



In Memoriam

It is with deep reverence that we dedicate this yearbook to the memory of James Dougan Norris, who passed away on Feb. 25, 1966.

Jim, as he was affectionately known to his many friends and business associates, loved all sports, but his greatest love was hockey.

His business interests were wide and varied — senior partner of a large brokerage firm, member of the New York Stock Exchange, member of the Board of Trade, Director of one of the largest railroads in the U. S., Chairman of the Board of one of Florida's largest banks, as well as Chairman of the Board of many large and influential corporations which he and his partner, Arthur M. Wirtz, had co-owned for over thirty-five years. However, Jim was a great sportsman and preferred to be active in, and identified with those corporations dealing with sports.

Jim had been associated with National League Hockey since 1931 when he, his father and Arthur M. Wirtz acquired the Detroit Red Wings. In 1954, after the death of his father, Jim and Arthur Wirtz sold their interest in the Red Wings, and simultaneously acquired the Chicago Blackhawks, which they have continuously co-owned and operated.

Jim rarely missed a game, sometimes flying from distant places to be on hand. He travelled with the team whenever possible, and his continued efforts for the betterment of the sport of Hockey won him a place in the Hockey Hall of Fame.

Jim also maintained an active interest in horse racing. Since 1920 he had personally owned and operated the Spring Hill Racing Stable.

In World War II. Jim served with distinction as a Lieutenant Commander in the Naval Air Force.

His conscientious co-operation, his understanding and loyalty have contributed immeasurably to the Chicago Blackhawk Hockey Team and the same high standards will always be maintained. We shall miss his kind and easy ways and his enthusiasm for sports, particularly for Hockey, which endeared him to everyone.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS: Won six straight NHL titles at Detroit plus 3 Stanley Cups. Picked up fourth cup as General Manager of Black Hawks in 1961. Teamed with Co-owners Jim Norris and Arthur Wirtz to build Hawks into solid contender since coming to Chicago in 1954.

HAWK HISTORY: Joined team in 1954-55 season. Since then team has moved to contention with several near misses for first place, plus a Stanley Cup in 1961.

Biggest contribution has been development of solid farm system which has continually sent youngsters to Hawks. Two years ago, for instance six men were playing as rookies in the NHL and three more were added last year.

Married, lives in Chicago. Soft spoken but sure footed in his dealings with other owners and managers.

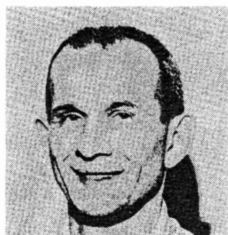

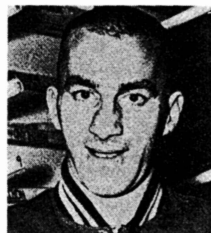

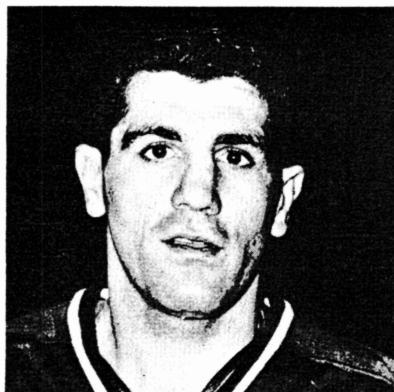
NHL RECORD: 10 years—105 goals, 162 assists, 267 points.

LOUIS F. ANGOTTI

Few players skate as hard and continuously as Lou Angotti who is perpetual motion, itself. What he lacks in finesse he makes up in desire and proved a valuable asset to the Hawks after he came here from Rangers in midseason last year.

Attended Michigan Tech College where he was All American. Helps run a family business in the off-season near Toronto.



WALTER BOYER

CENTER

Shoots left 5'7" 160 lbs.

Born: Cowan, Man.

Sept. 27, 1937

Wally Boyer was drafted from Toronto last summer and could take up some of the slack at center for the Hawks this year. An excellent penalty killer, Boyer will be used first to fill the gap left by Bill Hay's retirement. But he also might fit into the over all plans as a center man on one of Billy Reay's lines.

His play making ability and defensive skill is just what a high scoring team like the Hawks need.

He had four goals and 17 assists last year in 46 games for Toronto. The Hawks hope to use him more and he could develop into an important part of the Hawks machinery.



DENIS DeJORDY

GOAL

Shoots left 5'9" 175 lbs.

Born: St. Hyacinthe, Que.

Nov. 12, 1938

Many people think Denis DeJordy is the second best goalie in the NHL. It is hard to prove because he has been playing behind the No. 1 goalie for the last three seasons.

Last season Denis agreed that it would be better for him to get plenty of work in St. Louis than to sit on the bench and watch the great Glenn Hall most of the year. So Denis finished the year as the All Star goalie for the Central League, an honor he had won twice before in the American League while playing for Billy Reay in Buffalo.

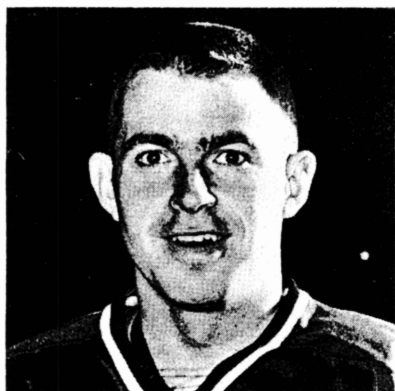
After playing only 5 or 6 games in 1963-64, Denis got in 30 games the following year for the Hawks and scored three shutouts. He was the goalie through a 13 game undefeated streak for the Hawks and certainly contributed to the team's success that year.

This could be the year DeJordy arrives as a major leaguer. But knowing Glenn, Denis will have to fight for his place on the Hawks and this makes it all the better for the entire team. One of the advantages of having more than one great goal tender is the chance for the forwards to get good workouts in practice. They don't have to worry about injuries in practice. With DeJordy and/or Glenn at the workouts, they can go all out against major league competition. It could be one of the reasons that the Hawks have been the No. 1 scoring team in the league the last three seasons.

A quiet, well mannered young man, Denis looks more like a business executive than a hockey player.

DAVE DRYDEN

GOAL

Shoots left 6'2" 175 lbs.

Born: Hamilton, Ont.

May 9, 1941

This calm, collected school teacher from Toronto could be one of the most important nuggets found through the Black Hawk scouting system in many years. Dave had all but given up on any chance of becoming a professional hockey player and resigned himself to playing amateur hockey when he wasn't teaching school.

Then all of a sudden, he found himself, not only in professional hockey but playing with a contending NHL team. Knowing the practical side of making it big in the majors, Dave was a willing worker in filling in for Glenn Hall last season and taking his licks in practice.

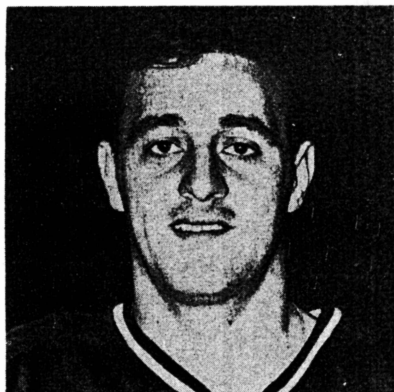
What the future holds for Dave during the coming season, will depend not only on his own ability and desire but on that of Denis DeJordy and Glenn Hall. But Dryden has proven already in his one short year, that he is a team man and will accept whatever fate comes his way.

He admits that last season meant a lot to him in learning from the old master himself. Dryden and Glenn worked well together and Glenn was able to relax once in awhile knowing that Dave would fill in well for him.

LEFT WING

Shoots left 6'1" 190 lbs.

Born: Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

Feb. 20, 1942

This big lanky loose kid could be the key to Black Hawk hopes for for the next decade.

No one denies his great ability both as a skater and a sharp shooter. However, his temperament is such that he needs constant prodding to get the best out of him. Playing with Bobby Hull and Chico Maki, Espo has scored 23 and 26 goals in his first two full seasons in the majors, a pretty good total for any one. But in Espo's case everyone believes he is capable of even more.

Now that Phil has "come of age" in the hockey world, he could develop into one of hockey's great play makers and scorers in his own right. He scored more "winning" goals than any other Hawk last year and was second only to Paul Henderson of Detroit in the entire NHL with 12.

Worked in construction during the past summer to keep in shape. Also has a TV show with teammate Matt Ravlich. An accomplished speaker, many feel he has a good future in TV when his hockey days are over. But that won't be for many years, the Black Hawks hope.

GLENN HENRY HALL

GOAL

Shoots left 5'11" 178 lbs.

Born: Humboldt, Sask.

Oct. 3, 1931

Few athletes in any sport have achieved the honors that this master goalie can boast in his brilliant career in the NHL.

Ironically, even with All Star honors a record eight times and all of his other achievements have not "tranquilized" Glenn into realizing that he is master of the situation before a game starts. Even with nearly 800 NHL games under his belt, each game brings fits of nausea and nervousness which attests to his tremendous competitive spirit.

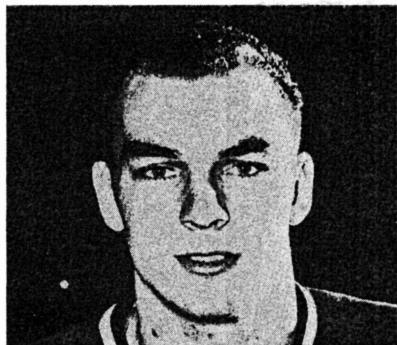
Usually an athlete will lose this wondrous desire for victory after he has settled into a comfortable salary bracket. But not Mr. Goalie. Every game is a war for him and probably points mainly to why he has been one of hockey's all time great goalies.

Glenn was rookie of the year in 1955-56 when he scored 12 shut-outs with Detroit. He came to the Hawks in 1957-58 and went on to roll up 552 games in succession which included 30, 120 consecutive minutes in the nets, a mark that will probably stand forever.

With such back-up men now as Dave Dryden and Denis DeJordy, Glenn gets an occasional rest, but all Hawk fans admit no Black Hawk team is quite the same without Mr. Goalie.

KEN HODGE

RIGHT WING

Shoots right 6'2" 200 lbs.

Born: Toronto, Can.

June 25, 1944

Ken made the jump straight to the majors last year after his apprenticeship at St. Catharines where he scored 63 goals.

Although he had only 6-17-23 last year, Kenny picked up a hat trick against no less than Montreal. Shows well in the fundamentals and Hawk fans are hoping the year of experience he gained will help him toward bigger things starting this season.

Hodge's size and aggressiveness should serve him well. Never backed away from trouble in his first season and proved valuable as a policeman in a couple tight scrapes. Could become a mainstay in any Black Hawk future plans.



DOUG JARRETT

DEFENSE

Shoots right 6'3" 205 lbs.

Born: London, Ont.

April 22, 1944

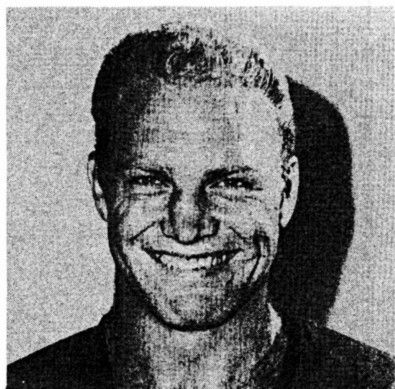
This husky youngster made the big jump from St. Catharines' amateur team to the majors with only a few minor league games in St. Louis. He now has two years of major league experience and is considered one of the most promising young defensemen in hockey.

Doug usually has a big smile off the ice, but takes his game seriously and dishes out as hard a check as anyone in the league. Has better than average shot from the point, but concentrates on the defensive aspects of the game.

Especially good at two on one situations in breaking up opposing rushes.

ROBERT MARVIN (BOBBY) HULL

LEFT WING

Shoots left 5'10" 195 lbs.

Born: Pointe Anne, Ont.

Jan. 3, 1939

If a fan were given the opportunity to see a sports event which included Babe Ruth, Howie Morenz, Doug Bentley, Red Grange, Jack Dempsey, Gayle Sayres, George Gipp and Ty Cobb, he certainly would run, not walk, to that Stadium where they were playing.

Black Hawk fans have this thrill every night when they attend NHL games with Bobby Hull battling for their side. Hull, 5 ft. 10 inches tall and weighing about 195 lbs. is such a perfect physical specimen that most writers and broadcasters, as blase as they usually are, merely gasp at the sight of this super-human machine known as the Golden Jet.

Hull's records are legend even in his short nine years in the National Hockey League. Last year, of course, he broke the goal scoring mark with 54 and the point total with 97. He won the Hart Trophy as the most valuable player for the second year in a row, and picked up his third Art Ross trophy in only nine years of NHL competition.

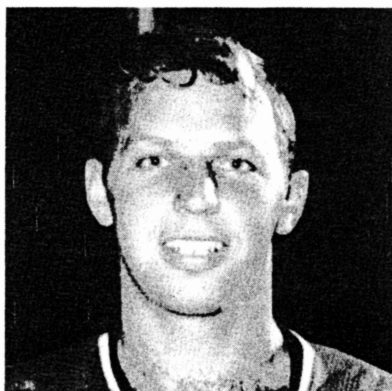
He has scored 17 hat tricks, second only to Maurice Richard's 26 covering 18 years.

He is far in front as the Black Hawks' all time goal scorer with 318, passing Bill Mosienko last year.

He skates faster, shoots harder, than anyone else. And with it all, acts like few other athletes when it comes to being a nice guy. With all his ability, he even has among his trophies the Lady Byng, won a year ago as the most sportsmanlike player in the league.

DID YOU KNOW . . .

The Hawks had six men with 20 or more goals last year? Several Hawk teams had five 20 goal men before but none had six.



DENNIS HULL

LEFT WING

Shoots Left 6' 185 lbs.

Born: Pointe Anne, Ont.

Nov. 19, 1944

The Stadium carpenter can attest to Dennis Hull's shooting ability. "I hate to see that big kid come out to practice. He busts at least three chairs every morning."

"Not even Bobby Hull shoots them into the seats like that No. 10."

While young Dennis has had the difficult problem of trying to live up to his famous brother, he has a lot of things going for him that even Bobby can't match.

Dennis is the only player ever to shatter one of the "unbreakable" panes of glass around the rink during a game. And he did it with a shot almost from the red line.

He is a little taller and huskier than Bobby and most coaches admit "a little meaner." His one obstacle is his skating which has been improving each year. Coach Billy Reay says, "anybody that can shoot like that has to be in the National League. It might sound funny, but I think Dennis actually shoots harder than Bobby and I didn't think that would be possible."

Dennis spent a full year with the Hawks in 1964-65 scoring 10 goals. Last season he played in the Central League and picked up 15 goals.

If he can find his skating legs, he will be a great asset to the Hawks in the next 10 or 12 years. It will also give the Hawks their best brother combination since Max and Doug Bentley, who are both in the Hall of Fame now.

HOCKEY TIPS





STANLEY MIKITA

CENTER

Shoots right 5'9" 165 lbs.

Born: Sokolce, Czech.

May 20, 1940

Some people are thankful there is only one Stan Mikita. They are all Black Hawk opposing coaches. To the Hawks Mikita is a competitor, a game winner, a leader, and each and every one of the Hawk players gives a little prayer of thanks each night that little Stosh is in "on my side."

Mikita is possibly the greatest hockey player in the NHL if you leave out Bobby Hull, who takes unfair advantage. As most players admit, "Hull isn't human," so don't count him.

And Stan is one of the few men in sports who could endure the day in, day out comparison with Hull.

"I've played with Bobby since we were together in high school. I get as big a charge out of watching him out there as anybody. I'm just glad we are on the same team. I'd hate to have to play against him every night. Besides, he helps us win games and that puts money in my pocket."

Stosh's Gas House Gang tactics make good reading, but when you dig deeper into this little dynamo there is a lot more substance than that ornery outer layer.

For instance, during the summer Matt Ravlich was operated on for cartilage removal. When General Manager Tommy Ivan called Matt's room after the operation, it was Mikita who answered the phone. He was Matt's first visitor, at a time when a guy is really glad to have a friend around.

When Kent Douglas viciously slashed Stan for 15 stitches in a Toronto game last year, Stan took 5 minutes of playing time to get stitched up and was back on the ice for all of the final two periods. The next night he scored two goals and an assist to help beat Toronto 3-2. Most athletes would have taken a month off with the kind of gash Stan had.

Mikita led the league two years in a row in points. Last year he was second only to Hull who set a new record with 97 points.

Yes, there is only one Stan Mikita — and he's on our side!



RONALD "CHICO" MAKI

RIGHT WING

Shoots right 5'10" 170 lbs.

Born: Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

Aug. 17, 1939

Chico led all Hawks with 16 assists on Bobby Hull's record of 54 goals.

His speed and ability to go into the corners is credited with much of Hull's success as a scorer. Men like Maki don't always get the credit that coaches know they deserve.

His ability to break fast means the opposition must watch him as well as his line mates. Also, Maki is considered one of the best checkers in the league.

Played center his first two years with the Hawks but is better suited as a right wing. His shot cannot be discounted either. Coach Reay has said he should have many more goals if he would shoot himself. But Chico is satisfied with setting up his teammates whenever possible.



JOHN MISZUK

DEFENSE

Shoots left 6'2" 200 lbs.

Born: Naliboki, Poland

Sept. 29, 1940

A rough, tough defenseman, John Miszuk could give Hawks that added beef needed to slow down opposing forwards barging in on goal.

A hard worker, Miszuk had a short trial with Detroit before coming to the Hawks. Had a good year in St. Louis last season and showed well in the few games he played with Hawks toward the end of the season. Likes to hit and helps keep the opposition looking up.



DOUGLAS A. MOHNS

DEFENSE

Shoots left 6' 190 lbs.

Born: Capreol, Ont.

Dec. 13, 1933

One of the most underrated players in the NHL, Doug Mohns had a great season in 1965-66 scoring 22 goals on the Scooter Line.

Mohns was brought to Chicago after a great career in Boston as a defenseman. Injuries in the Hawk system forced Mohns to be moved to left wing and his play there has made him one of the most fearsome left wingers this side of Bobby Hull.

Playing with Stan Mikita and Kenny Wharram, who are both on the small side, Mohns' experience on defense and his good size make him valuable as a policeman for his two mates.

One of the fastest skaters in the league, Mohns' ability as a checker makes him a good scorer because he can be counted on to steal the puck. In 1959-60 Doug scored 20 goals as a defenseman, a feat accomplished only a few times in league history.





ERIC PAUL NESTERENKO

RIGHT WING

Shoots right 6'1" 195 lbs.

Born: Flin Flon, Man.

Oct. 31, 1933

Just when you think Eric Nesterenko is one of the top defensive wings in the league, he comes up with one of his fantastic skating exhibitions to score a crucial goal in a key game.

Never high among goal scorers, he consistently clicks off between 12 and 18 a year with his high coming in 1957-58 when he scored 20. Last year was one of Eric's best years with 15 goals and 25 assists, and on at least five of his goals, he skated through the entire opposition while rivals stood by waiting for a pass. Since Eric has a reputation of passing off instead of shooting himself, when he pulls a surprise and actually keeps the puck himself, he really brings the house down.

Considered an "intellectual", Eric doesn't say too much and lets his game by game play do the talking.

Many players have been quoted as saying Eric is the hardest man to play against because of his long arms and legs that seem to tangle up opposing forwards with tantalizing success.

He and Bill Hay were considered as good a penalty killing pair as the league could muster last season.

Eric is especially valuable in working with youngsters. His line usually has at least one rookie so the kid can pick up pointers from Eric.

PIERRE PAUL PILOTE

DEFENSE

Shoots left 5'10" 173 lbs.

Dec. 11, 1931

Black Hawk Captain Pierre Pilote has been an NHL All Star defenseman four years in a row and was on the second team three years before that.

Pierre has been on the Hawks for 11 seasons. Considered one of the best play makers in the league, his work on the point and in setting up teammates during power plays gives him large assist totals each season. In 1964-65 he set league mark for points by a defenseman with 59. Was named James Norris trophy winner three years in a row as best defenseman. Last season finished second in the voting mainly because he missed 29 games with a broken thumb.

While he is tops among defensemen, he actually is one of the smallest in the league, coming in under 175 lbs.

Has played in the Black Hawk organization all his life, doing his minor league chores at Buffalo and amateur work at St. Catharines.

An injury-free season could put him back in the running for the Norris Cup and keep him among the league's super stars for several more seasons.





MATTHEW J. RAVLICH

DEFENSE

Shoots left 5'10" 175 lbs.

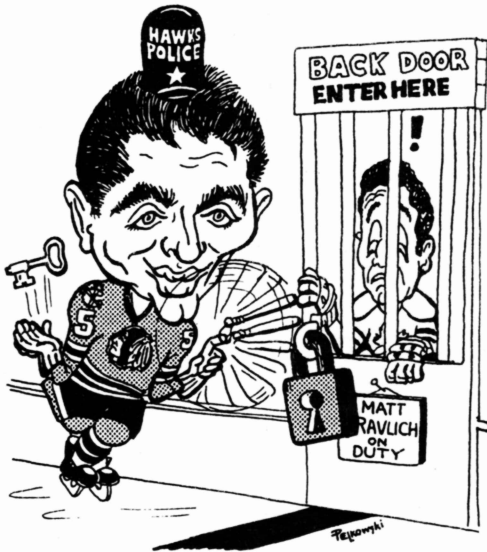
Born: Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

However, he spent most of last season in St. Louis. His stick handling ability and skating finesse should make him one of the league's great centers in years to come but the Hawks are trying to be patient.

Freddie comes from a family of eight brothers, all of whom are playing hockey in the Hawk system somewhere. But few deny that Fred has shown the most promise and should make it big in the majors, starting with this season.

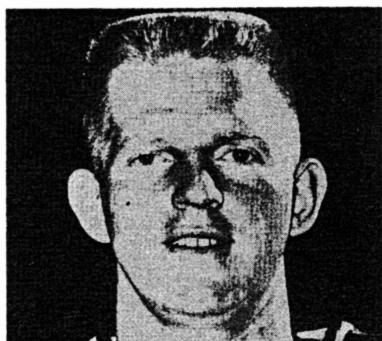
FREDDIE LEADS THE WAY

Born: Sarnia, Ont.

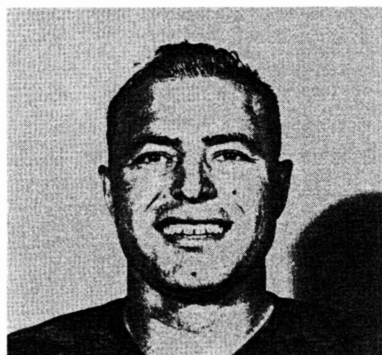
July 4, 1940

Few Hawks have made the hit with fans and players alike that Pat Stapleton did when he joined the team in midseason last year and moved right into a place on the squad.

Originally in the Black Hawk organization, Pat was lost in the draft. Finally was drafted back last year which made both Stapleton and management very happy.

Short but stocky in build, Pat has especially quick hands and reflexes and makes up for his lack of size in anticipating opponents' moves. Also has a good shot from the point, a necessary requirement for the modern type of hockey.

Made the All Star team in the second half and picked up enough points to gain a berth on the second team for the overall year, although missing most of the first half.



ELMER "MOOSE" VASKO

DEFENSE

Shoots left 6'3" 215 lbs.

Born: Duparquet, Que.

Dec. 11, 1935

Although he's a big man, he has deceptive speed and many times overtakes a forward that might get a step or two out in front.

While Moose can dish out punishment when necessary, he is usually low on the penalty side because he doesn't go looking for trouble unless it comes to him first. Especially adept on defense during a short handed situation.



KENNETH M. WHARRAM

RIGHT WING

Shoots left 5'9" 168 lbs.

Born: Ferris, Ont.

July 2, 1933

Kenny's 26 goals last season gave him his fourth year in a row over 20, including his phenomenal 39 goal season two years ago.

His fast break across the blue line has made the "Scooter" line one of the most feared in hockey. With Stan Mikita setting him up, Kenny and Stan make one of the best combinations in hockey.

Played one game with the Hawks, in 1951, which gives him the title of "senior" member of the team. He didn't make it big with the Hawks until 1958-59 after two other tries.

Won Lady Byng trophy in 1963-64 as well as 1st team All Star. Has one of best averages in league for goals against number of shots taken.

CURVED STICKS CAME EARLY

Just in case you get in an argument about who "invented" the curved stick, here's something few people know.

Cy Denneny, whose Hall of Fame career spanned 1914-1929, says he played with a curved stick most of his career. "We didn't have those fancy machines to make our sticks just the way we wanted them," Cy says. "I had to stand on the blade and bend it. But let me tell you, putting a curve in the blade helps your control when you are shooting."

Stan Mikita and Bobby Hull are credited with starting the recent trend among NHL players to use curved sticks, and many people have criticized them saying they lose something by having their blades curved.

But take it from a member of the Hall of Fame, Cy Denneny says the curved blade makes for better shooting. He should know. One year, 1920-21, he scored 34 goals in 24 games.

Young brother of Chico, blossomed fast last season after only one year of junior hockey. Bigger than Chico and has proven a good goal scorer.

Has bright future.

Shoots right 6'0" 195 lbs.

Two time All American from Denver U., expected to be solid defenseman. Big enough with a good shot for a defenseman. Might need year in minors but don't be surprised if he's on Hawk team before year is over.

Shoots left 6'1" 180 lbs.

Oct. 8, 1935

Led both American and Central leagues in scoring. Played a few games with Hawks and Detroit. Good back up man for both left wing and center.

HATS ARE HARD TO GET

John F. Kennedy almost put the hat business out of commission, but National League goalies do their part also to keep "hats" from being too prominent in the hockey world.

Every one talks about hat tricks but few realize just how tough it is to get three goals in one game.

Dickie Moore, for instance, who once held the record for points and played 14 major league seasons, finished his career with only five three goal games.

Alex Delvecchio, a perennial 25-30 goal man, has only two. Gordie Howe, after 20 years in the major leagues has only 15 in his life time.

Bobby Hull is the highest active NHL player with 17 which is not too far behind Maurice Richard's 26 picked up over 18 years. Bobby got his in only nine seasons.

Only five other Black Hawks have even cracked the barrier, including Camille Henry who has six, all scored during his years with New York. Stan Mikita has seven, Kenny Wharram two, Eric Nesterenko and Ken Hodge one each.

Hull's two four goal games last year give him four of those for an all time high. Henry had one four goal game.

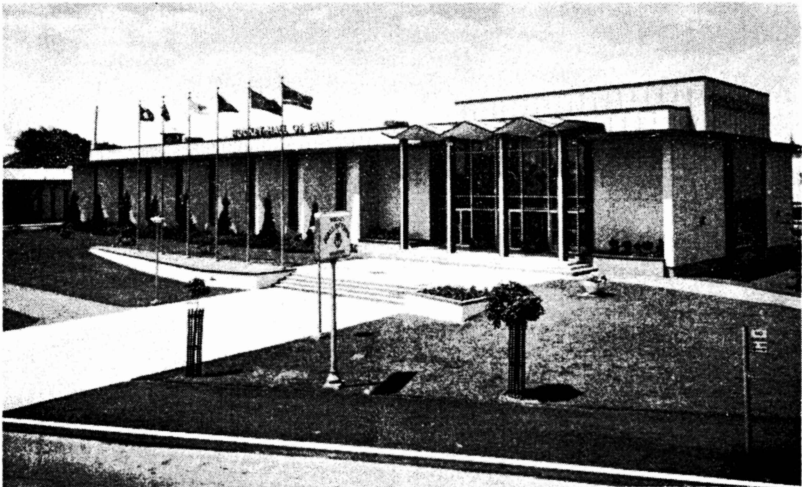

FAMOUS HAWK LINE FIRMLY ENTRENCHED IN HALL OF FAME

The Black Hawks' most famous line, Bentley-Bentley, Mosienko, is now firmly entrenched in hockey's Hall of Fame.

Bill Mosienko, all time scoring champ among Black Hawks before Robert Marvin Hull came along, made the Hall in 1965. Doug Bentley had been in for several years. Now, Brother Max joins his former linemates in the last group of Hall members.

While Doug and Mosie played all of their big league hockey with the Hawks, Max was traded to Toronto in 1947 for five men and continued his assault on goalies from there.

Two other former Hawks made the Hall when Frankie Brimsek and Ted Lindsay were voted in. Brimsek played only one year at the end of his career for Chicago, after making most of his glory moves with the Boston Bruins where he acquired the nickname of Mr. Zero.

Lindsay played three years with the Hawks but most of his great years were in Detroit. It took a unanimous vote to install Lindsay since he had not been out of hockey the required five years.

Other new members enrolled in this year's vote included Clarence Campbell, who just finished his 20th year as President of the NHL, Babe Pratt, Frank Bouchard, Terry Reardon, Ted Kennedy, Elmer Lach and Toe Blake.

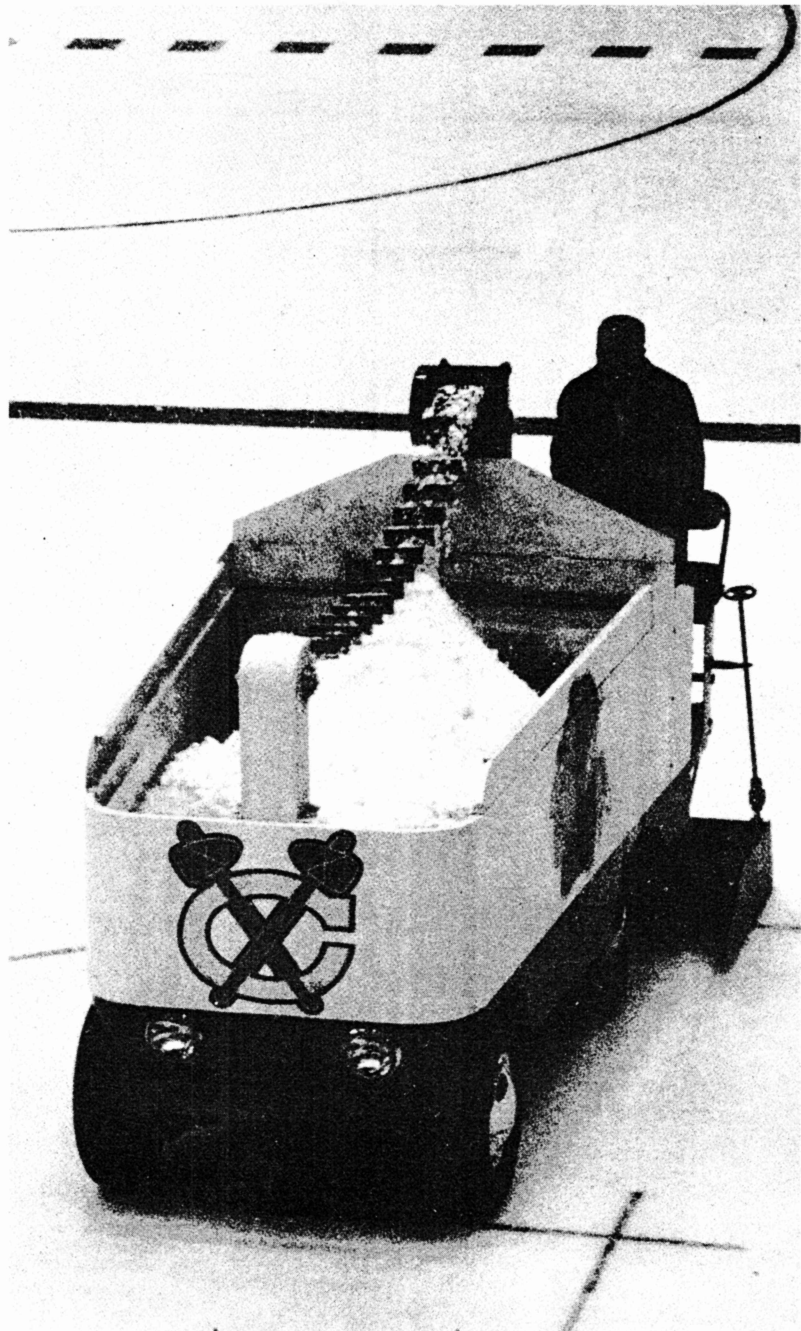

CHICAGO STADIUM HOLDS BIG WINDY CITY SPORTS TRADITION

THE STADIUM, the world's largest indoor arena in seating capacity, has been the scene of six national political conventions, championship fights, six-day bike races, wrestling, soccer, track, rodeos, symphonies, tennis, softball, midget auto racing, operas, basketball, religious revivals, dog, horse, and flower shows, swimming meets, circuses, and, of course, Black Hawk hockey.

Possibly three of the most unusual events ever held in the Stadium were two funerals and a football championship. The funeral rites were for Mayor Cermak and Patrick Harmon.

Pro Football

On December 18, 1932, perhaps the strangest indoor sporting event ever held was unfolded in the Stadium. Because of a blizzard, the National Football League championship game between the Chicago Bears and the Portsmouth Clippers was transferred indoors and played on an 80 yard especially designed field. The Bears won the game 9 to 0.

The Stadium has been graced by many personalities of the stage, business, athletic, and political worlds. In January, 1936, a blonde skater from Europe made her professional debut with the Hollywood Ice Revue. This lass from Norway, Sonja Henie, has since become the world's best known skater.

Three Presidents in Stadium

There have been countless personalities from the entertainment world who have appeared in the Stadium. Roy Rogers, Hopalong Cassidy, Bob Hope, Jimmy Durante, Bing Crosby, and Satchmo Armstrong are just a few. In fact, almost every known entertainer has at one time or another played the Stadium.

Politics also has contributed its share of world-known figures to the roster of those making Stadium appearances. These include Franklin D. Roosevelt, Thomas Dewey, Harry Truman, and John F. Kennedy. Kennedy held his last rally prior to the 1960 election inside the Stadium. Roosevelt received the Democratic nomination

twice in the Stadium, while Truman received his party's V.P. nomination.

The most impressive facility in the Stadium is probably the huge Barton pipe organ, capable of producing volume equivalent to 2,500 instruments of a brass band. Its keyboard is so huge it had to be built upright and semicircular so one man could operate it. The organ is powered by a 100 HP motor and twin Spencer turbine blower. The console weighs 7½ tons. It took 36 men to install the organ.

With a legal capacity of 26,085, the Stadium has held more than 30,000 for national political conventions.

Bismarck Leads Way to Boost the Black Hawks

FOR THOSE WHO WONDER why newspapers and readers spend so much time and energy on sports, let them study the events surrounding Black Hawk games in Chicago Stadium.

Many restaurants in the city have set up plans whereby fans can have dinner before the game, park their car and take a bus furnished by the restaurant to the Stadium. The idea has become so popular that new restaurant plans are popping up every year.

Pioneer in this operation has been the Bismarck hotel, where as many as eight bus loads have been seen caravanning to the Stadium after patrons have enjoyed dinner in the Swiss Chalet. The Bismarck parks your car and then there is a bus waiting at 7 p.m. to transport the passengers to the Stadium. It leaves after the game and helps avoid problems of traffic and parking.

Not all restaurants with plans are known to the Black Hawks because many buy their tickets on season plans and use their own means of publicizing among their own customers. Others set up bus transportation for those who already have their tickets.

At any rate, the Black Hawk games seem to generate extra business for many companies that see fit to use foresight and imagination.
