**W**ILLIAM W. WIRTZ, President of the Chicago Blackhawks, was elected Chairman of the Board of Governors of the National Hockey League at its annual meeting. He is also Chairman of the Expansion Committee, Finance Committee, the T. V. Committee, the Playoff Committee and a member of the Owner-Player Council.

**B**ILL WORKS closely with General Manager Tommy Ivan and Coach Billy Reay in making fast, and practical decisions on the day to day operation of the team. Other owners and general managers have found him knowledgeable while his own general manager and coach have found him ready to back them on important decisions.

Bill has grown up in hockey with his family's interest and has always been an ardent fan. He lives in Winnetka with his wife, Joan, and five children, Rocky, Gail, Karen, Peter and Allison and you can often see the entire family rooting for the Blackhawks.

**H**E ATTENDED high school in Chicago and was graduated from Brown University in 1950. Bill's active business interests include President, Wirtz Corporation; President, American Furniture Mart Corporation; President, First Security Trust and Savings Bank and many other companies, but his hobby and first love is hockey and he has made a real business of it.

## THOMAS N. IVAN

GENERAL MANAGER

Born: Toronto: Ont.

Jan. 31, 1911

**A**LTHOUGH TOMMY IVAN never played professional hockey — an injury ended his career while he was an outstanding player in the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association Senior Series — his list of achievements as coach and general manager is long.

Ivan began his pro career as a scout in the Detroit Red Wings organization and in 1945-46 began coaching Omaha Knights of the old United States Hockey League.

**T**HE FOLLOWING season he coached Indianapolis in the American League and moved into the NHL as coach of the Red Wings in 1947-48. At Detroit Ivan's Teams won six straight NHL championships and three Stanley Cups in seven years.

In 1954-55 he left Detroit to join the Chicago Black Hawks as general manager, combining that position with coaching for one and a half seasons following the fatal illness of Dick Irvin.

**I**VAN IS CREDITED with much of the success in molding the Black Hawks into a strong club through a fine farm system which he helped rebuild. Under his tenure as general manager, the Hawks won their first Stanley Cup title in 23 years, in 1960-61, and their first NHL title, in 1966-67 with another league title last season.

Tommy and his wife, Dorothy live in Lake Forest.



## WILLIAM T. REAY

COACH

Born: Winnipeg, Man.

Aug. 21, 1918

**BILLY REAY'S** coaching career is unique in the fact that he coached before he played in the NHL. He has also been a Chicago coach longer than anyone else in the team's history. Reay, now in his eighth season behind the Chicago bench, was playing coach of Quebec Aces in 1943-44 when the Quebec Senior Hockey League champions won four games with Detroit Red Wings (two in each of the 1943-44 and 1944-45 seasons). Reay is remembered as a light-weight center (155 pounds) for eight seasons with Montreal Canadiens.

After retiring from the NHL at the end of the 1952-53 season, Reay became playing-coach for two seasons with Victoria Cougars in the Western League and then moved to Seattle in the WHL for the 1955-56 term.

**THE FOLLOWING** season he coached the new Rochester entry in the American League. In 1957-58 he was appointed coach of Toronto Maple Leafs and was succeeded early in the following season by Punch Imlach.

After his tenure in Toronto, Reay joined the Black Hawks organization, coaching Sault Ste. Marie in the Eastern Professional League for one season and then Buffalo Bisons in the AHL for two terms.

**BILLY COACHED** Buffalo to league and playoff titles in 1962-63. He is the Dean of coaches in the NHL. His team won the Prince of Wales title for the first time in Black Hawk history in 1967 and again last year.

Billy lives in Chicago with his wife, Clare and son Bill, Jr. who is a freshman at Wisconsin. He also has a married daughter and granddaughter in Toronto.

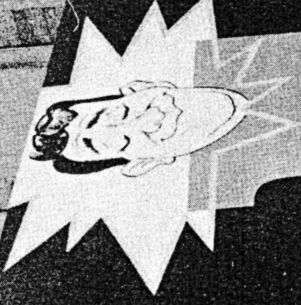

## **LOUIS FREDERICK ANGOTTI**

CENTER

Shoots right 5'9" 175 lbs.

Born: Toronto, Ont.

Jan. 16, 1938

Some people are born "winners" and Lou Angotti seems to be one of them. In the past four seasons, Lou has played on three division championships starting with 1967 when he helped the Black Hawks win their first Prince of Wales trophy in history.

The next year he was involved in the expansion draft and helped Philadelphia win the West Division title. Then, after spending a year in Pittsburgh, Louie was back in Chicago where he was one of the members of the Hawks' second title in four seasons.

Starting his hockey career late, playing his first organized games in high school, he went on to Michigan Tech where he was All American while obtaining his degree.

A perpetual motion type of player, Lou seems to be every place at once when he is on the ice and for that reason among others, he has always been a crowd pleaser.

Lou and his wife, Ann, have two sons and make their off season home in Toronto. He likes golf and tennis and helps out in a family business when he is not playing hockey.

## **GERARD F. (GERRY) DESJARDINS**

GOAL

Shoots left 5'11" 186 lbs.

Born: Sudbury, Ont.

July 22, 1944



They say pitching is 70 per cent of baseball. If this is true, goaltending is 80 per cent of hockey and with Gerry Desjardins and Tony Esposito the Black Hawks have the two best young goaltenders in the NHL. At least they proved to be last year when they combined to win the Vezina trophy, emblematic of top goal tending.

Desjardins, which means gardener in French, is joining a long Black Hawk tradition of great goal tending which started with a man named Charles Gardiner.

But the coincidence doesn't stop there. Gerry came to the Hawks last January in a deal involving Denis DeJordy and Gil Marotte and also brought Bill White and Bryan Campbell to the Hawks.

In his four games in the nets for the Hawks Gerry won all four and gave Tony Esposito just enough rest that he could go on to break the shutout record with 15 and keep the Hawks in first place.

But Gerry is by no means a "back up goalie" or a man you have around to give your big man a rest now and then. Desjardins proved while at Los Angeles that he can play with the best. When he came to the Hawks, Los Angeles had nine victories at that point in the season and were mired deep in last place. But of the nine victories three were shutouts. He won all four games as a Hawk.

Among his qualities Gerry is candid in his approach to hockey and his own contribution. "If the puck goes in the net, I have to blame myself most, because I have the last chance to stop it," Gerry says.

With that attitude and with help from Tony O, Gerry should be a valuable asset to the Hawks' future. With both goalies 26 and 27 respectively, the Hawks shouldn't have goal tending problems for at least 10 years.

## **ANTHONY JAMES ESPOSITO**

GOAL

Shoots left 5'11" 185 lbs.

Born: Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

April 23, 1943

Few Chicago athletes have had more exciting seasons in the Windy City and especially as a "rookie." Tony Esposito came to Chicago after playing a few games in Montreal the year before with the "hope" of winning a first string job.

Little did he or anyone else realize that his change to Chicago would result in a major league shutout record of 15, a Vezina trophy for the best goal keeper in the league, and the rookie of the year trophy as well as a league championship because of his great work. He also was voted 1st team All-Star.

Espo joins a long tradition of great goal keepers that have been with the Black Hawks starting with the immortal Charlie Gardiner and continued with Glenn Hall. In fact, Chicago fans have come to expect great goal tending and Espo already, even in his rookie year, has become a household word many times "taken for granted."

A tough competitor once the game starts, Tony is always thinking, always figuring the next move and is usually one step ahead of the opposing forward coming in on him.

Tony O, as he has become known, did his amateur goaling at Michigan Tech and joins the long list of Black Hawks who have college degrees. He flashes a soft, quiet smile off the ice and could be taken for a young business executive if you didn't know he had two of the fastest hands in hockey.

Tony and his wife Marilyn have one son, Mark.

## DENNIS HULL

LEFT WING

Shoots left 6'0" 195 lbs.

Born: Pt. Anne, Ont.

Nov. 19, 1944



One of the hardest working forwards in the NHL, Dennis doesn't have to bank on his famous name to make the Black Hawk team.

His slap shot is considered by many as harder than even his famous brother's. Although he had a somewhat disappointing season last year with 17 goals and 52 points, he scored five goals in the Playoffs, three of them coming in the big Boston series when few other Black Hawks could get moving.

Dennis had 30 goals the year before and has proven many times that you don't let him loose out there without regretting it.

Dennis is not only big but one of the strongest and toughest men in the league. And his speed is deceptive. As he proved in the final playoff game, when he gets loose few will really be able to catch him. And certainly no one wants to step in front of him.

Bobby and Dennis set a record two years ago that will probably stand for a long time when they scored 88 goals between them for a record for brothers in the NHL.

Dennis and his wife Mary Sue have two daughters. He works a farm with wheat and cattle in the off season.

## **ROBERT MARVIN HULL**

LEFT WING

Shoots left 5'10" 195 lbs.

Born: Pt. Anne, Ont.

Jan. 3, 1939

Few athletes have dominated their sport as Bobby Hull has dominated hockey over the past 10 years. Even in 1969-70 after missing the first 14 games, Bobby went on to accomplish more than most hockey players could do in two or three seasons, including scoring 38 goals and increasing his career total to 510.

Hull has been to hockey what Babe Ruth was to baseball and Johnny Unitas and Paul Hornung were to football.

Only two other players ever scored 50 goals in one season, Bernie Geoffrion and Rocket Richard. But Hull has done it four times, including the record 58 which he piled up in 1968-69. He is still the most feared player in the game when he gets the puck and starts down the ice.

After four sons, Bobby, Blake, Bret and Bart, the Hulls finally had a daughter last March, Michelle.

Hull makes many personal appearances because of his position in sports and has a gift of keeping things moving with "ad libs."

Bobby was named to the NHL All Stars for the ninth time last year. He also has been on the second team once in his 13 full seasons.

Only 2 other players have scored more goals than Bobby's 510. He needs only 34 to pass Rocket Richard for second place.

# 4

## **DOUGLAS JARRETT**

DEFENSE

Shoots right 6'3" 205 lbs.

Born: London, Ont.

April 22, 1944



As the Black Hawks won their second Prince of Wales trophy in four years, Doug Jarrett finally began to come into his own as the great defenseman every one believed he could be when he first joined the Hawks in 1964-65. For some reason or other, each season would go by and Jarrett would be just short of the potential everyone knew he had.

But last season the pieces seemed to go together and Doug had one of his greatest years.

Doug claims that by keeping his weight five or six pounds heavier than in previous years helped him. But whatever it was he proved finally that no defenseman can be more valuable to his team than Doug.

Always big enough to knock an opposing forward into the next county, Doug also began carrying the puck a little more and proved to be able to make the big play when it was most needed.

Starting his junior career with St. Catharines, Doug has been a Black Hawk all his life and now is what they call a veteran after six seasons wearing the big Indian Head on his jersey.

Married, Doug and his wife, Mary Lou have two sons, Doug, Jr., and Mike. Since he played his junior hockey with Dennis Hull and the two came up together, they are almost inseparable on and off the ice.

## **CLIFF KOROLL**

RIGHT WING

Shoots right 5'10" 185 lbs.

Born: Canora, Sask.

Oct. 1, 1946

Few youngsters have had bigger skates to fill than Cliff had last year when he moved in at right wing with Stan Mikita, taking over for the ailing Kenny Wharram, who was felled by a heart ailment.

But Cliff kept moving up and down his wing and scored 18 goals in his first major league season, many of them in the clutch.

In the Playoffs, when some of the Hawks started to falter, Cliff proved he had that ability to rise to the occasion and had one of the best playoff series of any Black Hawk. Usually rookies are given a "pass" in their first Stanley Cup if they don't live up to expectations, but Cliff proved he is better under pressure than any other time.

Along with Keith Magnuson, Cliff is a product of the University of Denver. After spending one year in the Hawks' farm city of Dallas, scoring 28 goals, Cliff filled right into one of the toughest assignments ever given a rookie, replacing one of the all time Hawk greats.

He and Keith room together, sharing a bachelor apartment in the western suburbs.

## **KEITH MAGNUSON**

DEFENSE

Shoots left 6'0" 185 lbs.

Born: Saskatoon, Sask.

April 27, 1947

Few youngsters make it from junior hockey right to the major leagues and even fewer turn the trick from the college ranks, but Keith Magnuson proved that hard work and ability make a great combination.

If it weren't for his own teammate, Tony Esposito, Keith would have walked off with the rookie of the year award last season, but he had to settle for being possibly the most popular hockey player to put on a Hawk uniform since Reggie Fleming.

Although he led the league in penalties, he really stayed out of trouble and he made his penalty minutes count. Usually he took a big name like Gordie Howe, or Carol Vadnais to the box with him when he went and on many occasions he incurred the rath of the officials because he was helping protect a Stan Mikita or Gerry Pinder or some other Hawk that was being manhandled unmercifully.

But this isn't what made him the rookie sensation. It was his poise and ability to do the job as a defenseman in the toughest league there is and the proof of his work was the fact that the Hawks allowed fewer goals than any team in the league.

Keith spent the past summer working as a promotional representative for Seven-Up Company here in Chicago and polished up on his speaking ability, at more than 100 different hockey and sports banquets.

His reddish hair and boyish grin make him the most eligible bachelor in sports.

# 16

## **RONALD (CHICO) MAKI**

**FORWARD**

Shoots right 5'9" 170 lbs.

Born: Sault Ste. Marie, Ont.

Aug. 17, 1939



With the Black Hawks for eight full seasons and parts of two others, Chico Maki is one of the handiest people to have around.

While he likes right wing the best, he can play center and even left wing when called upon. And one thing you can be certain about. His man won't stray far away.

Playing with Bobby Hull most of his Hawk career he has set up many Golden Jet goals in his time and no one appreciates it more than Bobby.

Chico actually has a good shot, but he has spent so much time making plays he seldom has time to take the big shot himself.

He has one distinction. He is the only Black Hawk player in history to be awarded a penalty shot. It happened two years ago against Oakland. No other Hawk ever had a penalty shot in regular season play in the NHL.

Married, he and his wife, Nancy have two boys, Michael 8, and Stephen 6.

Hailing from Sault Ste. Marie, Maki comes from an area that has produced several Black Hawks including Tony Esposito.



# 7

## HUBERT (PIT) MARTIN

CENTER

Shoots right 5'9" 165 lbs.

Born: Noranda, Que.

Dec. 9, 1943

Pit Martin could well have been the most valuable player in the league last season, although his records aren't as flamboyant as some of the bigger names.

Nevertheless, his 30 goals and his complete hustle at all times gave him a stature among all Black Hawks that would be hard to top.

He was awarded the Masterton trophy by the Hockey Writers Association, a trophy going to "unsung heroes".

A dapper dresser and a quiet, soft spoken gentleman with a slight French accent, Pit completely changes when he puts on the uniform because he comes to win. Anything less than winning is completely foreign to his makeup.

His degree from Windsor college puts him in league with several other Black Hawks with college educations.

Ironically his biggest night in hockey came against the Black Hawks when he scored four goals against them during his time in Boston. He turned this trick again against Detroit while playing for the Hawks.

Although Pit is not yet 27, he will be starting his eighth NHL season. He and his wife Pat now have a baby daughter born last season just before the playoffs.

# 21

## STAN MIKITA

CENTER

Shoots right 5'9" 165 lbs.

Born: Sokolce, Czechoslovakia

May 20, 1940



Ready to start his 12th season in the NHL, Stan Mikita has been a first team All Star six times and second team twice. He has won every honor there is in hockey and most of them two or three times.

Pound for pound, possibly the best athlete in sports, his 86 points was high on the Hawks last year. He has won the scoring championship four times and the Most Valuable Player award twice. The only player ever to win the Hart, Ross and Lady Byng trophies in the same year and he did it twice in a row.

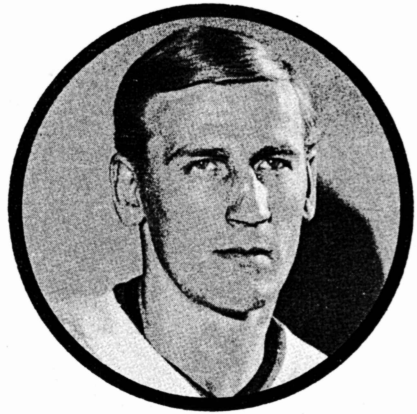
## PAUL SHMYR

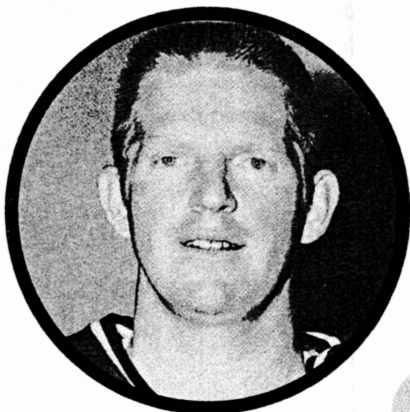

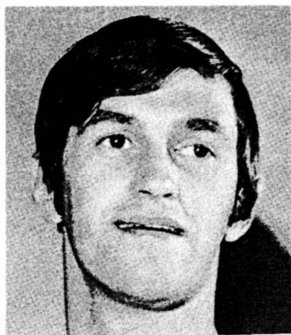
Bill came to the Hawks in February and had a bad knee when he first reported. But he played anyway and by Playoff time, he was playing better than any one on the ice.

A rarity in the NHL, a right hand shot, Bill should be a big help to the rest of the blue line corps for many years to come.

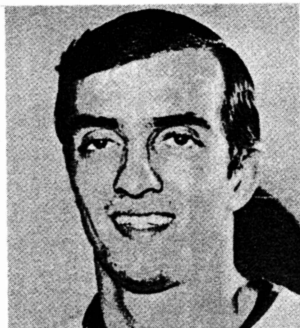

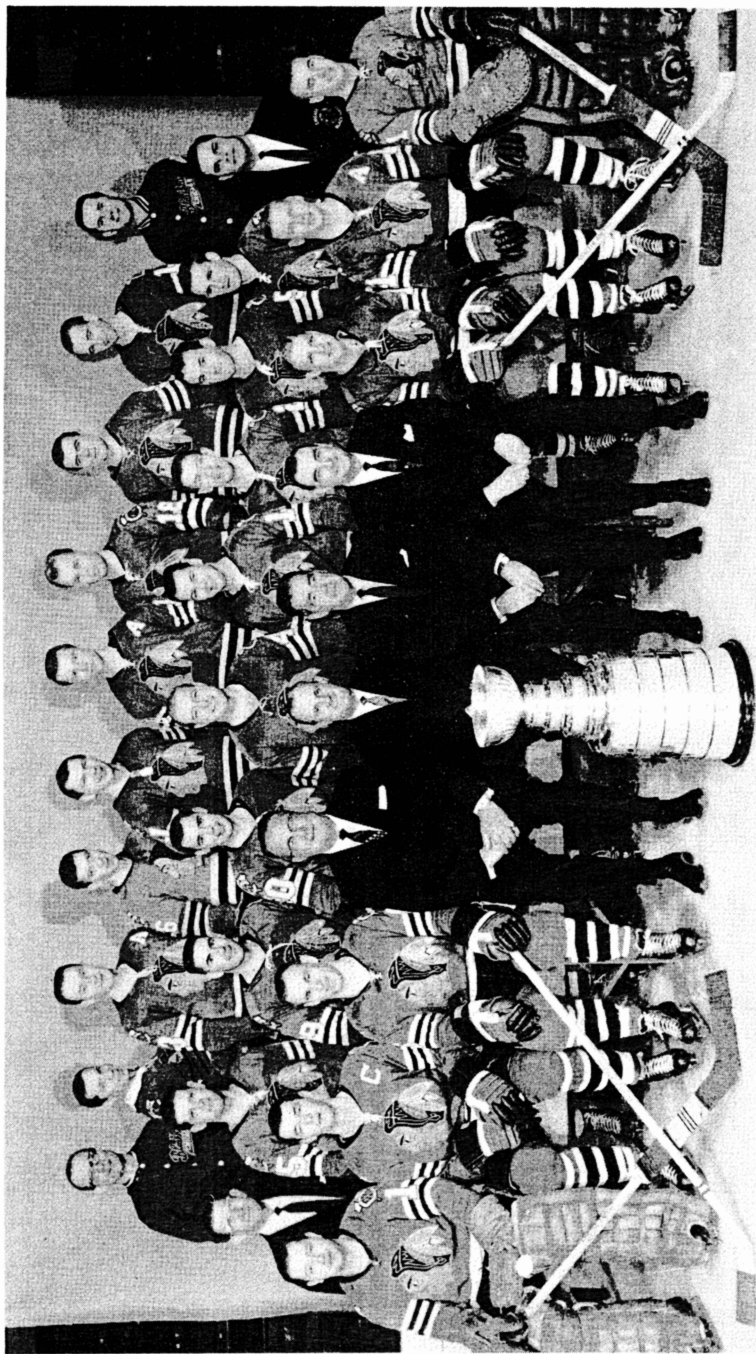
