THOMAS NATHANIEL IVAN - Coach.

The career of Toronto - born Tommy Ivan in hockey is perhaps typical of the entire Detroit organization. The diminutive, quiet ex-amateur forward who is starting his third season as a National League coach has been hand - tailored for his present capacity by a series of progressive steps just as a player is brought from the amateur ranks through the farm system to the major league.

Ivan, whose playing career as an amateur was shortened by a severe facial injury, first attracted the attention of Scout Carson Cooper, through his handling of a junior team in Brantford. Cooper recommended that Ivan be signed by the Detroit group to handle the coaching of a junior sponsored club at Guelph, and later Brantford. In addition Tommy spent considerable time assisting Cooper in scouting players in lower Ontario.

The war put a temporary end to Ivan's hockey progress, sending him into the Canadian Army as a gunnery instructor. When he was discharged, having kept as active interest in hockey as his service would permit, he was sent to Omaha to handle the Wings' farm club in the newly-organized United States Hockey League.

Here Tommy was reunited with boys whom he had scouted and began his active career as a professional hockey mentor. He piloted the Kinghths to the playoffs, and started such promising players as Gordie Howe on the first rung of the pro ladder. The following fall he moved up to Indianapolis, and in the fall of 1947 was ready for the National League.

His success in two seasons as a National League coach are a matter of record. His team has finished first and second in season schedule play. He has brought the club to the Stanley Cup Finals both years. Players from the Wings, in the two year span, have won six first place posts, two second place positions, and one third place spot on the All Star Teams. Individual players have won the Hart, Byng, and Calder trophies. His teams have equalled the best performances in Detroit's hockey history, in games won, in road play, and in scoring power.

Hockey is Tommy's life. He followed baseball as an entertainment in the off season, and is rated as one of hockey's best golfers. He enjoys musical comedies, smokes only cigarettes and seldom drinks alcohol.

Ivan divides his off - season time between Detroit and Brantford. As is typical of most of players, he is a bachelor. He is a fastidious dresser and is noted for a large and tasteful collection of neckties.

SIDNEY GERALD ABEL - Center.

Born Melville, Saskatchewan, February 22, 1918. Height 5'11". Weight 190 lbs.

To evaluate the coming season for Sid Abel, Captain of the Wings, is tempting the bounds of all prediction. A year ago it was felt that Abel, oldest of Detroit's forwards in both age and seasons of service would be relegated to a utility position.

Instead the black haired Abel came up with his best season in nine years of professional puck chasing. He led the National League in goal scoring, and won himself the Dr. David A. Hart Trophy as the leagues's most valuable player, and at the same time was selected at center on the first All Star Team.

For Abel the season was one of his greatest personal triumphs. He became a 20 goal man for the first time, entered the century club by bagging his 100th goal in big league competition and won a place on the first All Star team for the first time.

In addition to his league awards he was honored by the Detroit Hockey Writers' Association, being chosen the most valuable Red Wing for the second consecutive season, and shared the Gormley Trophy with teammate Ted Lindsay.

That Abel's success was popularly accepted throughout hockey goes without saying. He has been a respected, well liked competitor ever since he turned professional in the fall of 1938. With the exception of two part seasons spent in minor league seasoning, he has worn no uniform but that of the Wings. He had already been selected as a member of Detroit's Hockey Hall of Fame.

Abel is one of the two remaining members of Detroit's last Stanley Cup winning team still on the Wing roster.

What new laurels are ahead for the seemingly tireless and ageless Abel is difficult to say. He is literally idolized by his fellow players, for his spirited leadership, his willingness to coach and inspire youth, and his great zest for the game. This plus his quiet, uncomplaining acceptance of hockey fortunes have make Abel a man marked with the qualities of a Captain.

Off the ice he pursues his career as a salesman for the Springfield Detail and Machine Parts Corporation of Detroit with the same enthusiastic doggedness which have stamped him a player of quality.

He is married, has two children, a son and daughter. His wife, the former Gloria Morandy, is a Detroit girl who was serving as Jack Adams' secretary when the two first met. Abel makes his permanent residence in Detroit, owns a home in a quiet residential section.

Sid enjoys dubbing at golf and playing softball as off season conditioners. He is an avid sports fan, watches baseball closely, and prefers cribbage and gin rummy for card divertissement.

Among the players he is called "Boot", a derivation of his original nickname, "Bootnose" which he received back in 1941.

PETER JOSEPH BABANDO - Left Wing.

Born Braeburn, Pennsylvania. May 10, 1925. Height 5'9". Weight 200 lbs.

Another newcomer to the Detroit squad this season is chunky Pete Babando, a hard skating, high flying left wing, who, because of his physical abilities is regarded as one of the best young players in the league.

Babando, a native of Pennsylvania who moved to Canada at an early age, is one of the few players in the National League born in the United States.

He began his junior career with Galt, Ontario, when the Red Wings sponsored the club there, but even then was a Boston chattel. He started as a defense man, being shifted to the forward line when he turned professional with Hershey, a Boston affiliate, in the fall of 1946.

After a succesful year with the Bears he moved into the big league, and in his freshman season distinguished himself as a 20-goal man. He finished second to Jim McFadden of the Wings in the voting for the Calder Trophy that year.

Last season he tallied 19 goals.

He is of Italian parentage, and spent some time with his mother in Italy when he was a child. Unmarried, he is a baseball catcher in the off season.

STEPHEN BLACK - Left Wing

Born Ft. William, Ontario, March 3, 1927. Height 6'1". Weight 190 lbs.

When the Detroit Red Wings secured this husky left wing from St. Louis in August he was something of a question mark. Black was known as a hard working, powerful forward who had played two years of professional hockey with the Flyers, and had shown steady improvement. He had been highly recommended by members of the Indianapolis club who had opposed him for two seasons.

In camp, the quiet, laughing youngster settled down to work with a vengeance and soon showed that he was bidding for a major league uniform and giving no quarter.

Of Ukranian descent he was christened Stephen Chorniy by his parents, soon translated the name to Black, its English counterpart.

Unmarried, but engaged, he makes his permanent home in Fort William where he works as a brick layer's helper in the off season.

For diversion he is an avid moviegoer, preferring light comedies, and enjoys light reading.

He played junior hockey for Port Arthur Bearcats and spent one year on the Pacific Coast.

GERALD JOSEPH WILFRED ARTHUR COUTURE - Right Wing

Born Saskatoon, Saskatchewan. August 6, 1925. Height 6'2". Weight 185 lbs.

Reporting to the training camp a year ago in the best playing condition of his career, lanky Doc Couture appeared determined to establish himself as a major leaguer. As a result of his determination and ability three years of patient coaching paid off for the Red Wing management, and the big fellow bagged 19 goals to rank with the league's best right handed scorers.

Couture, a find of the late Fred Pinkney, broke into professional hockey by jumping from the Memorial Cup series into the Stanley Cup finals in the Spring of 1945. The following fall he was a full fledged member of the Detroit hockey organization who spent three years alternating between Indianapolis and the Red Wings.

In coming into his own he missed nine games last season by virtue of a shoulder injury and might well have connected for the coveted 20 goals. In the playoffs he was key player in advancing Detroit to the final round.

A sound, rather than a spectacular player, Couture is a good checker, who because of his size is a considerable target for the fans. Lacking particular color in his play he is prone to attract unwarranted criticism.

Doc draws his nickname from his interest in scholastics and the fact that he withdrew from a dental course after two years to pursue his puck chasing.

He follows his family's trade as a baker in Saskatoon in the off season. He is unmarried and is probably the most proficient tennis player among the National Leaguers. An amateur musician, he enjoys listening to the best in popular music.

JAMES ENIO (Enio Gnio Sclisizzi) - Left Wing.

Born Milton, Ontario. August 1, 1925. Height 5'10". Weight 170 lbs.

Scouted before the war by Carson Cooper, and signed to a tryout agreement, this brush cut youngster from Milton finally earned his chance to enter professional hockey in the fall of 1946, following his discharge from the Canadian Army.

Unspectacular he is a sound, workmanlike type of hockey player, one who may never become a great, but who through thorough application to his work may well develop into a handy left wing. He is eager to learn and has displayed a rugged solidity in his play.

He turned professional with Indianapolis in 1946, played the season schedule with the Capitals for two years and was called to Detroit for the final two games of the year in his second season. The following fall he was again in a Capital uniform, but was brought to the parent club to break into the lineup on November 14.

Sliz, as he is nicknamed, finished the year with the Red Wings, scoring 17 points, and establishing himself as player with a definite future.

He agreed to play under the name of Jim Enio (pronounced with a long e) at the start of last season as a natural courtesy to writers and announcers who found the consonant studded Sclisizzi too unorthodox to cope with regularly.

Jim is a bachelor, makes his summer home with his parents in Milton.

LIDIO JOHN FOGOLIN - Left Defense.

Born Fort William, Ontario. February 27, 1926. Height 5'11". Weight 200 lbs.

A hard hitting rookie from Manager Jack Adams, Fogolin completed a natural progression in the Detroit hockey organization by gaining a place on the Red Wings in the middle of last season.

The stocky, blond Italian youngster is typical of the current Red Wings. He joined the Detroit organization when he was 17 years old, played three seasons of junior hockey with Galt, then the Wings' sponsored club in Ontario.

His hard body checking made him a one man gang, and when he turned professional in the fall of 1946 and was sent to Omaha for seasoning and polishing, United States Hockey League newspapermen organized a "meet Fogolin" club of opponents who had been flattened by his hard hitting.

Lee won promotion to Indianapolis the following season, and was called to Detroit as a utility player in the playoffs. He made his debut in the third game of the Wing - Toronto round and spent the night crashing blue shirted players to the ice in a brilliant defensive display.

Last season he was returned to Indianapolis to absorb further coaching from Ott Heller, but was brought into Detroit in mid season, making his debut December 1. Throughout the remainder of the schedule he saw utility duty, learning the tricks of the major league, and endearing himself to the Detroit fans by his derring-do defensive style.

He is strictly a defensive player, has many rough spots still to be smoothed out. But the youngster has definitely won the respect of opposing forwards for his fearlessness and hard bumping.

Fogolin is unmarried, summers with his family at Fort William. He is employed as a tool maker in the off-season.

GEORGE GEE - Center.

Born Stratford, Ontario. June 28, 1922. Height 5'11". Weight 170 lbs.

When lanky George Gee (pronounced with a soft "g") became a member of the Red Wings early last season as part of a five - man trade with the Chicago Black Hawks, little was actually known of the man. He appeared to be a quiet, self - effacing individual who was in his fifth season of National League hockey.

The person who appeared in the Red Wing lineup over the remainder of the year proved to be one of the most brilliant stickhandlers to occupy a Detroit uniform in many seasons. Not a brilliant scorer, Gee is a literal perfectionist in offensive play. For style he is one of the best, yet so mechanically efficient is his play that it excites little comment beyond very close students of the game. He is literally a hockey player's hockey player.

George started in the professional ranks as a Chicago farmhand back in 1941, making his bow with Kansas City in the old American Hockey Association. He then spent three years in the Canadian Army before returning to the Pla-Mors in 1945, following his discharge.

A year later he was elevated to the National League where he has remained ever since. Last fall he and Bud Poile came from the Black Hawks in the deal which sent Jim Conacher, Doug McCaig and Bep Guidolin to Chicago. He played soundly for the Wings, despite a knee injury which sidelined him for nine games and forced his sparing use much of the time. In the playoffs Gee rose to his greatest heights and was a key player.

Gee is married, has one child. He makes his year round home in Detroit and is employed by the Metal Mouldings Corporation. For several previous summers he had played semi - pro baseball.

FRED AUSTIN GLOVER - Right Wing.

Born Toronto, Ontario. January 5, 1928. Height 5'8". Weight 160 lbs.

Advanced to the National League in three years of professional play is quiet, curly haired Fred Glover, another of the many natives of Toronto to reach the big time. Glover began his career in the Detroit hockey organization five years ago with the Galt Juniors, then under Detroit sponsorship.

Following two seasons in the junior ranks he turned professional in the fall of 1947, abandoning his last season of amateur hockey to make the step to the salaried ranks. He was assigned to Mud Bruneteau's Omaha Knights, and after a slow start became one of the top freshmen in the league.

Last fall Glover was promoted to Indianapolis. Again he started off slowly but finished with a rush, topping the club in scoring with 89 points, and finishing among the circuit's ten leading point getters.

He was called to Detroit for a playoff replacement and broke into a few games as a spare right wing. His two way hustle immediately stamped him as a player worthy of a big league opportunity.

This year he will probably see limited fourth line duty, but he is definitely a player to be reckoned with in the future book of young N. H. L. players.

Glover continues to make his home in Toronto in the off - season. He is employed in a warehouse. Fred was married last summer.

GORDON HOWE - Right Wing

Born Floral, Saskatchewan, March 31, 1928. Height 5'11". Weight 185 lbs.

When the coaches of the National League placed husky Gordie Howe on the second All Star Team at the close of the past season, it marked the high point of the rise of the young Westerner in his four year professional hockey career. It also proved a fitting tribute to Howe's mechanical greatness, for the boy, twice injured, played only 40 scheduled games, and was outscored by a number of other right wings.

However close students of the game feel that Howe is mechanically equipped to be the best hockey player in the league today. Strong and rugged he is one of the cleverest stickhandlers to come into the league in 20 years, and his ability to shift his hands on his stick at close range, keeping him always on the forehand, make him a brilliant finisher.

With all of this mechanical ability Howe seldom appears to be pressing. He is a sound skater but seldom gives the impression of speed. He is a good, rugged checker, but seldom appears to be a hard hitter.

Young Gordie, who jumped from Junior hockey to the Omaha Knights when he was but 17 years old, established himself in one year under Coach Tommy Ivan. He moved immediately into the National League a year later and has grown steadily in age, ability, and experience in three years in a Red Wing uniform.

He has already established himself, by his personality, as one of the league's more colorful players. Drawling, almost indolent, and easy going, his rather philosophic comments have endeared him to his teammates and local press as a top humorist.

Gordie returns to Saskatoon in the off season, making his home with his parents. He is unmarried. A strong believer in condition he plays considerable softball in the summer, has begun to compete in golf.

Last season curiously, he reached the high point of his career in the first playoff round after All Star selections had been made. With a scoring splurge which made him the top point - getter of the playoffs he almost singlehandedly eliminated Canadiens.

LEONARD PATRICK KELLY - Left Defense

Born Simcoe, Ontario, June 9, 1927. Height 5'11". Weight 180 lbs.

Unlike so many athletes Red Kelly definitely escaped the second year jinx. The sorrell - topped youngster who jumped directly from junior hockey at Toronto St. Michaels' to the National League gained stature last year, and by a brilliant finish established himself as one of the club's key players.

Kelly, who appears definitely headed for stardom in the big show without even a minor league pause, was an all around man, filling in regularly on defense, and playing several games at center and left wing, positions he had also filled in his junior days.

Len is a hockey anachronism. His fiery red hair, Irish name, and face would make him a player likely to be a bumptious, fighting type of lad. Instead his play is deliberate enough to stamp him as a 10 - year veteran, and he has proved to be one of the coolest recruits ever to come into the league.

In fact many observers feel that Kelly would rate All Star consideration were he not on a defense studded with such luminaries as Stewart and Quackenbush. He is a brilliant stickhandler, a sound blocker, an excellent finisher, and is without a peer in carrying the puck with his skates. He has more facility in that department than many erstwhile big leaguers have with their sticks.

Off the ice Kelly's personality is identical with his competitive self. The same deliberation and coolness, modest, and quiet demeanor belied by his colorful appearance are keynotes of him. He is noted for never having used profane expression, but can speak volumes with a "gosh ding". He neither smokes nor drinks, is unmarried, and spends his summers on his family's tobacco farm outside of Simcoe.

ROBERT BLAKE THEODORE LINDSAY - Left Wing

Born Renfrew, Ontario, July 29, 1925. Height 5'8". Weight 165 lbs.

Only a shoulder injury which kept him on the sidelines for a ten game stretch prevented Lindsay from leading the National League goal scorers for the second consecutive season. As it was Ted yielded that honor to his linemate, Sid Abel, and still wound up in a four way tie for second place despite the ten game handicap.

Lindsay was placed on the second All Star Team, after having made the first squad the preceding season, but many observers feel that the only factor preventing his reappearance was his injury enforced absence.

The injury was the most serious one of Lindsay's five year National League career. Despite his size and aggressive attitude, the swashbuckling gamecock had missed only nine games in four previous seasons.

Ted's great value lies in his two-way ability. He is regarded as one of the best defensive forwards in the league, and offensively he has compiled 187 points in five years as a Red Wing 110 of them goals. With Abel he passed the 100-goal mark last season, and became the eighth player in Detroit hockey history to achieve that total in a Wing uniform.

Scouted by Carson Cooper, Lindsay made the jump directly from Toronto St. Michael's Junior club to the National League in the fall of 1944 at the age of 19.

He has won a host of team awards in his five years as a Red Wing, receiving the Frank J. Murphy Memorial Trophy, and the Detroit Hockey Writers' Trophy each once, and has captured the Gormley Trophy twice.

Unmarried, he is regarded as one of the club's most eligible bachelors. He makes his off season home with his parents in Kirkland Lake, Ontario. Originally he and Toronto's Gus Mortson were partners in a gold mining venture, but in the past two summers Lindsay has done little prospecting. His father, one of the great goal tenders of hockey's early days, keeps an active interest in hockey through son Ted and has contributed several worthwhile suggestions to the development of equipment.

HARRY LUMLEY - Goalkeeper

Born Owen Sound, Ontario. November 11, 1926. Height 5'11". Weight 190 lbs.

Youngest goalie ever to play regularly in the National League, Lumley is starting his sixth season in the Red Wing nets at the age of 23. A husky, powerful youngster with a strong pair of hands, Harry appears destined for a long and successful career. Maturity and experience should enable him to realize his full potential as a major league net minder.

Lumley is a difficult player to rate. Benefitted by an iron clad defense of all star proportions in front of him, he is perhaps underrated because of the caliber of his teammates. He is a streak goalie, and in a hot period ranks with the best.

Last season was his best in the National League. He remained, for the second straight season, in contention until the very end of the year for the Vezina Trophy, finally being edged out. However considering the experience he has already absorbed, he could well equal Durnan's record in a long career.

Scouted by Carson Cooper, Harry joined the Red Wings in March, 1943, as a practice goalie as the Detroit team was on a successful march to the Stanley Cup. The following fall at the age of 17, he was the regular net guardian for Indianapolis, played a few games with the Wings. He returned to Indianapolis at the start of the 1944 - 45 campaign, was recalled to Detroit in December and installed as regular goalie, a position he has since not vacated.

Having been injured at the close of the 1946 - 47 season and forced to undergo surgery there was some fear that his career might have been cut short, but he returned to action better than ever before.

Harry makes his home with his family in Owen Sound in the summer. He plays baseball and lacrosse as a conditioner, and is employed as an automobile salesman. He is a bachelor with an eye for a well turned ankle. Lum is the best cigar smoker on the club, likes popular music, most any card game, and is an avid movie-goer.

GEORGE CLARE MARTIN - Right Defense

Born Waterloo, Ontario. February 25, 1922. Height 5'10". Weight 185 lbs.

Newest arrival on the Red Wing rear guard is hard hitting Clare Martin, regarded as one of the toughest defense players to come into the National League. The 27 year old Martin has been in professional hockey since 1941, barring a three year hitch in the Canadian Navy.

He turned professional late in the 1941 - 2 campaign, finishing that season with the Bruins and playing six games. The next year he began his meritorious Navy career, which ended with his honorable discharge in 1945. Returning to hockey he was placed with the Boston Olympics of the Eastern Amateur Hockey League, moving to Hershey the following fall.

Clare was promoted to the Bruins at the end of the season, just before playoff time, but worked only as a utility rear guard and did not see much competition. In 1947 he began his only full season of big league play, showing a hard shot and his devastating body checking.

Last season he suffered a knee injury during the training season which required surgery. As a result he was returned to Hershey for the year. He was the Bears' key player and was credited by their players and opponents alike with directing the club to the playoff finals.

Martin's body checking has become known throughout hockey, and it is felt that given a full opportunity he will hit as hard and as often as any man in the game.

He makes his off season home in Waterloo where he plays baseball to keep in shape.

JAMES ALEXANDER McFADDEN- Center

Born Belfast, Ireland. April 15, 1921. Height 5'7". Weight 180 lbs.

Stocky black-haired McFadden, a native of Belfast, Ireland, is the only member of the current Red Wing squad born outside of the confines of continental North America.

Unlike most big leaguers who start young with a professional organization and work their way in to the National League, McFadden broke in at the relatively old age of 26. At the time of reaching the big show he had two seasons of professional hockey under his belt, one of them back in 1940 when he played in the old Pacific Coast League before beginning a long stint in the Canadian Armed Service.

The young wheat farmer who makes Darlingford, Manitoba his home attracted attention of hockey observers during the war by his strong play on service teams, and finally crashed the salaried ranks in the middle of the 1946-47 campaign when Buffalo weaned him away from the Ottawa Senators.

McFadden was purchased by the Red Wings in time for playoff delivery, Buffalo having been eliminated from further competition. He played three games of the first round against Toronto, and the following season won a regular berth and by a brilliant 24 goal effort won the Calder Trophy as the rookie of the year and became the first Detroit player to gain that trophy.

Last season he failed to reach his previous peak, but still proved a handy forward. A sound forechecker he was especially valuable as a defensive forward when the Wings were shorthanded.

He is a dark-complexioned, quiet, laughing Celt with a slightly high voice. A bachelor he divided the off season between barnstorming with a softball team and his Manitoba wheat acreage.

MAXWELL DOUGLAS McNAB - Center

Born Watson, Saskatchewan, July 2, 1924. Height 6'2". Weight 170 lbs.

Completing his first full season as a Red Wing Max McNab was again dogged by the injury jinx which has hampered him since he first appeared in the Red Wing camp. An amateur teammate of Doc Couture and Pat Lundy, McNab's entry into the professional hockey picture was delayed by his service in the Canadian Navy. He reported in Detroit in September, 1946, and was found to be suffering from anemia. As a result he opened the season with a team in the International Amateur Hockey League while being treated. He eventually found his way to Omaha and turned in an outstanding half-season.

The following year he started as a utility forward with the Wings but was used so sparingly that it was decided to return him to Omaha for regular work. In his second game with the Knights he fractured his nose, but still performed often enough to score 44 goals and 32 assists. Recalled by the Wings at playoff time he turned in an outstanding performance in the final round against Toronto.

Last season he began as center on the club's number one line. However he fractured a small bone in his hand which forced him to the sidelines, and had scarcely returned when he suffered a slight shoulder separation. Despite this run of ill fortune he bagged 10 goals and 13 assists. He showed strength at the end of the season and is a player who is counted upon to be a key factor in the future plans of the Wings.

Max makes his home in Saskatoon in the off season. He is unmarried, works for a local construction firm.

Slated for increased duty and possible stardom in the coming season is husky, black haired Marty Pavelich. Pavelich, the hard going eager beaver, had his appendix removed during the past summer and will report for his third season of major league hockey in the best shape of his career.

The Italian youngster bypassed his final season of junior competition in order to turn professional with Indianapolis in the fall of 1948. Before the season was half spent he had won promotion to the National League, and his willing, aggressive play had stamped him as a player to be watched.

Last year he spent the entire season in a Wing uniform. He was a tireless worker, spending many hours in private practice of skating and shooting. Eager to gain as much experience as possible he played several games at center and right wing when injuries shortened the Detroit roster.

One of the more personable of the Red Wings, he is noted for his piercing humor and his love of dancing, which ranks only behind hockey and baseball in his affections.

Pavelich is one of Canada's better softball catchers, but was forced to limit his baseball activities to managing last summer due to his operation. He is unmarried and makes his off season home with his parents in his native city. He worked as a beverage distributor.

When the Red Wing organization finally completed a trade which brought Jim Peters into the fold this fall it completed years of planning for Manager Jack Adams.

Adams had first been attracted to the lanky right winger in an exhibition game between the Red Wings and the Canadian Army team at Kingston in 1944. At that time, Peters, who had one season of minor league hockey under his belt, was the property of the Canadiens.

Following his three year hitch in the service Jim returned to professional hockey and jumped right into the National League. He spent two and a half years with the Montreal club, being traded to Boston for Joe Carveth midway in the 1947 - 48 campaign.

Jim has spent a season and a half with the Bruins, and in his four years as a major leaguer has established himself as a very sound two way hockey player, a sound checker, and a dogged if not brilliant forward.

Last season he reached his heights as a goal producer, registering 16 times. In all he has bagged 51 goals in his four years in N. H. L. competition.

LEO CHARLES REISE, JR. - Right Defense

Born Stony Creek, Ontario. June 7, 1922. Height 6'. Weight 190 lbs.

Physically the biggest of the Red Wings, Reise was regarded by many as the most improved player on the squad last season. A sound, rugged blocker who is primarily a defensive rear guard he contributed very valuable points to the scoring column in both regular schedule and playoff games. His chief goal was the one which broke a 1 - 1 tie in the seventh game of the first playoff round and sent the Wings past Montreal into the Stanley Cup Finals.

Reise is the first second generation player to become a top flight National Leaguer in his own right, following in the footsteps of his father who spent some years on defense for N. H. L. teams 30 years ago.

Leo came to Detroit in a trade with Chicago. He had turned professional with the Hawks following his service in the Canadian Army, and had spent most of his pro career with Kansas City. At the time of the trade he had just been farmed out for the second time. As the trade involved Pete Horeck and himself from Chicago for Adam Brown and Ray Powell, he has emerged as the most valuable of the four players.

He was moved to Indianapolis, but within two weeks was in a Red Wing uniform to stay.

Off the ice he is one of the most scholarly of the Wings. He is an avid card player, enjoys classical music with a discerning ear, and has a penetrating humor. He is married, has one son, Lec Gerald. During the past summer he traveled for a manufacturer of heating equipment.

JOHN SHERRATT STEWART - Left Defense

Born Pilot Mound, Manitoba. May 6, 1917. Height 5'10½". Weight 180 lbs.

When Jack Stewart, oldest member of the Red Wings in point of service, was selected at left defense on the National League All Star Team at the close of the 1948 - 49 campaign it marked his fourth consecutive appearance on either the first or second aggregation. In addition it was the fifth time in his career that Stewart had been selected as an All Star and gives him the distinction of having received more All Star mentions than any other Detroit player in the club's history.

Throughout his long service in the N. H. L., this being his tenth year with the Wings, Stewart has been rated as one of the toughest body checkers the game has ever known. He is already a member of Detroit's Hockey Hall of Fame, and was the first defense player in the National League to win All Star rating under the changed rules, both before and after the advent of the center red line.

It took Stewart a year and a half with Pittsburgh, then Detroit's minor league affiliate, to win his way to the majors, but once he arrived, during the middle of the 1938 - 39 campaign, he has remained, barring two years service in the Royal Canadian Air Force.

Because of his great power Stewart is regarded as the policeman of the club on the ice, and he is the avenger of wrongs done to younger or smaller members of the Wings.

Not a prolific scorer, he manages to bag an occasional goal, and his scores are usually crucial ones.

Long hailed as one of sport's most eligible bachelors, he was married last Spring.

His permanent home is on his family's large wheat farm at Pilot Mound. He plays softball to keep in shape, and takes an avid interest in harness racing.

He is noted for his silence and unexpected flashes of laconic wit.
