# R. THOMAS GAGLARDI

OWNER AND GOVERNOR

R. Thomas (Tom) Gaglardi is the owner and governor of the Dallas Stars Hockey Club and the president of Northland Properties Corporation, the largest family-owned hospitality company in Canada with its head offices located in Vancouver, B.C. He was officially introduced as the sixth owner in franchise history on Nov. 21, 2011.

Since acquiring the club, Gaglardi has revitalized hockey in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex, overhauling the team's front office by hiring veteran administrator Jim Lites to serve as president and installing one of the most respected hockey minds in Jim Nill as general manager. He also spearheaded the overhaul of the team's logo and uniform, forging a new identity for the club to fit his vision. Under his watch, industry insiders have consistently identified the Stars as a team "on the rise" for both the business and hockey operations side of the organization. During the 2014-15 season, Gaglardi purchased the Texas Stars of the American Hockey League (AHL) and acquired the operating rights to H-E-B Center at Cedar Park in Cedar Park, Texas. The move reinforced his commitment to sustaining and growing the sport of hockey in the state of Texas and creating a seamless organizational process to develop and train NHL-caliber players, coaches and front office staff.

A passionate and knowledgeable leader who is deeply involved in all aspects of the family's business, Gaglardi began his career in the hospitality industry at age 13 as a busboy and has worked in virtually every area of his business since that time. He spent considerable time in construction, hotel and restaurant operations, real estate development and finance. At age 23, he was promoted to president of the Sandman Hotel Group, and at 26 he became president of Northland Properties Corporation, the Gaglardi family's umbrella company.

Under his direction, Northland has grown to be the largest family-owned hospitality company in Canada including a large portfolio of hotels with the Sandman Hotel Group and the Sutton Place Hotels & Resorts, several restaurant chains including Denny's Restaurants of Canada, Moxie's Grill & Bar, Chop Steakhouse & Bar and Shark Club Bar & Grill. In 2009, Gaglardi began expanding his brand of hospitality to the United Kingdom and more recently began operating in the United States, with the first Moxie's Grill & Bar opening in Dallas in November 2016, and the first Sandman Hotel opening in Plano in February 2019. The family also owns and operates a large real estate portfolio and the world-renowned Revelstoke Mountain Resort. In addition to his role with the Stars, Gaglardi is a co-owner of the Kamloops Blazers Hockey Club of the Western Hockey League and serves as its governor.

An active member of the community, Gaglardi founded the Sandman Harvest Foundation, which has raised over \$1 million for disadvantaged and medically challenged children living in the Okanagan Valley of British Columbia. He also serves as trustee for the PA and JM Gaglardi Senior Citizens Society, a non-profit society providing housing for seniors in Kamloops, B.C. and serves on the board of St. George's School in Vancouver. He founded the Josh Dyck Foundation to assist Josh with his recovery from an auto accident in October 2006, which left him paralyzed and confined to a wheelchair.

Gaglardi and his wife Brittney have three sons, Charlie, Bennett and Wilson, all of whom play competitive hockey. In addition to his own participation on his hockey team, Gaglardi enjoys playing golf and spending time with his family at their cottage on the shores of Kamloops Lake near Savona, B.C.

# BRAD ALBERTS

PRESIDENT/CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Brad Alberts is in his second tenure with the Dallas Stars and currently serves as President and Chief Executive Officer after rejoining the team in February 2011.

Additionally, he acts as President and Alternate Governor of the Texas Stars, Dallas' development affiliate in the American Hockey League, roles in which he has served in since July 1, 2017.

Alberts serves alongside Stars Chairman Jim Lites on the American Airlines Center Board of Directors, assisting in the management of one of the busiest arenas in the United States.

Alberts, who was named team President on March 2, 2018 and took on the role of Chief Executive Officer on July 10, 2020, oversees all aspects of the Stars business operations. Previously leading all sales and marketing, he's also in charge of all aspects of the organization's finance and administration, box office, human resources and information technology, as well as the communications department, which has won two Dick Dillman Awards as the NHL's Western Conference top public relations staff under his leadership.

Alberts' career includes nearly two decades of professional sports experience selling tickets, suites, premium seating and sponsorships. From 1996-2009, Alberts worked for the Dallas Stars and Texas Rangers in various sales management roles in tickets, suites and corporate sponsorships. From 2006-09, Alberts served as the Executive Vice President of the Hicks Sports Marketing Group, the in-house sponsorship sales group for the Stars, Texas Rangers and Liverpool Football Club. In 2009, Alberts took over as the Vice President of Sponsorship and Sales at Legends/CSL, overseeing events at numerous venues around the country, most notably the Circuit of The Americas, a Formula One racing track in Austin, Texas.

Since rejoining the team in 2011, Alberts has played an integral role in the resurgence of the Stars in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex, helping lead the organization to tremendous growth in brand visibility, attendance and sponsorship sales. Alberts and his leadership team were instrumental in the sweeping rebrand of the team, retiring the numbers of Mike Modano, Jere Lehtinen and Sergei Zubov and creating tremendous sponsorship value for the team and its partners. Under his leadership and direction, the organization hosted the 2020 Winter Classic at Cotton Bowl Stadium against the Nashville Predators. The event sold out within hours of tickets going on sale and was hailed as one of the most successful NHL events of all time, becoming the second-highest attended game in league history with a capacity crowd of 85,630.

Alberts received his bachelor's degree from Ripon College in 1992 where he was a four-year letterman and co-captain of the basketball team, earning an induction into the Ripon College Athletic Hall of Fame in 2002. He received a master's degree in sports administration from University of Northern Colorado in 1995. Alberts is an avid golfer and fitness enthusiast. Alberts serves as a member of the American Cancer Society CEO Board, the Dallas Sports Commission Board and is actively involved in other non-profit causes in the Metroplex.

He resides in Dallas with his wife Kate and their daughter Grace.



# JAMES R. LITES

CHAIRMAN, DALLAS STARS

Dallas Stars owner Tom Gaglardi appointed Jim Lites President and CEO of the Stars on Nov. 18, 2011. Lites is very familiar with the position having held it twice previously under prior owners Norm Green and Tom Hicks.

Shifting his role to serve as the team's Chairman and Managing Director of Northland Properties Corporation, U.S. Division in

July 2020, Lites boasts a reputation as one the finest administrators in professional sports. He continues to work with Mr. Gaglardi on the day-to-day business activities of the Stars, while overseeing the hockey operations department and continuing to chair the Dallas Stars Ownership Advisory Group. Lites also maintains his role as the organization's alternate governor, a role he held from 1982-2007. Over the years, Lites has served on the Board's marketing, broadcasting, expansion and game committees.

Over the course of Lites' two prior stints with the Stars (1993-02; 2003-07), the team won seven division championships, two Western Conference championships, two Presidents' Trophies and the 1999 Stanley Cup. He played an active role in the conception, design, construction and on-going business operations of American Airlines Center and Children's Health StarCenter ice facilities. Most recently, Lites played a significant role in hiring General Manager Jim Nill, purchasing the Texas Stars of the American Hockey League (AHL) and the operating lease of H-E-B Center at Cedar Park in Cedar Park, Texas.

From 1999-02, Lites also served as president of the MLB's Texas Rangers, becoming one of only four executives at the time to simultaneously manage the affairs of two major league franchises. He served three years on the MLB's Executive Council and was president when the Rangers captured the 1999 American League West championship.

Prior to joining the Stars in 1993, Lites served 11 years as chief operating officer of the Detroit Red Wings, who, during his stint, won three Norris Division championships and two Norris Division Playoff championships after having missed the playoffs in 10 of the 11 seasons before his hiring. During his tenure, the Red Wings were named by Financial World magazine as the most valuable franchise in the NHL in 1990, 1991, 1992 and 1993. Lites was also instrumental in the defection of former Soviet stars Sergei Fedorov, Vyacheslav Kozlov and Vladimir Konstantinov, each of whom played important parts of the Red Wings' record-setting and Stanley Cup champion hockey clubs.

While with Detroit, Lites also served as chief operating officer of Olympia Arenas, Inc., one of the Midwest's largest facility management companies. He was also responsible for the redevelopment of Detroit's historic Fox Theatre, now the most successful entertainment venue of its type in the United States and the cornerstone of Detroit's growing northside sports, entertainment and gaming complexes.

From 2007 until being rehired by the Stars in 2011, Lites managed the New York Giants' Personal Seat License program at MetLife Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey - a program that was one of the most successful of its type in history.

Born and raised in Pentwater, Michigan, Lites received a Bachelor of Arts degree with highest honors from the University of Michigan in 1975 and graduated cum laude from Wayne State (Mich.) University Law School in 1978. He specialized in litigation and labor contract negotiations when he practiced law. Lites and his wife Kim reside in Frisco, Texas. They have four children: sons Chase, Sam and Chandler, and daughter, Brooke.

## JIM NILL

GENERAL MANAGER/ALTERNATE GOVERNOR

Nill, 65, is in his 11th season with the Stars, having served as the team's 11th general manager and sixth GM since moving to Dallas. During Nill's tenure, the Stars have amassed a record of 403-280-98 and have made the Stanley Cup Playoffs in six seasons (2013-14, 2015-16, 2018-19, 2019-20, 2021-22 and 2022-23), including two trips to the Western Conference Final (2020, 2023) and an appearance in the Stanley Cup Final (2020). The longest serving general manager in franchise history, Nill became the first GM in team history to win the Jim Gregory General Manager of the Year Award following the conclusion of the 2022-23 campaign, which recognizes the work of the top general manager in the NHL.

Last season, the Stars posted 108 points in the regular season with a record of 47-21-14, their highest point total since 2015-16. In the Stanley Cup Playoffs, the team advanced to the Western Conference Final for the second time in the past four seasons (2020). Nill began the 2022-23 campaign by bringing in new Head Coach Pete DeBoer, who became the second coach in NHL history to reach the Conference Finals with four different franchises during the Stars' 2023 postseason run. Prior to the start of the season, Nill extended the contracts of forward Jason Robertson and goaltender Jake Oettinger -- both of whom went on to post career-best seasons -- and acquired defenseman Nils Lundkvist via trade. Nill also signed forward Roope Hintz, the Stars' leading scorer in the 2023 postseason, to an eight-year contract extension in November before acquiring forwards Evgenii Dadonov and Max Domi ahead of the trade deadline, bolstering the team as it headed into the Stanley Cup Playoffs.

Since joining the Stars, Nill has dramatically re-shaped the team's culture and roster with a series of trades and acquisitions. He began to make his mark on the club with key acquisitions of centers Tyler Seguin and Jason Spezza and three-time Stanley Cup champion Patrick Sharp. After leading the team to regular-season Central Division and Western Conference championships in 2015-16, Nill was named a finalist for GM of the Year, marking his first career nomination. He'd continue to add more pieces over the next few seasons, including trading for goaltender Ben Bishop and signing right wing Alexander Radulov, goaltender Anton Khudobin and center Joe Pavelski, leading to a highlight season for the Stars in 2019-20. Following the NHL's pause due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the team traveled to the Edmonton bubble and advanced to the Stanley Cup Final for the first time since the 2000-01 season and the fifth time in franchise history, ultimately losing in six games to the Tampa Bay Lightning. Nill's accomplishments and roster building during the 2019-20 campaign was recognized, as he was named a finalist for GM of the Year for the second time in his career. He has also used the NHL Draft to build the core for both the team's present and future, selecting standout players such as Hintz (2015), Miro Heiskanen (2017), Oettinger (2017), Robertson (2017), Ty Dellandrea (2018), Thomas Harley (2019) and Wyatt Johnston (2021).

A native of Hanna, Alberta, Nill joined the Red Wings' front office in the summer of 1994 following three seasons with the Ottawa Senators. Previously, Nill enjoyed a nine-season NHL career as a right wing with the Boston Bruins, Vancouver Canucks, St. Louis Blues, Winnipeg Jets and Red Wings. He collected 58 goals, 87 assists and 854 penalty minutes in 524 regular-season games. Nill later went to Adirondack as a player/coach, retiring as a player after the 1990-91 season. A member of the 1979-80 Canadian National and Olympic teams, he was originally selected by St. Louis in the fifth round (89th overall) of the 1978 NHL Draft.

Jim and his wife, Rebecca, reside in Frisco, Texas, and have three children: Jenna, Trevor and Kristin, and three grandchildren: Cael, Hazel and Lincoln.



## SCOTT WHITE

### ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER/TEXAS STARS GM

Scott White is in his ninth season as assistant general manager, while he also serves as the GM for the Texas Stars, Dallas' development affiliate in the American Hockey League. The only GM in Texas Stars history, White was the architect behind the 2015 Calder Cup-winning club that set a franchise record with 48 wins, claiming the Macgregor Kilpatrick Trophy as the AHL's regular-season points champion. He also manufactured the team's second John D. Chick Trophy win (West Division champions) in 2018 as Texas again reached the Calder Cup Final. White was selected by Hockey Canada to serve as a member of the management group for Canada's National Men's Team at the 2014 Deutschland Cup and 2014 Spengler Cup. A member of the Stars organization since 2005, White, 55, previously served as a pro scout and director of minor league operations. He headed up the hockey department for the Iowa Stars, Dallas' then-

primary affiliate, for three seasons. Prior to joining the Stars, he served as head coach of the Columbia Inferno of the ECHL for four seasons, qualifying for a playoff berth each year. He also guided Columbia to a Kelly Cup Final appearance in 2003 and finished with a 165-87-36 record with the Inferno. White also worked as an assistant coach with the ECHL's Greensboro Monarchs for a season and a half. In college, White played for Michigan Tech University from 1985-89 and was an assistant coach from 1995-99. He was inducted into the Michigan Tech Sports Hall of Fame in 2016.

White played five years of pro hockey from 1989-94, including three seasons with Greensboro, where he won the 1990 ECHL Championship and earned ECHL Defenseman of the Year and First-Team All-ECHL honors for the 1991-92 season. He signed with the Ottawa Senators in 1992 and played the entire season with the club's AHL affiliate in New Haven, capturing team MVP honors with 54 points (10-44-54) in 80 games.

White and his wife, Kathy, have four children: Emily, Katie, William, Madelyn and three grandkids: Remi, Corbin and Cooper.



## MARK JANKO

### ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Mark Janko is in his 24th season with the Dallas Stars and his eighth as assistant general manager. Janko has spent the past 15 seasons in hockey operations after previously working in the Stars' public relations department for eight years.

In his current role, Janko is primarily responsible for player and staff contract negotiations and has played an integral role in the construction and framing of the contracts for several of the team's core players including Jamie Benn, Miro Heiskanen, Roope Hintz, Esa Lindell, Jake Oettinger, Jason Robertson and Tyler Seguin. Additionally, Janko oversees all preseason and regular-season scheduling, Collective Bargaining Agreement compliance, cap and budget management, salary arbitration, strategic planning and works closely with Dallas' scouting staff, with an emphasis on the professional level. Along with Jim Nill, he created and now oversees both an analytics department and mental health division and serves as the team's liaison for all player transactions with NHL's Central Registry.

Janko, 47, joined the Stars in 1999 after serving in the media relations department for the Mighty Ducks of Anaheim during the 1998-99 season. A native of Mission Viejo, California, Janko graduated from the University of California at Santa Barbara with a degree in communications in 1998. He and his wife, Jessica, their daughters, Reese and Hayden, and son, Carson, reside in Highland Village, Texas.



## RICH PEVERLEY

### DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Rich Peverley is in his ninth season with the Stars and his third as director of player personnel. In his current role, Peverley works alongside the club's hockey operations management team of general manager Jim Nill, assistant general manager and Texas Stars GM Scott White and assistant general manager Mark Janko, assisting in the decision-making process with regards to player personnel and the team's makeup. Peverley is also heavily involved in professional and amateur scouting, as well as player development.

Peverley, 41, played nine seasons in the National Hockey League, spending time with Nashville, Atlanta, Boston and Dallas. He finished his career having tallied 241 points (84-157-241), including 20 game-winning goals, in 442 regular-season contests. A member of the 2011 Stanley Cup champion Boston Bruins, Peverley accumulated 21 points (9-12-21) in 59 postseason contests with two trips to the Stanley Cup Final, both with Boston. Prior to breaking into the NHL, Peverley went undrafted after playing four seasons of college hockey with St. Lawrence (ECAC). Peverley skated in 138 games for the Saints, registering 117 points (44-73-117).

A native of Guelph, Ontario, Peverley currently resides in his native Ontario with his wife Nathalie and their three children Isabelle, Frederik and Elena. In addition to his work in hockey, Peverley is also extremely active with the American Heart Association, and created PEVS Protects, aimed at raising funds for AED purchases and training in the community, as well as CPR training.



**JOE MCDONNELL**  
**DIRECTOR, AMATEUR SCOUTING**

Joe McDonnell is in his 11th season as director of amateur scouting for the Stars. In his role, McDonnell oversees all facets of the team's amateur scouting operations, including running the Stars' efforts at the NHL Draft, while working closely with GM Jim Nill and his staff. Among players McDonnell has drafted in the first round include Miro Heiskanen, Jake Oettinger, Ty Dellandrea, Thomas Harley, Mavrik Bourque, Wyatt Johnston and Lian Bichsel.

McDonnell was a member of the Detroit Red Wings organization for 18 years, winning four Stanley Cups (1997, 1998, 2002, 2008). He was appointed the club's director of amateur scouting in 2003 and served in that role until he joined the Stars. He was hired as an

amateur scout by Detroit in 1995 and was an integral part in drafting Pavel Datsyuk, Henrik Zetterberg, Niklas Kronwall, Valtteri Filppula, Jimmy Howard and Johan Franzen, amongst others.

The Kitchener, Ontario, native played professional hockey for seven seasons, including three in the NHL with the Vancouver Canucks and Pittsburgh Penguins. In 50 career NHL contests, he recorded 12 points (2-10-12) and 34 penalty minutes. Additionally, McDonnell served as head coach of the Kitchener Rangers (OHL) from 1986-95, qualifying for the postseason in each of his nine seasons.



**KARI TAKKO**  
**DIRECTOR, EUROPEAN SCOUTING**

Kari Takko is in his 24th season with the Dallas Stars as the director of European scouting. In his role with the club, Takko is responsible for both professional and amateur scouting in Europe, working closely with director of amateur scouting Joe McDonnell and European scouts Rickard Oquist, Jiri Hrdina and Evgueni Tsybouk.

The native of Uusikaupunki, Finland has been responsible for helping draft NHL players such as John Klingberg, Esa Lindell, Miro Heiskanen, Roope Hintz, Jacob Peterson, Jussi Jokinen, Patrik Nemeth, Loui Eriksson and Nicklas Grossmann.

Originally selected with the 97th overall pick in the 1984 NHL Draft by the Minnesota North Stars, Takko appeared in 131 games over six seasons with the Stars organization. Takko represented Finland numerous times on the international stage, including the 1984 Winter Olympic Games in Sarajevo. He helped lead Finland to a silver medal at the 1981 IIHF World Junior Championship in West Germany and a bronze medal at the 1982 IIHF World Junior Championship in North America.



**CRAIG BONNER**  
**HEAD PROFESSIONAL SCOUT**

Craig Bonner is in his eighth season with the Stars having served as a professional scout since joining the team's front office in 2015-16. In his expanded role as head professional scout, Bonner coordinates the club's professional scouting initiatives, including covering the NHL, American Hockey League (AHL) and European pro tournaments. Prior to joining Dallas, Bonner spent seven years as vice president of hockey operations/general manager of the Western Hockey League's Kamloops Blazers beginning in the 2008-09 season.

A native of Edmonton, Alberta, Bonner, 51, played three seasons of professional hockey from 1993-96. The former defenseman appeared in 12 career AHL games with Syracuse, recording one assist, while also skating in 62 career International Hockey League games with the Kalamazoo Wings/Michigan K-Wings, registering 10 points (2-8-10) and 114 penalty minutes for the then-primary development affiliate of Dallas. He also spent five seasons with Kamloops, recording 130 points (29-101-130) in 250 career games. After his retirement from hockey following the 1995-96 season, Bonner returned to Kamloops, serving as an assistant coach for five seasons before joining the Vancouver Giants (WHL) as assistant general manager and assistant coach in 2002-03. Bonner won a Memorial Cup with Kamloops as a player in 1992 and as an assistant coach/assistant GM in 2007.



## RICKARD OQUIST

**EUROPEAN DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL**

Rickard Oquist is in his 16th season with the Stars organization and his third as European director of player personnel. Previously serving as a European amateur scout since joining the club in 2008-09, Oquist oversees all European professional scouting, while working alongside Stars Director of European Scouting Kari Takko to coordinate the team's scouting efforts in Europe at both the professional and amateur levels.

Prior to joining the Stars, Oquist, 40, played at several levels within the Swedish Ice Hockey Association. Beginning in 1999-2000, Oquist appeared in 11 games with Djurgardens of J18 Allsvenskan, where he recorded seven points (3-4-7) and 59 penalty minutes. The former defenseman went on to play three seasons at the J20 SuperElit level with Sodertalje, registering 24 points (11-13-24) and 143 penalty minutes in 62 games from 2000-03 before moving up to Division 1 in 2003-04, where he posted two points (1-1-2) in 11 games with Botkyrka. Oquist then played one season with Torino of the Italian Hockey League, skating in 12 games before returning to Sweden where he played in one game and recorded two points (1-1-2) with Telge of Division 3 in 2008-09.

Oquist resides in Nykvarn, Sweden with his wife, Elena, and their daughters, Alba and Gaia.



## STEVE GREELEY

**DIRECTOR OF HOCKEY STRATEGY/SCOUTING AND DEVELOPMENT**

Steve Greeley is in his second full season with the Stars after being named Director of Hockey Strategy/Scouting and Development on Jan. 3, 2022.

In his role, the 42-year-old oversees the club's scouting and analytics initiatives, and its application to evaluating player personnel decisions at both the amateur and professional levels. He previously served as assistant general manager for the Buffalo Sabres from 2017-20, where he oversaw the team's pro scouting and player development department.

Greeley joined the Sabres after spending two seasons as the assistant director of player personnel for the New York Rangers. Before his tenure with New York, he spent two seasons as an associate coach at his alma mater, Boston University, where he played a vital role in the school's recruiting process. The native of Scituate, Massachusetts also spent seven seasons (2006-13) in the scouting department for the Los Angeles Kings and served as a regional scout for the U.S. National Team Development Program from 2009-12 and again from 2015-17.

Greeley and his wife, Lauren, have three daughters: Reilly, Sloane and Nina.



## SAM LITES

**DIRECTOR OF ORGANIZATIONAL ANALYSIS**

Sam Lites is in his second season as director of organizational analysis, a role that includes scouting all NHL teams' reserve lists.

Lites, 34, has held various scouting roles with the Stars, including hockey analytics coordinator/professional scout (2020-22) and hockey analytics coordinator/amateur scout (2018-2020).

Prior to joining the Stars, Sam spent seven years with the Detroit Red Wings as an amateur scout.

Lites earned his Masters of Business Administration from the Mike Ilitch School of Business at Wayne State University in 2018 and his Bachelor of Arts at Southern Methodist University in 2011.

Ben Bishop is in his first season as player development coordinator with the Dallas Stars, transitioning into a front office role following and 11-season NHL career as a goaltender. During his time in a Stars sweater, he earned a 74-48-11 record with a 2.33 goals-against average, .923 save percentage and 14 shutouts in 143 career regular-season appearances. He also earned a 29-21 record with a 2.27 GAA and .924 SV% in 52 postseason appearances. A three-time Vezina Trophy Finalist (2013-14, 2014-15, 2018-19), Bishop was twice named to the NHL's Second All-Star Team in 2015-16 and 2018-19 and made one appearance in the Stanley Cup Final in 2014-15 with Tampa Bay.



## PAR JOHANSSON

### PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COORDINATOR/ EUROPEAN PROFESSIONAL SCOUT

Par Johansson is in his fifth season with the Dallas Stars and is responsible for monitoring the development of all drafted prospects in the organization.

Johansson joined the club after serving as director of player development for HV71 of the Swedish Hockey League (SHL). Prior to his time with HV71, he spent three seasons as an assistant coach for Frolunda (SHL) from 2015-18. Clark has had a multi-faceted career in the airline industry, completed training and certification in the health and nutrition field, including product formulation, held positions in Research & Development, attended the Masters program in Counseling in Otterburne, Manitoba, and served as a director of marketing and communications in the private sector.



# PETE DEBOER

## HEAD COACH

Pete DeBoer is in his second season behind the bench for the Stars after being named the 25th head coach in franchise history and 10th in team history on June 21, 2022.

In his first season as head coach of the Stars in 2022-23, DeBoer, 55, guided the club to a Western Conference Final appearance in the 2023 Stanley Cup Playoffs after finishing the regular season with a 47-21-14 record (108 points).

The Dunnville, Ontario native owns a record of 560-400-137 in 1,097 games coached over 15 NHL seasons with Dallas, Vegas, San Jose, New Jersey and Florida. Since entering the league in 2008-09, DeBoer ranks fourth in regular season wins and first in games coached. In the 2023 postseason, the Stars became the fourth franchise Peter DeBoer has led to a Conference Finals/Semifinals appearance (also Vegas, San Jose & New Jersey), a feat accomplished by only one other head coach in NHL history – Scotty Bowman (5; St. Louis, Montreal, Buffalo, Pittsburgh & Detroit). Additionally, DeBoer is the only head coach in NHL history to lead a franchise to a Conference Finals/Semifinals appearance in his first season as head coach on four separate occasions. DeBoer has also reached the Stanley Cup Final on two occasions, first with New Jersey (2012) and then with San Jose (2016). Boasting a record of 78-64 in 142 postseason contests, DeBoer ranks second in playoff games coached behind Jon Cooper (145) and third in wins behind Cooper (86) and Joel Quenneville (79) since 2008-09. During the 2021 Stanley Cup Playoffs, DeBoer became the first coach in NHL history to win his first five Game 7 appearances and has a record of 7-0 in Game 7s, including a 2-1 victory over Seattle in the Western Conference Second Round on May 15, 2023. With the win, DeBoer became the third coach to win a Game 7 with four different teams, joining Darryl Sutter (8-3 with Calgary, Chicago, Los Angeles and San Jose) and Scotty Bowman (6-3 with Buffalo, Detroit, Montreal, Pittsburgh and St. Louis).

DeBoer joined the Stars after spending parts of three seasons as the head coach of the Vegas Golden Knights. Hired midway through the 2019-20 season, he guided the Golden Knights to the 2020 Western Conference Final against the Stars. In his time with Vegas, DeBoer earned a 98-50-12 record in 160 regular-season contests with a .650 points percentage. He led Vegas to the postseason in two of his three campaigns with the club, registering a 22-17 record in 39 postseason games and reaching the semifinal round in both the 2020 and 2021 Stanley Cup Playoffs.

Prior to his time in Vegas, DeBoer served as the head coach for San Jose over five seasons (2015-19) and amassed a 198-129-34 record in 361 regular-season games. He qualified for the Stanley Cup Playoffs in four of his five campaigns with the Sharks and helped lead the team to its first Stanley Cup Final appearance in franchise history during the 2015-16 season. DeBoer spent four seasons (2011-14) as the bench boss for New Jersey, posting a 114-93-41 record in 248 regular-season contests and reached the Stanley Cup Final in his first campaign with the club in 2011-12. Additionally, he served as the head coach for three seasons (2008-11) in Florida and recorded a 103-107-36 mark in 246 regular-season games.

His extensive head coaching resume includes 13 seasons behind the bench in the Ontario Hockey League (OHL), capturing the 2003 Memorial Cup Championship and two OHL championships (2003, 2008) with Kitchener. DeBoer won the OHL Coach of the Year award in 1999 and 2000 with Plymouth and captured the Canadian Hockey League (CHL) Coach of Year Award in 2000. He is one of eight coaches in OHL history to reach the 500-win plateau (539) and ranks eighth all-time in OHL wins.

DeBoer has represented Team Canada on several occasions on the international stage, capturing gold medals for his country at the 2015 IIHF World Championship and the 2005 World Junior Championship. He served on the coaching staff at four IIHF World Championships (2010, 2011, 2014, 2015), two World Junior Championships (1998, 2005) and at the 2007 Canada-Russia Super Series.

Prior to his coaching career, he was originally selected by the Toronto Maple Leafs in the 12th round (237th overall) of the 1988 NHL Draft and played two seasons of professional hockey with the Milwaukee Admirals of the International Hockey League (IHL).

DeBoer and his wife Susan, have one daughter, Abigail, and two sons, Jack and Matthew.

**STEVE SPOTT**  
**ASSISTANT COACH**

Steve Spott is in his second season as assistant coach for the Stars in 2023-24.

Spott, 55, helped guide the Stars to a Western Conference Final appearance in the 2023 Stanley Cup Playoffs after finishing the regular season with a 47-21-14 record (108 points).

Prior to joining Dallas, Spott spent parts of the three seasons as an assistant coach with the Vegas Golden Knights. Before joining Vegas' coaching staff, he also served alongside Pete DeBoer from 2015-19 with the San Jose Sharks.

Spott also spent two seasons with the Toronto Maple Leafs organization from 2013-15. He was an assistant coach with the Maple Leafs during the 2014-15 campaign and was the head coach of the Toronto Marlies (AHL) for the 2013-14 season. He posted a 45-25-6 record as the bench boss for the Marlies, leading the club to the Northern Division crown and an appearance in the Western Conference Finals against the Texas Stars.

The Toronto, Ontario native also coached for the Kitchener Rangers and Plymouth Whalers of the Ontario Hockey League (OHL). Spott spent four seasons as an assistant coach on DeBoer's staff in Plymouth before joining him in Kitchener for the 2001-02 season, where he served for seven seasons as an assistant coach. Spott was appointed as head coach of Kitchener in 2008 following DeBoer's departure for the Florida Panthers and earned a 187-121-32 record. He qualified for the postseason in four of his five seasons, including two appearances in the Western Conference Final. Internationally, Spott has earned two gold medals with Team Canada at the Under-18 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament in 2008 as an assistant coach and 2011 as a head coach, and a silver medal at the 2010 World Junior Championship as an assistant.

Spott played collegiate hockey at Colgate University from 1986-90, totaling 148 points (75-73-148) in 131 career games, and two seasons of professional hockey with 35 points (17-18-35).

He and his wife Lisa, have two children: Tyler and Emma.



**ALAIN NASREDDINE**  
**ASSISTANT COACH**

Alain Nasreddine is in his second season as assistant coach with the Stars.

Nasreddine, 48, helped guide the Stars to a Western Conference Final appearance in the 2023 Stanley Cup Playoffs after finishing the regular season with a 47-21-14 record (108 points).

Before joining Dallas, Nasreddine spent seven seasons as an assistant coach with the New Jersey Devils. Hired by New Jersey ahead of the 2015-16 season for his first NHL coaching role, he served as an assistant coach under John Hynes until assuming the role of interim head coach partway through the 2019-20 campaign, earning a 19-16-8 record in

43 games as bench boss. Following the 2019-20 season, Nasreddine was retained as an assistant coach, serving in the role through the end of the 2021-22 season.

The native of Montreal, Quebec began his coaching career in 2010-11 as an assistant coach with the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Penguins of the American Hockey League. In his first season with the team in 2010-11, he helped the Penguins win the club's first Macgregor Kilpatrick Trophy as AHL regular-season champions after posting a 58-21-0-1 record. Focusing on defensive groups, Nasreddine coached his teams to the best defense in the AHL in four of his five seasons with Wilkes-Barre/Scranton, allowing the fewest goals against in the League during the 2010-11, 2012-13, 2013-14 and 2014-15 campaigns.

Originally selected by the Florida Panthers in the sixth round (135th overall) of the 1993 NHL Draft, the former defenseman recorded five points (1-4-5) in 74 career NHL regular-season games over parts of five seasons with Chicago, Montreal, the New York Islanders and Pittsburgh. He also appeared in 726 career regular-season AHL games, logging 136 points (29-107-136) over 12 seasons with Carolina, Portland, Fredericton, Quebec, Hamilton, Bridgeport and Wilkes-Barre/Scranton. Additionally, Nasreddine earned 16 points (5-11-16) in 104 career AHL postseason contests, reaching the Calder Cup Final twice, both times with Wilkes-Barre/Scranton, in 2004 and 2008.

He and his wife Josiane have three children: sons Alec and Loic, and daughter Kaelle.



## MISHA DONSKOV

### ASSISTANT COACH

Misha Donskov is in his first season as assistant coach with the Stars in 2023-24.

Donskov, 46, joins Dallas after seven years with the Vegas Golden Knights. He served as director of hockey operations for his first three years with the club (2016-2019) before moving behind the bench as an assistant coach for the following four seasons (2019-23). Having joined the club prior to Vegas' expansion draft, Donskov helped construct the Golden Knights roster that made a run to the Stanley Cup Final in its inaugural season. The Golden Knights made the playoffs in five of the six seasons he spent with the team. After moving from the front office to the coaching staff, Donskov and the Golden Knights made two more

runs to the conference finals in 2020 and 2021 before winning the Stanley Cup in 2023.

Prior to his time in Vegas, Donskov held positions with Hockey Canada's Men's National Team as an assistant coach and manager of hockey operations/analytics. He won two IIHF World Championship gold medals in 2015 and 2016 and a gold medal at the IIHF World Junior Championship in 2015.

Before his tenure with Hockey Canada, Donskov spent two seasons as an associate coach for the Ottawa 67's (OHL) from 2012-14 after three years as an assistant coach for the London Knights (OHL) from 2009-2012. In his final year with London, Donskov took on the role of assistant general manager in addition to coaching duties and helped the club to an OHL Championship.

Early in his career, Donskov held positions in hockey development, community development, fan development, marketing and hockey operations for the Columbus Blue Jackets and Atlanta Thrashers.



## JEFF REESE

### GOALTENDING COACH

Jeff Reese is in his eighth season as the Stars' goaltending coach in 2023-24.

He joined the Stars in June 2015 after spending the previous six seasons in the same role with the Philadelphia Flyers. Prior to the Flyers, he spent 10 seasons with the Tampa Bay Lightning coaching staff, where he was responsible for working with all goaltenders in the organization, as well as assisting in the assessment of amateur goaltenders for the NHL Draft. His time with the Lightning included its 2004 Stanley Cup championship.

Over parts of 11 seasons in the NHL with the Toronto Maple Leafs (1987-92, 1998-99), Calgary Flames (1991-94), Hartford Whalers (1993-96), Tampa Bay (1995-96) and New Jersey Devils (1996-97), Reese posted a 53-65-

17 record with a 3.66 goals-against average and five shutouts in 174 career regular-season contests. In 11 appearances in the Stanley Cup Playoffs, Reese posted a 3-5 mark with a 4.08 GAA.

Reese holds NHL records for the most assists and points by a goaltender in a single game, set when he had three assists for the Calgary Flames in a game against the San Jose Sharks on Feb. 10, 1993. He was selected by Toronto in the fourth round (67th overall) of the 1984 NHL Draft.



## STAN TUGOLUKOV

### SKILLS COACH

Stan Tugolukov returns for his 10th years as a skills coach for the Dallas Stars in 2023-24, working closely with players in skills development and individual on-ice, post-injury conditioning roles.

The Chelyabinsk, Russia native is active in the Dallas-Fort Worth youth hockey scene, serving on the coaching staff for the Dallas Stars Elite Hockey Club.

SKATING COACH



**NEIL GRAHAM**  
**TEXAS STARS HEAD COACH**

Neil Graham is in his fifth season as Texas Stars Head Coach after assuming the role on Dec. 10, 2019. He was originally named as an assistant coach for Texas on July 8, 2019.

Graham, 38, spent the previous four seasons as the head coach of the Idaho Steelheads, the ECHL affiliate of the Dallas Stars. Over that span, he amassed a 166-91-31 record in 288 regular-season contests and led Idaho to three consecutive 40-win seasons. Graham guided the Steelheads to the Kelly Cup Playoffs in all four seasons as head coach, recording a 14-20 record in 34 postseason games. He helped continue the club's streak of qualifying for the postseason in each of past 22 seasons, which is the longest active postseason streak in professional hockey. Prior to being appointed head coach on Aug. 7, 2015, he was named Idaho's full-time assistant coach in 2013-14 after serving as

a player/coach for the 2012-13 campaign.

The Calgary, Alberta native is a graduate of Mercyhurst University where he recorded 60 points (23-37-60) in 137 games before turning pro. He split three seasons between the ECHL and Southern Professional Hockey League, scoring 98 points (42-56-98) in 113 professional games.



**TRAVIS MORIN**  
**TEXAS STARS ASSISTANT COACH**

Travis Morin is in his fifth season as assistant coach of the Texas Stars. Promoted to assistant coach on Dec. 10, 2019, Morin was previously hired as the skills coach and director of business development with the organization on July 31, 2019.

Morin, 39, played 12 seasons in the American Hockey League (AHL), spending 10 seasons with the Stars organization. He skated in 13 career NHL games, all with Dallas, recording one assist (0-1-1) and a +3 rating. He retired following the 2018-19 season as the Texas Stars leader in goals (175), assists (385), points (175-385-560) and games played (686), the most by an AHL player with one organization since 1974. On Oct. 19, 2019, he became the first player in team history to have his jersey retired.

The Brooklyn Park, Minnesota native served as team captain from 2015-17, was a four-time AHL All-Star and led the Stars in scoring across five of his 10 seasons. He was a focal point of Texas' 2014 Calder Cup championship season, capturing the Les Cunningham Award (AHL MVP), John B. Sollenberger Award (Regular Season Scoring Leader), and Jack A. Butterfield Award (Calder Cup Playoff MVP). Morin is also the organization's most decorated postseason scorer, earning 64 points (23-42-64) in 87 playoff games.

Morin is a graduate of Minnesota State University-Mankato where he recorded 133 points (58-75-133) in 151 games and served as team captain in his senior season.



**MAX FORTUNUS**  
**TEXAS STARS ASSISTANT COACH**

Max Fortunus is in his third season as assistant coach of the Texas Stars after being named to the team's coaching staff on May 20, 2021. Fortunus, 40, played 15 seasons in the AHL where he amassed 286 points (76-210-286) in 882 career games including posting 167 points (44-123-167) in 402 career games with Texas over six seasons from 2009-15. Fortunus was named an assistant captain for the 2011-12 campaign before serving as Texas' captain for three seasons from 2012-15. He ranks third in Texas Stars history in games played (402), fourth in assists (123), sixth in points (44-123-167) and 16th in goals (44), while he ranks first among defensemen in club history in each category.

The native of La Prairie, Quebec made 10 trips to the Calder Cup Playoffs in his AHL career, logging 31 points (6-25-31) in 118 career AHL postseason games. Of his 10 career playoff appearances, five came with Texas, recording 15 points (2-13-15) in 63 Calder Cup Playoff games in a Texas sweater. Fortunus won the 2014 Calder Cup with Texas, while he also reached the Calder Cup Final in 2009 with Manitoba and again in 2010 with Texas. He was also named to the 2014-15 AHL All-Star Game. He also appeared in nine career NHL contests with Dallas during the 2009-10 and 2013-14 seasons, recording one assist (0-1-1), five shots on goal and an average time on ice per game of 15:10.

He and his wife Marie-Josée Gagne have two sons, Malik and Mai, and a daughter, Mayla.



## AMERICAN AIRLINES CENTER

One of the finest multi-purpose venues in the world, American Airlines Center has served as the home of the Dallas Stars since 2001, playing host to over half a million hockey spectators and over 2 million spectators total annually.

Designed by world-renowned architect, David M. Schwarz and Dallas-based HKS Inc., American Airlines Center encompasses over 800,000 square feet and includes 105 luxury suites, 36 theater boxes, 25 Germania Insurance Club loge boxes, 17 Osadía Tequila Club loft boxes, two 50-person party boxes and room for 18,532 hockey fans. Its brick and glass façade, sweeping vistas of downtown Dallas, double-vaulted ceilings and welcoming signature arches give the Center a unique combination of a modern, yet classical elegant design that is perfectly suited for Dallas' "larger-than-life" Texas spirit.

No stranger to hosting major sporting events, the American Airlines Center, in conjunction with the Dallas Stars and National Hockey League, proudly hosted the 2007 NHL All-Star Game, the 2018 NHL Draft and last year's 2023 Stanley Cup Western Conference Finals. The arena has also served as home to the 2006 and 2011 NBA Finals as well as events during the 2010 NBA All-Star Weekend. In addition to the Dallas Stars' & Mavericks' accolades, the venue has hosted prestigious sporting events including two NCAA Women's Basketball Final Fours, multiple rounds of NCAA Men's Basketball Tournaments, Men's Big-12 Phillips 66 Basketball Tournaments, the U.S.A. Gymnastics Visa Championships and other events such as boxing and UFC matches.

Not solely a sports mecca, American Airlines Center has been consistently placed among the top-10 arenas in the world by Pollstar and Billboard, ranking as the 6th busiest arena in 2022. It has hosted major concerts and events such as Garth Brooks, The Rolling Stones, Bad Bunny, Beyoncé, Elton John, Eagles, Taylor Swift, Drake, Madonna, Justin Bieber and Bruce Springsteen, among others.

American Airlines Center is designed to keep ice in perfect condition, even when the Texas heat blazes outside. To maintain a constant temperature of 64-68 degrees, the building has a separate chiller system just for the slab, eight miles of one-inch pipe and 300 tons of refrigeration. In addition, a 4,200-ton air-conditioning system and a dehumidification system extract 500 gallons of moisture per hour during the season. The ice is put into place each September and takes 24 hours to build up to the 1-inch depth the players are accustomed to. The ice stays in the Center until the playoffs are complete and is covered up during the season with a special material called Polar Floor, a fiberglass product that keeps the ice cold and allows the air temperature above to rise without affecting the ice. The Zamboni is retrofitted with a Fast Ice system, the latest technology that allows the ice maintenance crew to cut the ice quickly to keep the ice smooth and fast.

In its 22nd year, American Airlines Center still pushes the envelope with technology. With the recent installation of cutting-edge LED video display upgrades, the Center continues to set the standard for hockey and basketball arenas. The upgraded size and resolution of the Center-Hung and the addition of its brand-new under-belly displays will improve the in-game experience for fans enjoying sports, concerts, and more. Matching the spectacular HD video experience is a state-of-the-art concert-quality sound system. The digital line array audio system delivers audio effects that the American Airlines Center visitor can both feel and hear. Using a patented retractable system with new ergonomically improved seats, the Center can convert from an ice rink to a basketball court or concert setting in less than two hours.



## H-E-B CENTER AT CEDAR PARK

Northland Properties Corporation, the parent holding company of the Dallas Stars, purchased the Texas Stars, Dallas' development affiliate in the American Hockey League (AHL), in December 2014, announcing that the transfer of ownership from Hicks Cedar Park, LLC had been successful and was approved by the AHL Board of Governors. Texas Stars, L.P. now operates the city-owned H-E-B Center at Cedar Park, located in Cedar Park, Texas, under a long-term lease running through 2034.

"H-E-B Center at Cedar Park, and the land surrounding it, is located in one of the fastest growing regions of the United States," Northland President and Dallas Stars Owner Tom Gaglardi said. "The opportunity to grow the area's footprint as the top-flight entertainment region in Central Texas is immense, and we are looking forward to engaging with the city of Cedar Park to make that happen."

H-E-B Center at Cedar Park holds 6,778 seats for hockey, 7,200 for basketball and up to 8,700 for concerts and other events. The state-of-the-art arena has 24 suites (including four party suites) and 545 club seats with a private club lounge. The building hosts more than 130 events per year including sporting events, concerts, and family shows. H-E-B Center at Cedar Park is home to the 2014 AHL Calder Cup champion Texas Stars. The building also serves as the home court to the Austin Spurs, the G League affiliate of the 2014 NBA champion San Antonio Spurs. Since opening in September of 2009, H-E-B Center at Cedar Park has hosted world-class performers and events such as George Strait, Rascal Flatts, Alan Jackson, Tool, Jason Aldean, Def Leppard, Eric Church, Cirque du Soleil and Disney On Ice.

"Since coming to Cedar Park, the Texas Stars have been a wonderful partner of ours in bringing world-class sports and entertainment to the area," said former Cedar Park Mayor Matt Powell. "We look forward to working closely with Northland Properties and the Dallas Stars in this outstanding partnership as we continue to fulfill the vision of H-E-B Center at Cedar Park and the city."

In 14 seasons of existence, all of which have been as the affiliate of the Dallas Stars, the Texas Stars have proved to be one of the most successful franchises in the AHL. The team captured its first Calder Cup championship in 2014. The club has made three trips to the Calder Cup Final (2010, 2014, 2018), qualifying for the postseason nine times (2010, 2011, 2013, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2018, 2022, 2023), and has posted 40-win campaigns seven times. Many of the Dallas Stars' young core of NHL players have spent time skating for the Texas Stars, including Roope Hintz, Jason Robertson and Thomas Harley.

"Since Northland Properties purchased the Texas Stars, we've been thrilled with the tremendous opportunities H-E-B Center at Cedar Park has provided for our organization," said Texas Stars President Brad Alberts. "Owning and operating our own AHL affiliate and the venue in which it plays has been immensely beneficial in creating a seamless process to develop not only the future stars of the NHL, but our coaching and front office staffs, as well. The state-of-the-art facility provides an incredible experience for fans and teams alike and has been the driving force in bringing top-name performers to the heart of Texas."

## COMERICA CENTER

The Comerica Center complex, which includes the practice facility of the Dallas Stars, the executive offices for the team's business and hockey operations, and a recently renovated 6,000-plus seat arena, is located in Frisco, Texas - one of the fastest growing cities in the United States.

In January of 2019, the Dallas Stars and Comerica Bank announced an expanded multi-year partnership making the financial services company the naming rights partner for Comerica Center.


"We are excited to take our longtime partnership with the Dallas Stars Hockey Club to the next level as the naming rights partner for Comerica Center," James H. Weber, Comerica Executive Vice President and Chief Marketing Officer, said. "This enhanced sponsorship will allow Comerica to expand its presence and significantly increase our exposure within our headquarters market, while continuing to strengthen brand awareness and affinity and raising expectations of what a bank can be with the Stars, NHL fans and in the North Texas communities we serve."

Originally constructed in 2003, Comerica Center was initially built in partnership with the Dallas Stars, City of Frisco and Frisco ISD. The arena portion of the complex, formerly Dr Pepper Arena, is a multi-purpose sports and entertainment venue that is home to the Texas Legends - the NBA G League affiliate of the Dallas Mavericks - and the Indoor Football League's Frisco Fighters. The venue features amenities such as a state-of-the-art sound system, multiple HD video screens, 12 suites and a private lounge area.

Comerica Center also hosts concerts, family shows, corporate conferences and other sporting events. Recently, the facility has hosted Cirque De Soleil, BIG3 basketball, the Harlem Globetrotters, the Men's and Women's Lone Star Conference Basketball Championship, Frisco ISD graduations and numerous other events and conferences.

In its commitment to remain at the forefront of the entertainment industry, the arena underwent major upgrades in the summer of 2018 to artist spaces and backstage dressing rooms, as well as updated signage and concessions stands and storefronts for an enhanced audience experience. In addition to the upgrades, the arena introduced Ryan Sanders Sports Services (RS3) as its new concessionaire. Through RS3's vision, Comerica Center features state-of-the-art food and beverage services specifically tailored to highlight the unique atmospheres of each event.

"We couldn't be more proud to partner with Comerica Bank, a North Texas-based company who has supported the Stars for many years," Dallas Stars President and Chief Executive Officer Brad Alberts said. "The renovations made to our Frisco campus have ushered in a new era for the Stars and have reinforced our commitment to partnering with local businesses, and we are thrilled to be able to share this exciting new chapter with Comerica Bank."



## CHILDREN'S HEALTH STARCENTERS

When the Stars moved from Minnesota to Texas, the club made exposing the Dallas/Fort Worth community to hockey an organizational priority. By constructing and operating several StarCenters throughout the Metroplex, the team has been able to have direct involvement with developing and growing the game of hockey in the greater Southwest region.

The Dallas Stars are one of the few teams in the NHL to design and build their own practice facility and arena, run in partnership with the City of Frisco. The team also sets the pace in the NHL among clubs that form partnerships with communities to create public skating facilities, a trend which is picking up momentum around the League. The facilities in Euless, Farmers Branch, Frisco, McKinney and Mansfield were all built in partnership with those respective cities, while there are also StarCenters in Plano, Richardson and Valley Ranch. The Stars and StarCenters are constantly looking to expand to more cities in and out of the DFW area.

The Stars have come a long way since moving to Dallas in 1993. When the team first set foot in Texas, there were five total sheets of ice in the area (two of which were at shopping malls and didn't host hockey). At that time, there were no high school or travel hockey teams, while only 200 local children were playing the sport and just 225 adults playing in recreational leagues.

As of the summer of 2022, there were more than 15,000 North Texas kids and nearly 9,000 adults skating and playing recreational hockey on over 20 sheets of ice in the area, including more than 65 high school hockey teams participating in the Stars-run AT&T Metroplex High School Hockey League.

With all the success the Stars have had growing the game and working with USA Hockey & TAHA (Texas Amateur Hockey Association), it's no surprise the Lone Star State is producing world-class hockey talent. Since 2005, 17 native Texans have been drafted into the NHL, including 11 who hail directly from the Metroplex (Dallas, Frisco, Flower Mound, Plano, Coppell, Arlington, Fairview and Lewisville). Thirteen of those players have been selected since 2008, making Texas a top-15 producer of American-born NHL draftees in that span. In the summer of 2013, Plano native Seth Jones was selected fourth overall in the NHL Draft by the Nashville Predators, the highest a native Texan has ever been selected. Blake Coleman, also a Plano native and two-time Stanley Cup Champion (first Texas born Stanley Cup Champion), was drafted in the third round (75th pick) of the 2011 NHL Draft, and even brought the Stanley Cup back to Children's Health StarCenter Plano to encourage youth players to chase their dreams.

The Stars continue to play a crucial role in the grassroots development of the sport in Texas through Rookies - a four-week, try-hockey-for-free program, and Fitness Stars - a physical education program dedicated to reinforcing the importance of a healthy lifestyle through clean eating and unique physical activities. Through these programs, kids will be introduced to the sport of hockey and invited to be part of the Dallas Stars' family for the rest of their lives.



The heart of the Dallas Stars Foundation is to invest in our communities by creating unique programs that nurture and enrich the lives of those in need. Since its inception in 1998, the Dallas Stars Foundation has donated more than \$12 million to the North Texas community.

Over the years, the Foundation has positively impacted more than half a million children across North Texas through its programming and partnerships with numerous non-profit agencies that focus on a myriad of worthwhile causes, including youth hockey, medical and other basic needs for disadvantaged youth, educational and social issues, family support and crisis intervention.

The Dallas Stars Foundation positively impacts 90,000 children each year through three pillars of focus for their giving, programs and partnerships: youth hockey, community engagement and health and education. Last season, the foundation mobilized more than 500 volunteers that served at non-profits across North Texas for a combined 1,500 service hours each year. Over 300 non-profit organizations received in-kind donations including autographed merchandise, game tickets, and experiences to auction off to raise money to support their organizations. We donated more than 10,000 Dallas Stars tickets to local non-profit organizations and community partners.

The Dallas Stars Foundation named St. Philip's the beneficiary of their 2020 Winter Classic Legacy Project, committing \$2 million over five years. Over the last four years, the organization and its volunteers have dedicated time and resources to numerous other events at St. Philip's including ball hockey clinics, player visits, volunteering weekly in the community pantry, community events, and implementing the Dallas Stars Foundation's educational programs in their school and after-school programming.

Through the continued work of the Foundation, the Dallas Stars organization pledges to support the Metroplex and the state of Texas to support community efforts through the great game of hockey.



## STICK WITH READING

The Dallas Stars Foundation Stick with Reading program returned during the 2022-23 hockey season to highlight the importance of reading and literacy for elementary students across the metroplex. Students tracked their reading totals with Stick with Reading minute logs throughout the hockey season to be eligible for prizes. During the 2022-2023 season, Stick with Reading impacted a total of over 1,430 students and 79 teachers. Top readers received Stick with Reading attire and tickets to a Dallas Stars home game.

Teacher Appreciation Week – We partnered with Scholastic Book Fairs to bring free books to the students and teachers of Charles Rice Learning Center in Dallas ISD. Students learned the value of reading from Stars mascot Victor E. Green’s Ready to Read school show. 440 students and 35 teachers were allowed to each select 2 books of their choice from the Scholastic Book Fair.




## FITNESS STARS

Fitness Stars enters its ninth season after launching at the start of the 2013-14 season. Originally created as a physical education program aimed at fighting childhood obesity through hockey-based fitness challenges, Fitness Stars was offered at 28 DFW area schools in its inaugural season, reaching over 15,000 children.

Due to the program’s overwhelming success, Fitness Stars has since expanded and is now offered in over 300 schools in the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex and is expected to impact over 206,000 children. Participating schools include Allen ISD, Carrollton-Farmers Branch ISD, Forney ISD, Fort Worth ISD, Frisco ISD, Garland ISD, Grand Prairie ISD, Irving ISD, Lewisville ISD, McKinney ISD, Wolfe City ISD, Wylie ISD, in addition to two individual charter schools.

The Fitness Stars Program is dedicated to reinforcing the importance of a healthy lifestyle through clean eating and unique physical activities. The program is designed to fit within the current curriculum of Physical Education teachers to help emphasize the programs and healthy options already in practice.



## 2022-23 REGULAR SEASON NOTES

- Recorded the fifth-most points in a regular season since the club relocated to Dallas in 1993-94
- Ended the season on a season-long six-game winning streak and won the division for the ninth time in team history and first since 2015-16
- The only team this season to score 10 goals in a game (10-4 W, March 9 @ BUF)
- Led the league in faceoff win percentage (54.8)
- Finished the season with the best road points percentage in franchise history (.671)
- Scored the second-most goals in a season (281) in team history, trailing only the 1993-94 team that had 286 goals (84 GP)
- Ranked second in the league in road power-play percentage (27.8) and fifth overall (25.0)
- Ranked third in penalty kill percentage (83.5)

## MAN OF 1,000 POINTS

- With a goal on April 10 at Detroit, forward Joe Pavelski earned career point No. 1,000 (448-552—1,000 in 1,248 GP). Pavelski became the 10th U.S.-born player to reach the 1,000-point milestone and is one of two active U.S.-born players with 1,000 points or more (also Patrick Kane: 451-786—1,237 in 1,179 GP). He also became the fifth player taken in the seventh round of the NHL Draft or later to reach the 1,000-point milestone, joining Doug Gilmour (1,414), Luc Robitaille (1,394), Theo Fleury (1,088) and Dave Taylor (1,069).
- With Ottawa's Claude Giroux earning his 1,000th point earlier in the day, this marked the first time in NHL history that two players reached the 1,000-point milestone on the same day.

## MORE ABOUT 'MIGHTY' JOE

- With his 27th goal of the season on April 10 at Detroit, Pavelski passed Dean Prentice (26 in 1972-73) for the most by a Stars/North Stars player in a single season at age 38 or older.
- Had goals in six consecutive road games from March 18-April 12 (6-2—8). Only two players have recorded a longer such run with the Stars/North Stars: Jere Lehtinen (8 GP in 2005-06) and Brian Bellows (7 GP in 1989-90).
- Finished the season third in assists (49) and points (28-49—77) and fourth in goals (28). He also ranked third in even-strength points (15-34—49) and fifth in even-strength goals (15).
- Pavelski had seven three-point games this season, trailing only Jason Robertson (12) for the most on the team.
- The 38-year-old ranked fourth in the league in plus-minus (+42) and finished with a plus or even rating in 66 of 82 games in the 2022-23 season.

## TO INFINITY ... AND BEYOND!

- In Dallas' 5-1 victory over Nashville on April 3, Jason Robertson (43-58—101 in 77 GP) recorded four points (1-3—4) to become the fourth different player in franchise history with a triple-digit total in a season.
- On March 31 at Arizona, Robertson recorded his 94th point (42-52—94) of the season, surpassing Mike Modano (50- 43—93) for the most points in a single season in Dallas Stars history.

## MORE ON ROBO'S RECORD-SETTING SEASON

- Already holding the record for the most multi-point games in a season in Dallas Stars history (34), Robertson tied Dino Ciccarelli (34) for the most in franchise history. (Ciccarelli had 34 multi-point games in 1981-82 with Minnesota).
- Robertson (46-63-109 in 82 GP) trails only Bobby Smith (114 in 1981-82) for the most points in a season in franchise history.
- Robertson's 63 assists in 2022-23 were the second most by a Stars player since the club relocated to Dallas in 1993-94, behind only Brad Richards (67 in 2009-10).
- He recorded his 13th three-point outing of the season on April 12 at St. Louis, tying Neal Broten and Bobby Smith (both w/ 13 GP in 1981-82) for the second-most three-point games in a campaign in franchise history behind only Dino Ciccarelli (15 GP in 1981-82).
- With three points (0-3-3) on April 12 against the Blues, Robertson (109) surpassed Jeremy Roenick (107 in 1992-93 w/ CHI) and Jimmy Carson (107 in 1987-88 w/ LAK) for the most points in a season by a U.S.-born player age 23 or younger.
- Robertson led the Stars in goals (46), assists (63) and points (109), and paced the club in even-strength goals (33), even-strength points (33-35-68), power-play points (13-28-41) and game-winning goals (7).
- Among league leaders, Robertson shared sixth in points and ranked seventh in goals. He also ranked sixth in even-strength goals and shared sixth in even-strength points
- In February, Robertson made his first All-Star appearance representing the Central Division in Sunrise, Florida, along with Stars head coach Pete DeBoer (third All-Star appearance).
- Robertson had 21 goals and 34 points (21-13-34) over a career-best 18-game point streak (Oct. 27-Dec. 4, 2022), which went down as the longest point streak in Dallas Stars history (1993-present) and the second-longest point streak in franchise history. Only Brian Bellows' 20-game point streak from Jan. 11-Feb. 21, 1986 with the Minnesota North Stars is longer.
- Only two active players recorded a longer point streak age 23 or younger: Paul Stastny (20 GP in 2006-07) and Sidney Crosby (19 GP 2007-08 & 16 GP in 2008-09).
- Robertson had goals in six consecutive games from Oct. 27-Nov. 8, 2022, becoming the fifth player in franchise history to have a goal streak of six games or more before turning 24, and the second player in Dallas Stars history to do so.
- Robertson followed Neal Broten from Jan. 23-Feb. 4, 1982 (7-12-19 in 7 GP), Jamie Benn from March 1-11, 2011 (6-1-7 in 6 GP), Mike Modano from Feb. 29-March 10, 1992 (7-2-9 in 6 GP) and Danny Grant from Oct. 16-29, 1969 (6-1-7 in 6 GP).
- Robertson was named the NHL's First Star of the Week three times for the weeks ending Nov. 6, 2022, Nov. 27, 2022 and April 14, respectively.

- Defenseman Miro Heiskanen (11-62—73) surpassed Sergei Zubov (71 in 2005-06) for the most points in a season by a defenseman in Dallas Stars history. Additionally, Heiskanen surpassed Craig Hartsburg (60 in 1981-82) for the most assists in a season by a defenseman in franchise history.
- With 73 points, Heiskanen tied with Reijo Ruotsalainen (73 in 1984-85) for the most points in a season by a Finnish-born defenseman.
- Heiskanen set personal bests in assists (62), points (11-62—73), even-strength points (9-29—38), power-play points (2- 32—34), shots on goal (206) and TOI/GP (25:29).
- Playing in his 350th career NHL game, Heiskanen recorded his 200th point (44-156—200) with an assist on April 6 vs. Philadelphia. Among defensemen to make their league debut with the franchise, only Craig Hartsburg (276 GP), John Klingberg (279 GP) and Brad Maxwell (345 GP) required fewer games to reach the benchmark with the Stars/North Stars.
- He had 19 multi-assist games on the season, placing him in rarefied air among players in franchise history with multi- assist games in a single campaign. Bobby Smith (24 GP in 1981-82) and Neal Broten (21 GP in 1985-86) are the only skaters in franchise history with more in a single season.
- The 23-year-old ranked third among NHL defensemen in assists and shared third in points. A workhorse on the blueline, Heiskanen paced the Stars and ranked sixth in the league in TOI/GP (25:30).
- Heiskanen led all defensemen and ranked sixth overall with 23 points in the month of March. He surpassed Craig Hartsburg (3-17—20 in January 1982) for the most points in a month by a defenseman in franchise history.
- He had a 12-game point streak (4-16—20) from March 1-23, setting the franchise record for the lengthiest point streak by a d-man in franchise history.
- Heiskanen was the third defenseman to register a point streak of at least a dozen games in the 2022-23 season. The others: Erik Karlsson (14 GP) and Vince Dunn (12 GP).
- Heiskanen's 12-game point streak included seven multi-point games, including a three-assist performance on March 13 at Seattle. In all, Heiskanen has 19 multi-point games on the season.
- Heiskanen had four consecutive multi-point games from March 9-14 to tie Brad Maxwell (1983-84) for the longest such streak among defensemen in franchise history.

## THE 'BENNASAINCE' ERA

- Captain Jamie Benn finished the 2022-23 season with 33 goals and 78 points (33-45—78) in 82 games - the most goals and points since 2017-18 when he had 36 goals and 79 points.
- Among team leaders, the 33-year-old ranked second in points, third in goals and fourth in assists (45) this past season.
- Additionally, Benn shared first in power-play goals (13) and ranked third in power-play points (30).
- He tallied his 32nd goal of the season on March 31 at Arizona, which also represented his 101st career power-play tally. Benn is one of four players in franchise history with 100 power-play goals for the franchise (Mike Modano: 156, Brian Bellows: 134, Dino Ciccarelli: 130).
- With a goal on March 21 vs. Seattle, Benn reached the 30-goal mark for the fifth time in his career and the first time since 2017-18 when he had 36 in 82 GP. He trails only Mike Modano (9x), Dino Ciccarelli (7x), Brian Bellows (7x) and Dave Gagner (6x) for the most in franchise history. His three-point performance (1-2—3) on March 21 against the Kraken represented his 20th multi-point game of the season and the 62nd time he recorded three points or more in his career.

## THE 'BENNASAINCE' ERA CONTINUED...

- Benn recorded his 15th career shorthanded goal on Feb. 27 vs. Vancouver. Benn trails only Mike Modano (29) for the most shorthanded goals in Dallas Stars history.
- Benn had a season-high eight-game point streak (4-5—9) from Dec. 15-31, 2022.
- With a goal against Nashville on Dec. 27, 2022, Benn (343) surpassed Brian Bellows (342) for sole possession of second place on the franchise's all-time goals list. (Mike Modano is the all-time leader with 557.)
- Benn recorded career point No. 800 (342-458—800) with an assist in the second period against Edmonton on Dec. 21, 2022, becoming just the third player in franchise history (1967-present) to reach the mark, joining Mike Modano (557- 802—1,359) and Neal Broten (274-593—867).
- Benn recorded the 45th multi-goal game of his NHL career on Nov. 11, 2022 vs. San Jose and moved within two of tying Bill Goldsworthy (47) for fourth place on the Stars/North Stars franchise's all-time list.
- Benn (7) trails only Dino Ciccarelli (14) and Bill Goldsworthy (8) for the most three-goal outings in franchise history. Note: Tyler Seguin and Mike Modano also have seven hat tricks with the Stars/North Stars franchise.
- Benn became the 379th player in NHL history to reach the 1,000 regular-season games played mark on Feb. 6 against Anaheim.
- He became the 253rd forward to reach the league-recognized milestone, while he is also one of 38 active NHL players to do so (min 1 GP in 2022-23). Benn also became the 76th player in NHL history (75th skater) to appear in 1,000+ regular-season games with a single franchise and trails only Mike Modano (1,459) for the most games played in franchise history.

## HIGH-FLYIN' HINTZ

- Forward Roope Hintz set career highs in assists (38) and points (37-38—75) and tied his personal best in goals (37) during the 2022-23 season.
- Hintz was one of four Stars players to reach the 70-point mark in 2022-23 (also Jason Robertson, Jamie Benn & Joe Pavelski). Dallas had four 70-point scorers in a season for the eighth time in franchise history and first since 1992-93 (Mike Modano, Russ Courtnall, Dave Gagner & Ulf Dahlen).
- Hintz ranked second on the club in goals (37), fourth in points (37-38—75) and fifth in assists (38) in 73 GP.
- Hintz tied his single-game career high in points (1-3—4) on April 10 at Detroit.
- Hintz had an eight-game point streak (9-2—11) from Feb. 25-March 11, the second longest point streak of his career (10 GP from Oct. 27-Nov. 17, 2022).
- He scored his eighth career shorthanded goal (third SHG on 2022-23) and tied Brenden Morrow for the eighth most in franchise history on March 6 vs. Calgary.
- Hintz (3-0—3) recorded his third career hat trick on March 2 at Chicago (previous: Nov. 30, 2021 and Dec. 4, 2022).
- He tallied his 100th career NHL goal on Jan. 27 vs. New Jersey.
- He recorded his second consecutive multi-goal effort (and sixth multi-goal game of 2022-23) in a 3-2 victory over Nashville on Dec. 27, 2022. It represented his 20th career game-winning tally, the most by a Stars player since he entered the NHL in 2018-19.
- He had a 10-game point streak from Oct. 27-Nov. 17, 2022, tallying 15 points (6-9—15) over that span including four multi-point efforts.
- With two goals on his 26th birthday on Nov. 17, 2022 at Florida, Hintz became just the second player in franchise history to score multiple goals on his birthday (also Dave Gagner, Dec. 11, 1990).
- Hintz and Robertson became the third pair of Stars/North Stars teammates with simultaneous 10-game point streaks, joining Brian Bellows and Neal Broten (10 GP from Jan. 23-Feb. 13, 1986) as well as Steve Payne and Bobby Smith (10 GP from Feb. 10-28, 1980).

- In the final game of the 2022-23 regular season, forward Wyatt Johnston scored his 24th goal in the final game of the 2022-23 regular season.
- He finished his rookie season tied for first among NHL rookies in goals (24) and ranked fourth in points (24-17-41), appearing in all 82 games.
- Johnston finished the season with the most goals in a single season by a rookie since James Neal tallied 24 in 2008-09.
- In the penultimate game of the season (April 12 at St. Louis), Johnston recorded his first multi-goal contest (2-0-2). The last Stars rookie with more in a single season was James Neal (24) in 2008-09.
- Johnston had a career-best five-game goal streak (5-1-6) from March 13-21. Only two rookies have recorded a longer run with the franchise: Neal Broten (7 GP from Jan. 23-Feb. 4, 1982) and Dirk Graham (6 GP from March 16-26, 1985). Furthermore, only two teenagers in franchise history have scored as many goals in a season: Brian Bellows (41 in 1983-84; 35 in 1982-83) and Mike Modano (29 in 1989-90).
- Johnston became the fourth rookie in Dallas Stars history (1993-present) with 20 goals in a season, joining Denis Gurianov (20 in 2019-20), Jamie Benn (22 in 2009-10) and James Neal (24 in 2008-09).
- He scored his 15th goal of the season on March 4 vs. Colorado – the most by a teenager in Dallas Stars history. Valeri Nichushkin held the previous mark with 14 goals in 2013-14 and 2014-15).
- Johnston has two game-winning goals in 2022-23 (Dec. 23 vs. MTL and Dec. 29, 2022 at MIN). Only four teenagers in franchise history (1967-present) have tallied more in a single season: Brian Bellows (5 in 1983-84 & 3 in 1982-83), Tom McCarthy (5 in 1979-80), Miro Heiskanen (4 in 2018-19) and Brian Lawton (4 in 1983-84).
- With a goal (1-0-1) on Dec. 23, 2022 vs. Montreal, Johnston (19 years and 223 days) became the youngest player in Dallas Stars history (1993-present) with a goal streak of three consecutive games. He also became the youngest player since Ottawa's Tim Stutzle in 2020-21 to score in three consecutive games. Stutzle was 19 years and 20 days at the end of his streak.
- In addition, Johnston became the fourth fastest player in Dallas Stars history to score his first 10 career goals with the organization.
- At 19 years, 173 days, Johnston became the first teenager in franchise history to record a three-game goal streak on the road with his goal on Nov. 3, 2022 at Arizona. The last teenager to have a longer road run was Carolina's Andrei Svechnikov (4 GP in 2019-20).
- With a goal (1-0-1) in the season opener on Oct. 13, 2022, Johnston became the youngest player in Dallas Stars history to score a goal in his NHL debut (19 years, 151 days) and second youngest in franchise history with at least one goal in his NHL debut, behind Dave Archibald (18 years, 179 days on Oct. 10, 1987). Mike Modano (19 years, 120 days on Oct. 5, 1989) scored in his first regular-season NHL game but had debuted during the Stanley Cup Playoffs.

## YOU, YOU, YOU 'OTTER KNOW

- Goaltender Jake Oettinger set career highs in wins (37), shutouts (5), starts (61) and minutes (3,644:53) in his third NHL season.
- Oettinger shared overall in wins and sixth in save percentage (.919) and ranked seventh in goals-against average (2.37).
- Oettinger also shared second in shutouts, trailing only Ilya Sorokin (6) for the most shutouts among all goaltenders in the 2022-23 campaign.
- Oettinger turned aside 40 saves on 42 shots on March 23 vs. Pittsburgh to improve to 5-0-0 in his career when making 40+ saves in a regular-season game.
- Oettinger recorded his fourth shutout of the season on Jan. 21 vs. Arizona. It marked his second shutout in a three- game span (also Jan. 16 at Vegas) and the sixth of his career.
- With a 27-save effort in Dallas' 2-1 shootout victory against New York on Jan. 10, Oettinger (108 GP) recorded his 60th career win to become the fifth U.S.-born goaltender in NHL history to reach the mark in 108 or fewer games, joining Frank Brimsek (84 GP), Ryan Miller (102 GP), Brent Johnson (102 GP) and Jimmy Howard (104 GP).
- With a win on New Year's Eve, Oettinger earned his 40th regular-season victory of 2022 – the most among all goaltenders – and became the fifth netminder in NHL history to record as many wins in a calendar year before age 25, joining Terry Sawchuk (44 in 1951 w/ DET), Jonathan Quick (40 in 2009 w/ LAK), Mike Liut (40 in 1980 w/ STL) and Roger Crozier (40 in 1965 w/ DET).
- In his 100th career NHL game on Dec. 19, 2022, Oettinger improved to 54-27-11 (2.44 GAA, .915 SV% and 4 SO) with a 27-save performance in Dallas' 2-1 victory over Columbus.
- Only one goaltender in franchise history recorded more wins in their first 100 games as a member of the Stars/North Stars franchise: Ed Belfour (60-21-16).
- Oettinger's 45-save performance against Washington on Dec. 15, 2022 was one shy of tying his career mark for saves in a regular-season game (46) set Feb. 15, 2022 at Colorado (4-1 W).

## TYLER THE CREATOR

- Forward Tyler Seguin finished the 2022-23 season sixth on the Stars in goals (21), assists (29) and points (21-29—50) in 76 GP.
- He recorded his 44th career three-point game (2-1—3) with the Stars on March 1 vs. Arizona.
- With 21 goals, Seguin reached double digits in 12 of his 13 NHL seasons. (He was limited to three games during the 2020-21 campaign).
- Seguin also recorded the second shorthanded goal of his career on March 1 vs. Arizona, his first since Jan. 4, 2018 vs. New Jersey.
- With an assist on Feb. 8 vs. Minnesota, Seguin (0-1—1) registered his 600th career point with the Stars (263-337—600 in 675 GP). Only three players have had more assists than Seguin at the time of their 600th point with the franchise: Neal Broten (400), Jamie Benn (345) and Mike Modano (341).
- The 31-year-old earned his 400th career assist as part of a two-point performance (1-1—2) on Jan. 14 vs. Calgary.
- With the game-winning goal in sudden death on Dec. 8, 2022 vs. Ottawa, Seguin (1-0—1) scored his 10th career overtime goal to surpass Modano for sole possession of second place in franchise history behind only Benn (11).
- With his first of two assists (0-2—2) on Nov. 19, 2022 against the New York Islanders, Seguin recorded career point No. 700, becoming the first player from the 2010 NHL Draft to reach the 700-point mark.

## NEAL BROTEN

Neal Broten began his NHL career with a bang, being named the franchise's Rookie of the Year after setting team records that still stand for most goals, assists and points by a rookie (38-60=98) in the 1981-82 season. Sixteen seasons later, Broten retired as the club's all-time leader in games played (992), assists (593) and points (867) and is fourth in team annals in goals (274). The team's Most Valuable Player in 1984 and 1986, Broten participated in the NHL All-Star Game in 1983 and 1986. In that 1985-86 campaign, he became the first American-born player to record 100 points (105) and set the current club mark for most assists in a season with 76. Moving with the team to Texas in 1993, Broten scored the first-ever goal in Dallas Stars history on October 5, 1993 against Detroit. Broten's number seven was retired by the Stars on February 7, 1998 and he was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame in 2000.

## BILL GOLDSWORTHY

Bill Goldsworthy began his NHL career with the Boston Bruins in 1964, appearing in just 33 regular-season games and earning 12 points (6-6=12) over parts of three seasons with the Bruins before he was selected by the Minnesota North Stars in the expansion draft in 1967. Goldsworthy would make a name for himself in the NHL with the North Stars through goal-scoring and the invention of his signature goal celebration, the Goldy Shuffle. Goldsworthy registered five 30+ goal seasons in his career, all coming while he was in Minnesota. The native of Waterloo, Ont. was the first player from a post-1967 expansion club to reach the 200- and 250-goal mark, while he eclipsed the 500-point plateau during the 1976-77 season to become the first player in Minnesota North Stars history to accomplish the feat.

Goldsworthy finished his 10-season career with the North Stars in 1977. Over that span, he registered 267 goals, 239 assists and 506 points (267-239=506) in 670 regular-season games. He currently ranks fifth all-time in goals (267), sixth in game-winning goals (34), 10th in points (506) and third in shots on goal (2,237). Goldsworthy was also named to an All-Star four times during his career (1970, 1972, 1974 and 1976). In recognition of his accomplishments, Goldsworthy's number eight was retired by the organization on February 15, 1992. Goldsworthy passed away on March 29, 1996 at the age of 51 due to complications from AIDS.




## MIKE MODANO

Mike Modano, the greatest American-born hockey player in NHL history, played 21 seasons in the NHL and is the all-time franchise leader in nearly every category, including games played (1,459), goals (557), assists (802), points (1,359), short-handed goals (29), game-winning goals (92) and power play tallies (156).

A seven-time NHL All-Star, 2014 Hockey Hall of Fame class member, and United States Hockey Hall of Fame inductee, Modano is also the American-born record holder in goals (561) and points (1,374). He was also instrumental in helping the Stars capture the 1999 Stanley Cup championship. The Livonia, Mich., native skated for Team USA at the Olympic Games on three separate occasions, winning the silver medal at the 2002 Games in Salt Lake City. He also captured the gold medal at the 1996 World Cup of Hockey; and was captain of the United States squad at the 2005 World Cup. Modano was drafted first overall in 1988 by the Minnesota North Stars.

On March 8, 2014, the Dallas Stars honored Mike Modano, the greatest player to wear a Stars uniform, by retiring his iconic number 9.

## BILL MASTERTON

Bill Masterton was a member of the Minnesota North Stars inaugural NHL team in 1967-68, recording 12 points (4-8=12) in 38 contests before suffering a fatal head injury in a game on Jan. 13, 1968.

A native of Winnipeg, Man., Masterton attended the University of Denver where he played for three seasons with the Pioneers in the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA), winning two National Championships in 1960 and 1961. The first player to sign with the new Minnesota club, Masterton made his NHL debut in the team's inaugural game on Oct. 11, 1967 against the St. Louis Blues, scoring the first goal in franchise history. In a game against the Oakland Seals on Jan. 13, 1968, Masterton suffered a severe head injury when his head hit the ice after being checked. The 29-year-old would eventually succumb to his injury as he passed away just two days later on Jan. 15.

In his memory, the Professional Hockey Writers' Association created the Bill Masterton Memorial Trophy in 1968, an award presented annually to the "National Hockey League player who best exemplifies the qualities of perseverance, sportsmanship and dedication to hockey." Masterton's number 19 has never been worn by another player in franchise history, and was retired by the organization on January 17, 1987.

## JERE LEHTINEN


Jere Lehtinen was originally selected by the Minnesota North Stars in the fourth round (88th overall) of the 1992 NHL Draft before making his NHL debut with Dallas in 1995-96. Lehtinen played his entire 14-season NHL career in a Dallas Stars sweater and recorded 514 points (243-271=514) in 875 regular-season games, landing himself on the Stars franchise leaderboard in a number of categories.

At the time of his retirement on Dec. 8, 2010, the Espoo, Finland native ranked third in franchise history in games played (875), seventh in goals (243), eighth in points (514) and 10th in assists (271). Lehtinen also finished third in game-winning goals (37) and sixth in power play goals (77), while he continues to sit atop the franchise leaderboard with a career +174 plus/minus rating.

Best known for his two-way play, Lehtinen won the Frank J. Selke Trophy as the NHL's top defensive forward three times in 1998, 1999 and 2003. The forward also earned recognition being named to the 1998 All-Star Game, his only All-Star appearance in his 14-season career. Lehtinen helped the Stars capture the 1999 Stanley Cup, finishing tied for second on the team with 10 goals and ranked fifth with 13 points (10-3=13) while appearing in all 23 postseason games during the team's championship run.

On Nov. 24, 2017, the Dallas Stars recognized Lehtinen's illustrious career by retiring his number 26. Lehtinen is the fifth player in Stars franchise history to have his number retired, and the third since the club moved to Dallas before the 1993-94 season.

## SERGEI ZUBOV

Inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in November 2019, Zubov spent 12 of his 16 NHL seasons as a member of the Dallas Stars, registering 549 points in 839 regular-season contests. Among franchise leaders (1967-present), he ranks third in assists (438) and plus/minus rating (+103), fifth in games played and seventh in points.

Zubov is the franchise leader among defensemen in numerous statistical categories including points, goals (111), assists, games played, PPGs (60), GWGs (20) and SOG (1,694).

The native of Moscow, Russia qualified for the Stanley Cup Playoffs in 13 of 16 NHL campaigns, including 10 of his 12 seasons with Dallas, and registered 117 points in 164 career postseason contests. With Dallas, he tallied 72 points in 114 Stanley Cup Playoff games and ranks first in plus/minus (+18), second in assists (57), third in games played, fifth in points and is tied for seventh in PPG (ninth) among franchise leaders. Zubov won two Stanley Cups in his career, including a championship with Dallas in 1999.

Over his career, Zubov made three appearances in the NHL All-Star Game (1998, 1999, 2000) and was selected to the 2005-06 NHL Second All-Star Team.

His No. 56 was raised to the rafters at American Airlines Center on Jan. 28, 2022, becoming the sixth player in franchise history to have his number retired.







Defenseman Philippe Boucher and goaltender Marty Turco represented the Stars in the game as they both were voted onto the Western Conference roster through the fan voting process, while Boucher was named a starter in the contest, replacing Anaheim's Scott Niedermayer who could not play in the game due to injury.

Former Dallas bench boss Lindy Ruff also participated in the All-Star Game as he was named head coach of the Eastern Conference All-Stars. With a capacity crowd of 18,532 on hand, the West defeated the East in the contest by a final score of 12-9, with then-Buffalo Sabres forward Daniel Briere being named the MVP of the game.







**JOSH BOGORAD**  
**PLAY BY PLAY ANNOUNCER**

Josh Bogorad is in his 11th season with the Stars broadcast team, and his sixth as the team's play-by-play broadcaster on Bally Sports Southwest and Sportsradio 96.7 FM and 1310AM The Ticket. Prior to his current role, he served as the host of Stars Live, the pregame, intermission and postgame show during Stars broadcasts on FOX Sports Southwest. Bogorad joined the Stars in 2013 as the pregame, intermission and postgame radio host on The Ticket.

Since becoming the Stars' play-by-play broadcaster, Bogorad was voted the 2020 Texas SportsCaster of the Year by the National Sports Media Association and won the 2022 Lone Star Sports EMMY in the Play-by-Play category.

Before joining the Stars, Bogorad served as the play-by-play broadcaster for the Alaska Aces of the ECHL and the Corpus Christi IceRays of the CHL. In 2011 Bogorad was voted ECHL Broadcaster of the Year. He was voted the CHL's Best Broadcaster in 2008, 2009 and 2010. He won the CHL's Communications Executive of the Year Award in 2007.

A native of Los Angeles, Bogorad began his broadcasting career as a sports correspondent on 97.1 FM KLSX. He attended the University of Arizona, where he served as a broadcaster for the school's hockey team. Bogorad and his wife, Andrea, live in Frisco, Texas with their two sons, Mason and Aaron.



**DARYL "RAZOR" REAUGH**  
**COLOR ANALYST**

Daryl Reaugh is in his 27th season on Stars television and radio broadcasts and his 25th as the team's color analyst. For two seasons from 2016-18, Reaugh had served as the team's play-by-play announcer in the wake of Dave Strader's cancer diagnosis. Named by the Sports Business Journal as one of the 2017 Regional Sports Networks Power Players, he moved back to his role as color analyst, for which he has won 12 Lone Star Emmy awards.

Reaugh came to Dallas from the Hartford Whalers, where he served as the color analyst on SportsChannel New England's telecasts during the 1995-96 campaign. He has also demonstrated his expertise on the national stage, having worked with Versus, NBC Sports Network, ABC, ESPN, FOX and CBC's Hockey Night in Canada. Additionally, Reaugh expanded his talents beyond the broadcast booth as he provided the color analyst dialogue and voice for EA Sports' NHL '98 and NHL '99 video games and is active on Twitter: @Razor5Hole and Instagram: @Razor4real.

As a player, Reaugh was a 1984 second-round draft pick of the Edmonton Oilers and his career included stints with both the Oilers and the Hartford Whalers. Prior to turning pro, he was an all-star netminder for the Kamloops Blazers of the Western Hockey League and was named to their 25th Anniversary Team.

## BRIEN REA

### TELEVISION HOST

Brien Rea is in his sixth season with the Stars broadcast team and returns to the host role after spending the previous three as a television analyst. He spent his first three seasons as the host of Stars Live from 2018-21. In 2023, Rea won two Lone Star Emmy awards for Sports Program - Live (Jamie Benn's 1,000th game) and Anchor - Sports Program. Shohara and his wife, Katt, reside in Dallas.




**RINA ZELL**
