THOMAS NATHANIEL IVAN GENERAL MANAGER

When Co-owners James D. Norris and Arthur M. Wirtz were casting about for a man to inject some modern methods into the Black Hawks and build them into a dominant power in the National Hockey League they hired a General Manager they thought best suited for the task.

The man was tiny, conservative Thomas N. "Tommy" Ivan, who spent a most successful career in the Detroit

organization under the shadow of Jack Adams, the cagey, flamboyant manager of the Red Wings.

Ivan's sharp knowledge of hockey and the men best suited to play the game made him an important part of the Red Wing scheme, first as a scout, then a minor league coach, and finally as one of the game's most successful coaches (six consecutive N.H.L. titles and 3 Stanley Cups in 7 years.).

Upon taking over the new duties as General Manager of the Black Hawks, Ivan's first move was to keep together a team that could hold the Hawks' following while setting about the enormous task of rebuilding a solid organization.

Next thing, Ivan recommended certain deals and such players as goalie Glenn Hall, Glen Skov, Pierre Pilote, Ed Litzenberger, Ted Lindsay, Elmer Vasko, and Bobby Hull were acquired. At the end of the first season, Ivan took on the added duties of coach. This additional, and onerous load had been forced on him by the fatal illness of Dick Irvin.

By smart manipulations and fine handling of players, Ivan gradually molded the players into a respectable stop-gap team, and on Jan. 1, 1958 turned over the coaching reins to Rudy Pilous. This permitted Tommy to devote his full time to his main objective - the development of a farm system.

Experts contend that the Black Hawks contain the nucleus of a great team, and that the farm system which the Chicago management has been nurturing since Ivan took over the reins in 1954-55, is about ready to yield what many believe is the finest crop of youngsters under contract to any in the National Hockey League.

Personally, Ivan is a quiet and modest fellow. Sports, and primarily hockey have been his work and play, alike. His one thought is to restore the Hawks' prestige to what it was back in the '30's when they were Stanley Cup winners. He knows hockey and hockey players thoroughly and is constantly searching for new talent to strengthen the club and build the Hawks into a growth organization.

Ivan was born in Toronto, Ont., on January 31, 1911. He's married and makes his permanent home in Skokie, Illinois.

Rudolph "Rudy" Pilous took over the coaching duties of the Chicago Black Hawks mid-way through the 1957-58 season succeeding Tommy Ivan, who had the dual role of general manager and coach at the time.

The seventh son of German immigrants to Winnipeg, Manitoba is an ebullient and blatant young man with rare self-confidence, who has as much faith in exhorta-

tions and admonitions, and perhaps incantations, as any coach who was ever in the game. Conversationally, he can hold his own with any of them.

Pilous has helped to improve the Hawks and restore Chicago to a rip-roaring hockey city with his fire-brand style led by that "Million Dollar Line" of Bill Hay - Bobby Hull and Murray Balfour. He did a masterful job last season in rallying his ranks after the Hawks' poor first half. He gave them rough treatment, he cajoled them when necessary, he kept them believing they could do the impossible. They hit pay dirt when they finished third - the second time in two years - and that was no mean feat.

As a lad, Pilous wanted to become a jockey, and when he was 12 he climbed over the fence at Polo Park, in Winnipeg, to exercise horses. However, he grew so quickly that, after six months, he was far too heavy to ride.

Next, Rudy's ambition was to become a musician, to follow in the footsteps of his musical family. Papa Pilous bought a coronet for his young hopeful, One day Rudy forgot his coronet lessons to go out and practice hockey on a corner lot. He never practiced music again. Papa Pilous promptly sold the coronet.

Rudy had hopes of becoming a star in the N.H.L. But he reluctantly made his decision to abandon his plans for a big league career on the advice of New York Ranger Coach, Frank Boucher. After watching the 6'2", 210-pounder attempting to compensate for his lack of skating ability with determination and muscle, Boucher advised Rudy to forget about playing and take up coaching.

Pilous' first coaching venture was in St. Catharines, Ont. where he interested local business men to form a junior team called the Falcons. When the team failed, Rudy took a job as chief scout and trouble shooter in the Buffalo Bisons farm system. The next two seasons found him resurrecting troubled properties, first at Houston, then at San Diego.

In 1949, it was back to St. Catharines and the formation of the TeePees, a junior "A" team which Pilous was to turn into one of Canada's most successful amateur organization. Four times the TeePees won the Ontario Hockey Assn. title, and twice the Junior Championship of Canada.

In 1955-56 the Hockey News, the N.H.L. official newspaper, named Pilous "hockey executive of the year," the only executive of an amateur club ever so honored.

Pilous was born in Brooklands, Manitoba on Aug. 11, 1914. He is married and has two daughters. His home is on St. Catharines and in the off-season he is assistant-director of public relations of the Ontario Jockey Club.

Al Arbour neither sounds nor looks like a major league hockey player.

His first name is Alger and he's a gaunt, scholarly looking man who wears glasses off and on the ice. He looks more like an associate professor of psychology.

But Arbour is a most competent and proficient defenseman who gets along very well, name and looks to the contrary. So highly regarded is he that the Black Hawks laid down \$15,000 in the N.H.L. draft to get him from the Detroit Red Wings in the summer of 1958.

In his first season with the Hawks, Al teamed with Jack Evans to form the club's stoutest defense pair. He managed to collect 12 points on 2 goals and 10 assists.

Last season Arbour was plagued with an injured leg and was sidelined for 11 games because of it. He managed but one goal and 5 assists. Now Al is healthy again and ready to prove that he is an outstanding rusher and blocker, as well.

Arbour started his hockey career with the Detroit Hettche's of the International League, then graduated to the Windsor Spitfire juniors in 1952-53. Then, before the season ended he was signed to a pro contract by the Detroit Red Wings and rushed to Edmonton Flyers of the Western League to help in their drive to the league title.

Arbour then started out on a Cook's Tour of the Detroit system. He split the 1953-54 season between the Red Wings and Sherbrooke of the Quebec Hockey League. He did the same the following season between Edmonton and Quebec. He spent the entire 1955-56 season with Edmonton. Then midway through the 1956-57 season was called up to the Wings where he stayed until acquired by the Black Hawks.

Al is a quiet, soft-spoken fellow who stands six feet tall and tips the scales at 180 pounds. He is the son of a former professional hockey player from whom he received his early training. Al was born on November 1, 1932 in Sudbury, Ont. He's married and maintains his summer home in his native city.

When speaking of conscientious, hardworking individuals in hockey, the name of Earl Balfour should be high on the list. Of all his talents, Earl's main attribute seems to be a love of plain ordinary hard work, for ever since the Hawks acquired him in the draft from Toronto Maple Leafs in 1957-58 his capacity for toil has stood out like a sore thumb.

Earl is used mostly in the role of a penalty-killer, and has won the praise and admiration of friend and foe alike, for the diligent manner in which he carries out the assignment entrusted to him. He is the type who gives his very best at all times, working extra duty if need be in order to help the team.

Oft referred to as "Spider", the raw-boned, elongated forward got his hockey start in the King Clancy series of the T.H.L. He moved up to the Weston "Dukes" and then to the Marlboro, juniors. The Toronto Maple Leafs signed him to a pro contract in 1951-52 and after a three-game tryout sent him to Pittsburgh of the American League to gain added experience. Leafs recalled him the next semester, but after 17 games was again shipped back to the Hornets where he remained until the end of the 1954-55 season. He was again recalled by Leafs and spent the entire season of 1955-56 with the parent club. He scored 14 goals and 5 assists.

Then, for some unknown reason Earl was sent down to Rochester Americans and spent two complete seasons with them, collecting 21-16-37 points in 1956-57, and 27-31-58 in 1957-58. This fine showing attracted the attention of the Black Hawks and they set out to draft him.

Earl, who is no relation to Murray Balfour, was born in Toronto, Ont. on Jan. 4, 1933. He stands 6'1", and weighs 180 pounds. He's married and in the summer resides in his native city.

There was no great fanfare when the Black Hawks purchased Murray Balfour from the Montreal Canadiens for the sum of \$20,000 at the start of the 1959-60 season. But the drums were beating loudly about him before the campaign came to a close.

A sturdily built forward with natural scoring ability, Balfour became an important cog in the so called "Million Dollar Line" which had Red Hay at center and Bobby Hull at left wing. Furthermore, if Hay hadn't won the Calder Trophy for the outstanding rookie-of-the-year, Murray may well have won it himself. He scored more goals on less shots than any other N.H.L. player last season. Balfour scored 18 goals on 83 shots. This means that he scored one goal every 4.58 shots. Not even such sharpshooters as Jean Beliveau, Boom Boom Geoffrion, Gordie Howe or Bobby Hull could match that feat.

Balfour does question whether he ever would have come out of the minors had he stayed in the Montreal system. How would you like to try and catch a place on the Canadiens right wing when there were guys like Rocket Richard, Boom Boom Geoffrion, Claude Provost and Ralph Backstrom around? He considered it a break landing with Chicago.

Balfour, who is no relation to Earl Balfour, is just another son of Regina Saskatchewan, to hit the big time with the Black Hawks. Such illustrious hockey greats as the late Dick Irvin, Mush March, Johnny Gottselig and Ed Litzenberger came out of Regina to star in the N.H.L.

Murray got his hockey fundamentals with the Regina Pats juniors. He was called up by Canadiens for a two-game tryout in 1956-57 and looked so impressive they offered him a pro contract which he accepted.

The following season after a three-game stint he was assigned to the Montreal Royals of the Quebec Hockey League where he scored 23 goals and 25 assists in 62 games.

He moved up to Rochester Americans in the American Hockey League in the 1958-59 campaign and collected 14 goals and 23 assists while playing mostly on defense.

Last season he scored 18 goals and 12 assists for a total of 30 points in 61 games. Balfour is the digger type, a tireless skater, ambitious checker, competent passer and an accurate shooter.

Murray was born in Regina, Sask., on Aug. 24, 1936. He stands 5'9" and weighs 178 pounds. He's single.

Robert "Bob" Courcy was acquired by the Black Hawks from the Montreal Canadiens along with Ab McDonald, Reg Fleming and Cec Hoekstra for Glen Skov, three Hawk minor leaguers and a bundle of cash.

Courcy, a sturdily built youngster, was probably the most sought after forward in minor pro hockey last season. Several other clubs besides Chicago were after him, and small wonder considering his record.

In 70 games with Hull-Ottawa last season, Courcy scored 46 goals and 56 assists for 102 points to finish third in the Eastern Pro League. He just missed winning the league's most valuable player award.

In hockey parlance, Courcy is the type of player who is best described as a "late comer." He's 24 years of age, and seems to have developed slowly as compared with some of the players who jumped to the N.H.L. direct from junior ranks.

Ironically enough, he almost quit hockey in his first season in pro company. After 21 games with Shawinigan Falls he suffered a broken shoulder. But, he reconsidered and is glad now that he did.

Bob returned to the hockey wars in 1957-58 with the Chicoutimi team and registered 10 goals and 18 assists in 59 games. The following year he shifted to Three Rivers and collected a total of 29-22-51 in 62 contests.

Last season with Hull-Ottawa, Courcy seemed to acquire polish and confidence, and with the aid of a fine accurate shot, became the nemesis of opposing goalies. His 46 goals was the second best mark in the league.

Courcy played his early hockey around his native city and was lured to Canadiens Juniors club in 1954. He played two seasons with them, being teamed with Forbes Kennedy, a former Hawk and Claude Laforge.

Tommy Ivan, general manager of the Hawks, is greatly enthused about Courcy, and thinks he will be a fine asset to the club. "He's a slow starter," said Ivan, "and I think after the season he enjoyed with Hull-Ottawa he is just coming into his own. He'll help the Hawks considerably in the future."

Courcy was born in Granby, Que. on Jan. 4, 1936. He stands 5'11" and weighs 170 lbs. He's married and in the off-season makes his home in Granby where he is an accomplished woodworker.

John Evans, one of hockey's strong and silent men, a bad man without a reputation, has played two full seasons with the Black Hawks. He was acquired from the New York Rangers in the summer of 1958.

Maybe you're somewhat tired of reading about players who acquire "confidence." It's an old story but usually it is true. It is part of the Jack Evans story.

Evans has been here, there and everywhere since turning pro with the Rangers back in 1948. Never really got a chance to show his true worth. But since coming to the Hawks he's gained stature as a National League regular. "I feel like I'm needed," says Jack, "And I think I'm a better player because the Hawks have given me confidence."

Jack has been pushed around a great deal in his career, so much that it would discourage most others. He played in only 3 games in '48-49 and 2 games in '49-50 when Rangers shipped him to New Haven. Then followed a short stop at Cincinnati and back to the Rangers to complete the 1950-51 season.

The next three seasons Jack commuted between New York and Saskatoon of the Western League. Finally in 1955-56 the Rangers decided to keep him, and he played regularly with them until acquired by the Hawks.

Evans is one of the very few major league hockey players born across the pond. Jack first saw the light of day in Garnant, South Wales. His family moved to Western Canada when he was but a lad of six, and he spent most of his life in the prairie country around Calgary, Alta.

Jack stands 6'1" and weighs 185 pounds. He was born on April 21, 1928. Jack is married and makes his home in Calgary.

Reginald Fleming is still another player the Black Hawks acquired from the Montreal Canadiens in the big mid-summer deal.

Fleming is a product of Montreal's vast farm system. He started in that organization with the Canadiens junior team back in 1953, and after two seasons with them was sent to St. Michael's College for the 1955-56 campaign.

Reg turned pro in the fall of 1956 and spent two seasons with the Shawinigan Falls Cataracts. He was sent to Rochester Americans for the 1958-59 season and moved to Kingston Frontenacs last fall. He enjoyed his best season in pro ranks with the Frontenacs, scoring 19 goals and 49 assists for a total of 68 points.

Rugged and strong, Reg is always willing to muscle menacing opponents and fans compare his tactics to those of another Hawk player, Murray Balfour.

Reg has the dubious distinction of holding the American League record for most minutes served in the penalty box in one season. He spent a total of 227 minutes in the "hoose-gow" in 1957-58 while toiling for Shawinigan Cataracts.

While most players stick to one position, Fleming is an exception, having played both forward and defense. Too, he supplements his regular defensive work with heavy duty as a penalty-killer, a specialized department in which he has also won high acclaim.

Reg was born in Montreal, Que. on April 4, 1936. He stands 5'10" and tips the scales at 185 pounds. He's single, and in the off season is employed by a construction company in Montreal. His hobbies are coin collecting and high-fi records.

Glenn Henry Hall, the most durable netminder in all hockey gathered in more honors in his fabulous career last season.

Besides extending his N.H.L. consecutive-games-played record to an astounding 358 at the close of the '59-60 campaign, Hall wound up being nominated to the N.H.L. First All-Star Team, just nosing out Jacques Plante of Montreal, the five times Vezina Trophy winner, by one point.

It was the third time in his five seasons of N.H.L. competition that Glenn was selected to the N.H.L. First All-Star squad. He was voted to the Second Team once. Despite such an impressive record and the glory he has come by, it has failed to change the actions and behaviour of one of the swellest guys in the game.

Hall's success, in addition to the sort of unpretentious confidence that he carries into every game, stems primarily from his quick reflexes, his speed to maneuver, plus the lightning action of his now famous left hand.

Hall learned to stop rubber in the Detroit farm system. He performed for Indianapolis of the American Hockey League in 1951-52. He was called up to the Wings for 6 games in 1952-53 and then shipped to Edmonton of the Western League where he put in three seasons. The Wings called on him for 2 games at the tail end of the '54-55 campaign and the following season took over the regular netminding duties from Terry Sawchuk who was traded to Boston.

In his first full season in a Red Wing uniform Hall won the coveted Calder rookie award and was named on the N.H.L. Second All-Star Team. He also led the league in shutouts with 12. The next season he made the First All-Star Team as Detroit won the N.H.L. title.

A bundle of Black Hawk cash and four players enticed Hall, along with Ted Lindsay, to Chicago at the start of the 1956-57 season.

Hall promptly repaid his new employers by being named on the N.H.L.'s First All-Star Team although his club finished in the cellar. His sparkling play the past two seasons was a big factor in the Hawks finishing third each time and making the playoffs.

Hall played two years of junior hockey with the Windsor Spitfires before turning pro with the Indianapolis Caps in 1951-52.

Born in Humboldt, Sask., the 29-year-old Glenn stands 5'11" and tips the scales at 160. He makes his summer home in Edmonton where he owns a construction business. He's married.

William "Red" Hay, center and key player on the Black Hawks' "Million Dollar Line" is the first American College hockey player to win the coveted Calder Memorial Trophy which is presented annually to "the player selected as the most proficient in his first year of competition in the N.H.L."

Red, Canadian-born, starred for the Colorado College Tigers for 3 years, from 1955 to 1958, and is one of the few players who played U. S. College hockey and then went on to play in the N.H.L.

The Black Hawks purchased Hay from the Montreal Canadiens for the sum of \$25,000 prior to the '59-60 N.H.L. draft.

The 24-year-old "rookie-of-the-year" had no chance to break into the Montreal lineup. He attended the Canadiens' camp two seasons ago but they were so overstocked with talent they loaned him to Calgary Stampeders of the Western League, a Black Hawk farm team. He scored 24 goals and 30 assists in 53 games for the Stampeders and it was on this showing that the Hawks added him to their family.

Hay is the fourth Black Hawk to win the Calder Trophy. Ed Litzenberger won it in 1954-55, Cully Dahlstrom in 1937-38 and Mike Karakas in 1935-36.

The 6'3", 200-pound Hay had never played a single game in N.H.L. competition until last season, yet he managed to score 18 goals and 37 assists for a total of 55 points, 13th best in the league.

Red played his first hockey around Regina and after an outstanding amateur career with the Regina Pats (Juniors) accepted an athletic scholarship at Colorado College.

Red was born in Saskatoon, Sask., on Dec. 9, 1935. He comes from an athletic family. His father, Charlie Hay, was an outstanding goalie for a Saskatchewan Senior team in the early '20's. His mother, the former Florence "String" Miller, was one of Canada's great track and field stars. His Uncle, the late Earl Miller, played for the Black Hawks from 1928 through 1931.

Hay, who earned a degree in geology, is connected with an oil company in Western Canada. He makes his summer home in Calgary, Alta., and is married and has one daughter.

Cecil Hoekstra came to the Black Hawks in the multi-player deal with the Montreal Canadiens.

Strange to relate, the lanky center played his junior hockey for the St. Catharines TeePees before that club became a Hawk farm affiliate. He helped the TeePees win the Canadian Junior Championship in 1953-54. Some of his teammates at the time were, Elmer Vasko, Hank Ciesla and the Cullen Brothers, Brian and Barry.

From the TeePees, Cec graduated to the Montreal Royals in 1955-56, but after 34 games was shipped to Winnipeg of the Western League. He wound up playing the entire 1956-57 season for Winnipeg and scored 21 goals and 12 assists. The following year he was back with the Royals, but midway through the campaign was moved up to the Rochester Americans where he's been ever since. He had a great season in '58-59, scoring 24 goals and 24 assists. Last year he collected 17 markers and 32 assists.

Tall and rangy, Hoekstra rates as a pretty good sweepchecker. His extremely long reach enables him to poke the puck off opponents sticks when he is as much as ten feet away from them. He's also a fine playmaker, and when the opportunity arises can put the puck in the net.

Cec is 6'1" tall and weighs 170 lbs. He was born in Winnipeg, Man. on April 2, 1935. He comes from a hockey playing family. His younger brother, who also played for St. Catharines TeePees, is now with Cleveland. Cec is married and makes his summer home in St. Catharines.

Robert Marvin "Bobby" Hull, the muscular sharpshooter, who captured the N.H.L. scoring championship last season with a total of 81 points, is one of the brightest stars to speed across the hockey firmament.

His dazzling speed and reckless abandon on the ice have earned him the titles of the Chicago Comet, Hurricane Hull, Bullet Bob, The Golden Jet, etc. He has no fear of defenses and crashes into all opposition at high speed and only an extraordinary physique has enabled him to weather the most strenuous kind of hockey.

Bobby crashed into the N.H.L. with a bombshell smash reminiscent of young Mickey Mantle's debut with the baseball New York Yankees. Before he was 19 Hull was wearing a Black Hawk uniform, the youngest player ever to sign a Hawk contract. In three full seasons, the hulking Hawk has played every game.

Aside from capturing the Art Ross Trophy, the fifth Hawk to do so, Hull also was selected on the N.H.L. First All Star team at left wing, last season. His 39 goals, which included four Hat Tricks (three 3-goal efforts and one 4-goal spurge), constituted a new Hawk record.

On the broad shoulders of young Bobby rest the responsibility of establishing the Black Hawks as Stanley Cup contenders.

It's a heavy burden for a 21-year-old, but Chicago's thousands of Hull rooters are sure he will make good.

Hull was born in Pointe Anne, Ontario on January 3, 1939. In school he was an all round athlete, playing football, baseball, as well as, hockey.

Hull was discovered by Bob Wilson, the Hawks' head scout, when Bobby was only 13 years old. He found the husky lad zig-zagging and barging thru other youngsters in a rink-rat match on an improvised rink. Wilson signed him and shipped him to Hespler where he played Junior "B" hockey. He moved up the ranks to St. Catharines Teepees juniors where he sparked the team to the league title in 1956-57.

The following season Bobby turned pro with the Hawks and was a smash hit right from the start. In his first season he collected 47 points (13 goals and 34 assists). In 1958-59 he upped that to 18 goals and 32 assists for a total of 50 points.

Some hockey appraisers have gone so far as to compare Hull to the great Howie Morenz, the Montreal Canadiens immortal. He's built along the same lines as Morenz, skates like him and strikes just as accurately with his bullet shot.

Bobby stands a solid 5'10" and weighs 195 pounds. He's married and makes his summer home in Pointe Anne, Ontario.

Ed Litzemberger, Black Hawks' big right winger, with the jet black hair, a lean, rather sharp face, has all the requisites a hockey player desires. He has a strong, muscular body, wonderful co-ordination and excellent hockey sense.

The husky forward from Saskatchewan made one of the N.H.L.'s most remarkable comebacks last season without causing more than a ripple of interest. The reason for the lack of attention was the fact that he has always been more interested in doing his job than talking about it.

Ed was seriously injured in an auto accident which resulted in his wife's death on January 17, and although doctors at the time said he would be out for the season, the big forward surprised them with a quick recovery from his injuries. Litz missed but 16 games and returned to the lineup Mar. 5 to score 2 goals and pace the Hawks to a 5-0 victory over New York Rangers. His play the remainder of the season was a big factor in the Hawks gaining the playoffs.

Litz has been a highly-regarded player ever since he played for the Regina Pats Juniors back in 1950-51. In two seasons with the Pats he scored 88 goals. This interested the Montreal Canadiens who signed him to a pro contract. And in two games with them in 1952-53 scored one goal. He was farmed out to the Montreal Royals of the Quebec Hockey League the next two campaigns and scored a total of 57 goals and 63 assists. Canadiens again called on Ed, but except for the fact that Montreal were loaded with right wingers he was found expendable and sold to the Black Hawks for \$15,000.

In his first year with the Hawks, Litz scored 23 goals and 28 assists and was voted the "rookie-of-the-year" and won the Calder Trophy.

Then came his disappointing sophomore season when he managed to score but 10 goals and 29 assists. Then in 1956-57 Ed came back and turned in a banner year with 32 goals and 32 assists and was selected on the N.H.L. Second All-Star team at right wing. Then followed another bright year as Ed was again the Hawks' best workman collecting 32 goals and 30 assists. In 1958-59 Ed hit his peak production and scored 33 goals and 44 assists. It was the third consecutive year he topped the thirty-goal barrier.

The big right winger rates as one of the best stickhandlers in the game, with a most deceptive shift and a powerful slap-shot that is a menace to all goalies.

Ed was born in Neudorf, Sask. on July 15, 1932. He stands 6'3" and weighs 194 lbs. He makes his home in Chicago. He's single.

Alvin "Ab" McDonald was acquired by the Black Hawks from the Montreal Canadiens last summer in a nine-player deal and a bundle of cash.

The 24-year-old left winger is a sound aggressive player who is strong in the checking department. Big and robust, with a powerful physique, Ab isn't going to be pushed around. He could well be the guy the Hawks need to strengthen their port side. A lot of people will be hoping that McDonald finds his place with the Hawks for he couldn't get results with his talent as a member of the Canadiens.

Strange enough, as a Montreal Chattel, McDonald played his junior hockey for St. Catharines Teepees under coach Rudy Pilous back in 1955-56, scoring 49 goals in 48 games. Canadiens signed him to a pro contract the following season and shipped him to Rochester of the A.H.L. where he collected 21 goals and 31 assists. The next season he upped the total to 30 goals and 33 assists and Montreal called him up in '58-59. But due to lineup shakeups, Ab found it difficult to nail down a regular berth, yet, he managed to score 13 goals and 23 assists. Last season it was much the same and Ab was again kept from playing regular, as a result his scoring dropped to 9 goals and 13 assists.

General Manager Tommy Ivan expects a big year from McDonald, especially if given a chance to play regularly. "He's big and strong, has a fine shot and is very good when close in on the net," opined Ivan. "But perhaps most of all, uses his size and muscle-power to check in big league fashion. He could well become one of the Hawks' solid stars of days to come, and this could be the season in which his progress towards that goal gets a real boost."

Ab hails from Winnipeg, Man. where he was born on Feb. 18, 1936. He stands 6'2" and weighs 190 pounds.

Stanley "Stan" Mikita is one of the few European born players to make the grade in the National Hockey League.

Stan was born in Soholce, Czechoslovakia, a medium-sized town about 400 miles west of Prague. When he was 8 years of age he was brought to Canada by his uncle, Joe Mikita.

After a great many family palavers, during which the benefits of a life in Canada were expounded, the Mikitas finally convinced Stan's family that they should allow them to adopt Stan.

Stan's first brush with hockey came at the school level. He played his first organized hockey with St. Catharines' Legion minor hockey setup. As a bantam in that league he won the scoring title in 1954. He played two years of midget and then leaped to St. Catharines TeePees juniors. He was only 16. In 1957-58 he was chosen on the O.H.A. All-Star Team and voted the most valuable player in the league.

The following season, despite the fact he was sidelined with a broken wrist and dislocated shoulder, Stan still managed to lead the O.H.A. in scoring with 38 goals and 59 assists in 45 games. He was again selected on the All-Star squad. At the conclusion of the season, the Hawks rewarded the youngster with a three-game try-out. Young Stan showed so much poise and skill that he was signed to a pro contract.

Last season, Stan's first as a full-fledged pro, he opened with a bang, scoring one goal and one assist. But more important, he proved that lack of size did not interfere with his determination to succeed in the big time. He proved he could hold his own with the best of them. Stan wound up his first season in the N.H.L. with 8 goals and 18 assists. Not bad, considering he suffered a fractured wrist and missed half a dozen games.

Despite the Iron Curtain, Stan has kept in close contact with his parents, sending them his press clippings regularly. This past summer he fulfilled his fondest wish as he with his adoptive parents made a trip back to Ruzomberok, Czechoslovakia to visit his natural parents and a younger sister who had never seen him.

Stan was born Stan Gvoth on May 20, 1940. He arrived in St. Catharines, Ont., on Dec. 22, 1948 and couldn't speak a word of English. Now, of course, he speaks English fluently and was graduated with honors from school. Stan is single.

Ron Murphy, the free-wheeling, fast-skating Irishman earned the name of "Dead-eye" around the N.H.L., because of his clutch goal scoring.

The hard-shooting winger may not be a prolific goal scorer but he sure notches the big ones. A year ago, in 1958-59, Murph scored 17 goals and 8 of them turned out to be pay-off markers. Then last season he collected 15 tallies and again half a dozen were winning shots.

"Any player who can get you 15 goals, especially if they are the deciding markers, is a valuable asset to a team," opined coach Rudy Pilous.

The Hawks acquired Murphy from New York Rangers in an even swap for Hank Ciesla in 1957-58. In his first season with Chicago he scored 11 goals and 17 assists. The next season he upped the total to 17 goals and 30 assists, despite the fact that he missed 11 games because of injuries. Last season he had a 15-21-36 record.

Ron is a product of the Guelph Biltmores Juniors. He turned pro with Rangers in 1952-53 and got in 15 games, scoring 3 goals and one assist. The next season he started out like a prairie fire only to be knocked out of action after 27 games when he became involved in a stickswinging fracas with Montreal's Boom Boom Geoffrien. Both were suspended by the league prexy. Ron spent the remainder of the season with the Saskatoon Quakers of the Western League.

Then in 1954-55 Ron was recalled by Rangers and stuck around until the middle of the 1956-57 campaign when he was shipped to Providence, a victim of coach Phil Watson's purge.

Throughout his major league career Murphy disappointed a lot of people, including himself, and although he's showed bursts of brilliance he couldn't come up with any consistency in his form, a prime requisite for N.H.L. stardom. However, Ron is a hard working guy and very courageous and these qualities will certainly help him in his quest for future greatness.

Ron was born in Hamilton, Ont. on April 10, 1933. He stands 5'11" and weighs 185 pounds. He's married and makes his home in Mount Hope, Ont.

Eric Nesterenko has been hockey's Jekyll-Hyde since turning professional. None will deny that he has tremendous ability. None will deny that when he plays well he is as good as any forward in the game. Yet these same people will agree that when Nesterenko plays a bad game, he looks like a raw amateur.

Nesterenko has been a study of inconsistency, but now appears to have the situation fairly well in hand and all look for him to come through with another 20-goal season just as he did the first year the Hawks acquired him in 1957-58 from the Winnipeg Warriors of the Western League.

Nesterenko came into prominence as an amateur while playing for the Toronto Marlboro Juniors. He was a standout with them and considered 'a million dollar' prospect. The Toronto Leafs signed him to a pro contract and immediately heralded him as another famous amateur, Jean Beliveau, who made such a spectacular debut with Montreal Canadiens the year before.

But for some reason Eric did not live up to Toronto's expectations, and after a little more than three seasons with Leafs, in which he scored but 43 goals and 36 assists, he was sent to the Winnipeg Warriors. It was then that Eric realized that half-speed in the N.H.L. isn't fast enough. But to be successful a player must play with the throttle wide open all the time. This he did, and Hawk scouts were convinced he still had plenty of good hockey and set their sights on acquiring him.

The Leafs failed to protect him in the 1956 draft and Hawks stepped in and claimed him for the \$15,000 price tag.

In his first season with the Hawks Nester scored 20 goals and 18 assists, then in '58-59 he registered 16 and 18, respectively. In both of these campaigns, Eric had the strangest playing routine. He commuted between his home base, London, Ont., where he attended the University of Western Ontario and wherever the Hawks were playing. Nester took a course in psychology and philosophy at the University.

Last season Eric slipped to 13 goals and 23 assists. A groin injury sidelined him for 9 games and during his absence Murray Balfour took over his spot at right wing on the Red Hay-Bobby Hull Line. He never got it back.

Eric was born in Flin Flon, Man., on Oct. 31, 1933. He stands 6'2" and weighs 185 lbs. He's single.

One of the National Hockey League's most durable defensemen is the Black Hawks' Pierre Pilote, who despite his frail looking physique holds an amazing record of durability.

The 165-pound Mighty Mite of the Black Hawks' defense corp has not missed a solitary game since joining the club back in 1955-56. He finished playing the last 20 games of that season. Then followed four full seasons of 70 games each, and so starting out this season Pete has a record of 300 games going for him.

Last season little Pierre came into his own as a playmaker and goalscorer. He topped all N.H.L. defensemen in the matter of total points with 45, made up of 7 goals and 38 assists. For this accomplishment he was voted on the N.H.L. Second All-Star Team.

The quiet, French-Canadian has two very important things needed to make him a stellar performer; fire and desire. Not only does he go about his work with enthusiasm, but he gives it all he's got every time the coach says go.

Aside from his blocking ability, Pilote rates as one of the best puck-carrying defensemen in the league. And as a playmaker, Pete already has established a new Hawk record for most total points by a defenseman in one season. He far exceeded the old Hawk mark of 35 points established by Bill Gadsby back in 1949-50.

Pilote hails from Kenogami, Quebec and played junior hockey for the St. Catharines TeePees, now a Hawk sponsored farm team. He turned pro with Buffalo Bisons of the American Hockey League in 1951-52 and for two seasons was a standout and an important cog in the Bison's rise in the A.H.L. The Black Hawks purchased him near the end of the '55-56 campaign and hasn't missed a game since.

Pierre was born in Kenogami on Dec. 11, 1931. He stands 5'10" and weighs 165 pounds. He's married and makes his summer home in Fort Erie, Ont. He owns and operates a Launderette in St. Catharines, Ont.

Dollard St. Laurent came to the Black Hawks from the Montreal Canadiens for a bundle of cash at the start of the 1958-59 season and although he was slightly disappointed and disheartened because he was traded away by a World Championship team after being with them for seven seasons, Dolly like a true pro, soon took things in stride. He pitched in, gave it all he had and wound up as one of the most popular Hawks.

The dashing and debonair Frenchman gives every game he plays the full treatment. He's a study in grace and finesse when he takes off on one of his dazzling rushes. Despite the fact he has been used mostly as the "swing-man" on the Hawks defense, Dolly still managed to collect 12 points (4 goals and 8 assists) his first season with the Hawks, then up that total to 17 points (4 goals and 13 assists) last season.

For the second straight season Dolly played a full schedule of games. As a member of the Canadiens his periods of absence, due to minor injuries, ranged from 6 games to 24 per season. It was his constant availability that made Hawks a much stronger and sounder team defensively.

Dolly joined the Canadiens in 1951 after a brilliant amateur career with the Montreal Royals. But injuries and sickness of one sort or another prevented him from putting his best foot forward. Every season, just as he was coming into brilliance he'd be knocked on the shelf, and seldom did he have time to get rolling again before he'd be sidelined. In his six years with Canadiens he never played more than 65 games, once only 40.

Dolly was born on May 12, 1929 in Verdun, Quebec. He stands 5'11" and weighs 185 pounds. He's married and operates an insurance business in his native city.

Aloysius Martin Sloan, called the "Slinker" at times and "Tod" invariably, rates as one of the 31 most productive goal scorers in the history of big league hockey. Only 31 men have potted 200 goals or more during their N.H.L. career from Rocket Richard's unparalleled 544 to Hooley Smith's 200.

The 33-year-old center finally achieved his life's ambition when he scored No. 200 against the New York Rangers last Dec. 23. By the end of the season the Slinker upped the total to 209.

Also, when Sloan potted No. 200 he became the sixth Black Hawk to achieve the feat. Other Hawks who are included in the select group are such memorable names as Bill Mosienko (258), Harry Watson (236), Roy Conacher (226), Doug Bentley (219) and Babe Dye (202).

All but 47 of Sloan's 209 goals were made on behalf of the Toronto Maple Leafs. Except for a one-year apprenticeship (1949-50), Tod was a Leaf chattel from the time he left St. Michael's College in 1946 until he was sold to the Black Hawks in 1958.

Slinker signed his first pro contract with Toronto at the age of 18. He was immediately farmed out to Pittsburgh Hornets of the A.H.L. where he spent the 1946-47 and 1947-48 seasons.

Midway through the '48-49 campaign Tod was called up to the Leafs and finished out the season with them. The following season he was peddled to Cleveland and he came through with a bang-up year, scoring 37 goals and 29 assists for a new A.H.L. record. This showing won Tod a return to the Leafs and for the next 8 seasons toiling for them he racked up 159 goals and 185 assists.

Then, for some unknown reason, relations with the Leafs became taut and Sloan wasn't a bit surprised to learn he'd been sold to Chicago. He was so content, in fact, that he compiled more points (27-35-62) than any other Leaf in the 1958-59 season. Last season he had a 20-20-40 record.

The veteran of 11 N.H.L. campaigns is a past master at maneuvering the puck. He's a veritable magician once inside the blue line, and the closer he gets to the net, the greater his magic.

Sloan was born in Vinton, Que., on Nov. 30, 1927. He stands 5'10" and tips the Toledo at 175 pounds. He's married and makes his home in North Bay, Ont.

Elmer "Moose" Vasko, 6'3", 210-pounds of hockey dynamite isn't just an unusually large, fast and skillful rearguard. He has that extra "something", or whatever it is that makes him especially valuable to a professional hockey club. He can lift his teammates with headlong rushes down the ice and at the same time bring the fans to their feet.

Vasko is the first defenseman the Hawks have had since the departure of Big Earl Seibert who can draw in the fans on the basis of his own appeal.

All around the National Hockey League the fans chorus "Moose! Moose!" when Elmer charges down the ice. The Black Hawk fans started it and now its taken up all around the loop. He's a national figure because of the hockey telecasts.

The 25-year old giant with four N.H.L. seasons under his belt has matured in hockey physique and savvy into one of the truly great defensive players in the game.

An unassuming youth, in 1955 and now, Vasko didn't flash any clippings of his prior amateur prowess, but he had scored 16 goals and 20 assists as a teen-age defenseman for the St. Catharines TeePees when they won the memorial Cup, emblematic of the Junior Championship of Canada. In order to land the young blond bomber, the Hawks had to outbid two other N.H.L. clubs.

In his first three seasons with the Hawks, Vasko survived the constant pressure of a special harness designed to protect an old shoulder injury, yet he managed to accumulate 3-12-15 points in 1956-57, 6-60-26 in '57-58 and 6-10-16 in '58-59. Before the start of last season Vasko underwent special surgery to correct the chronic injury. As a result his play improved and he threatened the league leader and his teammate, Pierre Pilote, in total assists with 27. He counted 3 goals for a total of 30 points.

Vasko, now in his fifth N.H.L. season, has acquired the polish of a big-time defenseman. His bull-like rushes make him a constant scoring threat every time he ambles down the ice and lets go his powerful shot. As soon as he acquires better direction his goal production will rise considerably. With youth on his side, he's only 25, he ought to be a fixture on the Hawks defense for many years to come.

Vasko was born in Duparquet, Que. on Dec. 11, 1935. He's married and makes his summer home in St. Catharines, Ont.

If there is one player in the N.H.L. in a position to talk with authority on breaks, it is Ken Wharram, the Black Hawks' slightly built forward. He had an assortment of such, both good and bad, in his hockey career.

Back in 1953, Ken was a starry-eyed kid who had just graduated from junior ranks after an outstanding record with the Galt Black Hawks. He was signed to a pro contract by the parent Hawks, but before the training camp broke he heard the old familiar tune told to a rookie "you need more experience."

For five long years Wharram kicked around the minor leagues hoping his record would speak for itself. He had a 29-game whirl with the Hawks at the outset of the 1953-54 season, but then was shipped to Quebec Aces to finish the campaign. Then followed four fruitful seasons with the Buffalo Bisons of the American Hockey League where he rolled up a total of 119 goals and 187 assists. True, he did manage a "look-see" with Hawks on one occasion during that span, a three-game stint in 1955-56, but that was all.

This may have been enough to dishearten anyone, but not Wharram. He took the 'breaks' in stride and never wasted any time feeling sorry for himself. He simply kept on trying, and when the Hawks gave him another chance in 1958-59 he was ready for the challenge. He played in 66 games that season and scored 10 goals and 9 assists. However, his spirit and determination were a deciding factor in keeping him with the team.

Then last season, just when Ken seemed to find his stride he suffered a fractured jaw against Toronto on Feb. 21. This sidelined him for a month (he missed 11 games) yet he managed to wind up the season with 14 goals and 11 assists.

Ken is a slightly built fellow, standing 5'9" and weighing but 115 pounds, but he is a whirlwind skater and possessor of a hard and accurate shot. The secret of his success is the triumph of brain over brawn.

Ken was born on July 2, 1933, in Ferris, Ontario, a town in the hot-bed of Northern Ontario hockey. He's married.
