DUDLEY S. DEGROOT

Head Coach

Born November 20, 1899, in Chicago, Illinois. Dr. Dudley S. DeGroot (Dud got his Doctor's Degree in Education at Stanford in 1940, besides earning a Phi Beta Kappa Key as an undergraduate) rambled his way up the undergraduate sports trail. He attended four different high schools—as a freshman at Wilmette, Illinois, a sophomore in San Francisco, a junior in San Diego and a senior in Redwood City, California.

In 1919, Dud settled down at one school—Leland Stanford University—but he maintained his migratory habits by playing four different line positions in his four college years. Season by season, he progressed from end to center.

Dud's coaching career began in 1923 when he served for two years as an Assistant Coach at Stanford. After a year of business life in Europe, he turned back to coaching as Head Coach at Santa Barbara State. From there he went to Menlo, California Junior College where his team captured the National Scoring Championship with 396 points, once scoring six touchdowns in seven consecutive plays.

Coach DeGroot moved to San Jose State in 1932 and brought the Spartans from gridiron obscurity to national fame. His last three years at San Jose—1937, 1938 and 1939—his teams earned three National scoring titles, winning 36 games against 3 losses and 1 tie during that span. In 1940, he moved to Rochester for four years as Heach Coach, again raising the football fortunes of his school. In 1942, Dud proved that he was not just an offensive coach by putting together a team that earned the National defensive record by holding opponents to 8 points.

In 1943, Dud took his bag of football tricks into major league circles as Head Coach of the Washington Redskins. In two seasons there he won 14 games, lost 6 and tied 1. In the 1945 season his Redskins won the Eastern Division of the National Football League, but lost the playoff to Cleveland 15-14. In 1946, he came to the Los Angeles Dons, winning 7 games, losing 5 and tying 2.

Besides pigskinnery, Dr. DeGroot is an expert writer and lecturer in the fields of ornithology and oology. He is also an outstanding public speaker. His plan to help high school football has been widely acclaimed by high school coaches and players in Southern California, and he and his assistants spend their off-season months conducting coaching clinics in this area. It was also Coach DeGroot's plan to admit, free of charge, all high school football players in Southern California to the Dons' home games.

TED SHIPKEY

Assistant Coach

Born in Great Falls, Montana, Sept. 28, 1901, Ted Shipkey and Dud DeGroot were rejoined last season in a football venture for the first time since 1923. That year, DeGroot, starting his coaching career, had a promising young end named Shipkey on his Stanford freshman squad. Dud went on to the head coaching job at Santa Barbara State and Ted went on to win All-American honors for the Indians in 1926.

Ted went from Stanford to coaching basketball, track and football at Sacramento Junior College. In 1930 he left California—where he had grown up and earned All-Southern California prep honors at Fullerton High—to accept the head football coaching job and Athletic Directorship at Arizona State Teachers at Tempe.

He returned to Southern California in 1934 to coach football and hockey at Los Angeles City College. In 1935 Ted got his first taste of professional football as coach of the Hollywood Braves, the first professional football in Southern California. In 1937 he went to the University of New Mexico as head football coach. He served there until joining the Army Air Force as a Captain in 1942. While in the army Ted Coached the famous "Flying Kellys" at Kirtland Field, Arizona, and organized and coached the Personnel Distribution Center of Louisville, Kentucky, the early part of 1945.

Ted was discharged with the rank of Major in October 1945 and returned to the University of New Mexico, taking the Lobos through a championship season and into the Sun Bowl New Year's Day game where they defeated Denver University 34-24. MEL HEIN

Assistant Coach

Born in Redding, California, August 22, 1909. Mel Hein, all-time All-Pro center and one of the greatest sportsmen the game of football has ever known, joined the Dons in March 1947. Hein, who at 37 can still step on a football field with the best of them, earned a reputation as the "Iron Man of Football" during his 15 years with the New York Giants, a record of service surpassed only by Ken Strong. During that span from 1931 through 1945, Hein, long an idol and inspiration to America's youngsters because of his high code of living and gridiron sportsmanship, was selected All-Pro center for eight consecutive seasons, from 1933 through 1940. In addition he made the second team four times.

Mel first gained fame as an All-American center at Washington State in 1930. He is well remembered by Southern California football fans as the bulwark of the Washington State team that beat a highly-favored U.S.C. eleven 7 to 6, in 1930 to earn the Rose Bowl bid. In the fall of 1931 Mel headed for New York City and the start of the greatest major league career of all time.

Mel went to Union College in 1943 as Assistant Professor of Physical Education, but he did not forsake major league football until last season. In 1943-45 Mel would carry on his duties at the college during the week and join the Giants for Sundays. Hein is married and has two children, a boy and a girl. They make their home in Pasadena. His hobbies are swimming, hunting and fishing.
