A BRIEF HISTORY

of the BOSTON BRUINS



CHARLES F. ADAMS

Founder of the Boston Bruins
and Pioneer of National League
Hockey in the United States

THE Boston Bruins became the first National Hockey League team in the United States at the start of the 1924-25 season, through the efforts of C. F. Adams, prominent Boston businessman, sportsman and amateur hockey buff.

During a trip to Montreal for the Stanley Cup playoffs, the previous spring, he saw the great possibilities of pro hockey in the U. S. and particularly in Boston.

He wasted no time negotiating for a franchise and the Bruins joined the Montreal Canadiens, Montreal Maroons, Hamilton Tigers, Toronto St. Pats and Ottawa Senators as the sixth NHL team.

An astute businessman, Adams was an equally keen judge of men. He picked Art Ross, a former hockey great, as his coach, general manager and scout and together they began building the Boston hockey empire.

Success was not immediate.

Recalling that first year, Adams would quip, "We had three teams that year. One coming, one going and one playing."

The purchase of the old Pacific Coast League stars from Lester and Frank Patrick brought the dawn of the Bruins as a N.H.L. power. Among those Pacific League stars were Eddie Shore, Harry Oliver and Perk Galbraith.

Adams was determined to have a championship team in Boston and he spared no expense when he learned these men were available.

He and Ross picked the players they wanted for the Bruins and then distributed the others to the New York Rangers and Detroit which had come into the league.

From then until World War II, the Bruins finished at or near the top of the N.H.L.

FIRST STANLEY CUP

The Bruins won their first Stanley Cup in 1928-29, sparked by Eddie Shore who was to become known as "Mr. Hockey" and the "Edmonton Express."

His colorful rushes filled the Arena, where the Bruins first played, with standing room crowds for every game. Boston Garden, where the Bruins now play, was erected to satisfy the demand of the fans to see Shore in action.

Also on that first Stanley Cup team were goalie Tiny Thompson and the famous Dynamite Trio of Cooney Weiland, Dit Clapper and Dutch Gainor. Four members of the team — Shore, Thompson, Clapper and Oliver — are in Hockey's Hall of Fame.

The Bruins continued as a powerhouse through 1941 when they won their third and last Stanley Cup.

In 1939 Ross put together the famous Kraut line of Milt Schmidt, Bobby Bauer and Woody Dumart to go with other new stars, Frank Brimsek, John Crawford, Bill Cowley, Mel Hill and Roy Conacher to win their second Stanley Cup.

Many veteran hockey men feel the 1939-40 team was the greatest in Bruins history. But it was so crippled by injuries that it was the first-round victim of the New York Rangers, in the playoffs.

Schmidt, Bauer and Dumart finished one-two-three in the individual scoring race, and Cowley was fifth that season.

WAR BROKE UP TEAM

The war really broke up the Bruins in 1941-1942. The entire Kraut line enlisted in the RCAF as a unit. Brimsek and Conacher also went into the service.

Ross retired to the front office in 1942 to concentrate on his duties as general manager. Dit Clapper, the only member of the three Stanley Cup champions and an all-star both as a right wing and defenseman, succeeded him as coach.

Dit, the first N.H.L. player ever to last 20 years, was a playing coach. He retired to the bench during the 1946-47 season and remained in that capacity until 1949-50. He was succeeded by George Boucher, who had a one-year reign.

Lynn Patrick coached for four and a half years and also became general manager after Ross' retirement in 1953. Patrick relinquished the coaching job to Schmidt just before Christmas, 1954.

After coaching a year and a half, Schmidt moved to the front office as assistant general manager and farm director while Phil Watson took over the bench. But Milt returned to coaching early in the 1962-63 season and remained on the bench until Harry Sinden succeeded him for the 1966-67 season.

RE-BUILDING BEGINS

Patrick left the Bruins organization at the end of the 1966-67 season when Leighton "Hap" Emms, long associated with Canadian Junior Hockey, took over as general manager. Schmidt became his assistant.

Emms, who had come in on a two-year basis, resigned last spring and Schmidt took over the job of rebuilding the Bruins.

In the past 43 years the Bruins have had their days of glory. Besides the three Stanley Cups, they finished first 10 times. Tiny Thompson won the Georges Vezina Memorial Trophy four times and Frank Brimsek, twice.

Eddie Shore was a four-time winner of the Dr. David B. Hart Trophy, as the league's Most Valuable Player, while Bill Cowley earned the honor twice and Milt Schmidt, once.

Schmidt, Cooney Weiland and Herb Cain won the individual scoring title; Brimsek, Jack Gelineau and Larry Regan were joined last year by Bobby Orr as Calder Memorial Trophy winners as outstanding rookies. Bobby Bauer, three times, and Don McKenney, once, were awarded the Byng Trophy as most gentlemanly players.

Hockey's Hall of Fame, now located at the Canadian National Exhibition Grounds, numbers 16 members of the Bruins organization. They are: Charles F. Adams and Walter Brown as builders; and former players Dit Clapper, Eddie Shore, Nels Stewart, Mickey Mackay, Tiny Thompson, Milt Schmidt, Frank Frederickson, Art Ross, Duke Keats, Sylvio Mantha, Sprague Cleghorn, Cy Denneny, Frank Brimsek and Harry Oliver.

WESTON W. ADAMS

**PRESIDENT AND
CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD**



BOSTON'S number one sportsman is Weston W. Adams . . . He is best known to the present generation as president and chairman of the board of the Boston Bruins . . . But, his sports interests are much more varied . . . He is one of the leading backers of the Boston side in the United Soccer Association . . . He has been a Marblehead sailing enthusiast for years . . . At Harvard, he played on the baseball and hockey teams . . . Later he raced a stable of thoroughbreds on the New England circuit, Suffolk Downs which his dad, the late Charles F. Adams, built; Rockingham Park and Narragansett, as well as in Florida . . . Hockey, however, has always been his first love . . . His association with the Bruins dates back 44 years to the time his dad purchased an N.H.L. franchise and established Boston as the first N.H.L. city in the United States . . . His first executive position with the Bruins was as president of the Bruins' Cubs . . . In 1936 he succeeded his dad as Bruins' president . . . During his regime the Bruins won their last two Stanley Cups in 1939 and 1941 . . . He became president for the second time after the death of Walter A. Brown, three years ago . . . He also succeeded him as an N.H.L. governor . . . A past president of the Boston Stock Exchange and a member of the New York Stock Exchange, Weston devotes most of his time, now, to his sports interests . . . His son, John Weston, is executive director of the professional soccer team . . . His son, Weston, Jr., is active around the hockey office . . . His daughter, Wendy, is the wife of Shelby Davis, one of the Bruins' directors.



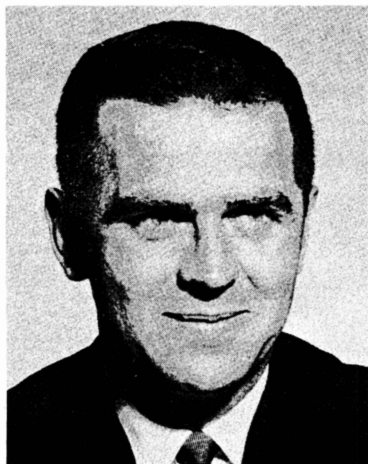
MILT SCHMIDT

GENERAL MANAGER

AN old face in a new place . . . That is the situation this year as Milt Schmidt moves into the general manager's role . . . This will be Schmidt's 32nd year with the Bruins' organization, with whom he started as a teenage prospect back in 1937-38 . . . Assistant general manager a year ago, Milt succeeded Hap Emms in his present role a few months back . . . As a player, Schmidt had no peers . . . During his 16 years of active service (he missed three prime years, 1942-45 because of WWII service in the RCAF) he was named All-Star center three times, won the Hart Trophy as the league's most valuable player, led the league in scoring in 1939-40 and wound up as a member of Hockey's Hall of Fame . . . In 1954-55, he retired as a player and succeeded Lynn Patrick as Bruins' coach . . . His coaching career extended over a period of 11 years . . . A year ago he moved up to the front office while Harry Sinden took over as bench boss . . . Milt's first major move as general manager the past spring was a multi-player trade with Chicago, which brought centers Phil Esposito and Fred Stanfield and right-winger Ken Hodge to the Bruins, in exchange for Gil Marotte, Pit Martin and Jack Norris . . . Schmidt is a year-round Greater Boston resident, making his home in Needham with his wife, Marie, daughter, Nancy and son, Milt, Jr.

HARRY SINDEN

COACH



It is a wise man who realizes his mistakes . . . Harry Sinden has to be placed in the category of a wise man, because he says he is aware of the mistakes he made as a freshman National Hockey League coach, last year with the Bruins . . . For one thing, he says that he overestimated the ability of his veteran players . . . "That won't happen again," he averred . . . Sinden is a pleasant young man of 33, still the youngest coach in the league . . . He expresses himself well and refreshingly different, because he refrains from the old cliches and coins bright new phrases . . . Last season was the first time in his seven-year coaching career that his team finished out of the playoffs . . . He started as playing coach with Kingston, in the old Eastern Pro League, in 1961-62 . . . He shifted with the franchise to Minnesota, in 1963, and was with Oklahoma City the first year it was represented in the Central League . . . Harry is a coach who stresses positional play and forechecking . . . He reasons that if his players force and force and force the opposition, their opponents will make mistakes . . . When mistakes are made his players, if they are in proper positions, will capitalize with goals . . . He spent the off-season in Collins Bay, Ontario, selling real estate . . . He is married and has four daughters, Nancy 15, Carol 14, Donna 12 and Julie 2.

He has been since his junior amateur days with the Niagara Falls Flyers . . . A rugged, 190 pounder, he uses his weight to good advantage on opposing forwards . . . He isn't a spectacular rusher but he skates well enough to move the puck if he has to and he is solid defensively . . . A native of Niagara Falls, he moved right on to the Flyers when he was old enough to play junior hockey and starred for them for four years . . . He still makes his home there with his wife, Jean Marie . . . He worked on construction in the vacation resort the past summer and did some skating so that he would report in top shape.

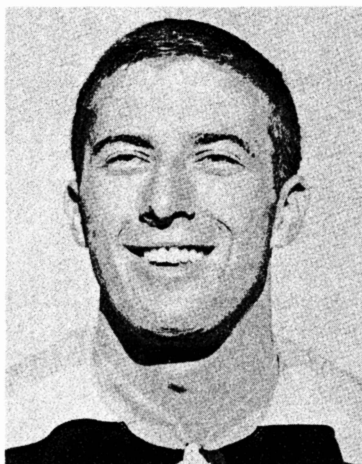

Called up to the Bruins the last few games of the past season, Don impressed Schmidt so much with his improvement in all departments that he was protected in the expansion draft, last Spring . . . The 23-year-old product of the Niagara Falls junior Flyers has shown flashes of greatness in the past but never fulfilled that potential . . . Awrey has been a pro for four years, only one of which was a full season with the Bruins . . . That was in 1965-66 when he played the entire 70 games both as a defenseman and left wing . . . A year ago he seemed to mature all at once, under the careful handling of Hershey coach, Frank Mather's, a former defense ace . . . Don is married to a former Greater Boston girl, Leah Harris, and makes his off-season home in Waterloo, Ontario.

JOHNNY BUCYK started his 10th season as a Bruin in third place among the all-time Bruins' point-getters and goal-scorers . . . In his 9 years with Boston, the "Chief," as he is called by his teammates, amassed 543 points, five behind Bill Cowley in second place and 32 back of the Bruins' all-time leader, the present general manager, Milt Schmidt . . . Bucyk's 216 goals in a Boston uniform likewise left him behind the top man, Schmidt with 229 and former all-star forward and defenseman, Dit Clapper, 228 . . . Johnny topped the Bruins in scoring last year with 18 goals and 30 assists . . . It was only the fourth time in his Boston career that he failed to score at least 20 goals . . . He was near the mark but an injured back kept him on the sidelines the last three games of the schedule . . . Bucyk is the Bruins' oldest player in point of service . . . He is the last member of the highscoring "Uke" line with Bronco Horvath and Vic Stasiuk, that sparked the Bruins to their last playoff berth, in 1958-59 . . . There are few major-leaguers better at digging the puck out of the corners than the "Chief" . . . He scored his 200th goal in Montreal, Wednesday, March 9, 1966 and now is only 33 short of the 250 club . . . In the off-season he works on his in-laws fruit farm in Erickson, B. C. . . . He is married and has two children, Jo Anne, 7 and Larry Edward, 4.

THE biggest surprise of the N.H.L. expansion meetings last June was when the Bruins protected Cheevers as their top goaltending choice . . . Bruins' officials felt the 27-year-old backstop rated that honor in view of having the best average of all the Boston netminders in N.H.L. competition last year and his fine play in sparking Oklahoma City to its second straight Adams Cup triumph, in the Central League playoffs . . . Bruins obtained Cheevers in the draft from Toronto two years ago . . . He has been with the Bruins in N.H.L. competition for only brief periods in each of the past two years . . . But, he apparently showed General Manager Milt Schmidt something to pick him as his top goaltender . . . Coach Harry Sinden is sold on him after winning the Central League title with him in goal at Oklahoma City, two years ago . . . "He's not the picture-type goaltender," says Sinden, "but he gets the job done and that's all that really counts." . . . When his hockey-playing days are over Cheevers would like to become a horse trainer . . . Summers usually finds him around the stable areas of the Ontario tracks, learning the business . . . His off-season neighbor in St. Catherines is new teammate, Fred Stanfield . . . Gerry is married and has a three-year-old son, Craig.

AS far as Gary Doak is concerned, 1966-67 was a lost season . . . A month or so before he was to report to the Bruins' training camp, the handsome, young defenseman went roller skating with some friends in his home town . . . He fell and broke his leg . . . It was December before he was able to start skating again — ice skating, that is . . . He was sent to Boston's Oklahoma City affiliate to get into playing shape and he joined the Bruins for the last half of the season . . . But, he never really showed the form which made him one of the N.H.L.'s most promising young defensemen the year before . . . Obviously hampered by the injury, he was unable to skate with his usual proficiency . . . The past summer he worked hard to get his leg back into shape . . . A great deal depends on how Doak plays this year, whether the Bruins stay where they have been or move up the league ladder . . . This is a rugged 22-year-old who is mean and tough on the defense which is what the Bruins have lacked in recent years . . . Bruins obtained him two years ago from Detroit, in exchange for Leo Boivin . . . Hap Emms, then Bruins general manager, had been impressed by him when Gary played for the Hamilton Red Wings against Niagara Falls Flyers, in the OHA Junior A league . . . Doak is a bachelor.

PHIL ESPOSITO finished seventh among the N.H.L. scorers the past season . . . He had 27 and 23 goals respectively, the two years before that . . . Some critics tended to belittle his scoring efforts because he centered for Bobby Hull and "is bound to pick up goals just off Hull's rebounds" . . . Esposito admits it was probably so but adds "I always station myself in front of the net when I play on a line with a shooter like Hull, so that I'm in position to score on rebounds." . . . If he plays with wings who don't shoot as much, Phil says, then he'll shoot more . . . "What does it matter how he gets them as long as he gets them," pointed out Toronto's King Clancy. "You got yourself a heck of a hockey player in Esposito. He's good offensively and he covers the whole ice defensively. He's big and doesn't get pushed around either." . . . The articulate Esposito was a bit shocked when he heard the trade news. Not that he was traded to Boston, but that he was traded in the multi-player deal which also brought Ken Hodge and Fred Stanfield to the Bruins, just before the rosters were frozen last May 15 . . . Esposito was attending a dinner when his wife phoned to tell him of the trade . . . So, Phil hustled over to the Sault Ste. Marie TV station where he has a nightly sports program with former teammate, Matt Ravlich, to announce to his listeners the news of his trade . . . Phil is married and has a daughter, Laurie, three years old.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR ELECTION TO THE HOCKEY HALL OF FAME



Any person who is, or has been distinguished in hockey as a Player, Executive or as a Referee, shall be eligible for election.

Player and Referee candidates will normally have completed their active participating careers five years prior to election, but in exceptional cases, this period may be shortened by the Hockey Hall of Fame Committee.

Candidates for election as Executives and Referees shall be nominated only by the Hockey Hall of Fame Committee and upon election shall be known as "Builders."

Candidates for election shall be chosen on the basis of "playing ability, integrity, character and their contribution to their team and the game of hockey in general."

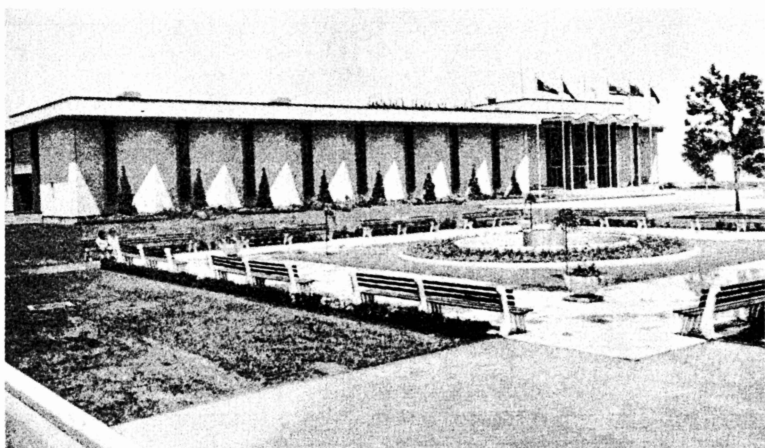

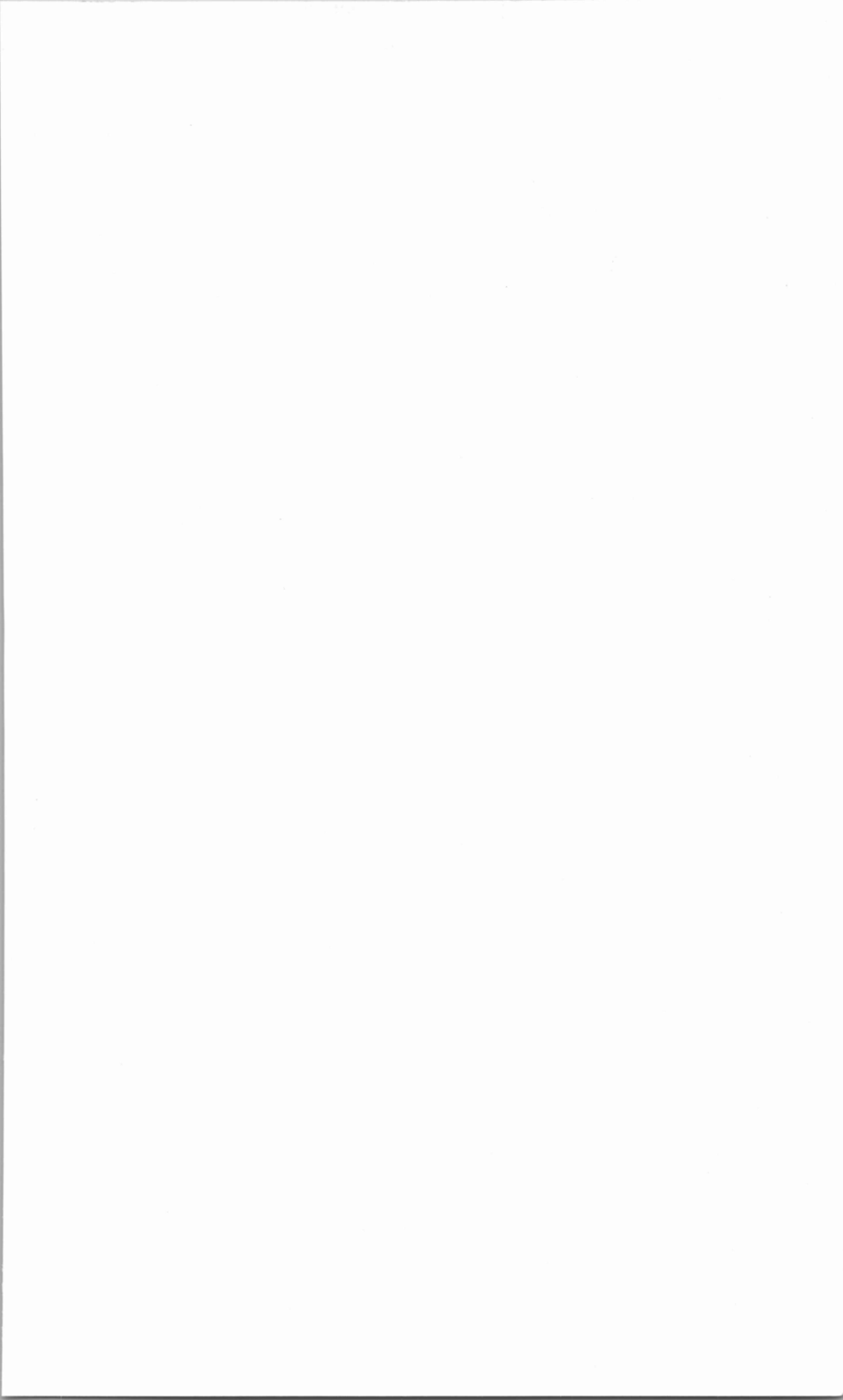
