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JOHN PETER GOTTSSELIG

If you do your work well with the Black Hawks you are liable to stay with them until your beard covers your chest. Take the case of John Peter Gottselig for instance. John came to the Black Hawks in 1928-29 and is now entering the nineteenth season of his illustrious career in the N.H.L. For sixteen years he established himself as a topflight left wing and when he hung up his playing skates he was made coach of the Black Hawks by President W. J. Tobin.

During his playing days Gottselig was always among the high point getters of the league, an outstanding team player and a great stick handler. He was known throughout the hockey world as the "Hoppe of Hockey" as he was considered the peer of all stick handlers and puck manipulators.

John became a professional in 1926-27 with the Regina Caps of the Western Canada League. He played with them one season and went up the ladder to become a member of the Winnipeg Maroons in 1927-28. Johnny arrived in the Windy City in the fall of 1928 and remained an important fixture in the Chicago lineup until midway in the 1940-41 season when he was sent to Kansas City as playing manager, finishing out the season and remaining all the next with the K. C. club. He returned to the Black Hawks in 1942-43 and at the close of the 1944-45 season he relieved Paul Thompson as manager of the Black Hawks.

Gottselig was a playing member of the Hawks when they first won the Stanley Cup in 1933-34 and again in 1937-38.

To those closely connected with hockey Johnny is known as a friendly and congenial fellow, well liked by players and fans around the N.H.L. circuit.

Johnny is a native of Russia. He was born in Odessa on June 24, 1905 and brought to Canada as a babe in arms. He learned the game of hockey in Regina, Sask. where he grew up. He is now an American citizen. He is married and has one daughter. He makes Chicago his home.

DOUG BENTLEY

Speed and determination are the principal hockey assets of Doug Bentley who operates on a Black Hawk line alongside of Brother Max and Billie Mosienko.

In 1945-46 a severe knee injury kept Doug out of fourteen games and probably cost the Bentley-Bentley-Mosienko an all-time record for points. As it was, they were only together for 28 games and outpointed the celebrated Lach-Richard-Blake string of the Canadiens who operated together in the entire 50 contests.

Doug was going like wild fire when a collision with Toe Blake produced a knee cartilage injury which nearly wrecked the Hawks' dashing first string. Last season Doug's knee was injured again and although out of the lineup for eight games he nevertheless finished the season in sixth in the scoring list ahead of such campaigners as Toe Blake, Woody Dumart and Syd Abel who played the entire sixty games.

Doug has had a peculiar hockey career. Nine years ago, when he was only 22, he was on Boston's reserve list and was given scant attention at the Bruin's training camp. The next year he was selected by the Toronto Maple Leaf's scouts as a potential big leaguer and again he received a more meager lookover, so back to the sticks he went again. Approaching his twenty-fifth birthday he was put on the Hawks' list and reported to their training camp at Hibbing, Minnesota where he received a lot of attention from Manager Thompson, Gottselig and President Tobin. He was used sparingly in his first two seasons as a major leaguer but in 1941-42 he started off like a prairie fire on a line with Brother Max and the speedy Mush March, only to be severely injured early in the season. The injury kept him from the game and impaired his usefulness for the remainder of the season.

Every one of Doug's brothers played hockey and at one time they had a whole team of their own with their Dad the coach.

Doug and Max talked the Hawks into bringing up brother Red and for a while in 1941 the three played on the same line which was the only time in N.H.L. history that three brothers performed in such a fashion. However, Reg failed to remain in the big time and Doug remarked: "I just don't know why he couldn't make it, he was on the same line with us and we did everything we could for him. We passed to him all the time." That statement typifies the spirit of the Bentleys.

The Bentley family hails from Delisle, Saskatchewan where Doug was born on September 3, 1916. Doug weighs 145 pounds and is one of the league's lightweights. He stands 5 feet, seven inches, is married and has two daughters. Like brother Max, he also is a wheat farmer in the off season.

CHARLES "CHUCK" CONACHER

Charlie "Chuck" Conacher, big right winger of Toronto Maple Leafs' famed "Kid Line" of the 1930's is back in the National Hockey League again - but this time minus the skates and the potent war club that made him one of the big guns of the hockey world, and Leaf's one of the most feared teams in the circuit.

Chuck came back to the big time the last week of 1947 as coach of the cellar-dwelling Chicago Black Hawks, replacing Johnny Gottselig who moved upstairs to become general manager of Bill Tobin's squad. Thus the burly Chuck, starboard patrolman of the high-flying Kid Line, joins his younger brother Roy who lined up with the Hawks this season after a salary dispute and holdout with Detroit Red Wings. Roy, after a lengthy holdout with Wings, was traded to New York Rangers but refused to sign with them, threatening to hang up his skates for good. It was said at the time that Roy's brothers, Chuck and Lionel, changed his mind and persuaded him to return to the hockey scene.

Charlie is a native of Toronto and is still a young man of 37. He played nine years with the Maple Leafs, joining them at the tender age of 19 back in 1929 and staying with them until the end of the 1937-38 season. The next season saw him in the Red and White uniform of the Detroit Red Wings where he played one season. For the 1939-40 and 1940-41 seasons he dressed in the star-spangled uniform of Red Dutton's now defunct New York Americans.

In five of his first seasons in the National Hockey League Charlie placed among the first three leading scorers. In 1934-35 he led the league scorers with 32 goals and 22 assists for a total of 54 points. In 1933-34 he scored 36 goals and 21 assists for a total of 57 points.

While with the Leafs, Conacher rated the first all-star team for three consecutive seasons being selected for the second team twice. He played on the first team in the 1933-34, 34-35 and 35-36 seasons, and was placed on the second team in the 1931-32 and 32-33 seasons.

It has been said that Conacher had the hardest shot of any player in the National League of his time and once split one of the boards at the end of the Maple Leaf Gardens after letting a sizzler go.

His career in hockey was not by any means confined to playing the game. During 1943-44 he coached the famed Oshawa Generals Juniors to the Memorial Cup championship. From that same junior team no less than seven players are now playing pro hockey in both the National and American Leagues, among them are Harvey Bennett, now tending the goals for Providence Reds, Gus Mortson of the Toronto Maple Leafs, and "Wild" Bill Ezinicki of the same team, Ted Lindsay with the Detroit Red Wings, Floyd Curry of the Montreal Canadians and Kenny Smith of the Boston Bruins.

AUGUSTUS "GUS" BODNAR

Bodnar came to the Hawks in the highly profitable five for two deal with the Toronto Maple Leafs. He is again reunited with his fellow townsmen, Stewart and Poile, on a line that was colorfully dubbed, "The Flying Forts."

There isn't a hockey player in captivity with more "moxie" than the slender center-ice man. Shifty and dogged in his tactics, Gus despite his apparent frailty, is nobody's pushover and doesn't back up from the largest opponents, and is a veritable puck hound from the first to the last whistle in every game.

Gus turned professional in 1943-44 and wound up being selected the rookie of the year and the recipient of the Calder Trophy. He bagged 22 goals and 40 assists for 62 points, the highest total a freshman ever accumulated.

Like his linemates, Gaye Stewart and Bud Poile, Gus was born at Fort William, Ontario on April 24, 1923 and got his hockey start in that thriving Lakehead City. He played his first important hockey with the Fort William Hurricane-Rangers in 1941-42 and was top scorer in the Thunder Bay League.

After three full seasons with the Toronto Maple Leafs in which Gus scored 48 goals and 105 assists, he was for some unknown reason assigned to Pittsburgh in the middle of last season and remained with that club until secured by the Hawks. It looks like the hockey fates have again looked favorably upon young Gus and he is determined to show the hockey fans all over the country that he is doubling back to stardom in the N.H.L.

Gus is single and the idol of the "bobby sox" fanettes throughout the league. He spends the summer months around Toronto as an "exterior decorator".

ADAM BROWN

Adam Brown came to the Black Hawks from the Red Wings December 11th of last season in a deal which sent Pete Horeck to the Detroit club. Both teams thought they had the better of the deal but the end of the season showed Brown far higher in the scoring list than Horeck.

Two seasons ago Brown was the Wings' highest scorer but he suffered a ligament injury early in a game of last season which kept him from hitting his regular stride until the 1946-47 grind was half over.

Brown is one of the speediest forwards in the major league and now is mated with Alex Kaleta and George Gee who are also two fleet forwards.

Brown spent all of his pro playing days as a member of the Red Wings organization before joining the Hawks. He started with the Omaha Knights in 1940-41, in the old American Association, climbed to Indianapolis of the American League in 1941-42 and by mid-season was with the Wings.

Adams joined the Canadian Army in 1944 and was out of hockey for a year. He was discharged in August of 1945 and played all season with the Wings.

Brown, like the Hawks' great goal tender Charlie Gardiner, was born in Scotland, February 4, 1920. He stands five feet nine inches and weighs 175 pounds. Adam glories in his Scottish ancestry and is the first one on the team to discover a new Scotch joke.

Brown is married and has two children. He makes his home in Hamilton, Ontario. He owns and operates a filling station in the summer months. He spends his free hours playing golf and softball and also manages a ball club which tours Ontario on weekends with considerable success.

ROY CONACHER

Roy Conacher was the sixth player to be acquired by the Black Hawks in recent deals made by President Bill Tobin to bolster the faltering Hawks. The sharp-shooting Conacher, youngest member of Toronto's three famed brothers whose playing careers just about span the N.H.L.'s modern history, had planned to retire from the game this season.

On hearing of his planned retirement, President Bill Tobin of the Black Hawks secured permission from Red Wing owner, James Norris, Sr. to negotiate with Conacher, and Roy surrendered to the folding money offered by Mr. Tobin. "It wasn't hard to sign Roy", said the Chicago owner, "I just offered him so much money he couldn't refuse".

That the transaction was a satisfactory one to Chicago is proven by the scoring records Roy compiled for the 1946-47 season. He finished second to Maurice Richard in goal scoring, with 30 tallies and seventh among the league's point getters. It also marked the fourth time in five regular N.H.L. seasons that Roy had surpassed 20 goals.

Possessed of one of the hardest shots in the league, Roy is deadly when he has the puck near the opponents' goal. In addition to his powerful shot he is a clever stick-handler and can as easily dump the puck in as to blister it past any enemy goaler.

Off the ice Conacher is a deep-voiced, quiet person with a love of sports. When not playing hockey you will find him a regular attendant at any sporting event currently playing. On the road he is a reader and a walker, has little interest in the usually all-consuming card games.

Roy was born in Toronto, Ontario October 5, 1916. He stands six feet one inch and weighs 175 pounds. He is married and has one son. During the summer he works with his famous brother, Charlie, on the latter's large farm near Toronto.

ERNIE DICKENS

Dickens comes to the Black Hawks with the highest recommendations of all those who played with him and against him when he was with the Pittsburgh Hornets, farm club of the Toronto Maple Leafs. A rangy and rugged individual who never stops battling, with plenty of hockey "savvy", he led all defensemen in total scoring points in the American League last season.

After a glimpse of Ernie in action and his great record, Hawk officials made sure he was included in the five for two players deal with the Toronto club. Both President Bill Tobin and Manager Johnny Gottselig are of the opinion that Ernie should fit in nicely with plans to produce a rugged, battling Hawk defense.

Teamed with Bashing Bob Goldham, Ernie is continuing his dynamiting, and with such a formidable duo on the Hawks' rear line, Chicago fans are reminded of such other former Hawk stalwarts as Taffy Abel, Lionel Conacher and Cy Wentworth.

Cold figures illustrate that Ernie was a mighty useful puck chaser for Pittsburgh the past two seasons. Official records credit him with 20 points in 1945-46 and 51 points in 1946-47. His great all around play last season caused managers and coaches to select him as the All Star defense man of the American League.

Ernie gained his hockey schooling around Winnipeg, Manitoba. He turned pro with the Providence "Reds" in 1941-42, was sold to Toronto in 1942-43 and had been travelling back and forth between Toronto and Pittsburgh since then. However, since being acquired by the Hawks, Ernie is definitely "here to stay" in the N. H. L. It has always been his ambition to play for the Hawks and now that he is with them he is determined to become a Chicago immortal.

Ernie was born in Winnipeg, Manitoba on June 25, 1921. He stands an even six feet and weighs 175 pounds. He is married and makes his home in Toronto. His teammates call him "Punch".

WILLIAM GADSEY

Gadsby was one of the youngest players in the past decade to ever make the big time. He was a standout performer with the Edmonton Canadians, Junior Champions of Alberta in 1944-45, a Hawk sponsored farm club. President W. J. Tobin and Manager Gottselig watched Bill with mounting enthusiasm all through that season and decided that he would be a sensation with the Hawks.

Gadsby was signed to a professional contract in 1946 and was assigned to the Kansas City Pla-Mors for further experience. He showed such great improvement in the few short weeks with the Pla-Mors that he was called to the Hawks much sooner than was expected, and was a welcome addition to the Black Hawks' defense last season.

Bill has rapidly picked up the experience needed and Manager Gottselig figures him a future star. He has that extra speed and determination which great stars of hockey always seem to possess. He blocks hard and plays for keeps and seldom is penalized because his moves are made right out in the open. He is gradually making the hard-bitten hockey critics sit up and take notice, and the "boys" around the circuit are beginning to sing his praises.

Young Bill was born in Calgary, Alberta on August 8, 1927. He stands an even six feet tall and weights 185 pounds. He is single.

Gadsby makes his summer home in Edmonton, Alberta. Plays baseball in the off season and ranks as one of Western Canada's best catchers.

GEORGE GEE

When the Hawks' manager, Johnny Gottselig, was head of the Kansas City team in 1941-42 Gee turned pro hockey with the team and Gottselig was impressed from the very start with the hockey potentialities of the rangy center.

George, a will o' the wisp on skates, has no peer in spectacular rink length rushes. He brings back memories of that "Ghost of the Ice Lanes", Bill Cowley.

George was slated for a tryout with the Hawks in 1942-43 but the war intervened and he was kept from hockey for three seasons while he served his country in the Navy. Upon receiving his discharge in the Fall of 1945, Gee was again sent to Kansas City but only for a few months just to get the feel of things. He was called up to the Hawks in December, 1945 and has been a regular ever since. He played in only 35 games in the 1945-46 season and just missed the Calder rookie award by a scant few points, finishing runner-up to Edgar Laprade of the New York Rangers, the award winner.

Gee's every move on the ice takes old timers back to the heyday of Morenz, Boucher, Cowley and Gottselig who were master stick wielders and shifty skaters of their day.

George played under a constant handicap last season, being bothered with a chronic appendix. He underwent an operation last September and had it removed, and Hawk hopes are high that he'll come bouncing back this season to the high standard as of yore.

George played his amateur hockey in Owen Sound and Sudbury, Ontario. He was born on June 28, 1922 in Stratford, Ontario, the same city that gave hockey Howie Morenz. He stands six feet tall and weighs 170 pounds. He is married and has one daughter. He is now an American Citizen and makes Chicago his home.

ROBERT "BOB" GOLDHAM

Bashing Bob Goldham, Georgetown, Ontario's gift to the N.H.L. is regarded as one of the best young defensemen currently extant in professional hockey. One inch over the six-foot mark, Big Bob packs 192 pounds of meat on his solid frame and, with the verve of youth, relishes rugged going. Schooled in his rookie days by Bucko McDonald, Golden Boy Goldham is proving that he has learned Bucko's Three R's - Ram 'em, Rough 'em and Reef 'em - to perfection.

Goldham came to the Hawks in the recent big player swap with Toronto in which seven players were involved. Hockey experts valued the players at well over \$100,000 which is believed to be the biggest deal in National League history.

Bob had been sought by President Bill Tobin for many weeks prior to the deal and had offered Conny Smythe, Toronto boss, \$25,000 cash but Smythe repeatedly refused the offer.

Goldham turned pro in 1941-42 with Toronto Maple Leafs and was sent to Hershey of the American League for seasoning. He was recalled by the Leafs just before they entered the N.H.L. playoffs and it was his spectacular playing and body checking in that series that enabled the Maple Leafs to win the Stanley Cup.

Bob enlisted in the Canadian Navy in the spring of 1942 and served his country for three years. Upon receiving his honorable discharge he returned to the Leafs and was outstanding in the 1945-46 season. After playing in 11 games last season Bob broke his left arm and was relegated to the sidelines for six months. He reported to the Leafs this fall but was loaned to their farm club, the Pittsburgh Hornets, in order that he might give his arm a good test and regain his confidence. His play thus far this season has proven to all that his arm is as good as ever and that Bob is back in his old time form.

Goldham got his hockey start around Toronto where he played junior hockey for the Marlboros. He turned pro when only 18 with Hershey of the American League.

Bob was born in Georgetown, Ontario on May 12, 1922. He stands 6'1" and weighs 192 pounds. He is married and makes his home in Toronto.

ROBERT "RED" HAMILL

"Red" came to the Black Hawks in 1941-42 from Boston and was the leading scorer of the team his first season. Always a prolific scorer in the big time, "Red" has accounted for 20 or more each year since he has been with the Hawks. He is still rated as one of the best all-around players in the N.H.L. and a mighty Handy Andy when it comes to checking and killing time when the Hawks are shorthanded. He is one of the heaviest forwards in the game today and likes nothing better than to toss his 200 pounds into the opposition. He can play any position -- and good. In any kind of going he'll give you all he's got, either on offense or defense.

Hamill turned pro with the Providence Reds in 1937-38. The year before that he made a great hit with the Copper Cliff "Redmen" Junior Champions of Ontario. In his minor league days he was buffeted for two seasons by Boston on player deals to the Hershey and Providence teams. In 1942-43, his first full season with the Hawks, he made 28 goals to break a Hawks' team record of 25 held by Babe Dye for fifteen seasons.

In the summer of 1943 Red was called by the Canadian Army and spent two seasons overseas. He received his honorable discharge as a sergeant and rejoined the Hawks for the 1945-46 season. He again finished high up in the scoring statistics, proving that he had not lost his scoring "eye". Last season he notched 21 goals which made the fourth consecutive year that big "Red" has entered the charmed circle of 20 goals or more per season.

Last winter Red worked like a trojan in a losing cause and this season---after a rugged summer getting himself in good playing condition --he is--back, looking as keen as ever and rarin' to go.

Hamill lives in Toronto, Ontario where he was born on January 11, 1917. He stands 5'11" and tips the scales at 200 pounds. He is married and the father of a son and a daughter.

ALEX "SEABISCUIT" KALETA

A standout performer on the Black Hawks' squad. Kaleta, a big rawboned winger, is - to use an old skating term - an "ice sprawler" which means he fills a lot of space when speeding down the ice with the puck. A shifty and crafty stickhandler and a sturdy body checker who gives and takes the jolts with utmost equanimity and a smile. There is no better natured player in the N.H.L. than the awkward, gliding Russian-Ukranian who answers to the nickname of "Seabiscuit".

Alex is a mighty useful operator as he plays either right or left wing equally well and has demonstrated that he is a steady goal scorer and an exceptionally good backchecker. He is considered a "puck hog", and likes nothing better than to have possession of the "rubber disc" and display his stick handling ability. This tendency often forces him to get in position at least twice before he parts with the puck. However, a good yell from his linemates generally snaps him out of it and more often than not he comes through with some spectacular plays.

Kaleta turned pro with the Black Hawks in 1941-42 and at the end of the season was called for war duty, serving in the Canadian Army for three years. He returned to the Hawks in 1945-46 and has been with them since.

Alex gained most of his amateur experience as a member of three of Western Canada's greatest organizations, the Lethbridge Maple Leafs Senior team in 1937-38 and 1940-41, the Calgary Stampeders in 1938-39 and the Regina Capitals in 1939-40.

Alex was born in Canmore, Alberta on November 29, 1919 and stands 5' 11½". He weights 175 lbs. The "Seabiscuit" is married and plans on making his permanent home in Chicago,

JOHN MARIUCCI

Mariucci, one of the few United States born hockey players in the N.H.L., is a product of the Eveleth High School and Eveleth College hockey teams of 1932-33-34-35. He was coached by Cliff Thompson who gave more really great hockey players to the game, from the limited number he had to tutor, than any other coach - Canadian or American. Others who became famous under Thompson's tutelage are: Brimsek, Karakas and Lopresti.

Mariucci is best known of the four, particularly in the United States where he attained fame for his great football playing under the coaching of Bernie Bierman while a member of the University of Minnesota Golden Gophers of 1937-38-39. Johnny played left end on those teams and was a chosen all-conference and for three seasons. He was also a member of the University's hockey team. It was the leading college team of the United States during the years Mariucci played on defense.

In 1940-41 Mariucci reported to the Hawks' training camp at St. Paul and looked so good that the Hawks signed him to a contract and sent him to the Providence Reds, the Hawks' farm team, for more seasoning. He developed so rapidly that he made an appearance in a Chicago uniform late in 1941 where he made good from the very start, and the following season-1941-42 - he clinched a regular spot on the Hawks' defense.

On the ice - at home or away - "Maroosh" has a few traits and characteristics that you might associate with Murder, Incorporated. There isn't any doubt in the world that Johnnie plays to win and for keeps, and this probably makes him the most "booed" player to ever operate in the N.H.L. However, off the ice he is one of the most pleasant and gentlemanly fellows you could meet.

Because of his record as a leader and his general all around ability, Mariucci was elected captain of this season's Hawk team. It is the first time an American born player was chosen to lead an N.H.L. squad.

Mariucci has been a real iron man of the puck chasing game. Back in 1939 in the A. A. U. tournament he played 56 minutes of a game one afternoon and came back an hour later to play 57 minutes of the next encounter.

Johnnie spent three years in the U. S. Coast Guard and also played for the "Cutters", a team that won the Eastern Amateur Championship in 1943-44-45. Upon receiving his discharge he reported to the Hawks again and his showing the past two seasons has earned him a spot in the hearts of Chicago fans. In a recent interview John Gottselig, the Hawks' pilot said "Mariucci has been outstanding in his play when two of the greatest scorers in the league are opposing the Hawks. The two are Apps of Toronto and Richard of Montreal. Both have admitted that "Maroosh" is "pure Pizen" to them."

Mariucci is of Italian parentage and was born in Eveleth, Minnesota. He weighs 200 pounds and according to his teammates he won't back up for any player in the league. He stands 5'10". He is married and the father of one daughter.

BILL MOSIENKO

Bill Mosienko will be lost to the Black Hawks for most of the 1947-48 season. Bill suffered an ankle injury in the National Hockey League's first All-Star game in Toronto two days before the start of the present season.

No hockey team in history was hit as hard as the Black Hawks were when the speedy little right wing was taken away from them in such sudden fashion. And no team in major league history needed a player of Bill's calibre as much as the Black Hawks did this season.

Mosienko, off to a poor start last season, came like a whirlwind after the Holidays and finished in ninth place in the scoring statistics.

"Wee Willie," a nickname applied to Mosienko in his early days as a major leaguer, is a misnomer for Mosienko who only stands 5 feet, 6 inches is nevertheless a chunky individual tipping the beam around 158 pounds.

Season before last "Mosey" was awarded the Lady Byng Trophy, annual award to the player whose conduct on the ice, coupled with a lot of hockey ability, is considered the most sportsmanlike by the hockey sports writers of the N.H.L. Mosienko was the fourth Chicago player to win this honor since its inception: in 1936 it was won by "Doc" Romnes; Max Bentley took it in '43 and Clint Smith was named in '44. It is also the first time since the trophy was first presented that three different players from the same team have won it in three successive seasons.

Born in Winnipeg, Manitoba on November 2, 1922, Mosienko played amateur hockey in his native city under the fall of '40 when he was invited by President Bill Tobin of the Hawks to attend training camp. He performed so well that he was offered a contract and farmed out to the Kansas City club for seasoning under the watchful eye of Johnny Gottselig who, incidentally, will coach the Black Hawks this season. Mosienko came along rapidly under Gottselig's tutelage and when he moved up to the Hawks in the fall of '42 he immediately established himself as a regular.

In the 1943-44 season he was a standout, garnering 32 goals and 38 assists for a point total of 70, some achievement when consideration is given to the fact that it was only his second year in the majors and the world's record up to then was 73 points. He was named as the right wing on the N.H.L. Managers' all-star second team.

In 1944-45 "Wee Willie" finished fifth in the regular league scoring with 28 goals and 26 assists for 54 points. He was named on the all-star teams as the right wing of both the N.H.L. Managers' and the Canadian Press second teams.

Mosienko was married in the summer of 1946 and tragically enough he became the father of a boy the night he received the injury which put him on the shelf for this season.

RALPH NATTRASS

Ralph became a major leaguer last season. He graduated from the Hawks' farm team, the Kansas City Pla-Mors, where he played a starring role on defense. Although Ralph is not a spectacular operator, he is a solid and dependable player, and it is these characteristics that convinced the Hawk management that he would be a capable man in the rugged going. Teamed alongside of Bill Gadsby, they form one of the youngest pair of defense men to play in the National League.

Nattrass is a product of the Black Hawks' farm system. He was tagged right from the time he started playing organized hockey and was brought along and tutored through the different stages of development right to the big Leagues. He played two years with the Moose Jaw Canucks, Junior Champions of western Canada, one season with Kansas City and then to the parent club, the Black Hawks.

Ralph is a big, rugged boy tipping the scales at 198 pounds. He is strictly a blocking type of defense player.

Nattrass was born in Gainsboro, Saskatchewan on May 26, 1925 and is another western Canadian lad who hails from the same part of the country that produced such other great players as Eddie Shore, Mush March, the Colvilles and the Bentleys.

Ralph is married and the father of one daughter. He has taken out his U. S. citizenship papers and now makes his home in Kansas City. He is an insurance salesman in the off season.

NORMAN "BUD" POILE

Another Maple Leaf player recently secured in the trade for Max Bentley, Bud Poile is expected to be a standout man for the Hawks. Bigger and heavier and considerably stronger than his linemates, Gus Bodnar and Gaye Stewart, Poile is quite a hunk of hockey player. Six feet tall and weighing about 190 pounds in playing condition, Bud packs one of the hardest shots in the game today. Pucks don't fly any faster than the way Poile propels them, and that deadly drive and his playmaking ability have earned him the nickname of "Point-a-Game" Poile.

Like Gaye Stewart and Gus Bodnar, Poile is a product of the Thunder Bay hockey incubator. He and Bodnar were teammates with the Fort William Hurricane-Rangers in 1940-41 and 1941-42. After Bodnar won the scoring championship of the league in 1940-41, their team manager promised Poile a trip to Toronto to see a Stanley Cup play-off game if he could win the scoring title the next year. Bud did - and got his trip. The following season, in 1942-43, he was playing for-- and not just watching - a National League team. He signed a pro contract with the Toronto Maple Leafs.

Bud was born at Fort William, Ontario, February 10, 1924 and began his climb to hockey's big time via the bantam-midget-juvenile-junior route in his home town.

Bud served in both the Canadian Army and Royal Canadian Air Force during World War II. He was in Oldenburg in northern Germany on VE Day. After receiving his honorable discharge he rejoined the Toronto Maple Leafs and was a big factor in the Leafs' drive for the Stanley Cup.

Poile is married and makes his home in Toronto, Ontario.

Few players breaking into the N. H. L. at the age of 20 have ever been accorded such unanimous and wholehearted approval from the sideline critics as this cagey youngster. From the very time he started playing organized hockey with the Moose Jaw Canucks' Junior team, Metro showed that he had the all-around characteristics of a big leaguer. He was tagged and watched with mounting enthusiasm all through his Junior years and President Bill Tobin and Manager Gottselig knew right along they had a sensational youngster. When Metro signed his professional contract last fall and made the big jump from Junior to National League hockey he joined the ranks with such other prominent stars as Mush March, Busher Jackson and Charlie Conacher, who made the grade in the same way.

Metro is a chunky, dynamic youngster who should be a great favorite with the Chicago fans. They don't make 'em any more spirited than Prystai and his bid for the Calder trophy should be one of the most enlivening aspects of the N.H.L. season.

Metro is a model athlete and adheres to strict and rigid training rules. He now tips the scales at 160 lbs. and is getting stronger as he matures. His hockey ambition always has been to play for the Black Hawks and now that he's with them he intends to stay for many years.

Throughout his amateur days his buddies nicknamed him "Meatball" because Metro is pronounced as Meatro.

Prystai hails from Yorkton, Saskatchewan where he was born on November 7, 1927. He is single. During the off-season he plays baseball.

GAYE STEWART

The third member of the famous "Fort Line", comprising Gus Bodnar and Bud Poile, came to the Black Hawks from Toronto in the five player deal for Max Bentley and Cy Thomas.

Tall, dark, good-looking Gaye topped the N.H.L. in goal scoring in 1945-46 with 37 goals and finished in second place, behind Max Bentley, in the points department. It was a banner year for Gaye. Despite the failure of the Maple Leafs to make the playoffs that spring he was selected on the N.H.L. All-Star team at left wing.

Not since Harvey "Busher" Jackson streaked to stardom in the early 1930's has a left-winger elicited so much admirable comment as Gaye Stewart. He combines remarkable speed with robust, aggressiveness. He has the frame to withstand punishing checks as he literally bulls his way past all obstacles on his dash "goalward". His teammates, taking cognizance of his speed, reached into Dagwood's territory to nickname him "Swish".

Stewart played his first organized hockey with the Port Arthur Juniors in 1939-40. The next season was a historic one for Gaye and hockey. He started out with Toronto Marlboro juniors, graduated to senior, turned pro with Toronto, was sent to Hershey and called up by the Leafs for the Stanley Cup playoffs. Never before had a hockey player taken the four major steps to stardom (junior, senior, minor pro and N.H.L.) all in one season.

In 1942-43, his first full season in the N.H.L., Gaye was acclaimed the rookie-of-the-year and received the Calder Trophy. He also gained the respect of the whole league as a "rookie to handle with care" as a result of his now famous altercations with badman Jimmy Orlando of the Detroit Red Wings, which cost them both a suspension and heavy fine.

Stewart served in the Canadian Navy during the war and received his honorable discharge as a lieutenant.

An inch shy of the six-foot mark, Gaye weighs 175 pounds. He was born in Fort William, Ontario June 28, 1923. His Scottish parents christened him James Gaye. He received his first skates for Christmas at seven and has been using them to good effect ever since. He is married and makes his home in Port Arthur, Ontario.

Stewart is a versatile athlete, ran as a 100,200 and 440 track competitor, played fullback and captained his high school team, now plays a good game of golf, billiards and bowling.

EMILE FRANCIS

Francis has the unique distinction of being one of the few goal tenders to make the jump direct from amateur hockey ranks to the National Hockey League.

Emile was called upon to replace Paul Bibeault toward the close of last season and never before had a youngster been put to the test as young Emile. He played behind a shaky and porous defense and although his goals-against record was not outstanding, through no fault of his own, he showed signs of major league possibilities.

At training camp prior to the start of this season, Francis was constantly tutored and urged by Tiny Thompson, one of the greatest goalies of all time, and he showed such marked improvement that hopes are held high he will show the form that made him a star performer in his amateur days.

Francis possesses a fine pair of hands and picks off blistering drives with the ease and skill of a first baseman. He is a veritable little jumping jack and because of his uncanny recoveries and nimble agility, team mates have nicknamed him "The Cat".

Francis is a product of the Hawks farm system having played junior hockey with the Moose Jaw Canucks, a Hawk sponsored club.

Emile was born in North Battleford, Sask. on September 13, 1926. He stands 5 feet 7 inches and weighs 155 pounds. He is single and makes his home in Moose Jaw.
