DOGS AND THEIR OWNERS.

THE NEW YORK SHOW.

Comment on Dogs, Owners, the Rewards and Other Matters.

(CONTINUED)

The collie judging at New York was fully in accordance with the opinion previously expressed respecting the decisions which might be expected. People who have memories capable of recalling the events of last year will remember that Thos. H. Terry, who is presumed to name the judge of collies for the New York show, made a great parade of not being a competitor, so as to give other people a chance of winning under Dr. Downey. People with good dogs, when they saw the condition of Mr. Terry's said: "Thank you, for nothing." This year Mr. Terry blossoms out as the Hempstead Farm Company, Limited. Some people say it is a chapel of ease belonging to the Westminster Kennel Club, but beyond the statement that the dogs have been for some time at the Babylon Kennels, it is difficult to say much.

That the H. F. C., Limited, has a good hold on the W. K. C., it is easy to see. For instance, entries for the New York show closed on May 19, and on May 24 Mr. Shotwell sold Glangarry, Lady of the Lake, Lady Elliot, May and Gifford to the Hempstead Farm Company. I am by no means prepared to say that Mr. Shotwell did not enter all these dogs for the show on May 19. I fancy he did, and perhaps he will tell us if I am wrong. Even if he did, however, how come it that they appeared as the entry of a person who did not own them at the time the entries closed? Rule 2 is very explicit on this point, and the entries as catalogued were invalid and a protest would have debarred them. Not that the Westminster Kennel Club would have allowed such a protest. Oh, dear no; but the A. K. C. would have overruled their decision. The W. K. C. is getting sick of the A. K. C., now that it finds it cannot boss the affair, and was not even represented at the New York meeting, although Elliot Smith is president.

With Mr. Terry able to change the entries to suit himself, and otherwise boss the collie department the result was as might be expected, and a sorry lot of entries Dr. Downey will get if the W. K. C. puts him in as judge another year. I think this is the third year out of four he has been in the ring there, and to think that such a judge as Mr. Aggar, of New York, should be only an onlooker instead of the adjudicator!

Dr. Downey commenced by putting the woolly sheep Robin Adair over Roy Boy for the dog champion prize. In the bitch class Zulu Princess, Effie and Lady of the Lake were the competitors. Zulu Princess was only a wreck of her former self and should not have been shown. Lady of the Lake has deteriorated since she came out at Pittsburgh this spring, and I fear has seen her best day. She is getting a hard, coarse expression, and her coat is still short so that we may take it for granted she cannot grow a full coat again. I am rather inclined to consider Effie the better bitch, and regret not examining the two together more closely.

There were thirty dogs in the open class, leading off in the catalogue with Glangarry, a nice young dog in good coat. As the breeder of the dog I should like to see him do well, but justice compels me to say that I fear he lacks cleanliness of head and he is short in body, so that he matures and falls in the show ring. He is first and second for his head, in color and style he is a good match for Glangarry. He is a brother to Stephen, and all over a much better dog. The latter was beaten by Mr. Lindsay's home-bred dog Craft. Mr. Lindsay thought my opinion very far wrong when I told him at Pittsburgh that I did not think Stephen was any better as a show dog than Craft. Kelly B., faultily in head and soft in coat, was too highly valued in getting very highly commended. It is noticeable that of the five dogs which got commendations three were by Robin Adair, and neither one of them deserved what he got. Stephen, as already stated, was very highly commended, and the other was a big puppy by Ben Neris named Master Ray. He got highly commended.

Mr. C. J. Venable, of New York, had a New Haven and third at Newark and certainly worth a good notice.

Nallamore, Mr. Mitchell Harrison's new dog, was completely overlooked. That such a dog should have been passed over would, in any ordinary case, be unaccountable. Perhaps Dr. Downey thought him too large, and with too heavy a coat for a collie. If so we must excuse him, for to one whose experience was gained as owner of such poor dogs as Tweed II., it would be difficult to know what to do with Nallamore. The morning after the judging Dr. Downey surprised us by saying that Nallamore did get very highly commended, and that it was a mistake in copying from his book. This I do not believe, for the following reasons:—Mr. Harrison showed his dog in the ring and was never asked for his number by Dr. Downey, who hardly glanced at the dog at all. The number of Nallamore did not appear on the blackboard, neither was it on the steward's book as receiving any mention, nor on the duplicate slip of Dr. Downey's book. The only place it was noticed was on the stub of Dr. Downey's book, which he did not give in until late at night. Mr. Hammond, I believe, says he checked his catalogue by the judge's own book on Tuesday night, and Nallamore had then no mention upon his number. I had an opportunity of examining the original awards in Dr. Downey's own book and the evidence to my mind was complete that the letter opposite Nallamore's number were not made at the same time as the others on the same page. My reasons are that all through the book Dr. Downey made remarkably neat small letters or figures without any perceptible difference in size or style with the single exception of Nallamore. In his case the letters V. H. C. were very large and black and altogether different from anything else in the book. It would have been better for Dr. Downey to have acknowledged that he made a mistake. Another overlooked dog was Con, shown a little too fat, but still well up towards the front in character. Laddy, out of condition, was another no judge of the breed would have overlooked.

When we come to Kappa, 749 A, there is another story to be told. Dr. H. M. Perry having been disqualified could not enter any dogs at New York, but three entries appear in the name of B. F. Perry, Jr., of Greenville, South Carolina, two of "Kappa black, white and tan, whelped August, 1885. Breeder, Sans Souci Kennels, 8200." His numbers were 749 A and 814 A. The other was "794 A, Sigma, brown, white and tan, whelped September, 1885. Breeder, Sans Souci Kennels, 8300." It should not escape notice that these are all "A" numbers and must have been made after the entries closed. By my records entries accepted as the property of another Perry and not the Sans Souci Kennels representative. Still the entry is invalid for want of pedigree. Mr. Silvey of this city, was asked by Dr. Perry to show his dogs for him, and got his instructions, which were that Kappa, 749 A, should have been Sigma. Sigma was accordingly led in for 749 A, and got nothing. Among his opponents was Master Roy, highly commended. When it came the turn for dog puppies Sigma was trotted in again, and this time got second to Glangarry, while Master Roy was placed behind Sigma. Great judging that.

The open bitch class found the top-cared Daisy Dean at the head of affairs. Her coat is her only recommendation, and catalogued at \$300, she would lead at \$50. Lass of Downey is a very plain-headed one, but made her good will, Lass of Downey is small and is weedy, has a short, weak head, heavy ears, and poor in coat. Maria, commended, is lame. She was the best headed one of odds. Norma was exhibited too fat and showed hollow backed, but her grand head and collie character should have taken her to the front. Not even noticed, however. Her ears, by the way, were all right of her bench, but when she threw them forward. In the dog puppy class Glangarry was. Gifford and Balmoral were the next best pair. The latter unnoticed. There was something called J. I. M. which got commended. It was by Robin Adair and belonged to Mr. Elliot Smith. The proper place for this dog was in the miscellaneous class.

There were some puppies catalogued as by Hiram, out of Jersey Lily, but there is no question in my mind that Bounce is their sire, particularly as he was at Mr. Lindsay's at the time Jersey Lily was bred. A comparison of Braw and Donnie with Jersey Lily II. and her litter brothers and sister would conclusively prove my statement. A chance service probably. Lady Ellis was the best bitch puppy, but she is light of bone and wrong in service. May G. and Chula, both by Robin Adair, received very highly commended and highly commended, but their paternity is the only reason I can assign for the selection. The puppies, outside of the first prize winners, were a poor lot.

If not too inquisitive, I should like to ask how it was that after the collie judging was over two additional special prizes were offered—one for the best kennel and another for the best bitch. No special should be added to the list after the entries close.

I must add a few notes to relieve the column from amnesia this week.

The St. Louis show committee unanimously decline to receive the entries of the San Souci Kennels.

Mr. Wm. Graham, of Belfast, has purchased the celebrated bulldog Tom Ball, and we may therefore look for a sight of him at the Waverley Fair show next September, as it is certain that the deal was made on behalf of Mr. Thayer.

Dr. M. H. Cryer has been greatly improved in health by his trans-Atlantic trip.

At the New York Show, in discussing the matter of Senation at Boston, Mr. Hitchcock took the astounding ground, that the W. K. C. would not give up the prize, no matter what action the A. K. C. and the New England Club took.

On enquiry for the reason why, he coolly sheltered himself under the legal aspect of the case, that the New England Club accepted the entry and the collie's collie is backy. If this is really the spirit the W. K. C. is disposed to take of the case, the less they have to do with the A. K. C. the better for the latter.

How does Mr. Hitchcock make his position hitch with the case of the disqualification of St. Elmo. His club accepted the entry and withheld the prize money subject to the decision of the appeal. Presumably the money will now be paid to the owner of First Choice. The W. K. C. cannot blow hot and cold in this way.

Mr. Hitchcock, I should suppose, has withdrawn from all other previous positions occupied by the club with regard to the improper entry of the dog, and I think there is too much sense concentrated in the A. K. C. just now to let the one single point for decision be overlooked. It is simply this: Was the dog eligible or not to compete in the champion class at Boston? There is but one answer to this question—he was not. Such being the case disqualification must ensue or what is the use of the A. K. C.

Chess Notes.

The Danites Chess Club, of Brooklyn, gave Mr. Steinitz a reception on the evening of May 13.

Dr. Zakertoff arrived in New York from San Francisco last Saturday. We believe he contemplates returning to the committee of the London International Tournament of 1883, having still some money in hand, having given £100 towards the prizes of the next tournament of the British Association, under the condition that the competition be opened to all the world, and that the first prize be £50 and the second £40. The British Chess Association will provide the minor prizes.

The proposed telegraph match between the chess clubs of London and St. Petersburg will likely commence during the present month. Two games are to be played simultaneously with a lapse of five days between each move. The stakes are for 1,000 francs. Flowers, Bird, Blackburn, Mason and others will represent the British Chess Club, whilst Messrs. Bernkrovy, Clements, Schiffrs, Tegelerino and others will represent that of St. Petersburg.

THE RING.

After the fight between Burke and Mitchell, Jack Dempsey rushed upon the stage and challenged Mitchell to fight him. Nothing was done then in the matter, but two days afterwards the two men met in "Parson" Davis' saloon and Dempsey became greatly agitated. He wanted to fight in four weeks, but Mitchell said it would have to be eight weeks, as he was under contract to meet Sullivan in the meantime. But for the "Parson" and Jack Burke the men would have had a scrap then and there. No match was made between them.

A few nights ago John L. Sullivan and Tommy Warren had a short talk. Sullivan said: "Well, Tommy, we are a hard pair to beat—big and light as a feather." Sullivan said further that he could go to England with himself as heavy-weight, Dempsey middle-weight, Harry Gilmore light-weight, and Warren as the feather, and beat everything on the other side.

Mitchell and Burke came together for the fifth time in Chicago on the 10th inst., and, as usual, an unsatisfactory result was reached. Ten hard rounds were fought, Mitchell gaining first blood; in fact, he had the best of the struggle all through. The referee, Mr. Bradburn, of Chicago, however, declared it a draw, greatly to the disgust of the 4,000 spectators.

Two Richmond "pugs" Billy Thomas and "Bottle" Henry, aided by a number of noted professionals, attempted to fight to a finish with two-ounce gloves near Sleeter's saloon, early on Sunday morning, the 9th inst., but after fighting two rounds in which Thomas had the best of it, the affair broke up in a scamp, owing to the appearance of the police.

Harry Herndon, colored, and Fred Walters, an Englishman, both "wrecked" at New York for \$100 and the gate receipts, under London prize rule, on the 9th inst. In the eighth round Jack Cash refused to allow his man Walters to respond, and offered to fight any one in the room. Herndon was awarded the stake.

An old barn in Sharpburg, Pa., was the scene of a desperate prize fight on the 8th inst. The principals were Bill Clark, of Reading, Pa., and Jim Jones, of Conowingo, Md. Both were in their prime. Forty-three rounds were fought, lasting 1 1/2 hours. Clark was the winner.

Previous to the Burke-Mitchell affair at Chicago on the 10th inst., Tom Warren, of Louisville, undertook to stop Harry Nolan, of Chicago, in six rounds, though the latter was fifteen pounds heavier. Warren would have done it, but the police stopped them in the third round.

Sullivan and Mitchell are to meet again, this time at one of the shelling rinks in Chicago, with three-ounce gloves, 70 per cent. of the receipts to go to the winner and the balance to the loser. The meeting will take place about the first week in June.

A bare knuckle fight between Edward Boat, of Brookline, and Max Fickler, of New York, was broken up in a free fight in the sixth round on Long Island on the 12th inst. Both are willing to meet again to a finish.

Wm. McLean, of Detroit, and John Harris, of London, Ont., fought three rounds, with three-ounce gloves, three miles from London on the 8th inst. The Detroit knock his man clean out and won the \$200 stake.

Tom Hughes, a well-known sporting man of Pittsburgh, has challenged Pat Ryan, of New York, to a fight in private, with bare hands, for \$500 a side.

Jack McCarthy, of Port Richmond, defeated Ed McCann, of Chester, Pa., for the middle-weight boxing championship of Pennsylvania and a gold medal in this city on the night of the 8th inst.

Jack Ashton, the heavy-weight of Billy Madden's, completely won Dick Collier, an English middle-weight, in three rounds in New York on the 12th inst. Ashton was the victor by a heavy margin.

Dick Goodwin—"Spring Heel Dick" as he is well known in the pugilistic ranks—one of the greatest feather-weight fighters who ever entered the ring, is lying seriously ill at Cleveland, O.

A. J. Stewart, a California pugilist, was arrested recently at San Francisco for picking pockets. He subsequently took an overdose of laudanum in the cell which ended in his death.

Jack Fogarty and Joe Ellingsworth are matched to fight eight rounds under M. Q. rules in New York, Boston, Philadelphia and Chicago, for \$500 a side and all the gate receipts.

Faddy Ryan has become the landlord of the Brower House, Boston, he having just week effected a satisfactory arrangement with George A. Ayer, the well-known houseman.

Tom Hurlburt, a Meriden mawler, offers to box any 145-pound man in Connecticut, with either large or small gloves, to a finish or for points.

A noted Cleveland sportsman has put up a forfeit to match Pat Kellen against Marvin Thompson for a fight to a finish under M. Q. rules.

Pat Sheppard, having nearly recovered from a long illness, set off for Europe on the Favosna on May 13, to be gone for three months.

Harry Maynard, the ex-middle-weight champion, who some years ago emigrated to the Pacific coast, is now back in New York.

Dave Campbell, the Portland, Oregon, pugilist, has notified his backers that he will fight all 12 rounds.

Jack Burgess wants to go to Boston again to fight any of the top 145 middle-weighters, for instance, Lou Bischoff, McGee, or any other of the top class.

The Club Club, of Boston, is to have elegant new quarters by fall. The matter is now in the hands of a committee.

Andy McCarthy defeated Dick Cronin with kid gloves upon a calm of night, in Boston, on the 12th inst.

The authorities of Cincinnati have decided not to permit any more sporting matches.

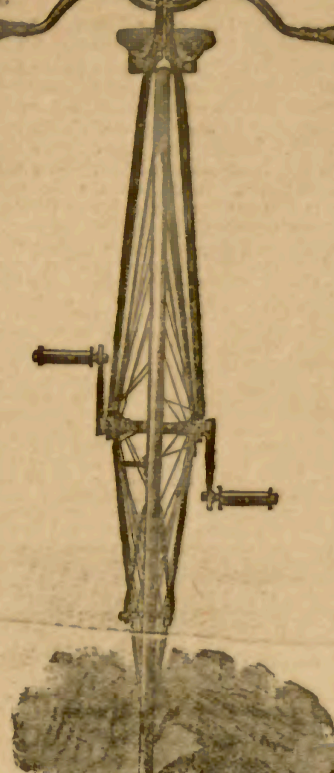
