## THOMAS N. IVAN

GENERAL MANAGER

Born: Toronto: Ont.

Jan. 31, 1911

**A**LTHOUGH TOMMY IVAN never played professional hockey — an injury ended his career while he was an outstanding player in the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association Senior Series — his list of achievements as coach and general manager is long.

Ivan began his pro career as a scout in the Detroit Red Wings organization and in 1945-46 began coaching Omaha Knights of the old United States Hockey League.

**T**HE FOLLOWING season he coached Indianapolis in the American League and moved into the NHL as coach of the Red Wings in 1947-48. At Detroit Ivan's Teams won six straight NHL championships and three Stanley Cups in seven years.

In 1954-55 he left Detroit to join the Chicago Black Hawks as general manager, combining that position with coaching for one and a half seasons following the fatal illness of Dick Irvin.

**I**VAN IS CREDITED with much of the success in molding the Black Hawks into a strong club through a fine farm system which he helped rebuild. Under his tenure as general manager, the Hawks won their first Stanley Cup title in 23 years, in 1960-61, and their first NHL title, in 1966-67.

Tommy and his wife, Dorothy live in Lake Forest.



## WILLIAM T. REAY

COACH

Born: Winnipeg, Man.  
Aug. 21, 1918

**BILLY REAY'S** coaching career is unique in the fact that he coached before he played in the NHL. He has also been a Chicago coach longer than anyone else in the team's history. Reay, now in his seventh season behind the Chicago bench, was playing coach of Quebec Aces in 1943-44 when the Quebec Senior Hockey League champions won four games with Detroit Red Wings (two in each of the 1943-44 and 1944-45 seasons). Reay is remembered as a light-weight center (155 pounds) for eight seasons with Montreal Canadiens.

After retiring from the NHL at the end of the 1952-53 season, Reay became playing-coach for two seasons with Victoria Cougars in the Western League and then moved to Seattle in the WHL for the 1955-56 term.

**THE FOLLOWING** season he coached the new Rochester entry in the American League. In 1957-58 he was appointed coach of Toronto Maple Leafs and was succeeded early in the following season by Punch Imlach.

After his tenure in Toronto, Reay joined the Black Hawks organization, coaching Sault Ste. Marie in the Eastern Professional League for one season and then Buffalo Bisons in the AHL for two terms.

**BILLY COACHED** Buffalo to league and playoff titles in 1962-63. He is the Dean of coaches in the NHL. His team won the Prince of Wales title for the first time in Black Hawk history in 1967.

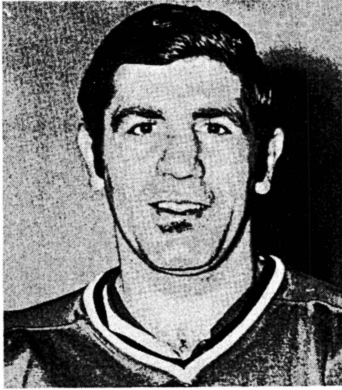

## **LOU ANGOTTI**

CENTER

Shoots right    5'9"    170 lbs.

Born: Toronto, Ont.

Jan. 16, 1938

A new Hawk this season, but certainly not a new face to Hawk fans is Lou Angotti who played with Chicago part of the 1965-66 season and in their league championship 1966-67 season. Last year Angotti played with the Pittsburgh Penguins and had his best NHL goal output with 17. He was traded in the off-season to St. Louis for Ron Schock and Craig Cameron and when the Blues failed to protect him, the Blackhawks picked him up in the draft.

After the expansion draft Angotti spent a year with Philadelphia and helped lead them to a West Division championship with a 12-37-49 record. Lou also spent a season and a half with New York before playing with Chicago, so he has now been on five different N.H.L. teams.

Although most professional hockey players begin their careers at a very early age, Angotti did not begin to play hockey until he was in high school. He earned All-American recognition at Michigan Tech where he played college hockey and was graduated in 1962.

A spirited competitor, Lou seems to give the team a lift whenever he steps onto the ice. He and his wife, Ann make their off-season home in Toronto with their two sons. Among Lou's hobbies are golf and tennis.



## DENIS DeJORDY

GOAL

Shoots left      5'9"      180 lbs.

Born: St. Hyacinthe, Que.

Nov. 12, 1938

If you were a general manager and could have any goalie in the NHL, your first choice would probably be Denis DeJordy for several reasons. He is still young as goalies go and he has had the experience of several big years in the NHL and he has proved from time to time to be able to handle any situation.

While last season was a disaster for most Black Hawks, Denis showed he has the fortitude to fight back and after spending some time in the minors he came back to play some great hockey for Chicago.

A born competitor, Denis fights himself some times, but this is a sign of a great athlete. With some help from his teammates, this could be the year Denis joins the ranks of the all time great goaltenders starting with Glenn Hall, who helped Denis in his early years with the Hawks.

According to Denis the hardest situation to cope with is a break-away pitting just himself against an onrushing opponent. "You have to hang in there until the last split-second and not give the puck carrier an advantage by making the first move and committing yourself," says Denis.

Denis and his wife, Joan have two daughters and they all spend the summer months in St. Hyacinthe, Quebec. Denis owns a couple of apartment buildings there which he built himself and also finds time to run a sporting goods store. His brother, Roger, is a star with Hershey in the A.H.L. where he scored 52 goals in the 1966-67 to lead the league. Originally Roger was a goalie and Denis a forward but they eventually switched positions. It looks as though they both made the right decision.



## TONY ESPOSITO

GOAL

Shoots left 5'11" 185 lbs.

Born: Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

April 23, 1943

Tony was acquired from the Montreal Canadiens in the annual N.H.L. draft. Last season when injuries and "flying fears" struck Montreal's two regular goalies, Esposito stepped in and racked up 2 shutouts and a 2.73 goals against average in 13 games.

In addition to his N.H.L. stint, Tony played in 19 C.H.L. games at Houston. His average there was an even more impressive 2.42. Prior to last season his only other professional season was at Vancouver in 1967-68 where in 62 games he chalked up 4 shutouts and a 3.20 average.

Before turning pro, Esposito was a standout goalie at Michigan Tech. Another Hawk, Lou Angotti, also toiled at that school.

Esposito and his wife, Marilyn have one son, Mark.

He is the brother of Phil, who now plays for Boston.

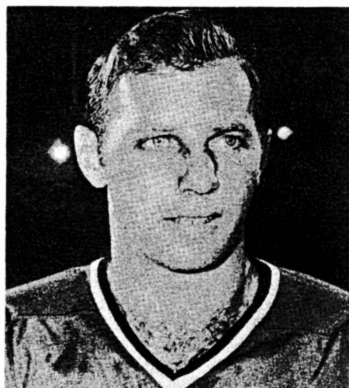

## *Hull's 58 Goals*

Bobby Hull scored his record breaking 58 goals off 21 different goalies. Gerry Cheevers gave up 7. Eight different men gave up one goal . . . five gave up three . . . Les Binkley and Eddie Giacomin gave up six each . . . Hull got the same number on the road as at home, 29 each . . . He scored 20 power play goals, and two short handed . . . He had 11 game winners and five game tiers . . .

Pat Stapleton was the man who assisted on the most with 16 while Stan Mikita and Chico Maki each had 13 assists on Hull's record . . . Even Goalie Dave Dryden got an assist during the record.

Hull scored 30 goals against the West and 28 against the East, although Boston and Pittsburgh tied as the most generous giving up nine each. Stingiest team against Hull was St. Louis with only two.



## **DENNIS HULL**

LEFT WING

Shoots left      6'      195 lbs.

Born: Pt. Anne, Ont.

Nov. 19, 1944

Dennis Hull would be a mainstay on any hockey team in any era, even if his name was John Doe, instead of the magic Hull. Despite the fact that many fans continually expect him to play like his famous brother, Dennis goes his own way and plays hockey the way he likes it, rough, rugged and with 100 per cent of himself in every game.

He would be the first to admit he doesn't skate as fast as Bobby, but he shoots just as hard and he hits harder and certainly more often when somebody gets in his way. While his famous brother has been criticized from time to time for being "too nice" this is something no one will ever say of Dennis, at least on the ice.

His 30 goals last season are all the credentials any player needs. And no one is convinced Dennis doesn't fire the puck harder than any human ever born. Most goalies will testify to this.

Between them, the Hull brothers scored 88 goals last year, which will stand as a league record until the pair start a new season. "Some day we should make it 100," Dennis says, "Because Bobby will hit 70." it's more likely that Dennis will get his 50 and Bobby will match it.

Dennis is married and he and his wife, Mary Sue have a daughter.

## **ROBERT MARVIN HULL**

LEFT WING

Shoots left 5'10" 195 lbs.

Born: Pt. Anne, Ont.

Jan. 3, 1939

This man scored more goals in four of his 11 years than most players score in an entire career. No other player has scored 50 goals more than once in his life and only two did it one time.

But Bobby Hull, the Golden Jet, hit the half century mark four different times, totaling 214 goals in those four years of 50, 54, 52, and 58. The 58 came last year.

With all his scoring Hull has had a somewhat frustrating career in that most of his exploits have come as individual efforts. In his 11 seasons with the Hawks they have won one Stanley Cup back in 1961 when Bobby was a fourth-year player and one league title in 1967. But his team has never been able to put together a good regular season and a good playoff. Ironically, in Hull's biggest season last year when he scored more goals than any man in history and became only the second man in history to top 100 points, his team finished in last place.

No athlete has been acclaimed as Bobby has for his work both on and off the ice. He spends more time signing autographs and helping friends than any man alive.

A gifted speaker, he can keep an audience on the edge of its seat with impromptu remarks.

Hull has a home in Addison, Ill., where he lives with his wife, Joanne and four sons, Bobby, Blake, Brett and Bart. He calls them the mavericks. In the off-season he spends most of his time on his cattle ranch near his birth place.



## **DOUG JARRETT**

DEFENSE

Shoots right    6'3"    205 lbs.

Born: London, Ont.

April 22, 1944

Doug would be the first to admit that he has not hit his potential as one of the league's great defensemen. His size and his skating ability should put him in the running for the James Norris trophy every year.

However, he is hoping that this will be the year when he can put together all the things that are needed to be a hard hitter, a thinking player, and a puck carrier at the same time.

Doug is a product of the Blackhawk farm system. A quiet workman, he will be one of the keys to whether the Hawks move out of their cellar position this year.

Doug came up to the Hawks the same time that Dennis Hull did from the St. Catharines farm team. The two are close buddies and keep the dressing room loose with their pranks.

Doug is married and he and his wife, Mary Lou, have two sons, Dougie Jr., and Mike.

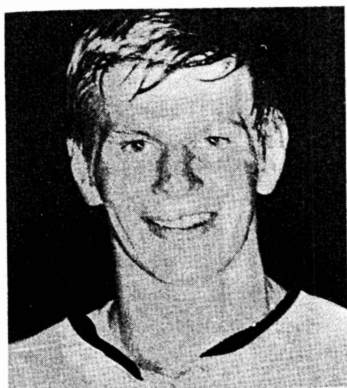

Shoots left      6'      185 lbs.

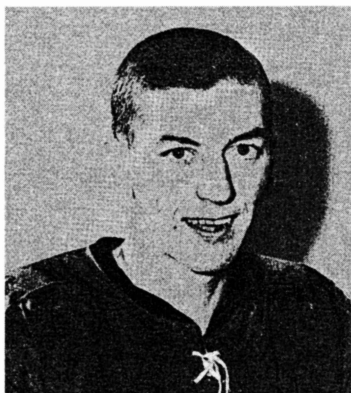
Born: Saskatoon, Sask.

Although his baby face would get him on a street car for half fare, Keith is no one to be pushed around. He has 185 lbs. on his six foot frame and knows how to use it to stop forwards trying to break in on his net.

A native of Saaskatoon, Magnuson plays hockey the rugged way that most of the Westerners in the NHL play. This probably comes from the fact that there aren't as many artificial rinks out west and the kids have to play outdoors in all kinds of weather. So they learn to be rugged and it shows in their play.

Magnuson roomed with Jim Wiste and Cliff Koroll at Denver U. then had another year to go while they were playing in Dallas last season.



## **RONALD (CHICO) MAKI**

FORWARD

Shoots right 5'10" 170 lbs.

Born: Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

Aug. 17, 1939

Chico has long been one of the unsung heroes of the Blackhawks. Never a high scorer, he has one of the most accurate shots on the team. But Chico has spent so much time setting up other players, that he has almost lost the knack of shooting himself.

Meanwhile, Chico does more than his share of back-checking and helping to keep the opposition out of position.

Chico made the history books last winter when he was awarded the first penalty shot ever given a Blackhawk in regular season play in a game with Oakland.

During Bobby Hull's goal scoring binges, it's usually Chico who is setting him up. When Hull got his 54 goals Chico had 16 assists. Last year when Hull made it 58, only one man, Pat Stapleton, had more assists than Chico. Maki had 13, and Stapleton assisted on 16 of Hull's goals.

Chico and his wife, Nancy, have two children, Michael 7, and Stephen 5.

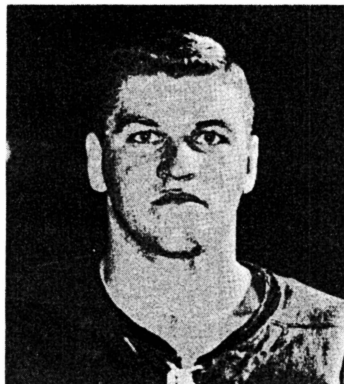

At the age of 24, Marotte possibly has as much potential ahead of him in hockey as any player. Touted as one of the great juniors to come out of the OHA, he made the Boston Bruins when he still had eligibility left as an amateur. Thus, at his age, he is already a veteran of four NHL seasons.

Gil plays it rough and tough at all times and for this reason has become a popular fixture with the fans.

While considered one of the better defensemen in the game, Gil started a new "career" toward the end of the season, playing left wing with the Scooters. His size and good skating ability gave Billy Reay some ideas of how to beef up the Hawks' potent line of Stan Mikita and Kenny Wharram, both little guys.

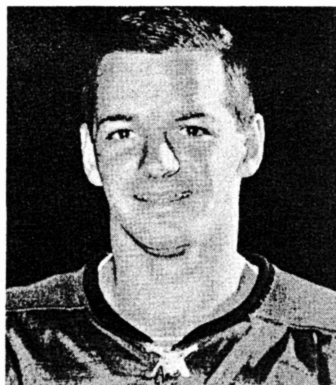
Whether Marotte plays at forward or defense this year, the fans know the other team will have to keep alert or they will find themselves back in the fourth or fifth row of the mezzanine.

## **HUBERT (PIT) MARTIN**

CENTER

Shoots right 5'9" 165 lbs.

Born: Noranda, Que.

Dec. 9, 1943

While Stan Mikita gets most of the headlines as the Hawks' top center, there are many times when Pit Martin is being overlooked for his great play at the pivot spot.

Last season Pit led the Hawks in scoring the first goal of the game, getting eight goals to start the scoring.

Few players ever get three goals in a game, but Pit has scored four in one game twice. The first one came against the Hawks several years ago and the other one came in the final game of the season last year when he hit his old teammates, the Detroit Red Wings with the cluster.

Martin does everything a center is supposed to do. He checks, he passes, and he gets himself into position for the big ones. Last year was by far his best, but at 26 he has plenty of good hockey left.

A graduate of Windsor College, Pit and his wife, Patricia, spend the off season in St. Claire Beach, Ont. He likes golf and boating in the summer.

A dapper dresser, he has a fiery competitive spirit once the whistle blows.

## **RAY McKAY**

DEFENSE

Shoots left      6'4"      180 lbs.

Born: Edmonton, Alta.

Aug. 22, 1946

Coming up to play in the last part of 1968-69 Ray seems to have earned himself a spot in the future of the Blackhawks.

His lanky size gives him a look of being awkward . . . but take it from his opponents, it's a deceptive illusion. Ray is anything but awkward when it comes to breaking up plays at his blue line. In fact, he impressed everyone in Chicago with some of the finest moves made all year by a Hawk defenseman.

His skating is also deceptive. When he gets those long legs churning, the ice virtually melts under him.

Ray could well be the best bet for rookie of the year if he plays anything like he did when he finished the year with the Hawks last season.



## STAN MIKITA

CENTER

Shoots right 5'9" 165 lbs.

Born: Sokolce, Czech.

May 20, 1940

Stan Mikita finished last year with 97 points. This had been the record for the NHL before the season started. But it was good for only fourth place in the scoring for Stan, who had held the old mark of 97 with his teammate, Bobby Hull.

Mikita has won every honor that there is in hockey and most of them a couple times. He has been the scoring champion four times, the Lady Byng winner twice, the Hart winner twice, and he holds the scoring records in Stanley Cup play for both points and assists.

In ten seasons Stan has made the first All Star team six times and the second team once. Outside of all that, Stan doesn't do much except play golf and enjoy life in a western suburb of Chicago.

He shoots in the low 70's in golf, and if you were to challenge him to a game of checkers, Stan would play toe to toe until he figured out a way to beat you.

He and his wife, Jill, own their own home in Elmhurst, and have three children, two girls and a boy.

Teamed with Kenny Wharram and Doug Mohns for the past five seasons, Stan's line is known as the Scooters and perennially is the highest scoring trio in hockey. Injuries and slumps dropped them a little off the pace last year, but Stan still finished with 97 points and Wharram with 69 including 30 goals.

The league passed its second rule change this past season affecting Stan's curved stick. The first change didn't hurt his production and Stan vows he'll overcome the change which was aimed mostly at him this season, too.



## **DOUG MOHNS**

DEFENSE - FORWARD

Shoots left      6'      190 lbs.

Born: Capreal, Ont.

Dec. 31, 1933

Doug is one of the most versatile players in the NHL. Starting his career with Boston as a defenseman, he scored 20 goals one year behind the blue line.

After coming to the Hawks in a trade the Bruins would like to forget, the Hawks moved him to left wing where he helped make the Scooter line one of the all time scoring combinations.

Always on of the fastest men in the league, he also has the brawn to keep the opposition "honest". Although he played more than 3/4 of his career as a defenseman, Doug is nearing the 250 goal mark.

Last year, after a series of injuries he was moved back to defense where he is still one of the better defensemen in the NHL.

Doug is an insurance executive in the off-season, living in Weymouth, Mass.

He has already passed the 1,000 game mark. Even with a year slowed with injuries he picked up 22 goals last season.

The biggest problem coach Billy Reay has with Doug is deciding whether to play him at left wing or defense. Doug excels at both positions.

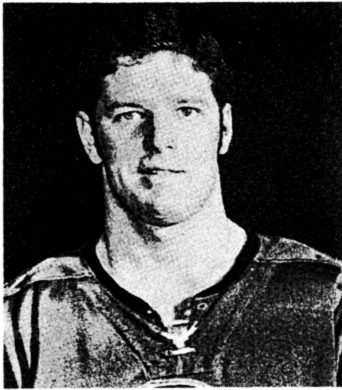
His size gives the Hawks plenty of beef on the right side and with Dennis Hull on the other side Lil' Pit Martin has plenty of protection for his play making.

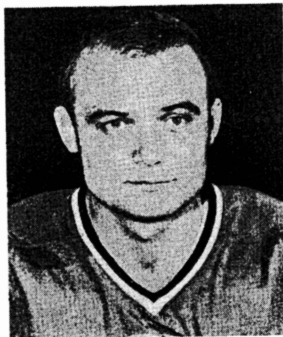

He came up to stay in 1958-59 after a few short trips to the majors before that. But what a career this man has had. With his 30 goals last year, he now has 252. Combining with Stan Mikita, Kenny has helped make the best scoring pair in hockey. They played together for eight seasons and form two thirds of the famous Scooter line.

Although small, Kenny Wharram is one of the most rugged men in hockey from the waist up and his legs make him probably the fastest man in the NHL from the blue line to the goal.

His best season was 1963-64 when he scored 39 goals and was voted the Lady Byng trophy along with first all star selection.

He and Mikita are almost inseparable on an off the ice.

Ken and his wife, Jean and son and daughter make their home in Elmhurst, not too far from the Mikitas. His off-season craft of cabinet making came in handy when Stan needed help in finishing off his recreation room.

Kenny is now recuperating from a mild heart attack. All Black Hawk fans are hoping he'll be back soon.

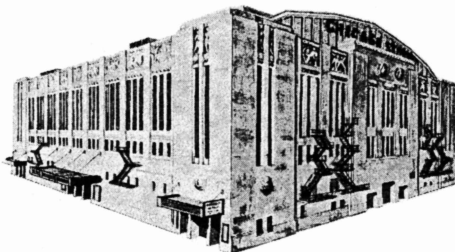

**Home of Bears—for a Day**

The Chicago Stadium has had every kind of event that could be imagined since it was opened in 1929. But possibly the most discussed was a football game for the National League title played on Dec. 18, 1932.

The Bears beat the Portsmouth, O., Spartans 9-0 on a field 60 yards between the goal lines.

Wilfrid Smith of the Tribune, later to become the sports editor, covered the game and here are some excerpts from his story:

*By Wilfrid Smith*

The professional football championship of the United States is the property of the Chicago Bears. They won that title last night at the Chicago Stadium by defeating the Spartans of Portsmouth, O., 9 to 0, before a near capacity crowd of 11,198.

For three periods the teams waged a scoreless duel, in which the Bears had the better of the gains. Then with 10 minutes to play, Bronko Nagurski tossed a short pass to Red Grange, who was standing in the Spartan end zone.

Tiny Engebretsen place kicked the ball between the wooden uprights and into the mezzanine for the full value of Red's score.

### **Safety Follows Touchdown**

Then, just before the end, Mule Wilson of the Spartans, ready to punt from behind his own goal line, fumbled Clare Randolph's pass from center and the ball rolling out of the end zone automatically gave the new champions two more points.

Grange and Nagurski received the roaring tribute of the crowd, but it was Dick Nesbitt who presented the scoring opportunity. Nesbitt raced back from his position at defensive right half back, leaped high into the air and intercepted a forward pass by Ace Gutowsky. He came down running and with the aid of excellent blocking, carried the ball to Portsmouth's 7.

### **Bronko Pounds Away**

The ball was within two yards of the north side lines. Under the ground rules adopted for the game because of the abbreviated grid-iron—60 yards between goal lines—the Bears were permitted to bring the ball out 15 yards, losing a down.

On the next play Nagurski smashed through Portsmouth's left guard for six yards. Again Bronko hit the line, but the Spartans hurled him back with a loss of a yard. It now was fourth and goal to gain. Nagurski again took the ball, but this time he stepped back and threw a short line-pass to Grange, who fell in scoring territory as he caught the ball.

### **Hard Accurate Tackling**

The playing conditions met with the approval of the fans. The game was completed in almost record time, and although the yard lines were not marked, the spectators had no difficulty following the progress.

Neither team attempted drop kicks nor place kicks although each was in scoring distance. This form of attack was banned by agreement.

The line play and the open field tackling were accurate and hard. Both teams took advantage of the firm dirt, which covered the ter-razza floor of the Stadium, to get the best results from their running plays. Grange was knocked out in the first quarter, but he recovered in time to return to assist the Bears to their first championship since 1924, which was one year before Grange completed his competition for Illinois and cast his lot with the professionals. Joe Kopcha regular guard was injured in the last period.
