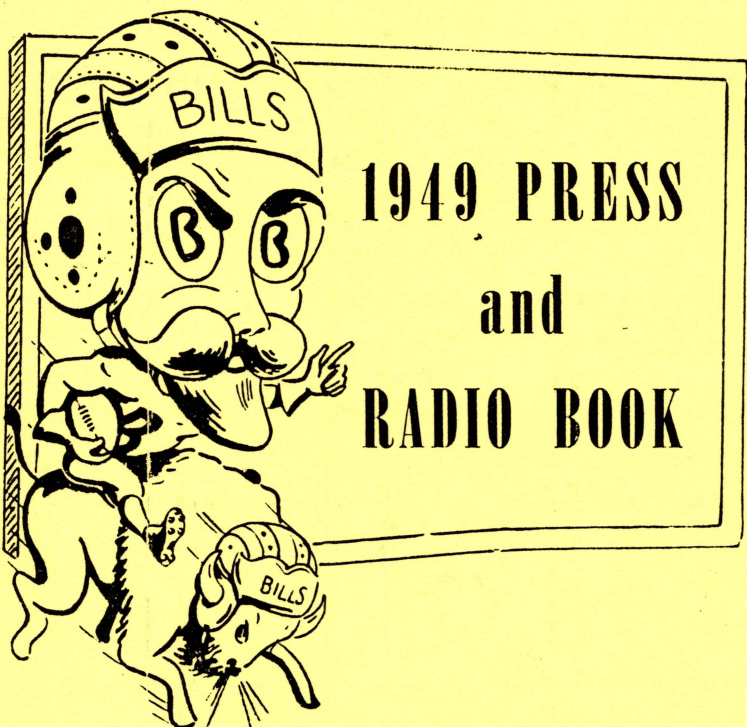

James F. Breuil

OWNER, BUFFALO BILLS

Long-time athlete and sportsman and President of the Frontier Oil Refining Corp., Buffalo, New York. A football player in prep school and college, Jim has maintained an intense and active interest in all athletics for years; has been influential in his company's sponsorship of amateur teams and the broadcasting of sports events. He owns his own airplane and shoots golf in the low 70's.

Jim became interested in professional football before the advent of the All-America Conference. Having been an ardent supporter of Buffalo sports for years, he felt the upstate industrial center certainly was of major league sports stature. As a consequence, when the All-America Football Conference was growing into more than a conversation piece, Breuil immediately became interested and active in its formation. He has spared no expense, time or effort to prove that his contention about Buffalo is correct.

Jim Breuil has more than a financial interest in the Buffalo Bills. He accompanies the team on all trips, knows personally every one of the players, and for that matter, a goodly share of the club's host of supporters.

While his Bills' won the Eastern Division title last year, he hopes they will go on to further fame by winning the AAFC championship this season.

Jim Wells

Assistant to the Owner

Jim Wells, former Sports Director of the Buffalo Evening News Station, WBEN, took over the reins of the Buffalo Bills in March 1948 and serves as executive assistant to Owner Jim Breuil.

Jim is eminently qualified to handle the Bills' managerial duties by virtue of his previous experience in the sports field. He is a sports perfectionist and tingles from head to toe whenever he sees a bang-up contest between two teams of specialists. He was an avid follower of the Bills during his radio stint and has made the jump to football executive with apparent ease and a great deal of success.

A four letter man at Lafayette High School (Cross Country, Hockey, Track and Baseball), Wells carried his interest in our beneficial games into college with him. While a Cadet at the United States Military Academy at West Point, he played football hockey and baseball.

His keen interest in sports was a cinch to lead him into the reportorial field. After ten months' apprenticeship at WBEN, he was named head of the Sports Department, a berth he occupied for eight and a half years until he accepted the call to aid in the fight to keep our only major league sport in Buffalo.

Wells served as a Naval Officer during the recent conflict. Volunteering for action, he was assigned to the gunnery division of the Navy's air arm and in that capacity, supervised the arming of the hard hitting Curtiss Carrier Bomber known as the Helldiver. In all, he was in uniform 27 months, serving 21 months at sea. A member of the Inactive Naval Reserve today, he holds the rank of Lieutenant.

Born and raised in New York City, Wells moved to Buffalo when his father, the late Walter P. Wells, became associated with the Pierce Arrow Motor Car Company. In 1936, he married a native Buffalo girl and they have two children. He is a member of the Buffalo Athletic Club, the Brookfield and Wanakah Country Clubs.

An avid enthusiast of all games, Wells keeps in shape by playing squash racquets in the indoor season, golf in the summer.

Lowell (Red) Dawson

HEAD COACH BUFFALO BILLS

In the waning days of May, 1946 when owner James F. Breuil sought a man to build a worthy representative for Buffalo in the All-America Conference, he was attracted by the reputation of Lowell "Red" Dawson, a Tulane alumnus. It took exactly 35 minutes for Breuil and Red Dawson to reach an agreement at their first meeting.

In putting his 1949 Bills on the gridiron, Dawson is marking his 18th season as a coach. After performing as a quarterback for Bernie Bierman at Tulane, climaxed by participation in the 1932 Rose Bowl classic against Southern California, Bierman had enough respect for the youthful redhead's knowledge of football to want him as an assistant when he moved to the University of Minnesota to take over the head mentorship of the Gophers. Dawson served under Bierman as backfield coach for four years and his progress as a teacher reflected in the success of the Gophers on the gridiron, propelled him into a top spot of his own.

In 1936, when Dawson was still on the sunny side of 30, Tulane recalled him as head coach. In 6 years at the Louisiana institution, Dawson's teams won 36, lost 18, and tied 4 in the strenuous southern conference and intersectional competition. Highlight of Red's stay at Tulane was the undefeated 1939 season when his team was invited to the Sugar Bowl as an opponent of Texas A. & M. In 1940 Red was a member of the College All Stars coaching staff as an aide to Doctor Eddie Anderson.

In 1942, Dawson left Tulane to return to Minnesota as an assistant to Dr. George Hauser while Bierman was serving in the U. S. Marines.

Coach Dawson is as streamlined today as he was when he weighed 165 lbs. as a college star. He started his football career in 1925, his last year at River Falls High School, in his birthplace, River Falls, Wisconsin.

Dawson's record with the Buffalo Bills is impressive. From a record of 3 wins, 10 losses and 1 tie in the season of 1946, Red coached his 1947 charges to second place in the Eastern division and third place in league standing with 8 wins, 4 losses and 2 ties.

Last year he directed the Bills to the Eastern Division title, winning eight and dropping seven games.

Red is married and the father of three children, all girls.

Clem F. Crowe

Assistant Coach, Buffalo Bills

Clem Crowe, line coach, is serving his fourth season with the All-America Conference Buffalo Bills. Coach Crowe first achieved fame as one of the seven mules to the four horsemen at Notre Dame in 1923 and '24, becoming captain in his senior year, with the label "the fastest end I ever coached" pinned on him by the illustrious Rockne.

Crowe went into coaching after graduation, remaining six years at St. Vincent's College in Latrobe, Pennsylvania, then serving for twelve years as head coach at Xavier College. In 1944 Crowe returned to Notre Dame as Line coach and took over as Head Coach at the University of Iowa in 1945.

A property holder in his adopted community, Clem has purchased a 50 acre farm just outside the city limits. There he figures he and Mrs. Crowe can provide ample space for the ten (10, that is) little Crowes.

John Scafide

Assistant Coach, Buffalo Bills

John Scafide, husky, black-thatched assistant line coach of the Buffalo team, was a teammate of Red Dawson at Tulane University, playing a regular guard position on Bernie Bierman's undefeated teams of 1930-31.

Captain of the team which went to the Rose Bowl in 1932, Scafide was picked as the outstanding lineman in that famous West Coast classic and gained All-Southern first string recognition in 1931. After graduation he was signed by the Washington Redskins but a broken leg during his first season ended his playing career.

Scafide started his coaching career in a Mississippi high school where he served for four years before taking over at Pearl River, Miss. Junior Collge.

John lives in Bay St. Louis, Mississippi, is married and has two children.

Joel Hunt

Assistant Coach, Buffalo Bills

Hunt began his professional career as a baseball player. He was outfielder with the Rochester Red Wings under Billy Southworth in the early 1930s. During his fifth year in the Cardinal "chain gang", however, he suffered a broken leg, and retired from the diamond.

After two years as head coach of the Junior College at Marshall, Texas, he returned to his Alma Mater to coach the Aggie backs under the inestimable Matty Bell, now head man at S.M.U.

During the high-pressure era of the late Huey Long, Hunt was brought to Louisiana State to coach the backs under Biff Jones. He wasted little time becoming the apple of the Kingfish's eye, serving up so deceptive an aerial offense, coupled with a strong defense against opposing thrusts as to help produce four Bowl teams in eight years plus a national championship in 1936.

As a player, Hunt was the first in the Southwest to receive any attention from All America selectors. In 1927, as the "best back in Texas," he was mentioned in connection with several "All" Teams. He justified that ranking by winning top honors in the Shrine-West game, January 1, 1928, being named the best player on the field. Hunt was three times "All Southwest Conference" and captained the Aggies his senior year.

Single, Hunt served four years in the Army Air Corps during the war, attaining the rank of Captain. His hobbies are hunting and fishing.

Hank Reese

Assistant Coach, Buffalo Bills

Hank brings to the Bills knowledge of the pro game gained through more than a dozen years of experience as a player, coach and scout in both the National and All-America circuits.

This is his first full year with the Bills and he is handling the twofold duties of line coach and chief scout for the Dawsonmen.

Tony Di Rosa

Trainer, Buffalo Bills

Tony DiRosa, hydrant-high fullback for Hiker Joy's Canisius College elevens for three seasons in the mid-thirties, succeeds the late Tony Dippery as trainer of Bills.

Upon graduating from Canisius College in '38, DiRosa took up a physical education course at Cortland State Teachers College in 1940 and 1941, also doubling as the school's assistant football coach and trainer.

War interrupted his studies and DiRosa spent 44 months in the Navy serving as RDM 2nd Class on the light cruiser USS San Juan, a member of the Pacific Fleet.

Resuming his studies at Cortland upon receiving his military discharge. DiRosa received his Physical Education Certificate in the Fall of '46. For the last three years, he has been physical education director at West Valley Central School, N. Y.

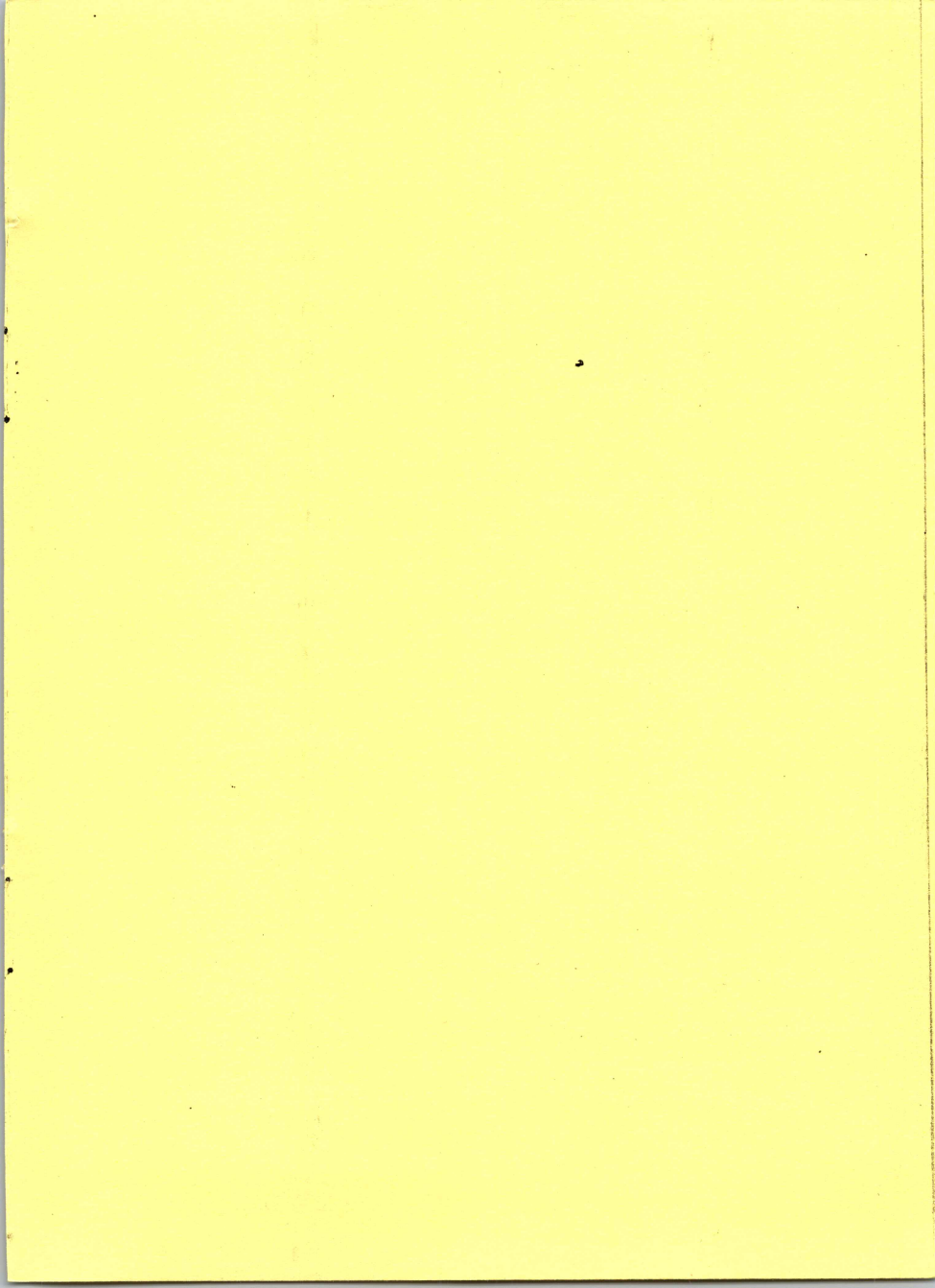
