Franchise** Feb. 13, 1937

National Football League approves transfer of Boston Redskins franchise to Washington, D. C.

## **The Band** Aug. 9, 1937

The famed Redskins Band founded. First of its kind.

## **Westward Ho!** Aug. 2, 1939

Redskins set forth on first coast-to-coast football training trip. Training site: Eastern State Normal School in Cheney, Washington.

## **California** Aug. 18, 1941

Redskins bring pro football on large scale for first time to California. Establish training quarters in San Diego at Brown Military Academy.

## **To a T** July 30, 1944

Redskins abandon their double-wing formation and adopt the T-formation.

## **Times Game** Sept. 6, 1946

First Annual Redskins-Rams game for benefit of Los Angeles Times Charities, Inc. Draws 68,188 to Memorial Coliseum. NETS Times Boys Club \$96,711.23.

## **High Note** June 13, 1947

Redskins Band performs at Philadelphia Inquirer's Famed Festival of Music alongside Whiteman, Waring and the Philharmonic.

## **First on TV** June 14, 1950

American Oil announces plans to televise all Redskins games—no other pro team on TV.

## **Baugh-to-Bach** Oct. 10, 1954

Dr. Howard Mitchell leads his National Symphony Orchestra at mid-field in a half-time show.

## **The Alumni** Oct. 15, 1958

Redskins Alumni Association organized. Twenty-three former players residing here adopt formal constitution and by-laws and invite all non-resident ex-Redskins to join for the welfare of all.

## **Here to Stay** Dec. 24, 1959

Redskins sign 30-year lease to play in proposed D.C. Stadium and Congress gives go-ahead to build.

Miniature-sized Davy O'Brien of Eagles completes 33 passes in 60 attempts, but Redskins win 13 - 6 to clinch Eastern Championship.

**73-to-Ohhh!**  
Dec. 8, 1940

Redskins get more first downs than Bears in World Championship Game at Griffith Stadium.

**Title Escapes**  
Nov. 23, 1941

Fifty seconds to go in this Eastern Championship Game, Redskins hold 13 - 10 lead. But Giants get field goal and touchdown to win, 20 - 13.

<b>NFC Coach of</b> <b>Year, 1972</b>	For second year in row, George Allen accorded "Coach of Year" honors.
<b>NFC East</b> <b>Co-Champs, 1973</b>	Redskins had the best record (10-4) in the NFC East. Second best in NFL.
<b>4th Straight Year</b> <b>In Playoffs, 1974</b>	For the fourth consecutive year, all under Allen, the Redskins made the NFL playoffs.

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

### 1971 Redskins—NFC Wild Card Winner (9-4-1)

Dec. 26, 1971—Redskins 20, San Francisco 24-Away

Redskins take a 10-3 halftime lead but fail to cash in on scoring opportunities. A Brodie to Washington 78-yard scoring pass ignites a winning 49er counter-attack.

### 1972 Redskins—Eastern Division Champions, NFC (11-3-0)

Playoff Game—Dec. 24, 1972—Redskins 16, Green Bay 3-Home

Powerful Redskin defense cuts off Green Bay running attack and the Redskins win their first playoff game under the new NFL Championship rules. Billy Kilmer hit Roy Jefferson for a score and Curt Knight kicked three field goals.

### NFC Championship—Dec. 31, 1972—Redskins 26, Dallas 3-Home

The Redskins win their first conference championship in 30 years with a smashing victory over the defending conference and Super Bowl champion Cowboys. Kilmer flipped two touchdowns to Charley Taylor and Knight booted a playoff record 4 field goals. Defense was outstanding all day.

### Super Bowl VII—Jan. 14, 1973—Redskins 7, Miami 14-L.A.

Undefeated Miami cooled off the Redskins attack and the Dolphins became Super Bowl champions with the first undefeated season by any NFL team since the 1941 Chicago Bears.

Dec. 22, 1973—Redskins 20, Minnesota 27-Away

Both Dallas and the Redskins finished the regular season with identical 10-4 records, but because of the point differential in head-to-head play, the Redskins were assigned the NFC "wild card" berth. The Redskins were led by quarterback Billy Kilmer, who had spent all of that week in a Washington, D.C. hospital with a stomach ailment that required surgery after the season. Vikings rallied from 7-3 halftime deficit and 10-10 4th quarter tie.

### 1974 Redskins—Eastern Division Co-Champions, NFC (10-4)

Dec. 22, 1974—Redskins 10, Los Angeles 19-Away

Although both the Redskins and Cardinals finished with identical records of 10-4 in the NFC's Eastern Division, the Redskins were again awarded the "wild card" berth since they lost to the Cardinals twice during regular season play. Despite holding a 10-7 lead at halftime, the Redskins were unable to score in the second half and faltered 19-10.

### 1976 Redskins—NFC Wild Card Winner (10-4)

Dec. 18, 1976—Redskins 20, Minnesota 35-Away

The Burgundy and Gold returned to the playoffs for the fifth time in the last six years facing Minnesota, who sported the best record in the NFC. The Redskins fell behind in the opening eighty-one seconds on a Viking TD and were unable to make up a 21-3 halftime deficit, despite scoring 17 points in the second half.


