## On RADIO

All 74 of the St. Louis BLUES' NHL games will be carried on Station KMOX (CBS). Jack Buck, KMOX sports director, who also handles the Dallas Cowboys of the National Football League and the St. Louis Baseball Cardinals, will be the play-by-play voice of the BLUES. Gus Kyle, former New York Ranger defenseman, will provide the color commentary during the BLUES' entire 1967-68 season. The BLUES' radio sponsors are: the Kroger Company, Kas Potato Chips, Pepsi-Cola, and Hunter Packing.

## On TELEVISION

A minimum of 12 color telecasts of the St. Louis BLUES' regular season games will be carried on KPLR-TV (channel 11). Jay Randolph, the versatile Football Cardinals and soccer Stars' voice on KMOX radio, will be the BLUES' video play-by-play commentator. Bob Ingham will handle the color.

## THE BIRTH OF...The Blues

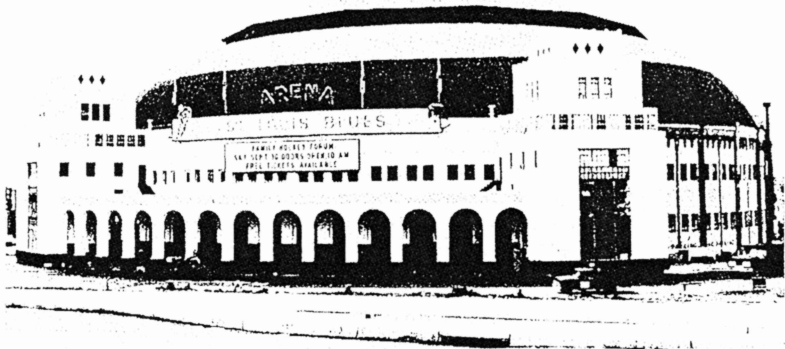
On April 6, 1966, the Board of Governors of the National Hockey League granted a big league hockey franchise to a group of local businessmen headed by sportsman Sidney Salomon, Jr. The announcement that St. Louis was to once more appear in the big time of hockey beginning in October, 1967, triggered much enthusiasm in a town that has been long awaiting the return of a team of its own to local ice. Even though the Chicago Black Hawks' young CPHL club has battled through five successful years in the Gateway City, the dreams of this community's hockey enthusiasts, dating back to the departure of the Flyers of the American Association in 1953, have been to have a NHL club wear St. Louis colors.

Obtaining the franchise for St. Louis was a long and tedious process that saw Sidney Salomon, Jr., and his son, Sid III, travel many air miles to have their appeal heard by each of the present NHL governors. Besides the two million dollar entry fee, the key to a successful venture was purchasing the St. Louis Arena, then owned and operated by Arthur Wirtz and the late James Norris. This dowager spinster of Oakland Avenue, situated across from St. Louis' famed Forest Park, was believed to be the finest building in the world when it was dedicated on September 24, 1929. Since the same group that comprised the building's ownership also controlled the Chicago Black Hawks, the Governors of the NHL deemed its acquisition a necessity. Before April, 1966, was a day old, the Salomon group had closed a deal on the structure for the healthy sum of four million dollars.

Since April, 1966, the organization, comprised of Sidney Salomon, Jr., his son, Sid III, four company presidents and two corporate chairmen of the board has quickly formed a working nucleus of personnel. Hiring a general manager to head up hockey, obtaining a building manager to run the Arena, staffing a ticket department as well as publicity and advertising personnel soon was accomplished. In bits and pieces, the organizing of a huge business began to take shape.

The group soon found itself faced with many tasks ranging from creating uniform designs, to ticket prices. Calling on help from the League, their fellow NHL partners, the BLUES began putting the pieces together. Players were drafted, signed and brought to St. Louis. Travel arrangements and accommodations covering thousands of air miles were made. From a dream, a thought — initiative, a franchise was born.

Appropriately named from William C. Handy's melodic tune that immortalized the riverfront metropolis that it now represents — the St. Louis Hockey Blues are a reality.



## The NEW LOOK Arena

Take a magnificently constructed building that seats 14,000 plus people with an unimpaired sight line . . . Add to it an array of modern improvements, including a complete face-lifting both inside and out . . . Toss in improved parking facilities, a new private club room, plus an exquisite paint job and you have a sports palace comparable to the best around the country . . . You are also describing the "new look" Arena in St. Louis.

The building located at 5700 Oakland Avenue, across from beautiful Forest Park has been the subject of a mammoth improvement program. The end result depicts a "miracle" of what hard work, heavy planning and insight can do.

New concession stands, improved rest rooms, a refurbished press box, the private Arena Club, an exquisite Walnut Room, are all part of the new marvelous showcase — The St. Louis Arena.

The front of the building is a gleaming white trimmed in gold and old brick, highlighted by a unique and colorful sign, announcing the "Home of the BLUES". The lobby has been widened with ticket windows moved inside, the inner Arena is decked with bright blue walls, highlighted by pennants and boasting of Navy blue theatre-type seats installed in the Box and Parquet Sections. A multi-purpose, modern score clock makes its appearance in the center of the rink — which is now a new ice facility — surrounded by spanking new hockey dashers and clear shatter-proof plexi-glass. The lighting system has been improved. A new ice resurfacing machine (Zamboni) stands ready to do its job.

On the outside, the area has been repaved and brightly lit. New exits and entrances have been added to the parking lot as well as the building.

A showplace . . . a magnificent edifice . . . a pride for St. Louisans . . . the "new look" Arena is now all of these things.

## SIDNEY SALOMON, JR.

Chairman of the Board  
President



Sidney Salomon, Jr., investor, sportsman and insurance executive, now holds the reins of St. Louis' newest major league attraction, the St. Louis Hockey Blues. Mr. Salomon will serve as president of the group behind St. Louis' National Hockey League entry, which also includes his son Sid III, four company presidents and two corporate chairmen of the board.

Salomon's interest in sports dates to his undergraduate days as an athlete at Culver Military Academy. After completing his education there, he joined the staff of the now defunct St. Louis Times, where he covered principally golf and basketball. The early 1940's and 50's found Sid, Jr. sharing in the ownership of this City's baseball clubs, serving on the board of directors of the St. Louis Cardinals and later as executive vice president of the former American League Browns. In 1955, Salomon purchased the Syracuse club of the International League, and brought them to life in Florida as the Miami Marlins.

An excellent amateur golfer, Salomon's career as an active and respected public servant was recently highlighted by his election to the Missouri Academy of Squires. Along with other capacities, Sid Salomon, Jr. has at one time been an executive assistant to the late Postmaster General Robert Hannegan, treasurer for the Democratic National Committee, chairman of fund raising drives in two mayoralty campaigns, and a member of Appellate Judicial commission for the St. Louis Court of Appeals District.



## SID SALOMON III

Executive Vice President  
Governor, National Hockey League

A "self-styled sports nut" is what the New York Journal American labeled Sid Salomon III shortly after the National Hockey League had awarded the National Hockey League franchise to a group headed by his dad, insurance executive Sidney Salomon, Jr. All the members of his St. Louis County household, his wife Carol, and their three children, Sid IV, Tim and Patti, will also attest to this description. A Twenty-nine year old native St. Louisian, Sid's already busy business schedule has been further complicated by his many executive sports capacities.

Sid, a former Commissioner on the Missouri State Athletic Commission and one time Assistant General Manager of the Miami Marlins Baseball Club, now finds himself in a new role, that of Executive Vice President of the St. Louis Blues National Hockey League Club. Young Sid's avid interest in sports has helped him become one of the state's finest amateur golfers, winning tournaments since his high school days at St. Louis Country Day.

In his active position as Secretary of the Golden Strand Motel, Sid often finds himself returning to the city of Miami, Florida where he was a student at Miami University and a member of Zeta Beta Tau fraternity.

A recipient of the Distinguished Service Award by the Mid St. Louis Jaycees, Sid III has followed his father's career footsteps by holding down the vice presidency in their successful insurance business, Sidney Salomon, Jr. and Associates. In spite of his many varied activities, young Sid has made insurance's Million Dollar Round Table — selling over one million dollars of insurance every year — ever since he joined his father's insurance firm at the age of 22.

## LYNN PATRICK

General Manager,  
Coach



Lynn Patrick, who began his pro career over thirty-two years ago on the ice of the St. Louis Arena, now returns to this city as General Manager of its new National Hockey League entry, the St. Louis Blues. Born in Victoria, British Columbia in 1912, Patrick stems from a famous hockey family. Lynn's father was the late Lester Patrick, immortal "Silver Fox" who for many years was player, coach, and manager for the Rangers. Brother Muzz and Uncle Frank both featured the sparkling hockey tradition of the Patrick clan.

With 2½ years out for military service, Lynn played with the New York Rangers from 1934 to 1946, being selected to the first All-star team in 1941-42 and the second team the next season. These two years were his most productive as he racked up 54 and 61 points, respectively.

In the spring of 1946 Patrick renewed acquaintances with St. Louis, this time as coach of New Haven, a club competing with the Flyers in the American League. From 1948 to 1950 Lynn reappeared on the National Hockey League scene as coach of the New York Rangers. In 1950 he began fifteen years with the Boston Bruin organization, serving as coach, vice-president and general manager. Prior to his appointment to the top slot with the Blues, he worked as the general manager and coach of the Los Angeles Blades of the Western League.

Upon selecting Lynn, Sidney Salomon, Jr., president of St. Louis' newborn club stated, "We wanted the best man in hockey and somebody who can put the best possible team on the ice in 1967. We believe we have him."



WILLIAM "SCOTTY" BOWMAN  
Assistant General Manager  
Assistant Coach

Although a young man — just 32 — Scott Bowman has under his belt years of valuable hockey experience that has earned him respect of all the officials around the League. Voted Coach of the Year in Junior Circuit, a scout and director of amateur personnel for the Canadiens, Bowman's front office background is an invaluable asset for the BLUES. His ability to bring along young athletes, as well as to evaluate talent, will play a giant role in the success of the new NHL club.

FRANK MARIO  
Director of Player Personnel

Frank Mario, a veteran of 14 years coaching experience, is Director of Player Personnel for the St. Louis Blues. Frank faces the all-important task of building the BLUES' farm system.

Mario, a center with Boston and Hershey during his playing days, leaves the Toronto organization after spending the last two seasons as coach of their Western Hockey League affiliate, Victoria. He had previously guided clubs in all Canadian amateur categories, coaching Regina and Peterboro Juniors as well as Cornwall Seniors.



TOM WOODCOCK  
Head Trainer

Tommy Woodcock, thirty-two, joins the BLUES after having spent the past seven years as trainer for Brown University. While at Brown, Tommy handled football, hockey, baseball and track. A former minor league hockey player, Woodcock has also served as Head Trainer with Rhode Island's Continental Football League entry.



CLIFF FLETCHER  
Chief Eastern Canadian Scout

Cliff Fletcher has spent ten years in the Montreal Canadian system. Learning under Sam Pollak, Cliff served as coach and scout in the HABS farm system. Only 32, Fletcher possesses a wide front-office background. Operating from his home in Montreal, Fletcher has been responsible for many of the BLUES' young 'finds.'



WAYNE COOPER  
Publicity Director

Wayne Cooper, is a journalism graduate from Tulane University. A long-time resident of the local area, Cooper is a former sales and advertising account executive. Thirty-one years old, Wayne is responsible for the BLUES' publications, including the Guide and the home-game magazine. He is also in charge of the club's press relations.



GUS KYLE  
Director of Sales

Gus Kyle is best known by St. Louisans as the former coach of the St. Louis Braves of the CPHL. An outstanding backliner, Kyle played under BLUES' General Manager Lynn Patrick in New York and Boston. A great student of the game, Gus not only serves as the BLUES' ticket director, but also lends his valuable observations on KMOX's broadcasts of all BLUES' games.

## ALGER ARBOUR

Born, Sudbury, Ont., November 1, 1932  
Defense . . . Shoots left . . . 6'1", 180 lbs.  
Last amateur club: Windsor Spitfires (Jrs.)

Al Arbour is a man who has been pegged by the majority of NHL goalies as the best defenseman in Hockey.

One of the few players to wear glasses, the bespectacled Arbour is a veteran of over 395 NHL games in a 15-year pro career.

A master at blocking shots, Arbour's gift of choking off the opposition has earned his three AHL first team All-star berths in as many years and twice a runner-up and once a winner in the voting for the Eddie Shore plaque as the American League's Outstanding Defenseman.

Al's shifty maneuvers while carrying the puck deep in his own end of the rink, his blocking of shots and effective tying up of opposing forwards has made him a favorite with the fans.

Arbour hardly knows what it is like to be on a losing club—he's been in the playoffs in every one of his 15 years as a pro. Al, who is engaged in the construction business in Sudbury, Ontario during off season, has caused the paraphrase, "Never try passes past the guy with the glasses."

## RONALD ATTWELL

Born, Humber Summit, Ont., February 9, 1935

Right wing . . . Shoots right . . . 6'2", 208 lbs.

Last amateur club: Montreal Canadiens (Jrs.)

Ron Attwell's strength and stamina have been the key to his success. Big for a center ice man "Toby" tips the scale at 205 pounds on his 6' 3" frame.


A smooth-working forward who knows his job on the ice and does it well, Ron was acquired by the BLUES from the Cleveland Barons of the AHL in a post-draft maneuver.

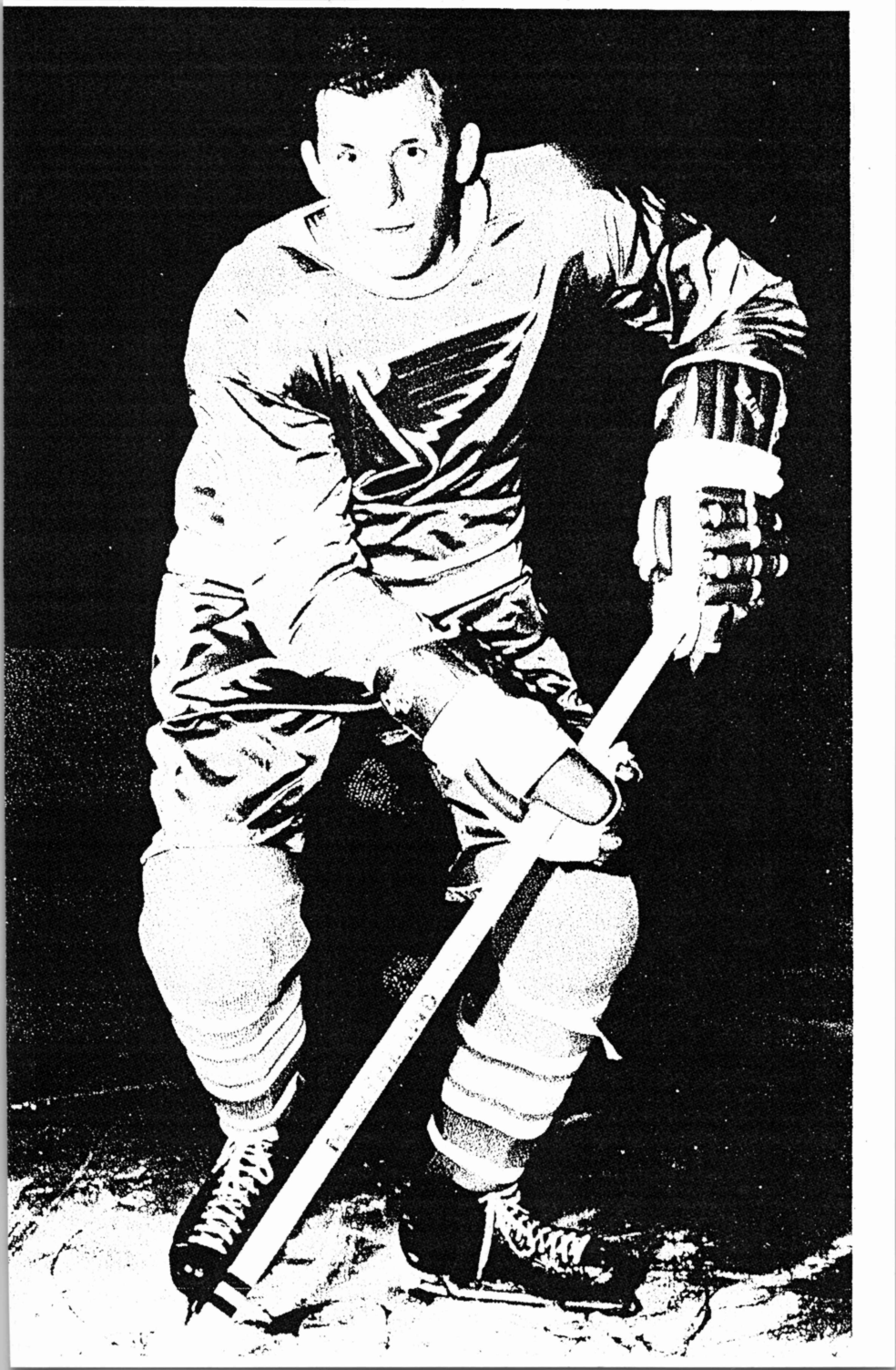
A member of Cleveland's squad six out of his past seven hockey season's, Attwell was one of the Baron's top playmakers. His alert thinking on the ice was especially noted in the 1961-62 AHL season when his 55 assists sparkled an 83 point career high.

Usually a mild-mannered type of player, Attwell lets it be known that he has two good fists when opposition players take advantage of his good nature.

An above-average golfer as well as a fine baseball player, Ron was a member of the BLUES' team that finished fourth in this summer's NHL golf tournament.

Ron makes his home in Sundridge, Ontario, with his wife Betty, two boys and a girl.

## **NORMAN BEAUDIN**

Right wing . . . Shoots right  
5' 8", 170 lbs.

Last amateur club:

Regina Patricia (Jrs.)

A six-year pro, Norm Beaudin is a young man who is beginning to make his mark.

Norm's greatest ability is scoring and last year, score, he did. His 39 goals for Memphis was the best in the CPHL. To this total Beaudin added 37 assists — a big reason why the Wings climbed out of the league's basement to make last season's Central League playoffs.

A twenty-five-year-old winger, who has constantly been able to put the puck in the net, Norm turned pro with Hull-Ottawa in 1962 after being voted the most valuable player of his Regina Pats Junior Club.

A top-point getter, a clever man with the stick, this Western Canadian will be getting his first NHL ice time with the BLUES.

Norm, his wife Linda and their son and daughter live in Regina, Sask., where he starred as a junior.

## **JOHN BRENNEMAN**

Left wing . . . Shoots left . . . 5' 10", 175 lbs.

Last amateur club: St. Catharines (Jrs.)

Fast as lightning — a crowd pleaser with great potential, John Brenneman is no stranger to St. Louis hockey fans.

In his first full pro year, John played with the St. Louis Braves in the 1963-64 season. Then only twenty years old, the speedy rookie tallied 28 goals, 47 assists in a terrific 75 point year.

In 1964-65, Brenneman was given a shot with the parent Blackhawks, but before the year was up, he went to the Rangers with Doug Robinson and Wayne Hillman in exchange for four New Yorkers.

Now only twenty-four, John has appeared in over 90 NHL contests seeing action last year with the Stanley Cup champs, Toronto Maple Leafs.

Popular as a Brave, John will be given an NHL opportunity once more, this time with the BLUES on Arena ice . . . the scene of his best season to date.

**Last amateur club: Weyburn Juniors**


The BLUES made a real steal when they drafted young baby-faced Don Caley from Pittsburgh and the Detroit Red Wing organization.

Don, appearing in 20 games with the Hornets in his first pro year, joined the club after being voted the most valuable player on his Weyburn Red Wings of the Saskatchewan Junior League. He was also voted to the league's All-star team.

Patterning his play after his idol, Terry Sawchuk, Caley uses a similar type catching mitt as well as a special stick patented by the NHL great.

A stand-up type goaler, young Caley also came up with a gimmick of his own. Don attaches a thick wad of tape to his hockey stick to serve as a warning device so that he won't crouch too low.

Twenty-one and single, Don, who enjoys music and reading, makes his home in Dauphin, Manitoba.





## TERRY CRISP

Born, Parry Sound, Ont., May 28, 1943

Center . . . Shoots left . . . 5' 8", 177 lbs.

Last amateur club: Niagara Falls (Jrs.)

Hustle is the best word to use in describing the 5' 8", 177 lb. center, Terry Crisp.

Completing his fourth year as a pro, Terry spark-plugged a top Oklahoma City CPHL unit last season, racking up 31 goals and 42 assists. His 73 points put him among the league's top ten point getters.

A hardworking forward, Terry is a scrapper from one end of the rink to the other. He makes up for any deficiencies by sheer determination.

Noted as a good checker, Crisp turned pro in 1963 after a fine season with the Niagara Falls Flyers Junior A Club. A fiery competitor, Crisp is a leader off the ice as well as in action — a big asset for the youngster in his first full NHL season with the BLUES.

Enjoying golf during the off season, Terry was born in Parry Sound, Ontario, and now makes his home with his wife Sheila in St. Marys, Ontario.

## DARRYL EDESTRAND

Last amateur club: London Jr. "A"

There are going to be many new names heard from in the NHL's 1967 expansion season . . . Darryl Edestrand has the potential to be one of them.

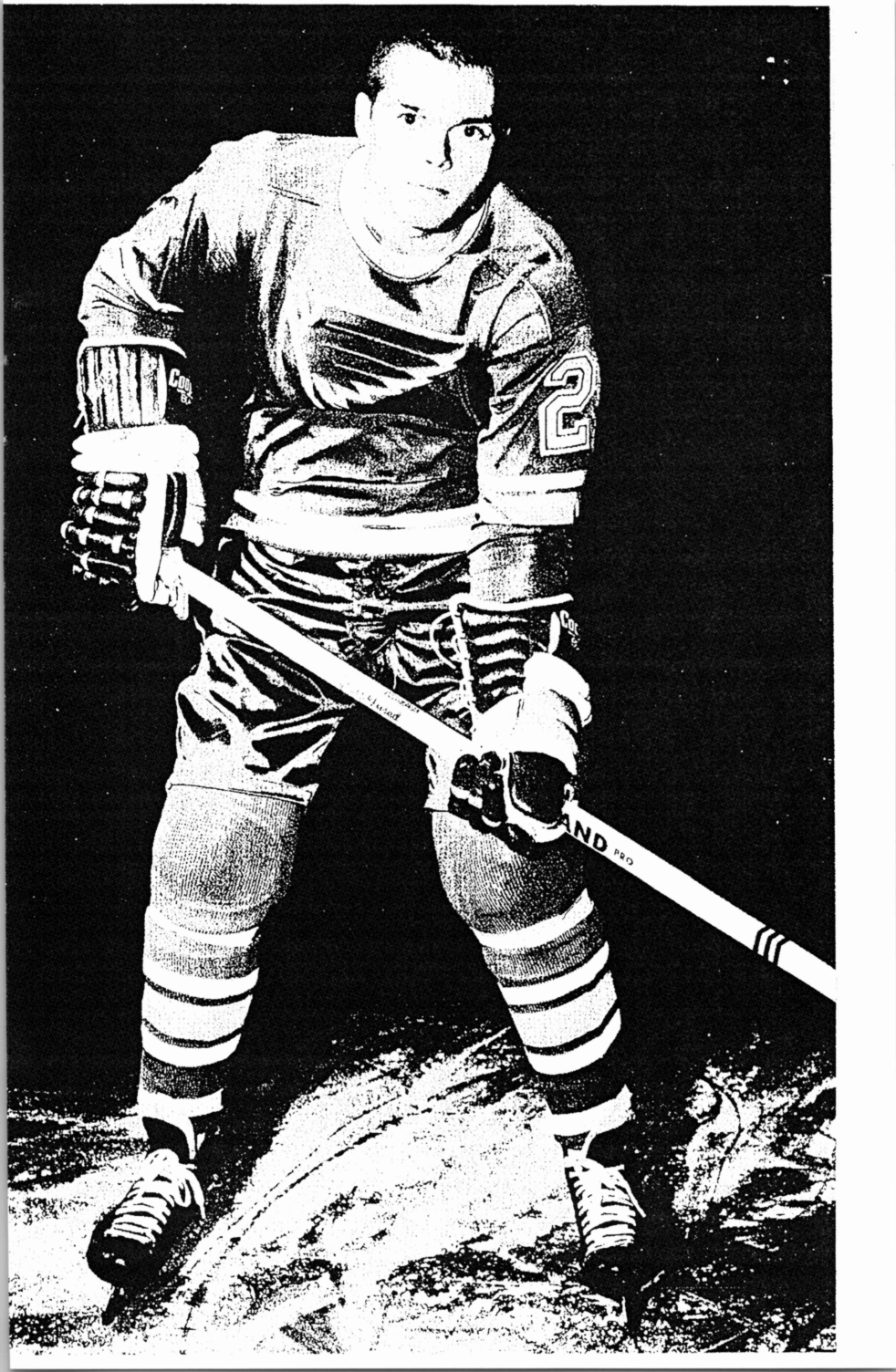
Last year an injury suffered in a freak accident during the seventh game of the American Hockey League season with Rochester slowed down the progress of young Edestrand. Darryl was beginning only his 24th game as a pro.

At 21, the 5' 11", 175 lb. rear guard, joins the BLUES after a promising amateur career. Edestrand was an All-Star selection in both Jr. B and Jr. A categories with teams in London, Ontario. He was twice selected as his league's top defenseman as well as ranking as its highest scoring backliner.

Darryl turned pro carrying a "tough guy" image having once been suspended for fighting. Although he doesn't look for trouble, Edestrand won't turn his back when it comes his way as his abbreviated AHL career has shown.

Edestrand is a stock car fan, serves as a pitman in races in London, Ontario, where he makes his home with his wife, Pat.

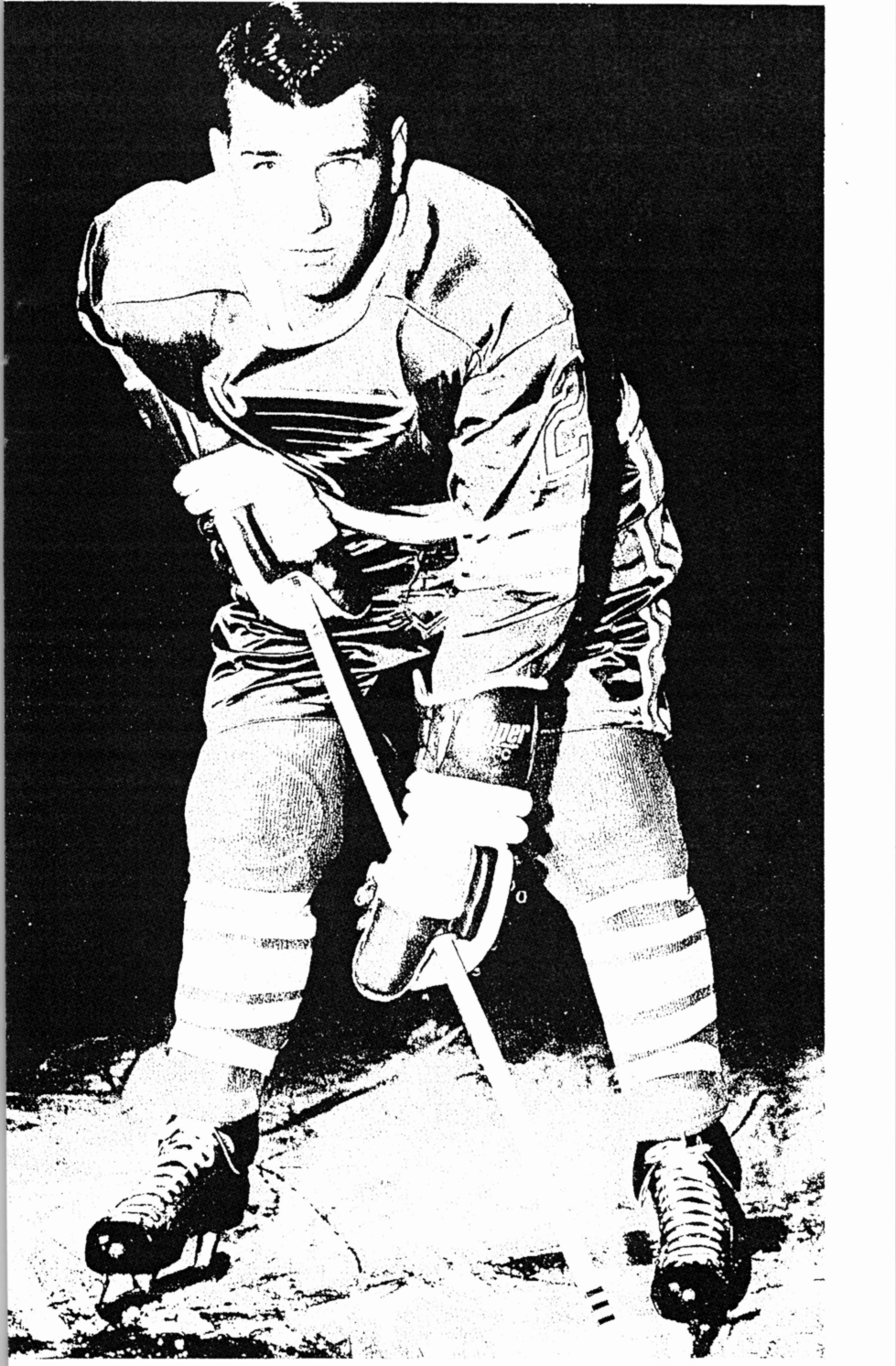
Fred Hucul is a born leader on and off the ice. He has the ability to know when to hit and is an above-average stick handler.

A competent worker, a potential leader, a good skater — all these credentials came to the BLUES when Bill McCreary was acquired from the Montreal organization.



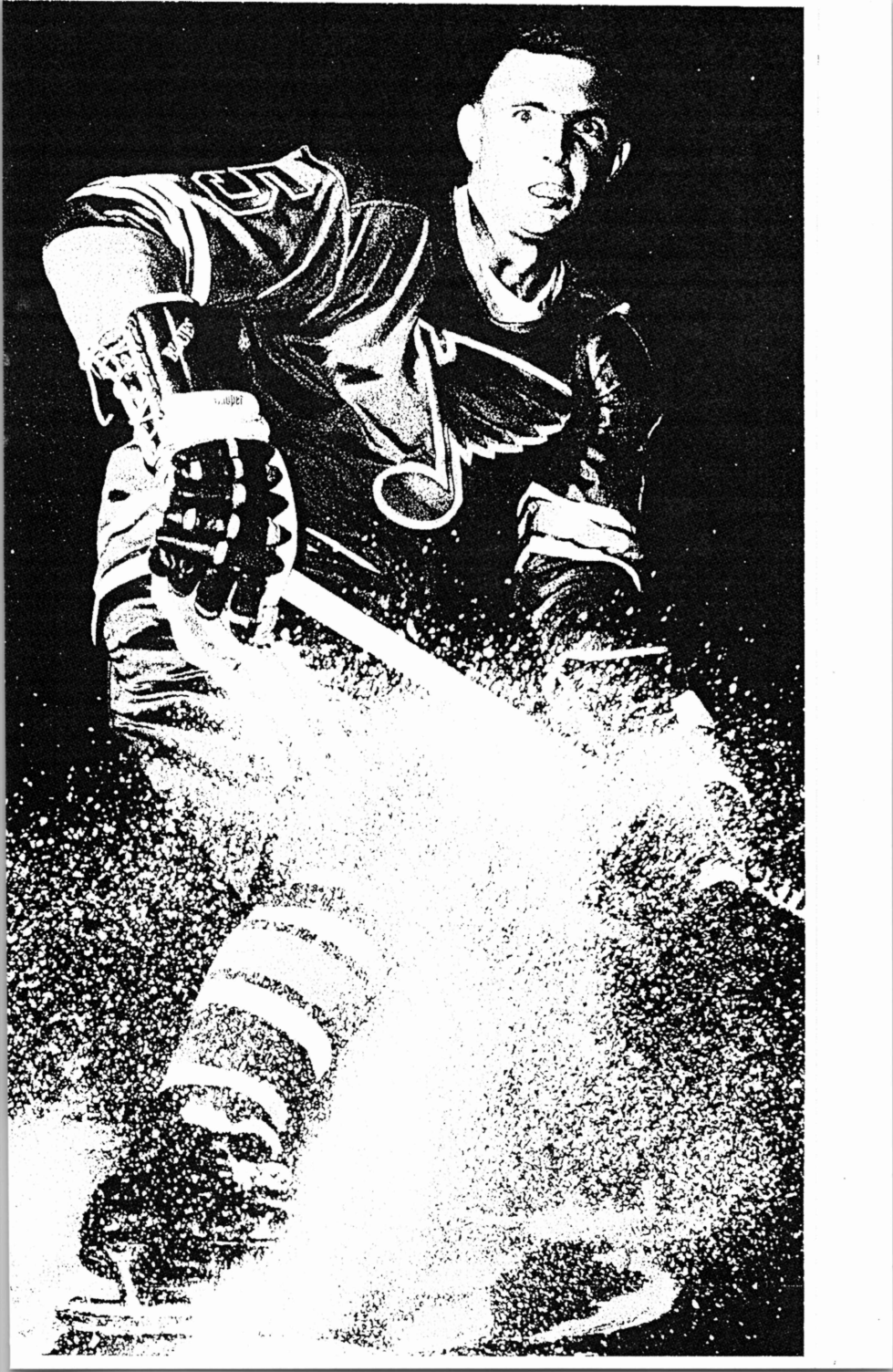
His potential leadership tag was borne out when two seasons ago he found himself the youngest coach in pro hockey, ramrodding the CPHL Houston Apollos.

Only nine men have ever scored 300 or more goals in their NHL career. Don McKenney has recorded 228.




Young Pat Quinn is a high-spirited competitor who enjoys shaking up on-coming forwards.

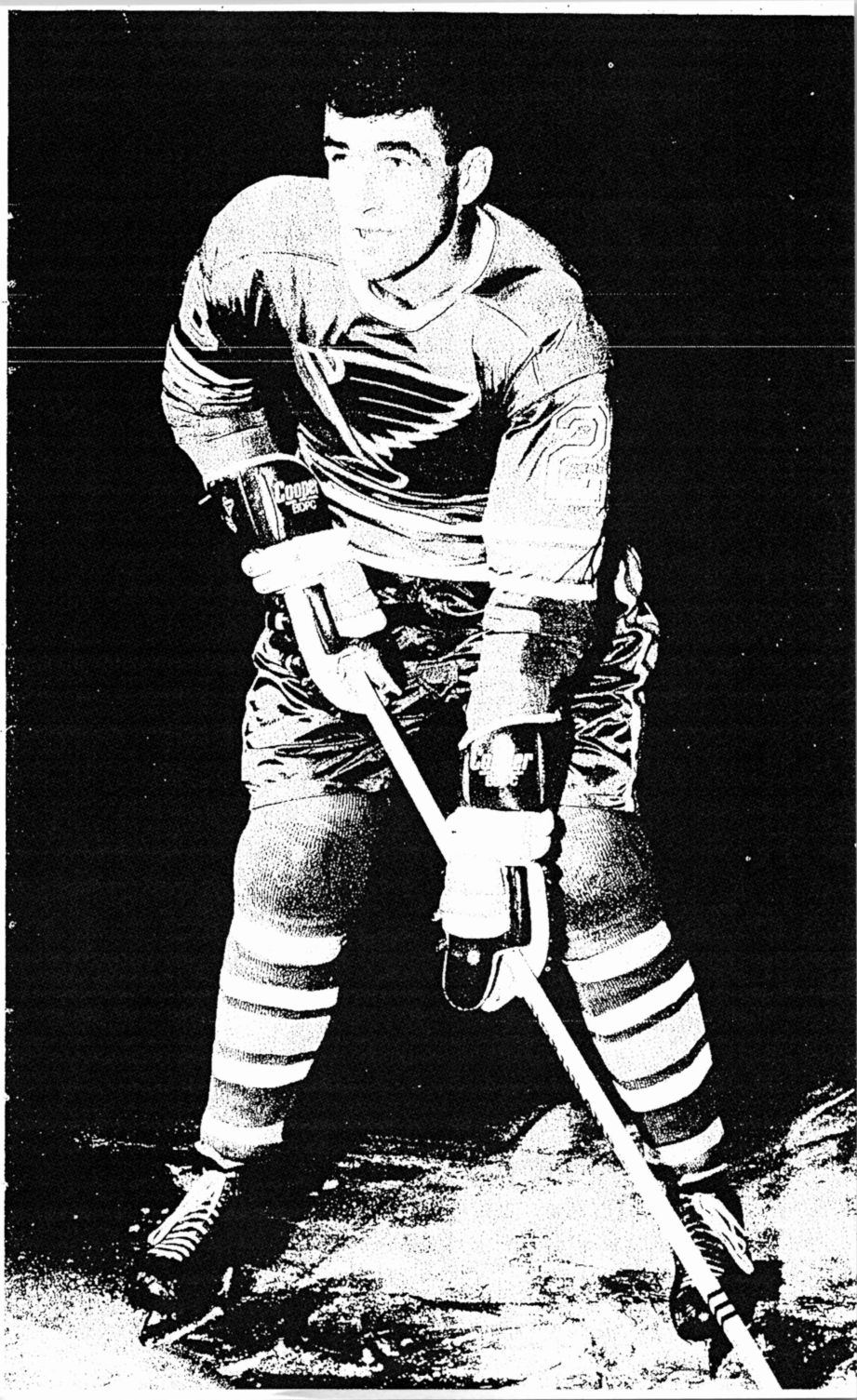
A solid 6' 3", 210 pounder, Quinn has little trouble in finding his pleasure. At 24, he is a three-year pro with good potential.

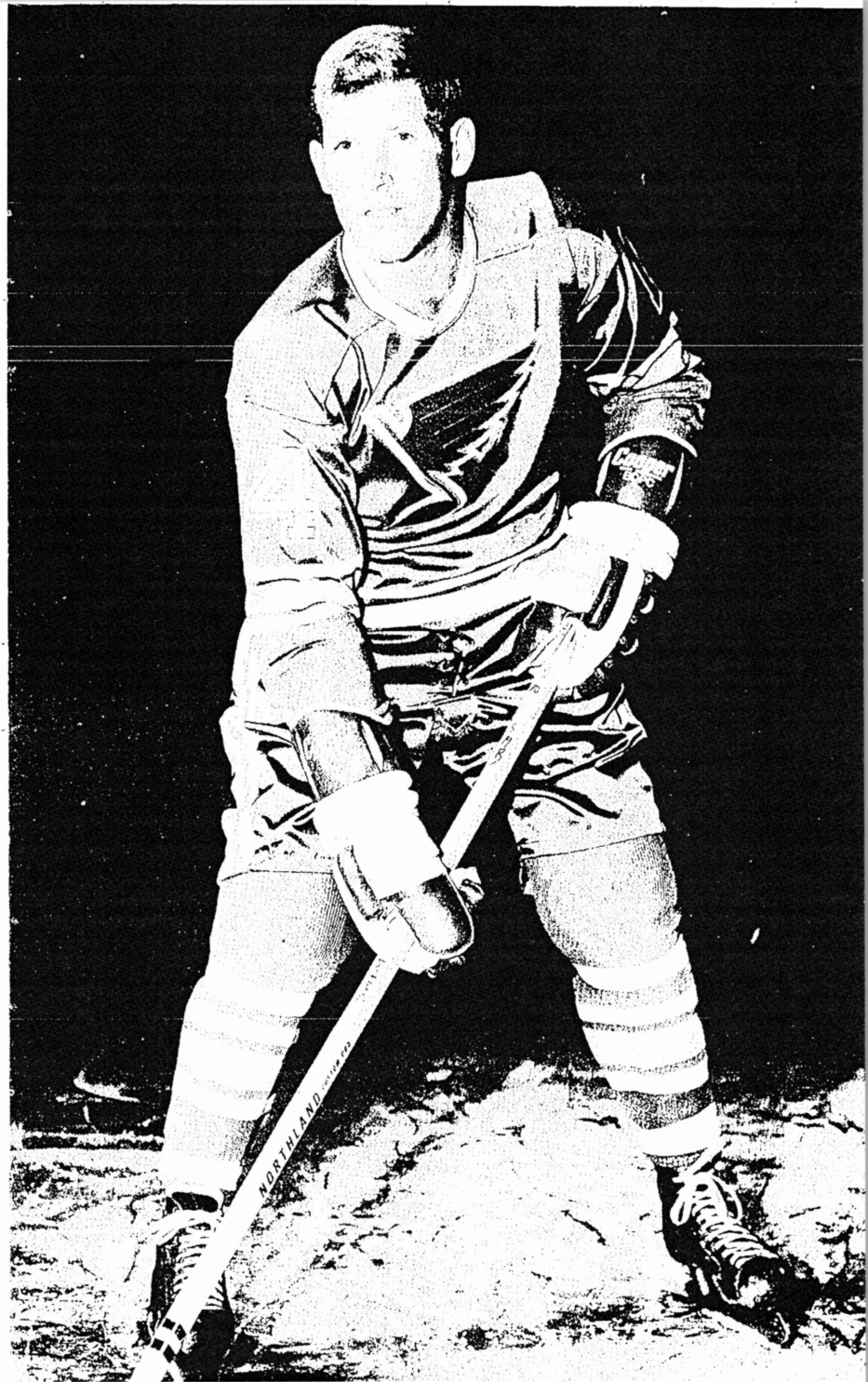


