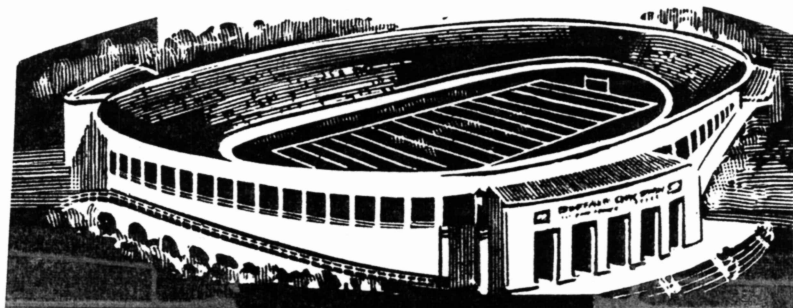

# *James F. Breuil*

OWNER, BUFFALO BILLS

Long-time athlete and sportsman and President of the Frontier Oil Refining Corp., Buffalo, New York. A football player in prep school and college, Jim has maintained an intense and active interest in all athletics for years; has been influential in his company's sponsorship of amateur teams and the broadcasting of sports events. He owns his own airplane and shoots golf in the low 70's.

Jim became interested in professional football before the advent of the All-America Conference. Having been an ardent supporter of Buffalo sports for years, he felt the upstate industrial center certainly was of major league sports stature. As a consequence, when the All-America Football conference was growing into more than a conversation piece, Breuil immediately became interested and active in its formation. He has spared no expense, time or effort to prove that his contention about Buffalo is correct.

Jim Breuil has more than a financial interest in the Buffalo Bills. He accompanies the team on all trips, knows personally every one of the players, and for that matter, a goodly share of the club's host of supporters.



# *Lowell (Red) Dawson*

## HEAD COACH, BUFFALO BILLS

In the waning days of May, 1946, when owner James F. Breuil sought a man to build a worthy representative for Buffalo in the All-America Conference, he was attracted by the reputation of Lowell "Red" Dawson, a Tulane alumnus. It took exactly 35 minutes for Breuil and Red Dawson to reach an agreement at their first meeting.

In putting his 1948 Bills on the gridiron, Dawson is marking his 17th season as a coach. After performing as a quarterback for Bernie Bierman at Tulane, climaxed by participation in the 1932 Rose Bowl classic against Southern California, Bierman had enough respect for the youthful redhead's knowledge of football to want him as an assistant when he moved to the University of Minnesota to take over the head mentorship of the Gophers. Dawson served under Bierman as backfield coach for four years and his progress as a teacher reflected in the success of the Gophers on the gridiron, propelled him into a top spot of his own.

In 1936, when Dawson was still on the sunny side of 30, Tulane recalled him as head coach. In 6 years at the Louisiana institution, Dawson's teams won 36, lost 18, and tied 4 in the strenuous Southern conference and intersectional competition. Highlight of Red's stay at Tulane was the undefeated 1939 season when his team was invited to the Sugar Bowl as an opponent of Texas A. & M. In 1940 Red was a member of the College All Stars coaching staff as an aide to Doctor Eddie Anderson.

In 1942, Dawson left Tulane to return to Minnesota as an assistant to Dr. George Hauser while Bierman was serving in the U. S. Marines.

Coach Dawson is as streamlined today as he was when he weighed 165 lbs. as a college star. He started his football career in 1925, his last year at River Falls High School, in his birthplace, River Falls, Wisconsin.

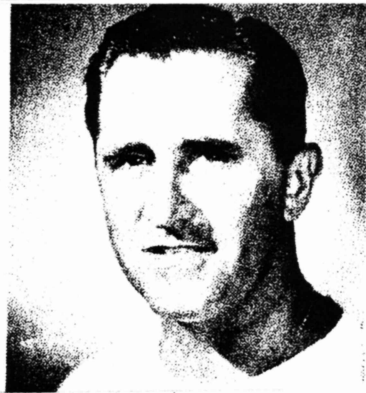
**JOHN SCAFIDE**

Clem Crowe, Line Coach, second season with the Bills. Coach Crowe, who signed George Ratterman for the Bills, first achieved fame as one of the Seven Mules to the Four Horsemen at Notre Dame in 1923-24, becoming captain in his senior year, with the label "the fastest man I ever coached" pinned on him by the illustrious Rockne. Crowe went into coaching after graduation, remaining six years at St. Vincent's College, in Latrobe, Pennsylvania, then serving for twelve years as head coach at Xavier College. In 1944 Crowe returned to Notre Dame as Line Coach and took over as Head Coach at the University of Iowa in 1945. Crowe also was head basketball coach at Notre Dame in 1944 and under his direction the Notre Dame quintet compiled the highest scoring total in the school's history. George Ratterman was one of the outstanding players on that quintet.

John Scafide, a teammate of Dawson's at Tulane and later on assistant coach at Minnesota with Red, alternates his line coaching chores with that of chief scout. Scafide enjoys a fine reputation as a keen analyst, and, like Dawson, is a student of the game.

Three former college head football coaches, under the guidance of Lowell (Red) Dawson, form the nucleus of the Buffalo All-America Conference board of strategy.

Dawson was the guiding light at Tulane University, after an apprenticeship under

Bernie Bierman at Minnesota. One of the Green Wave's better halfbacks in the early 1930s, Dawson has the distinction of having played in the 1932 Rose Bowl Game.

Dawson's penchant for details as a player under Bierman so impressed the coach that Red was appointed assistant coach a year after his graduation from Tulane, when Bierman changed from Tulane to Minnesota. Three years later Dawson was back at Tulane as head coach.

A newcomer to the Buffalo ranks this year is Wm. (Red) Conkwright, End and Center Coach, who is a graduate of Oklahoma University. Red played pro football with Chicago Bears and Cleveland Rams from 1937 through 1944, and scouted and coached the ends for the Rams in 1945. Last year Conkwright was end and center coach of the Champion Cleveland Browns.

Charles "Chuck" Jaskwhich, backfield coach of the Buffalo Bills, is a graduate of Notre Dame where he quarterbacked Rockne's last team in 1940, continuing for two more seasons under Hunk Anderson. Chuck began his coaching career as Head Coach at Holy Cross Prep School in New Orleans, going from there to the University of Mississippi as backfield coach, then to Georgia Preflight in the same capacity, and in 1945 Jaskwhich was backfield coach at Iowa working with Clem Crowe, then Head Coach at Iowa.

In high school Armstrong won two letters in football and two letters in track. In college he played Quarterback for John Carrol University and earned two letters.

A three-letter man in high school, Baldwin played Fullback on the football team and was named All State 1942. At the University of Arkansas, Baldwin won letters in football for four years. He was named All Southwest in 1943 and 1946, second team All American in 1946 at End, All Conference second team at Halfback in 1945 and 1946. Won All Southwest Conference in 1946 in the 100-yard dash. Played in the Cotton Bowl in 1946.

**BLACK, JOHN T. (BLONDY)**

Born in Philadelphia, Mississippi, on August 20, 1920. Played high school football with the Philadelphia High School and won All-State recognition as a halfback on two occasions. Entered Mississippi State and was a regular halfback for three seasons. In 1942 was All-Southeastern Conference and All-America selection. His great speed won him a place on the Southeastern track team. He performed in the 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash and broad jump. He was clocked at 9.6 seconds for his best time in the century. Joined the Marines and spent 19 months in the Pacific area. Blondy saw action in Guadalcanal and landed on D-Day on Okinawa.

He served in the Navy and makes his home in New Orleans, Louisiana.

"Mule" was born in Okolona, Mississippi on September 9, 1920. Played tailback in high school for five years and was captain twice. Switched to center at Mississippi State U. and won four letters at that position. He was chosen to play in the North-South game in 1946, and made the All-Southeastern team the same year. He is married and has an infant daughter, Melanie Anne, and still lives in Okolona.

**COPPAGE, ALTON (COP)**—Fast and rangy, Coppage is a former Oklahoma university sprint star. He played for the Chicago Cardinals before serving three years in the Air Force, and after returning from service he was an end with the champion Cleveland Browns in 1946.

He lives in Hollis, Oklahoma, where he owns a lumber business. He is married and has one son.

It was a break for the Bills when "Red" Dawson had the opportunity to draft this veteran Pro-ball player from the Los Angeles Dons at the beginning of this season. Opposing linemen and backs are duly respectful of that name "Duggan" and when calling a play through his position they usually find the play that should of worked, would of worked if it hadn't been for a guy named Duggan. A fine leader, Gil is a steady influence on the Pro-ball "freshmen" with the Bills. Good-natured Gil, (you wouldn't think so by his aggressive line-play) is an Oklahoma State Trooper during the off-season.



**EVANS, FRED (DIPPY)**—One of the hardest running backs in Notre Dame football history, Dippy was the leading scorer for the 1941 undefeated Irish national champions. He kept the championship habit, playing for the Randolph Field Ramblers, national service kings, in 1944; the Fort Worth A.A.F. titleholders in 1945, and the Cleveland Browns of the A.A.F.C. in 1946.

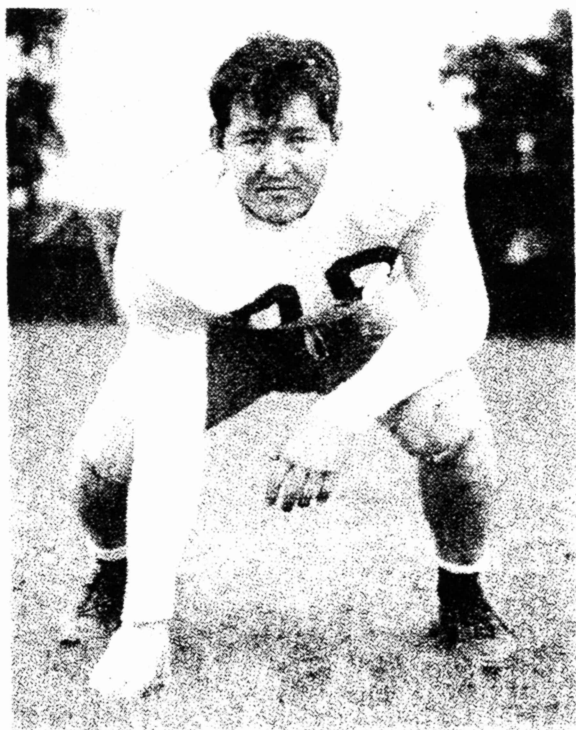
He is married and lives in Cleveland.

Grigg, Forrest P. 6-2 350 20 Longview, Tex. Tulsa

Oversize sensation of the Bison line-up is 350 pound tackle Forrest (Chubby) Grigg whose behemoth form last trampled the campus of Tulsa University. Chubby, who is only 20 years old, is 6 ft. 2½ in., is single, and resides in Longview, Texas, where he was named All State at Longview High School. At Tulsa, Chubby made All Missouri Valley Conference and All-American Honorable Mention in 1945 and was voted the best blocking and tackling lineman for Tulsa the same year. He participated in the Orange Bowl game of 1945 and the Oil Bowl Game of 1945. Besides being one of the biggest men in football today, Chub makes a specialty of place kicking. He measures 53 inches around the waist, 81 around the thigh and five feet around the shoulders.

## GEORGE KOCH

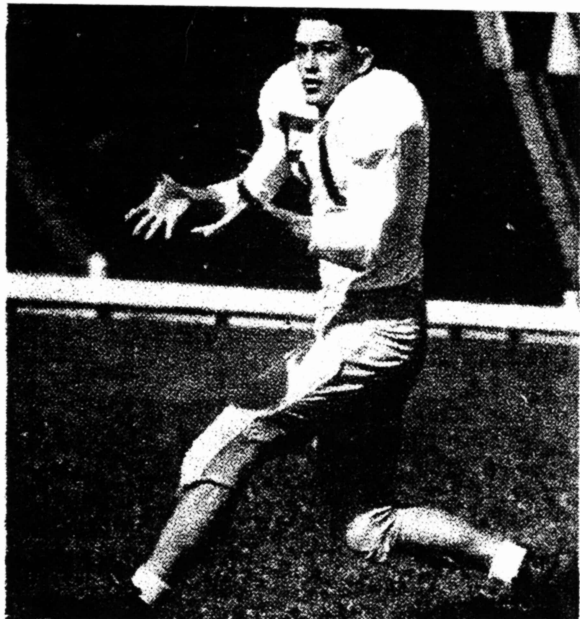
*Height—6 ft. ½ in. Weight—200*

*Service Record—*None. Worked in Houston Shipyards.

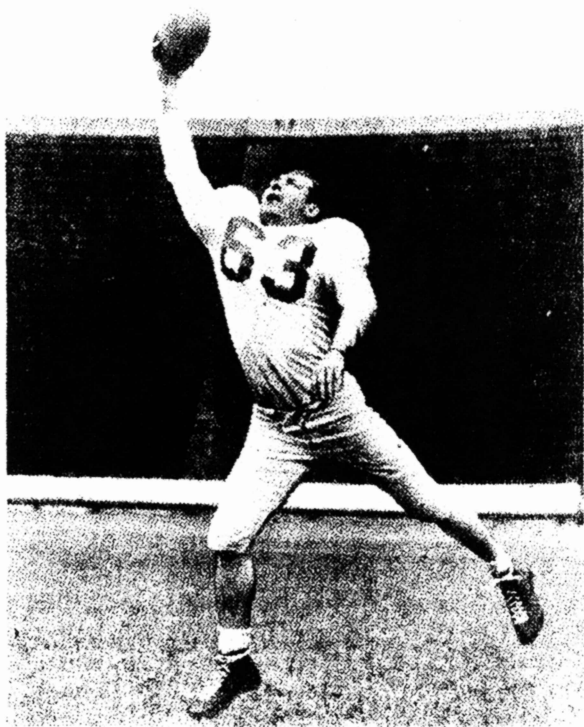
*Professional Record—*Signed with Rams in 1942 but did not report. Played with team in 1945.

*General Information—*George Koch was born in Temple, Texas, on July 7, 1919. He attended high school in Temple and was selected by the Rams in the 1941 draft but in his final college game he ran into a teammate and fractured his neck in three places. He finally recovered from the injury and reported to the Rams in 1945 but suffered a back injury early in the season and saw little action thereafter. Before being hurt he ran 54 yards to a touchdown against New York and showed plenty of drive. He operates a 3900-acre family ranch near Groesbeck, Texas, and coaches high school football when he is not playing. He is married and has one child. He plays right halfback.



## LAFAYETTE "Dolly" KING

6' 3" right end of the BUFFALO BILLS. From Macon, Ga. and a graduate of the University of Georgia, possessor of curly hair and a soft southern drawl, Dolly is very popular with the feminine followers of the BILLS. A great right end, in his second season with the BILLS, Dolly ranked fourth in the All-America Football Conference pass receiving statistics for last season snaring 30 passes for 466 yards and 6 touchdowns

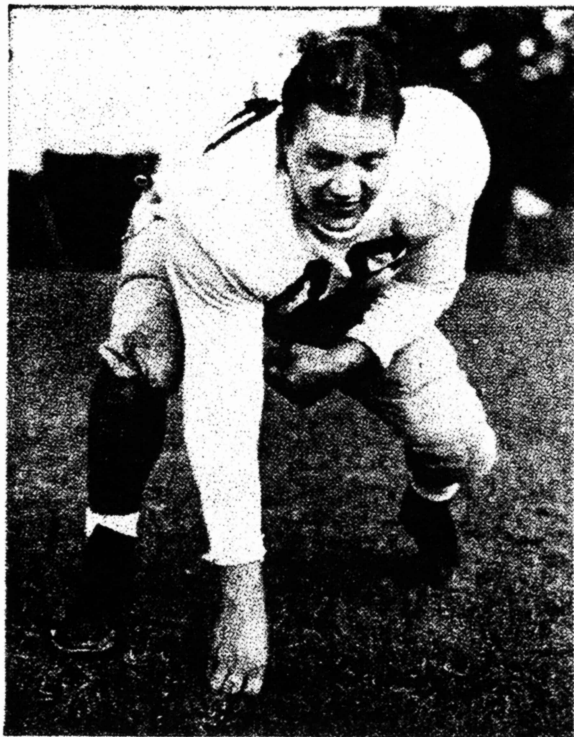


KONETSKY, FLOYD (Flo)

Born in Marianna, Pennsylvania on May 26, 1920. Played football for three years at German Township (Pa.) High School and also hurled the shotput and discus for the track team. At the University of Florida he played regularly for three seasons as a guard. In his senior year he captained the team and won honorable mention on several of the All-America teams. Served briefly in the Marine Corps after which he played with the ex-Cleveland Rams in the National League during 1944 and 1945. Buff Donelli, his coach in 1944, transferred him from a guard into an end and he was a regular with the Rams in both seasons, playing defensive left end and alternating with the team's offensive star, Jim Bonton. Was traded to the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1946, but was released just before the season to accept his old job with the Thompson Products Co. in Euclid.

Comes from an athletic family, his brother Ted having captained the University of Pittsburgh team and his brother Francis having starred for the University of Florida. Is married and father of one daughter, Carol Ann. Resides in Garfield Heights, a suburb of Cleveland.

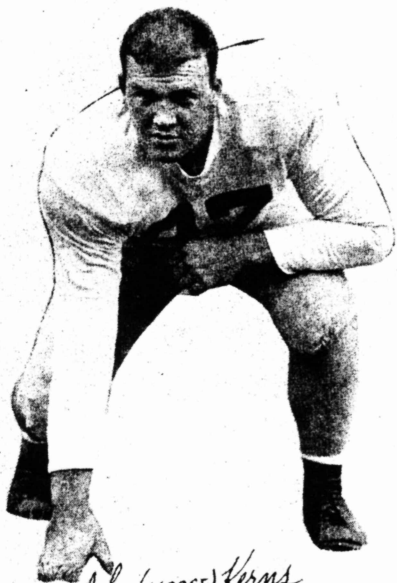

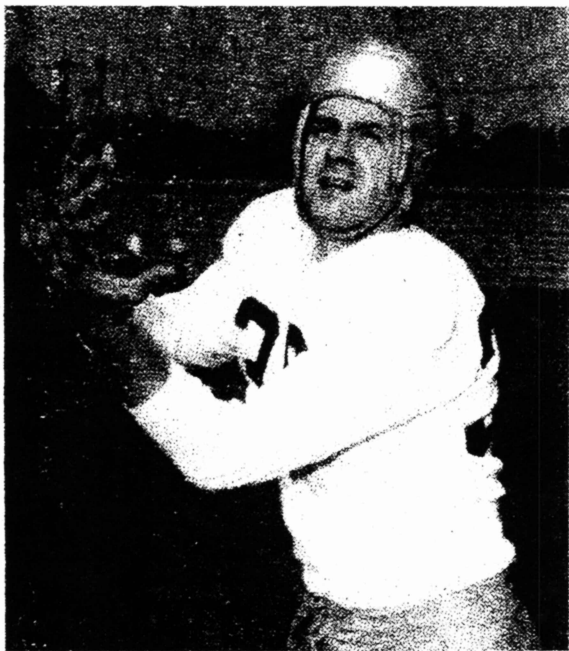

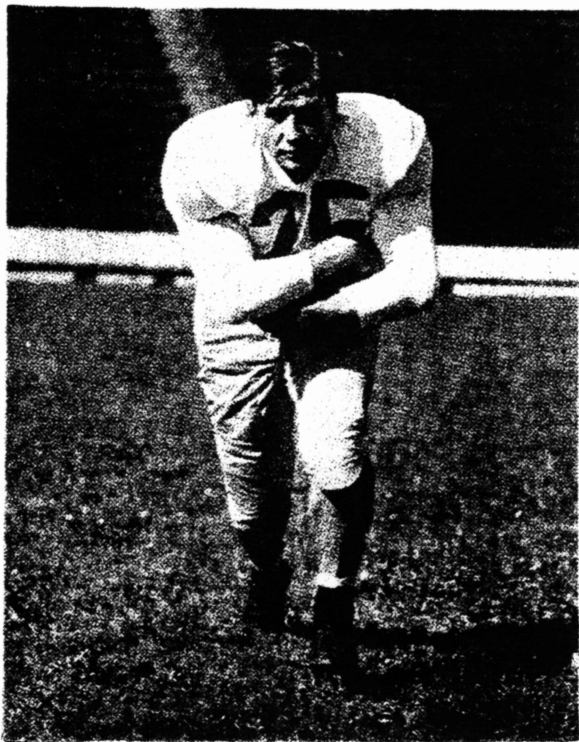


## RAY KUFFEL

In high school Prewitt played Center for four years and was nominated All District for that length of time. He was nominated All State in 1940 and All Southern in 1941.

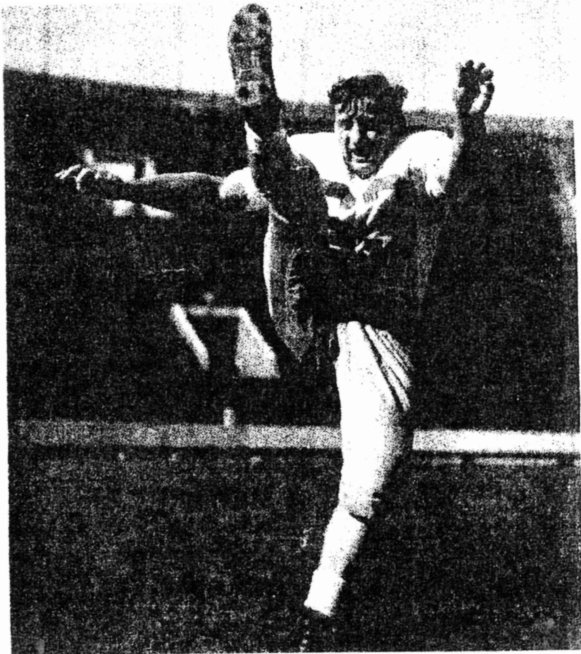

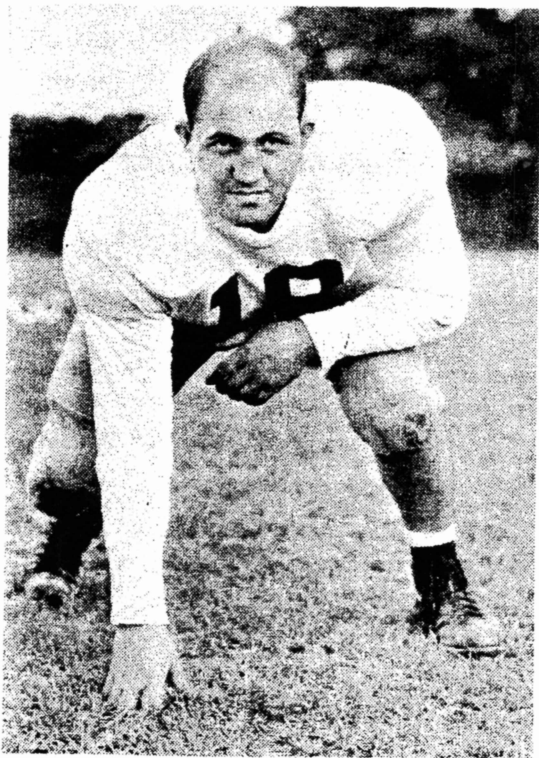
