WILLIAM W. WIRTZ, President of the Chicago Blackhawks and a Governor of the National Hockey League, plays an important role in the operation of the National Hockey League and the operation of the Club. He is Chairman of both the Expansion Committee and Finance Committee, and a member of the Owner-Player Council, the TV Committee and the Playoff Committee of the N.H.L.

BILL HAS grown up in Hockey with his family's interest and has always been an ardent fan. He lives in Winnetka with his wife, Joan, and five children, Rocky, Gail, Karen, Peter, and Alison, and you can often see the entire family rooting for the Blackhawks. He attended High School in Chicago and was graduated from Brown University in 1950.

BILL'S ACTIVE business interests include President, Wirtz Corporation; President, American Furniture Mart Corporation; President, First Security Trust & Savings Bank and many other companies, but his hobby and love is Hockey and he has made a real business of it.



ARTHUR M. WIRTZ, JR.

HE LIVES in Northfield with his wife, Sunny, and two children, Laura (three years old) and Arthur M. Wirtz, III (8 months). Mike and his wife never miss a game; however their children must be content to watch the games on TV until they become a little older.

MIKE ATTENDED High School in Chicago and was graduated from Wharton School of Commerce, University of Pennsylvania, in 1958. He is Vice President of Wirtz Corporation; Treasurer of American Furniture Mart Corporation; Director of First Security Trust & Savings Bank, and an officer and director of many other corporations, but his hobby and love is hockey.



ARTHUR MORSE

ARTHUR M. WIRTZ, JR., known as "Mike", is Vice President of the Chicago Blackhawks. He, likewise, has grown up in Hockey, with his family's interest, and has always been an ardent fan.

ARTHUR MORSE is General Counsel of the Chicago Blackhawks and the Club's Alternate Governor of the National Hockey League. He is a member of By-Laws and Constitution Committee of the National Hockey League as well as several other committees.

ARTHUR HAS long been associated with sports and is responsible for the development of the College Double Header Basketball Games which are played annually in Chicago Stadium. He is Assistant Athletic Director at Loyola University.



THOMAS N. IVAN

GENERAL MANAGER

FEW men in the National Hockey League have more experience in the various capacities necessary to make a good general manager than Tommy Ivan, who has served the Blackhawks since 1954. He was instrumental in developing a strong farm system which is responsible for the Blackhawks being a perennial contender.

His two proudest achievements as General Manager were winning the Stanley Cup in 1961 and the first National League Championship in Chicago's history in the 1966-67 season.

A QUIET executive, Tommy plans his strategy far in advance. He remains in the background because he believes the fans want to know about the players "especially when you have great ones."

Tommy works closely with the Wirtz family and is in position at all times to get fast decisions. "If opportunities arise I can always find Bill and between us we can move for the good of the Hawks. Sometimes, when things are happening faster than you'd like, I know that Bill will back me up. This makes my job and Billy Reay's much easier to know that top management is on your side."

YOU might meet Tommy Ivan in Greensboro, N. C., or St. Catharines, during the hockey season because he knows the only way to find hockey players is to go out and look for them.

Tommy and his wife, Dorothy, live on Chicago's north side. No matter how late it is when his plane arrives, Dorothy is always at the airport to meet him.



WILLIAM T. REAY

COACH

BILLY REAY is starting his sixth season as Coach of the Chicago Blackhawks. He never lost the feeling that goes with playing the game himself and knowing the way his men think. While many coaches lose touch with their men after they leave the playing field themselves, Billy still considers himself a professional in every sense of the word and expects his men to act accordingly. When he thinks they are right he goes to bat for them.

BILLY'S diminutive size in the midst of his burly crew makes him a colorful leader. But his actions and manner of speaking are low keyed except when some one goes out of his way to rile him.

Besides his ability to command loyalty from all sides, Billy has a tremendous will to win in anything he tries. Only a Stan Mikita can beat him on the team pool table and even Stan has trouble. In a quiz game or on a golf course he puts his entire concentration powers to work. A meticulous dresser and articulate speaker at banquets, Reay could pass for a bank executive.

BILLY has two children, a married daughter and a son, Bill, Jr., who is fast becoming a solid hockey player in several Chicago area leagues. The Reays live in Chicago the year around and young Billy is a sophomore at Lane Tech.

WGN Radio, TV To Broadcast All Blackhawk Games

WGN radio and TV have combined to handle all Blackhawk games during the coming season.

Channel 9, WGN-TV, will do all of the Blackhawk road games,



Lou Boudreau and Lloyd Pettit will handle mikes as WGN radio and TV do both home and road games this season.

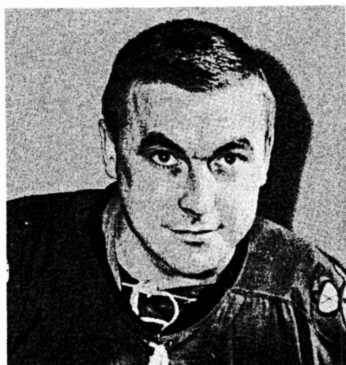
including two exhibition games before the season opened while the radio outlet for WGN will broadcast all of the home games, including the two exhibition games played in Chicago Stadium.

It marks the fourth year in which the Hawks' road games have all been televised.

"We are very happy that WGN was able to take our radio broadcasts," William Wirtz, president of the Blackhawks said. "It gives us continuity with the same announcers both at home and on the road. And it also gives us the best sports station in the country with our agreement with WGN."





DENIS DeJORDY

GOAL

Shoots left 5'9" 175 lbs.

Born: St. Hyacinthe, Que.

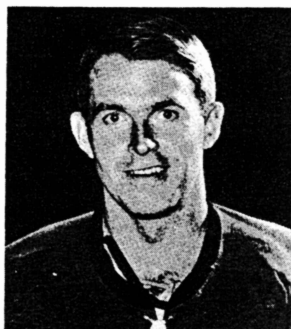
Nov. 12, 1938

During the Stanley Cup Playoffs last season, Denis DeJordy proved to everyone that he is at his best when the chips are down. With the Black Hawks trailing New York 2-0 in the first round, Denis pulled the team up by their skate laces as the Hawks won four straight. Denis finished that series with a goals against average of 2.00 allowing only three goals in the last three games.

Last season Denis appeared in 50 games, the most he has ever worked for the Hawks, and racked up four shutouts to complement his 2.80 average. Time after time he came up with the big save and made some outstanding stops on breakaways. It was in this department that he showed his biggest improvement.

A standup goalie, Denis plays with angles just right and doesn't allow the opposing forwards an extra inch of the net to shoot at. No Black Hawk fan will ever forget the outstanding maneuver Denis made against Frank Mahovlich last year when he came out of the net about 30 feet and dove on his stomach to push the puck away from Mahovlich who was streaking in alone, preserving a 1-0 shutout against Toronto.

During the off-season Denis and his wife Joan live with their two daughters in Dauville, Quebec, where Denis owns and operates a sporting goods store called "Denis DeJordy Sports Inc." He also owns a couple apartment buildings which he built himself to augment his pension when it comes time for him to retire from hockey. Black Hawk fans hope that day doesn't arrive for quite some time.



DAVE DRYDEN

GOAL

Shoots left 6'2" 175 lbs.

Born: Hamilton, Ont.

Sept. 5, 1941

Last season Dave Dryden appeared in 27 games as a Black Hawk, his highest total in the N.H.L. Dryden, the first Black Hawk goalie to wear a mask, finished the season with a 3.03 goals against average.

The biggest thrill for Dave came in a game against the Oakland Seals when he recorded his first N.H.L. shutout as the Hawks whipped the Seals on the West Coast by a score of 1-0.

Dryden, who is a school teacher during the off-season, is one of the taller goalies in the league at 6'2". He and his wife, Sandra, make their off-season home in Toronto with their three children.

Dave is a standup goalie in the true sense of the word and is rarely seen flopping on the ice. Dave's calm, cool temperament makes it easy for him to team with Denis DeJordy and bide his time on the bench when the Frenchman is hot.





BOBBY HULL

LEFT WING

Shoots left 5'10" 195 lbs.

Born: Pointe Anne, Ont.

Jan. 3, 1939

Enough can't be said about Bobby Hull who is probably the greatest natural athlete in the whole world. Although Bobby is a Black Hawk, for which Chicago fans can thank their lucky stars, he also affects the rosters of other teams who usually carry a player just to shadow the "Golden Jet."

Almost every N.H.L. trophy in existence has the name: Bobby Hull, inscribed upon it. Bobby has accumulated three scoring titles, one Lady Byng award, two most valuable player awards as well as shattering the single season goal scoring titles and tying the single season point title along the way. He has been selected to the all-star team a total of eight times, with seven of these choices for the first all-star team, all in 11 years.

Bobby possesses the hardest shot in the league, is probably the fastest skater in the league, has without a doubt the best physique in the league, and also owns the best personality of any super star in any sport.

With Stan Mikita, Hull gives the Hawks hockey's two greatest stars and the best 1-2 punch in hockey. The two hold the league record for points in a season at 97, and they finished 1-2 in goals last season, Bobby getting 44 and Stan 40. Bobby has 21 hat tricks in 11 seasons. Only Rocket Richard with 27 over 18 seasons tops this department.

Bobby and his wife Joanne have three sons who all possess their Dad's blonde hair and good looks. In the summer months, they spend their time on a farm in Demorestville, Ont., where Bobby really gets a workout farming and raising livestock. They toured Spain this past summer.



DENNIS HULL

LEFT WING

Shoots left 6' 185 lbs.

Born: Pointe Anne, Ont.

Nov. 19, 1944

Playing on the Black Hawks and having a name like Hull makes it a little difficult for Dennis Hull since almost everyone expects him to be another Bobby Hull. But he has made people hope the Hawks get more Dennis Hulls, because that's a pretty good type of player, too.

Dennis, who has one of the hardest slap shots in the league, displayed great durability last season by playing in every one of the 74 game schedule. He was one of only three Black Hawks to accomplish this feat. His rugged style coupled with a great defensive record make him one of the most valuable Hawks.

Playing with new linemates for much of the season, Dennis scored 18 goals last year. The year before he lit the red light 25 times. Coupled with Bobby's 52 goals that year, the brothers set an N.H.L. mark for brothers on the same team of 77 goals.

During the summer months Dennis, his wife Mary Sue, and their daughter live in Millbrook, Ont. where Dennis keeps busy by farming.

Big things are expected of Dennis this season and this could be the year that he blossoms into a high-scoring left wing.

DOUG JARRETT

DEFENSE

Shoots right 6'3" 205 lbs.

Born: London, Ont.

April 22, 1944

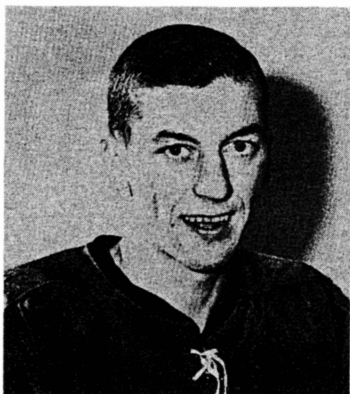
Although Doug Jarrett is normally classified as a "defensive" defenseman, he showed his scoring potential while playing the back-line during last season's Stanley Cup Playoffs, netting four goals. Jarrett showed his true value to the club by playing in every game last season including a couple of playoff games in which he was in agony from an injured knee.

Nicknamed "Chairman of the Boards," Jarrett derived this tag by using the boards to take opposing forwards out of the play. For a hard-hitting defenseman, Doug is a clean player with comparably low penalty minutes.

According to trade rumors, Doug was one of the most sought after players on the Black Hawk roster this summer. At 24, Jarrett should be around for a long time. Opposing forwards had better stay clear of the boards on the right side.

Doug pals around with Dennis Hull. They have been inseparable since their days at St. Catharines. With Gil Marotte, Jarrett gives the Hawks possibly the two hardest hitting defensemen in the N.H.L.

Doug and his wife Mary Lou have two sons, Dougie and Mike and they spend the summer months in St. Catharines, Ontario.



CHICO MAKI

RIGHT WING

Shoots right 5'10" 170 lbs.

Born: Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

Aug. 17, 1939

After completing a "tough luck" season, Chico Maki is raring to go this year and can hardly wait to get started. At the close of training camp last year Chico had to undergo an emergency appendectomy. He missed the first 14 games and, when he did return to the lineup, he certainly was not at full strength.

Although Chico finished the season with only an 8-16-24 record, he really stood out in the Stanley Cup Playoffs with a 3-4-7, fourth highest on the club.

Starting this season at full strength, Chico could achieve his first 20 goal season in the N.H.L. His true value to the team comes, however, through his "digging" in the corners and feeding the puck to his linemates. Also, his constant checking makes him one of the Hawks' best defensive forwards. Chico has spent the last three or four seasons with Bobby Hull as a linemate and has certainly been a factor in some of Bobby's big seasons. The year Bobby scored his record-breaking 54 goals, Chico assisted him 16 times, high on the club.

During the off-season, Chico and his wife, Nancy, live in Simcoe, Ont., where Chico indulges in a bit of farming. They have two sons: Michael 6; and Stephen 4.

He and Wayne make up one of the Hawks' famous brother combinations. Although usually low in goals, Chico has one of the most accurate shots in the league. But playing with scorers like Bobby Hull has gotten him out of the habit of shooting.



WAYNE MAKI

LEFT WING

Shoots left 5'11" 180 lbs.

Born: Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

Nov. 10, 1944

Last season in very limited action, Wayne's record with the Black Hawks was 5-5-10. He also notched a goal during the playoffs, which proved to be the final Black Hawk goal of the year. Most of his scoring was done playing right wing even though Wayne is normally a left winger.

All through his career Wayne's biggest asset has been his ability to score, which is the name of the game. In his two full seasons with St. Louis (now Dallas) in the C.H.L., Wayne lit the red light a total of 56 times.

Even though Maki is a left wing, his aggressive play should enable him to crack the Black Hawk roster this season, a roster that is overstocked at that position (Bobby Hull, Doug Mohns, Dennis Hull and a fine crop of rookies).

A popular player with Hawk fans last season, Wayne is expected to see a lot of action this year. Don't be surprised to see Wayne Maki blossom into a big scoring star.

His playing is completely opposite from his brother, who excels in checking while Wayne does the scoring in the Maki family.



GILLES MAROTTE

DEFENSE

Shoots left 5'10" 189 lbs.

Born: Verdun, Que.

June 7, 1945

Gilles Marotte became one of the Black Hawks' most valuable and most popular players in his first year in Chicago. Gilles has a very bright future ahead of him and with any luck could find his name inscribed on the Norris trophy before long.

Gilles started out slowly last season as he made the switch from left to right side of the ice. After a few games on the right side, however, he played the position as though it was tailor made for him.

A rough, tough defenseman, Gilles drew 122 minutes in penalties last season and did not land a major penalty. This is indicative of the other players' respect for Marotte. Nobody wants to tangle with Gilles.

When Marotte played defense for Boston, he scored 10 goals in a year and a half. Last season he went scoreless until the Stanley Cup Playoffs when he exploded for three goals.

Gilles and his wife Claire have one daughter, born last season. A former catcher, in the Quebec league, Gilles had some professional offers but turned them down to play hockey. After his fine play of last season, Black Hawk boosters are certainly glad he stuck to hockey.



PIT MARTIN

CENTER

Shoots right 5'9" 161 lbs.

Born: Noranda, Que.

Dec. 9, 1943

Although last season was a bit of a disappointment to Pit Martin, he hopes the injury jinx is behind him. After a good start last year, Pit injured his ankle in a game at Montreal and wound up missing 11 games. When he did return, he was limping badly for a few weeks and, consequently, his play was not up to par.

The playoffs were another story though, with Pit showing flashes of brilliance and finishing third on the club with a 3-6-9 record behind Stan Mikita and Bobby Hull.

Now that Pit has become accustomed to his linemates' style of play, he should have no trouble hitting the 20 goal plateau this season.

The Black Hawks were lucky to land Pit from Boston a year ago since Martin used to personally murder the team. In a game three years ago, Pit experienced his greatest night in hockey when he scored four goals in Boston to help defeat the Hawks.

Pit is one of a few college graduates playing on the team. He has degrees in French and in history from Windsor College. Pit and his wife, Patricia, spend the summer months in St. Clair Beach, Ont., where Pit enjoys boating and golf.

Although Pit is one of the smallest men on the Black Hawk roster, he could be one of the biggest players in the point standings at the end of this season.



RAY McKAY

DEFENSE

Shoots left 6'4" 176 lbs.

Born: Edmonton, Alta.

Aug. 22, 1946

The tallest player on the Black Hawk roster at 6'4", Ray went on a conditioning program over the summer months to add some weight to the 176 lbs. Billy Reay says, however, that Ray may be the right weight now. His build is wirey and raw-boned.

Ray, who is unmarried at 22, enjoys golf in the summer months. If Ray makes the team this year the Black Hawks are going to have one of the toughest defenses in the league with men like McKay, Jarrett, Marotte, and Reid.

STAN MIKITA

CENTER

Shoots right 5'9" 165 lbs.

Born: Sokolce, Czech.

May 20, 1940

Two seasons ago Stan Mikita became the only player to capture three trophies in one year: The Hart Trophy as most valuable player; the Art Ross Trophy as leading scorer; and the Lady Byng Trophy for good sportsmanship. Last season Stan became the only player to win these three awards TWO years in a row.

Last season Stan set two personal highs for himself, scoring 40 goals for the season and getting four goals in one game against Pittsburgh. His 40-47-87 record led the league and his 5-7-12 record led the team during the Stanley Cup Playoffs.

Among Mikita's individual accomplishments are the following: 4 Art Ross Trophies; 2 Hart Trophies; 2 Lady Byng Trophies; the N.H.L. Stanley Cup Playoff scoring records for both points and assists; the N.H.L. record for assists in one season; and a tie with Bobby Hull for most points in one season.

Perhaps the most amazing of all these awards are Mikita's two Lady Byng Trophies. During the 1964-65 season Stan racked up 154 minutes in penalties. Last year he had only 14 minutes. Mikita's logic on this is sound: "It takes an awful long stick to score from the penalty box."

Stan is one of two Black Hawks who spend the summer in the Chicago area, (Eric Nesterenko is the other). He and his wife Jill reside in Elmhurst with their two children Meg and Scott. This summer Stan went into the restaurant business in the Oakbrook shopping center with "Stan Mikita's Village Inn."

If Stan ever retires from hockey, he can always turn to golf, consistently shooting in the 70's. His best game is a 71 at Butterfield golf course. Black Hawk fans, however, would rather watch him play hockey. He captained the Black Hawk golf team to the NHL Championship this past summer.



DOUG MOHNS

LEFT WING

Shoots left 6' 190 lbs.

Born: Capreal, Ont.

Dec. 31, 1933

The Black Hawks are a very "deep" team at left wing and one of the reasons for this is Doug Mohns.

Doug came to Chicago from Boston in 1964 to help out on defense. When injuries hit the team, he was given a left wing assignment and the position has been his ever since. Doug's versatility is a plus on his side, for if he should ever slow up, he still could be one of the best defensemen in the league.

In 1959-60, Doug scored 20 goals on defense, quite an accomplishment. Last season Doug racked up 24 goals even though he missed nine games with a bad hip. His personal high is 25 two seasons ago.

During the off-season, Doug lives with his wife Jane and two children, a son and a daughter, in Weymouth, Massachusetts, where he works as an insurance agent for Lincoln National Life. Last season Doug scored his 200th N.H.L. goal ranking him among some fine players in the National Hockey League.

Doug will play his 1,000th N.H.L. game this season.



ERIC NESTERENKO

RIGHT WING

Shoots right 6'1" 195 lbs.

Born: Flin Flon, Man.

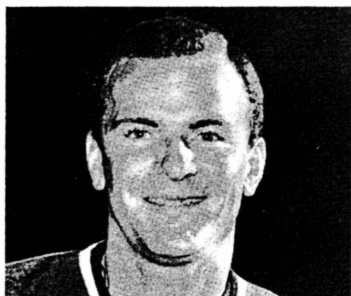
Oct. 31, 1933

One of the few hockey players in the N.H.L. who can do everything well is Eric Nesterenko, the pride and joy of Flin Flon, Manitoba. Eric will be starting his 16th full N.H.L. season this year, his 12th as a Black Hawk.

Whether shadowing an opposing forward, scoring a crucial goal, or killing a penalty, Eric always seems to get the job done. Last season Eric stood out as a penalty killer for the Black Hawks and scored 11 goals as well. The big thrill for him last season was his 200th N.H.L. goal. This is quite a feat for a player whose main job is checking the other team's big man.

While most players head for Canada during the summer months, Eric and his wife Barbara live in Evanston with their son and two daughters. Eric is employed as a registered representative for Douglas securities, a brokerage firm.

Having appeared in 966 games thus far in the N.H.L., Eric should reach the 1,000 game milestone this season. A very accomplished speaker, Eric is always under constant demand to attend banquets and make personal appearances.



JACK NORRIS

GOAL

Shoots left 5'10" 175 lbs.

Born: Saskatoon, Sask.

Aug. 5, 1942

When Denis DeJordy was injured late last season, the Black Hawks needed a goaltender to play alongside Dave Dryden. The Dallas farm team sent up Jack Norris to do the job and Jack made the most fabulous debut of the season.

In his first full game as a Black Hawk before a Sunday afternoon nationwide TV audience, Jack shut out Toronto 4-0 by making some fantastic saves. His outstanding maneuver came when he stopped Mike Walton on a penalty shot. Walton had scored the night before on a penalty shot in a game at Toronto against Detroit.

Prior to last season, Jack had appeared in 23 N.H.L. games as a Boston Bruin during the 1964-65 season and had recorded one shutout.



BILL ORBAN

LEFT WING

Shoots left 5'11" 170 lbs.

Born: Regina, Sask.

Feb. 20, 1944

Last season as a Black Hawk, Bill Orban appeared in 39 games and did a commendable job. He scored three goals and showed the opposition that he wouldn't be pushed around. This season Bill is looking forward to more ice time.

Before coming to the Hawks last year, Bill had played two seasons in the W.H.L. at Los Angeles. In 1965-66, his first season as a pro, Bill won the Rookie of the Year award in L.A.

Among Orban's greatest assets are his strong skating and aggressiveness. A former speed skater, Bill placed second in North America speed skating as a midget.



JIM PAPPIN

RIGHT WING

Shoots right 6'1" 190 lbs.

Born: Copper Cliff, Ont.

Sept. 10, 1939

Jim Pappin came to the Black Hawks last summer to help the offense, especially on the right side. He also gives the Hawks a journeyman scorer with comparative youth on his side.

Throughout his amateur and professional career Jim has been a consistently high scorer. His best pro season came at Rochester in 1965-66 when Jim's record was 36-51-87 in 63 games. An aggressive player, Pappin also totaled 116 penalty minutes that season. His top N.H.L. production was in 1966-67 at Toronto when his record was 21-11-32 in 64 games. That same season Jim's 7 goals and 15 points led all playoff scorers showing that Jim can produce under pressure.

During the off-season, Jim is a very busy man. He and his wife, Karen, make their summer home in Rexdale, Ont. with their two children, a son and a daughter. Jim spends the summer as a horse trainer and also enjoys golfing. He also keeps busy running Jim Pappin's Holiday Hockey Ranch in Pickering, Ont.

If Jim lives up to past performances, he could score 25-30 goals for the Black Hawks this season.





MATT RAVLICH

DEFENSE

Shoots left 5'10" 185 lbs.

Born: Sault Ste Marie, Ont.

July 12, 1938

If there is any justice in the world Matt Ravlich is destined for a great season since he has already had more than his share of misfortune.

After incurring a broken leg in the final home game of the 1966-67 home season, Matt sat out most of last season working hard in practices to get his leg back into shape. Toward the close of last season, he played 15 games at Dallas with a record of 1-8-9 and 55 penalty minutes showing opponents that he did not lose any of his toughness and competitive spirit.

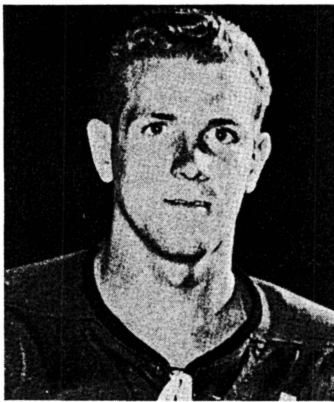
Matt joined the Black Hawk parent team for the Stanley Cup Playoffs and in his first game back at Chicago was struck above the left eye by a puck. It took 12 stitches to close the gash and Matt missed a few more games when the eye closed completely.

If Matt is fully recovered this season, he can be a big help in rounding out the Hawk defense corps.

In his first year as a pro last season, Tom Reid made the jump from junior hockey all the way to the N.H.L. After playing three games at Dallas, Tom got the call to join the Hawks and stuck with the team the remainder of the season.

Tom put his size and weight to good advantage, throwing some resounding checks. At 22, Tom has a long career ahead of him. His youth and his poise are his greatest assets. He showed outstanding potential for a first year pro.

Last year Tom was used primarily as a fifth defenseman and to kill penalties. This season he will undoubtedly receive more ice time and could land a regular assignment.

Tom is one of a scant few single players on the Black Hawk roster. He works for the Fort Erie Arena, Parks and Recreation Board as a park administrator during the summer months in his home town of Fort Erie, Ont.

If Tom lives up to his potential, he could be a mainstay in the Hawk defensive alignment for many years to come.

CHICAGO STADIUM ENJOYS BIG WINDY CITY SPORTS TRADITION

CHICAGO STADIUM, one of the world's largest in seating capacity, has been the scene of six national political conventions, championship fights, six-day bike races, wrestling, soccer, track, rodeos, symphonies, tennis, softball, midget auto racing, operas, basketball, religious revivals, dog, horse, and flower shows, swimming events, circuses, and, of course, Blackhawk hockey.

Possibly three of the most unusual events ever held in the Stadium were two funerals and a football championship. The funeral rites were for Mayor Cermak and Patrick Harmon.

Pro Football

On December 18, 1932, perhaps the strangest indoor sporting event ever held was unfolded in the Stadium. Because of a blizzard, the National Football League championship game between the Chicago Bears and the Portsmouth Clippers was transferred indoors and played on an 80 yard especially designed field. The Bears won the game 9 to 0.

The Stadium has been graced by many personalities of the stage, business, athletic, and political worlds. In January, 1936, a blonde skater from Europe made her professional debut with the Hollywood Ice Revue. This lass from Norway, Sonja Henie, became the world's best known skater and show business personality.

Many Presidents in Stadium

There have been countless personalities from the entertainment world who have appeared in the Stadium. Roy Rogers, Hopalong Cassidy, Bob Hope, Jimmy Durante, Bing Crosby, and Satchmo Armstrong are just a few. In fact, almost every known entertainer has at one time or another played the Stadium.

Politics also has contributed its share of world-known figures to the roster of those making Stadium appearances. These include Franklin D. Roosevelt, Thomas Dewey, Harry Truman, and John F. Kennedy. Kennedy held his last rally prior to the 1960 election inside the Stadium. Roosevelt received the Democratic nomination twice in the Stadium, while Truman received his party's V.P. nomination.

The most impressive facility in the Stadium is probably the huge Barton pipe organ, capable of producing volume equivalent to 2,500 instruments of a brass band. Its keyboard is so huge it had to be built upright and semicircular so one man could operate it. The organ is powered by a 100 HP motor and twin Spencer turbine blower. The console weight 7½ tons. It took 36 men to install the organ.

The first of these plans was developed by the Bismarck Hotel's famous Chalet.

The Chalet is continuing a tradition of delightful dining which it has followed for the past 85 years. The room has been completely redone in a handsome setting.

Werner Weber, who was named the new chef of the Bismarck Hotel recently became only the third man to hold that position in 85 years. Among his accomplishments during his years of apprenticeship has been serving such people as Winston Churchill and other famous statesmen and celebrities.

The Bismarck parks your car and then there is a bus waiting at 7 p.m. to transport the passengers to the Stadium. It leaves after the game and avoids traffic and parking problems.
